- The Hawkeyes host No. 4/4 Michigan on Saturday at Kinnick Stadium. It is the ninth time in the Kirk Ferentz era that Iowa has hosted a top five team in Iowa City. Iowa is 5-3 against top five opponents in Kinnick under Ferentz, including winning five of its last six games. One of those wins came against No. 2 Michigan in 2016 a 14-13 victory.
- lowa's defense has allowed just 23 points in its first four games of the 2022 season the fewest points allowed in the last 66 years. The Hawkeyes gave up 20 points in the first four games in 1956. Iowa shut out Nevada (27-0) on Sept. 17 for its sixth shutout since 2016.
- D-TD... the Hawkeyes scored two defensive touchdowns at Rutgers, via a 45-yard interception return from DB/CASH Cooper DeJean and a 33-yard scoop-and-score from safety Kaevon Merriweather. It marked the first career touchdown for both players. Iowa also had two defensive touchdowns in a 2021 win over Indiana.
- DB/CASH Cooper DeJean is leading the Big Ten and is tied for second nationally with three interceptions, with all three coming in consecutive games (ISU, Nevada, Rutgers). The last Hawkeye to have an INT in three straight games was DB Jermari Harris in 2021. DeJean has started two games at CASH and two at DB this season.
- From to +... the Hawkeyes haven't committed a turnover in each of their past two games. Iowa tied a season high by forcing three turnovers at Rutgers (2 INT, 1 fumble), moving the team to +2 in turnover margin. The Hawkeyes have scored 21 points off turnovers this season.
- lowa earned its third and fourth Big Ten weekly honors on Sept. 26. P Tory Taylor was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week for a second time after averaging 42.6 yards on five punts with four pinning Rutgers inside their own 20. Kaevon Merriweather shared the Defensive Player of the Week honors. Iowa has earned three Big Ten Special Teams POW honors this season.
- Senior LB Jack Campbell finished with eight tackles at Rutgers, moving his total to a team-high 39 for the season. Campbell's 9.8 average is third in the Big Ten and 17th nationally. Campbell has two 10+ tackle games this season (7 for his career). He ranks 61st in school history with 216 career tackles 12 stops outside the top 50 all-time.
- lowa's defense leads the nation in scoring defense, giving up just 5.8 points per game. The Hawkeyes are fourth in red zone defense (.571), sixth in total defense (236.2), sixth in rushing defense (73.0) and 14th in passing defense (163.2).
- Full strength... the Hawkeyes' rushing attack was at full strength at Rutgers with all three of the top running backs available for the first time this season. Leshon Williams (64), Kaleb Johnson (58) and Gavin Williams (17) combined for 139 yards on 33 attempts against a Rutgers defense that had surrendered 32.3 rushing yards per game entering the contest.
- P Tory Taylor is leading the Big Ten and ranks fifth nationally with a 47.3 average. Taylor has 28 punts this season with a long of 63. Twelve of his punts have traveled 50+ yards and 17 have been downed inside the 20. He was the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week on Sept. 3 and Sept. 26 and has twice been named to the Ray's 8 List.



SERIES HISTORY

Michigan holds a 43-15-4 advantage in the series that began with a 28-5 lowa win in 1900. The first meeting between the two teams was played in Detroit and the second in Chicago. lowa has won five of the last eight meetings against the Wolverines. The most recent meeting came last December in Indianapolis with Michigan claiming the win in the Big Ten Championship game.

- Iowa has won the last four meetings against Michigan in Kinnick Stadium, winning 14-13 on Nov. 12, 2016, on true freshman Keith Duncan's game-winning 33-yard field goal as time expired, and 24-21 in 2013 on Mike Meyer's fourth-quarter field goal. The Hawkeyes also won 24-16 in 2011 and 30-28 in 2009.
- lowa has faced Michigan 14 times when the Wolverines were ranked in the top five nationally. Iowa has three wins in such games -- 9-7 in 1981, 12-10 in 1985 and 14-13 in 2016.
- Head coach Kirk Ferentz is 5-2 all-time against Michigan in Kinnick Stadium.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

lowa has played 1,285 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 679-567-39 (.544). That includes a 422-225-16 (.649) record in home games, a 257-342-23 (.432) record in games away from Iowa City, a 349-385-25 (.476) mark in Big Ten games and a 306-190-15 (.623) record in Kinnick Stadium.



HEAD COACH KIRK FERENTZ

Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents) is in his 24th season as Moon Family Head Football Coach at Iowa. He is the dean of NCAA Division I football coaches and is Iowa's all-time winningest coach, surpassing Hayden Fry in 2019. His contract runs through the 2029 season.

- Named Big Ten Coach of the Year four times in his career (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015). Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year awards.
- Guided Iowa to Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, and Big Ten West Division titles in 2015 and 2021.
- Named Woody Hayes, Eddie Robinson, and Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year in 2015. Was a finalist for the Maxwell Football Club, Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year award.
- Ferentz is fourth all-time with 181 overall wins as a member of the Big Ten. He
 has 111 Big Ten wins, which ranks fourth all-time.
- Named the 2002 Associated Press and Walter Camp National Coach of the Year and AFCA Regional Coach of the Year.
- Iowa has made two BCS bowl appearances, including a 24-14 win in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, and one CFP Bowl (2016).
- Iowa has played in 12 January bowl games with five January bowl victories (2004
 Outback Bowl, 2005 Capital One Bowl, 2009 Outback Bowl, 2010 FedEx Orange
 Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl).
- lowa has posted a 172-90 (.656) overall mark and a 107-65 (.622) Big Ten record since 2001. Ferentz has placed in the top one-half of the conference 15 times, including Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, a second-place finish in 2009, and West Division titles in 2015 and 2021.
- At Iowa, Ferentz holds an overall record of 181-111 (.620) and a 111-79 (.584) mark in Big Ten games. He is Iowa's all-time winningest football coach with 181 wins. In 26 seasons as a college head coach, he holds a career mark of 193-132 (.594), giving him the fourth most wins among active head coaches.
- The only Division I head coach to coach three sons at the same college. Brian, an
 assistant coach since 2012 and lowa's offensive coordinator, was a Hawkeye letterman from 2003-05. James was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line
 before graduating in May, 2013. Steven was a senior offensive lineman in 2016.

FERENTZ AMONG BIG TEN'S BEST

Moon Family Head Football Coach Kirk Ferentz has 111 Big Ten wins as Iowa's head coach, the fourth most of any coach in Big Ten Conference history. The Hawkeyes defeated Penn State, 41-21, on Nov. 21, 2020, to earn Ferentz's 100th conference win.

- Ferentz' 181 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten Conference rank fourth all-time in league history. He is one of five coaches in Big Ten Conference history to win at least 150 games as a member of the Big Ten Conference. The top five include Woody Hayes (202), Amos Alonzo Stagg (199), Bo Schembechler (194), Ferentz (181) and Joe Paterno (162).
- Ferentz (181-111) became lowa's all-time winningest coach on Sept. 1, 2018. The Hawkeyes defeated Northern Illinois, 33-7. It was Ferentz's 144th win as lowa's head coach, one more than his predecessor, Hayden Fry (143-89-6). Fry coached lowa for 20 years (1979-98). Ferentz completed his 23rd season in 2021.
- Both Ferentz (181, 111) and Fry (143, 96) rank in the top 10 in overall wins and Big Ten wins. Only lowa and Michigan have two coaches ranked in the top 10 of both win categories (Bo Schembechler 194, 143; and Lloyd Carr 122, 81).
- Ferentz is fourth among active coaches with 193 career victories.
- lowa is the only school in the country to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

FERENTZ TOPS IN LONGEVITY

Kirk Ferentz is in his 24th season as Iowa's head football coach in 2022. He is the longest tenured active head coach in college football. Ferentz was named Iowa head coach on Dec. 2, 1998. Among Big Ten coaches, only Pat Fitzgerald (2006) has been at his current school for 10 seasons or more.

- Defensive coordinator Phil Parker has been with Ferentz throughout his tenure, as he is in his 24th season on lowa's staff, including his 11th as defensive coordinator. He is the longest tenured defensive coordinator in FBS.
- Ferentz is the only Division I coach to coach three sons. Brian Ferentz, a former Hawkeye letterman and captain (2003-05), is in his 11th season on lowa's coaching staff. James Ferentz was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line and a team captain before graduating in 2013. Steven was an offensive lineman and letterwinner in 2015 and 2016.

LONGTIME ASSISTANTS

lowa's coaching staff boasts some of the top longevity in the nation with its assistant coaches. The Hawkeyes are one of five schools nationally with a minimum of five assistants that are entering their seventh-plus year of full-time coaching at the school in 2022.

IOWA'S 20-YEAR REUNION

Iowa will recognize its 2002 Big Ten Championship team this weekend as the Hawkeyes host Michigan. Iowa posted a perfect 8-0 league record in 2002 and was 11-2 overall. Members of the team will be recognized at a Friday evening reception and introduced on the field during Saturday's contest.

IOWA TO HONOR ANF WEEK

Former lowa tight end Tony Moeaki will be recognized this weekend as the newest member of the ANF Wall of Honor. ANF Week is sponsored by the lowa Farm Bureau. Moeaki will be recognized during Saturday's contest.

MIGHTY D

Iowa's defense is the nation's best scoring defense as the Hawkeyes have given up just 23 points (5.8 per game) in the first four contests (3 vs. South Dakota State, 10 vs. Iowa State, 0 vs. Nevada, 10 at Rutgers). The 20 points are the fewest points allowed for the program in 66 years. The Hawkeyes gave up 20 points in the first four games in 1956.

- It is also the first time since 1935 that the Hawkeye defense has giving up 10 points or fewer in the first four games.
- Iowa gave up 151 yards of total offense to a Nevada offense that was averaging 336.3 yards per game. It was the second time this season Iowa has allowed 151 yards or fewer (120 vs. South Dakota State). It was the first time since 1986 that Iowa's defense has given up 160 or fewer (125 at Iowa State, 159 vs. NIU, 150 vs. UTEP) in the team's first three games.
- Iowa's passing defense held the Wolfpack to 82 yards, tied for the 13th fewest in a game in the Kirk Ferentz era. The Hawkeyes have held two of their four opponents under 100 yards passing (87 vs. South Dakota State).
- Along with leading the nation in scoring defense, the Hawkeyes are third in passing efficiency defense (91.16), fourth in red zone defense (.571) and blocked punts (2), fifth in defensive touchdowns (2), sixth in total defense (236.2) and rushing defense (73.0), 14th in passing yards allowed (163.2), 19th in sacks (3.00), 20th in interceptions (5) and 25th in tackles for loss (7.0).

DEFENSIVE SCORING

Iowa's defense extended its pick six streak to 15 consecutive years at Rutgers when DB Cooper DeJean made an over the shoulder catch and returned the interception 45 yards for his first career touchdown. It was the 30th longest interception return for a touchdown in school history and the 50th all-time.

- Iowa's defensive found the end zone a second time in Piscataway when DB Kaevon Merriweather scooped up a Rutgers fumble (on a hit forced by DB Sebastian Castro) and return it 30 yards for a touchdown. It was the eighth fumble return for a touchdown in school history and the fifth longest in the record books.
- Merriweather shared the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors on Sept. 26.
- lowa's defense has scored 16 points this season via two touchdowns and two safeties.

HEY, COOP

Sophomore DB Cooper DeJean has started all four games – two at the CASH position and two at defensive back. DeJean has recorded an interception in three consecutive games (vs. Iowa State, vs. Nevada, at Rutgers). The last Hawkeye to accomplish the feat was junior DB Jermari Harris when he had interceptions in three straight games to close out the 2021 season (at Nebraska, vs. Michigan, vs. Kentucky).

- DeJean had a career-high 11 tackles, recorded his first career interception and had two pass breakups against Iowa State on Sept. 10.
- In four games, the Odebolt, Iowa, native is third on the team with 24 tackles, has a team-high three interceptions and has five pass breakups. He is leading the Big Ten and ranks second nationally in interceptions and is second in the Big Ten and NCAA in passes defended (8).

JACK ATTACK

Senior linebacker Jack Campbell has a team-high 39 tackles – 9.8 per game – in Iowa's first four games, which are tied for second in the Big Ten and 17th nationally. Campbell has had eight or more tackles in all four of Iowa's games (12, 9, 10, 8) and he had 10+ stops in two contests.

- Campbell has seven career games with 10 or more tackles, which are tied for the most on the team. His seven double-digit tackle games came against: vs. Kent State (11), vs. Colorado State (18), vs. Minnesota (17), at Nebraska (16), vs. Kentucky (14), South Dakota State (12) and Nevada (10).
- Campbell surpassed the 200-career tackle mark in lowa's 27-0 victory over Nevada on Sept. 17. He currently has 216 career tackles, which ranks 61st all-time. Campbell is 13 tackles shy of moving into the top 50 in program history.

SACK YOU VERY MUCH

lowa has seven players that have recorded at least one sack during the first four weeks of the season. The team's 12 sacks (3.0 per game) are leading the Big Ten and rank 19th nationally.

- Sophomore DL Lukas Van Ness has a team-high three sacks (11 yards), while freshman DL Aaron Graves has two sacks (10 yards) in limited action. Van Ness is 31st nationally (fourth in Big Ten) with 0.75 sacks per game.
- Van Ness also has a team-high five TFL, which are tied for the fifth most in the Big Ten.

TURNOVER FREE

The Hawkeyes haven't committed a turnover in consecutive games. The last time that happened came in 2021 in back-to-back wins at Northwestern and at home against Minnesota.

• Combined with Iowa's defense forcing seven turnovers over the last three games, the Hawkeyes are now +2 in turnover margin. Iowa has turned the seven turnovers into 21 points.

KALEB'S BREAKOUT

Freshman RB Kaleb Johnson rushed for his first 100-yard game in his third career contest, finishing with 103 yards on seven carries and scoring two touchdowns against Nevada on Sept. 17. The Ohio native had touchdown runs of 40 and 55 yards to become the first Hawkeye in at least the last 20 years to have two rushing touchdowns of 40+ yards in a single game.

- Johnson is the first Iowa freshman to eclipse 100 yards since Tyler Goodson (13-116-1 TD) at Nebraska in 2019. Johnson is also the first Iowa freshman with 100+ yards and two touchdowns since Marcus Coker in the 2010 Insight Bowl.
- Through four games, Johnson is Iowa's leading rusher with 174 yards on 29 carries for a 6.0 average. His 12 points are tied for second on the team.

RAY-GUH-EE-KNEE APPROACHES 100

Senior Nico Ragaini is seven catches shy of 100 for his Hawkeye career. The Connecticut native has 93 career receptions for 1,024 yards.

A MARATHON W

Iowa's 27-0 victory over Nevada kicked off at 6:40 p.m. (CT) on Sept. 17 inside Kinnick Stadium and ended at 1:39 a.m. early Sunday morning. There were three weather delays lasting 236 minutes and the game spanned 6:59 minutes from start to finish.

• It was the second weather delay in Kinnick Stadium history. Iowa's game against Tennessee Tech was delayed 84 minutes in 2011. Iowa's last game affected by a delay came at Iowa State in 2019. Iowa won both of those contests.

THE SHUUUUUUUUUUUUUUUU

Iowa's defense recorded its first shutout since 2019 with its 27-0 victory over Nevada on Sept. 17. Iowa posted two posted two shutouts in 2019 in a road win at Northwestern (20-0) and a home win over Rutgers (30-0). The shutout of Nevada was Iowa's 13th under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

• Iowa has six shutouts since 2016, which are tied with Penn State, UAB and Virginia Tech for fourth most in the country over that span.

DON'T BEAT YOURSELF

Iowa ranks in the top 12 as one of the least penalized teams in the nation in 2022. The Hawkeyes haven't been penalized for more than 50 yards in each of their first four games.

- The team is tied for sixth in fewest penalty yards (115) and fewest penalty yards per game (28.75), 11th in fewest penalties per game (4.25) and 12th in fewest penalties (17).
- Iowa had just two penalties for 15 yards in the season-opening win over South Dakota State.

SCORING EARLY

The Hawkeyes allowed their first points in the first quarter of the season when Rutgers drove for a game-opening field goal on Sept. 24. Iowa is outscoring its opponents, 31-3, in the opening quarter this season.

• Iowa is also winning the third quarter scoring battle, 12-0.

ELITE SPECIAL TEAMERS - 9-TO-2

Junior Tory Taylor and senior Terry Roberts have teamed up to form a dynamic duo on the lowa punting unit. In three games this season, Roberts has downed four of Taylor's punts, all inside the 20 (three inside the 6) and he has five direct special teams plays (four downed punts, one tackle) on the unit.

• Roberts missed Iowa's game at Rutgers because of injury.

STEVENS STEPS IN

Freshman K Drew Stevens is 4-for-4 on field goal attempts this season. The South Carolina native made his Hawkeye field goal kicking debut against Nevada, connecting from 43 and 33 yards. Stevens kicked two more field goals at Rutgers, which includes a career-long 51 yarder. It is tied for the 11th longest in program history.

TRUE FRESHMEN STARTERS SINCE 1999

Since 1999, Kirk Ferentz's first year as Iowa head coach, 31 true freshmen have started for the Hawkeyes.

- Stevens is leading the team with 18 points via four field goals and six extra points.
- Iowa's placekickers are 5-for-7 on field goal attempts this season. Sophomore Aaron Blom made 1-of-3 attempts in the first two games with a make from 46 yards.
- Stevens also handles kickoff duties, where he has 11 touchbacks in 16 kickoffs.

BLOCK THAT PUNT

DL Lukas Van Ness tied a single-game school record, blocking a pair of punts against Iowa State on Sept. 10. It is the sixth time a Hawkeye has had multiple blocks in a single game and Van Ness is the fifth Hawkeye to accomplish the feat.

Ken Iwebema had two blocks against Syracuse in 2007 and against Illinois in 2005.

- Van Ness tied the school record for blocked punts in a game with two inside Iowa State territory. The only other Hawkeye to block two punts in the same game was Sean Considine at Iowa State in 2003.
- Van Ness' first block of the game set up the Hawkeyes' touchdown. It was Iowa's first punt block of the season and first since the 2021 regular season finale at Nebraska (Henry Marchese).
- Van Ness blocked his second punt in the third quarter, giving lowa possession at the lowa State 20. The possession ended with an lowa turnover at the goal line.
- Iowa is first in the Big Ten and third nationally in blocked kicks. Van Ness is leading the Big Ten and ranks second nationally behind Temple's De'Von Fox's three blocks.

CREATIVE SCORING

Senior LB Jack Campbell has found ways to put points on the scoreboard for the Iowa football team. In his Hawkeye career, Campbell has scored via a safety (vs. South Dakota State, 2022), interception return for a touchdown (vs. Illinois, 2021) and a fumble return for a touchdown (vs. Iowa State, 2021).

lowa took the unconventional path to seven points via a field goal and two second-half safeties during the 7-3 victory over South Dakota State on Sept. 3. Following Tory Taylor's punt that pinned the Jacks at the 1, Jack Campbell's tackle for loss gave the Hawkeyes a 5-3 third-quarter lead. Taylor pinned SD State deep again in the fourth quarter and Joe Evans' sack accounted for Iowa's final two points.

• It was the first time since 2018 at Penn State that the Hawkeyes had two safeties in the same game.

D SHINES IN OPENER

Iowa's defense limited South Dakota State to 120 yards of total offense in the Hawkeyes' 7-3 season-opening victory on Sept. 3. The 120 yards are the fewest allowed in a season opener since 2004 (110 vs. Kent State) and the fewest by the Hawkeye defense since 2018 (115 vs. Maryland).

- The 120 yards are the fifth fewest allowed during the Kirk Ferentz era.
- The Hawkeyes allowed just 33 yards on the ground, the fewest in 23 games, dating back to the 2019 Holiday Bowl victory over Southern California. Iowa gave up just 22 rushing yards to the Trojans.
- Iowa's pass defense was nearly as good, allowing just 87 yards passing the fewest since 2019 against Rutgers (a span of 34 games). The Hawkeyes limited the Scarlet Knights to 41 yards.
- In that same game against Rutgers, lowa gave up just five first downs. The Hawkeyes surrendered six first downs against South Dakota State on Sept. 3.
- The Hawkeyes gave up just three points against the Jackrabbits the fewest since shutting out Northwestern in 2019.
- Iowa's defense surrendered just six first downs against South Dakota State, which are tied for the third fewest allowed during the Kirk Ferentz era.

UNCONVENTIONAL 7 WAS ENOUGH

- The Hawkeyes' seven points are the fewest for a Big Ten team in a win since Iowa's 6-4 win at Penn State in 2004.
- Iowa is the first Big Ten team to win a game without scoring a touchdown since Nebraska in 2018 (beat Michigan State, 9-6). The Hawkeyes' last such win? The 6-4 win at Penn State in 2004.

FRESHMAN PT TRACKER

Iowa has had seven true freshmen play in the first four games of the 2022 season. The list includes: DL Aaron Graves (3), DB T.J. Hall (4), RB Kaleb Johnson (4), DB Xavier Xwankpa (4), TE Addison Ostrenga (4), RB Jaziun Patterson (1) and K Drew Stevens (4).

OH MY TORY

Junior Tory Taylor is averaging 47.3 yards on 28 punts over the first four games. The Australia native has 12 punts of 50+ yards and 17 punts have been downed inside the 20-yard line. His 47.3 average is tops in the Big Ten and ranks fifth nationally.

- Taylor punted a career-high 10 times for 479 yards, averaging 47.9 yards per attempt, against South Dakota State on Sept. 3. Taylor had punts downed at the 1, 2, 6, 8, 8 and 12-yard lines and seven of his punts were inside the 20.
- Taylor was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week and to the Rays 8 List on Sept. 5 for his efforts. It is his second career Big Ten weekly honor as he earned his first distinction last season following lowa's 27-17 win at No. 9 lowa State.
- He was also named to the Ray's 8 List following Week 3.

Taylor was also named Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week following Iowa's win at Rutgers, where he averaged 42.6 yards on five punts, with four of the five being downed inside the 20. He had a long of 51 yards and Rutgers had just one return for negative two yards.

• Taylor earned his second Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week honor on Sept. 26 after averaging 42.6 yards on five punts with a long of 51. Four of his punts were downed inside the Rutgers 20 and the Scarlet Knights had just one punt return for -2 yards.

P & P

The Hawkeyes return their top two quarterbacks from the 2021 Big Ten West Division-winning team in senior Spencer Petras and junior Alex Padilla. Petras started 11 games, completing 165-of-288 passes for 1,880 yards with 10 touchdowns, while Padilla went 55-of-112 for 636 yards and two touchdowns in three starts.

THE CALIFORNIA KID

- Spencer Petras owns a 16-7 record (.696) as Iowa's starting quarterback, the seventh-best percentage by a starting quarterback in program history. Iowa has scored 24.4 points per game in Petras' 23 starts.
- Petras completed 14-of-26 attempts for 175 yards and one touchdown in lowa's 27-0 victory over Nevada on Sept. 17. He is 48-of-94 for 524 yards with one touchdown this season. Petras currently is 12th in program history with 3,998 yards.
- In his last two games, Petras is 25-of-43 (.581) for 323 yards and one touchdown. More importantly, Petras (or the Hawkeyes) hasn't committed a turnover. Iowa is 10-3 under Petras when he doesn't throw an interception.
- He started 17 straight games from the 2020 season through Week 9 of 2021 before missing the Nov. 13 game against Minnesota because of injury in 2021.
- Petras led lowa to 12 consecutive victories from 2020-21, winning the final six games of 2020 and the first six games of 2021. He went 194-of-324 for 2,226 yards with 17 touchdown passes, four interceptions during the winning streak.
- The Hawkeyes averaged 31.8 points per game in 2020, Petras' first year as the starting quarterback. It marked lowa's highest point per game total since 2002 (36.5). The Hawkeyes won their final six games in 2020, outscoring their opposition, 214-83.

• Petras matched his career high with three touchdown passes and set a career high with two rushing touchdowns Week 5 at Maryland. He became the first lowa quarterback with multiple passing touchdowns and multiple rushing touchdowns in a game since Brad Banks at Minnesota in 2002.

FROM THE ROCKIES

Colorado native Alex Padilla led Iowa to two wins in his first two career starts (27-22 vs. Minnesota in Week 10; 33-23 vs. Illinois in Week 11) during the 2021 season. Padilla went 3-0 as a starter.

• Padilla made his first career start Week 10 against Minnesota and passed for career-high 206 yards. He ran for one touchdown (1) and threw for two (72, 27), both career firsts. He was 6-for-17 for 83 yards in his second career start, a Week 11 win against Illinois.

THE NEXT GREAT HAWKEYE TIGHT END?

Senior Sam LaPorta returns as Iowa's featured tight end after leading the team in receptions, receiving yards and touchdowns (tied) in 2021. The Illinois native had 53 catches for 670 yards and three touchdowns a season ago.

- LaPorta, who has been named to the John Mackey Award Watch List in each of the past two seasons, led Big Ten tight ends in receptions, yards, yards after catch (299), yards after contact (206) and catches of 15+ yards (18) in 2021.
- LaPorta concluded his junior season with the best game of his career, finishing with seven catches for 122 yards and a touchdown in the Citrus Bowl against Kentucky.
- LaPorta had a career-high eight receptions for 55 yards against Iowa State on Sept. 10 and had a career-long 42-yard reception at Rutgers. He is Iowa's leading receiver through four games with 16 catches for 154 yards.
- For his career, LaPorta has 111 catches for 1,283 yards and four touchdowns. He ranks 29th in school history with 1,283 yards.

WILLIAMS SQUARED

lowa has a 1-2 Williams punch in the backfield in 2022 in sophomores Gavin and Leshon Williams. The duo combined to rush for 374 yards on 86 carries during the 2021 season.

- Leshon Williams made his first career start in the season opener against South Dakota State, finishing with 72 yards on 24 carries, which were both career-bests. Leshon Williams is second on the team with 170 yards on 49 attempts in thew three games he has played. He scored his first career touchdown from 9 yards out against lowa State on Sept. 10 and scored at Rutgers (9/24). He missed the Nevada game due to the passing of his father.
- Gavin Williams has started two games, where he has 84 yards on 25 attempts in three games. He missed the opener because of injury and played sparingly against Iowa State.
- Gavin Williams made his first career start in the 2022 Citrus Bowl against Kentucky, where he finished with 98 yards on 16 carries. Leshon Williams, meanwhile, had 10 carries for 42 yards against the Wildcats.
- Gavin and Leshon Williams are not related.

THE MAN IN THE MIDDLE

Senior linebacker Jack Campbell returns as the anchor of the Iowa defense after earning second-team All-America honors by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) and Phil Steele in 2021. The Cedar Falls, Iowa, native led the country with 143 tackles, including 57 solo and 86 assists. The total ranks fifth in a single season in school history and were the most by a Hawkeye since Pat Angerer had 145 in 2009.

- Campbell was the first Hawkeye to record 100 tackles in a single season since Josey Jewell, who had 100+ tackles each year from 2015-17. He posted five double-digit tackle performances (11, 18, 17, 16, 14) in 2021. Campbell has a team-high 39 tackles and 2.5 TFL through the first four weeks of the season. He was named the Lott IMPACT Player of the week for his efforts against South Dakota State.
- This season, Campbell is a preseason All-American by Athlon Sports, Phil Steele and The Sporting News. He has also been named to the Butkas Award, Nagurski, Bednarik and Lott IMPACT Trophy Watch Lists.

WHAT A TRIO...

The Hawkeye defense returns all three of its starting linebackers in Jack Campbell, Seth Benson and Jestin Jacobs. All three players are on the Butkus Award Watch List, making lowa the only team in the nation to have three linebackers on the list.

- The trio combined for 301 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss, three sacks and four interceptions during the 2021 season. Campbell also scored two defensive touchdowns (fumble recovery at Iowa State; interception return TD vs. Illinois).
- Campbell, Benson and Jacobs have combined for 75 tackles in 2022. Campbell and Benson are first and second on the team in tackles with 39 and 30, respectively.
- Jacobs returned to action at Rutgers after missing games against Iowa State and Nevada because of injury. He made one tackle - a tackle for loss - before leaving the game because of injury.

TATUM-WOODSON BIG TEN DB OF THE YEAR RETURNS

Senior Riley Moss returns for his final season as a Hawkeye after earning second-team All-America honors by the Football Writers Association of America and third-team All-America honors by the AP.

- The Ankeny, Iowa, native was also named the Tatum-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year in 2021 after finishing with 39 tackles and four interceptions in 11 games.
- Moss is the first Big Ten player since Iowa's Desmond King to return to school the season after winning the Tatum-Woodson Defensive Back of the Year honor.
- Moss tied for 14th in the country and fourth in the Big Ten with four interceptions in 2021. Moss had two interceptions returns for touchdowns in Iowa's opening win over Indiana. He is tied for 11th in career interceptions (10-239-3 TDs), is one of three players in program history with three interception returns for touchdowns and ranks second in career interception return yards.

BALL HAWKS

- lowa led the country with a school-record 25 interceptions in 2021. The Hawkeyes have 94 interceptions since 2017, more than any team in the country.
- Sophomore Cooper DeJean has recorded an interception in each of Iowa's last three games. His pick against Iowa State was his first career interception. Senior Terry Roberts had a third-quarter pick against Iowa State (his second career interception) and he had an interception return for a touchdown wiped off the board against Nevada because of a penalty.

- Both DeJean and Kaevon Merriweather had interceptions at Rutgers, Iowa's fourth and fifth picks this season.
- Eleven Hawkeyes had at least one interception in 2021 -- the most for the program since 1997 (14). Four players finished with at least three interceptions for the first time since 2008. Riley Moss and Jermari Harris had four interceptions apiece.
- Moss had two interceptions returned for a touchdown, both in Week 1 against Indiana. LB Jack Campbell returned an interception 32 yards for a touchdown against Illinois in
- Iowa combined for 10 interceptions in consecutive games against Maryland and Penn State in 2021, which tied Miami (2001) for second most over a two-game span over the last 25 years. Mississippi State had 11 in 2002.
- Six different Hawkeyes intercepted a pass in Iowa's 51-14 win at Maryland, tying a school record for most players with an interception in a single game (vs. Wisconsin in 1982). The six interceptions are the most in a game since lowa had a school-record seven interceptions vs. Wisconsin in 1982.
- Iowa turned 31 turnovers into 92 points in 2021. The Hawkeyes' defense scored 28 points (4 TDs and 2 safeties). Iowa's special teams had two touchdowns (one kickoff return, one blocked punt return).
- Iowa has had at least one interception return for a touchdown in each of the last 15 seasons and 20 of the last 22.

YEP, THEY'RE FREAKS

Two Hawkeyes -- defensive back Riley Moss and fullback Monte Pottebaum -- have made Bruce Feldman's annual "Freaks" list for the 2022 season.

- Moss, who came in at No. 19, has vertical-jumped 42 inches and broad-jumped 10-8. The Ankeny, Iowa, native has clocked 3.85 seconds in the short shuttle time, which is the fastest time in the Ferentz era. It would have been the fastest time at this year's combine (no one has even cracked 3.90 at the combine since 2017).
- Pottebaum, who came it at No. 52, holds a Hawkeye position record with a 3.92 short shuttle time and a 435-pound power clean.

YOUTHFUL HAWKEYES

Iowa's 2022 roster features 86 underclassmen (56 freshmen and 30 sophomores), which are tied for the 12th most in the nation. Of Iowa's 126 player roster, 68.3 percent are underclassmen. The Hawkeyes are the second youngest team in the Big Ten.

A SPECIAL SPECIAL TEAMER

Melbourne, Australia, native Tory Taylor returns for his third season as Iowa's punter after ranking fourth in the Big Ten, averaging 46.1 yards per punt in 2021. The two-time Ray Guy Award semifinalist led the Big Ten and ranked second nationally with 80 punts. He had 27 punts of 50 or more yards, including a career-long 69-yard punt at Iowa State in Week 2. Thirty-nine of his punts were downed inside the 20.

- Taylor is a preseason All-American by Athlon Sports and a Ray Guy Award Watch List honoree leading into the 2022 season.
- Last season, lowa owned the field position battle in each of its 10 wins. The Hawkeyes

averaged 20-plus yards better in field position three times (+20 vs. Penn State; +22 at Maryland; +22 at Iowa State).

- Taylor recorded three of the top nine single-game punting averages in the Ferentz era. Iowa's Week 2 punting average of 51.1 ranked No. 3 all-time in the Ferentz era. Its Week 1 punting average of 49.5 ranked No. 7 and the 49.0 average Week 8 tied for ninth.
- Taylor was Big Ten Co-Special Teams Player of the Week following lowa's win at lowa State. He averaged 51.1 yards on eight punts. Five of his punts were downed inside the 20, while lowa State had just one punt return. His 47.3 average in 2022 is leading the Big Ten and ranks fifth nationally.
- In Iowa's 23-20 win over No. 4 Penn State, Taylor punted nine times, dropping six inside the 20, five inside the 10 and three punts inside the five.

IN THE RANKINGS

- Iowa has been ranked in the AP Top 25 at least once in each of the last seven seasons, the third-longest streak in school history.
- Iowa finished the 2021 season ranked 23rd in the coaches' poll and 23rd in the AP poll. It marked the 26th time in program history that Iowa finished the season ranked in the top 25. Iowa has finished ranked 15th or better in the AP poll six times in 23 completed seasons under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

BIG TEN BOWL GAMES SINCE 2001

- The Hawkeyes have been bowl eligible 20 times in the last 21 seasons. Iowa accepted an invitation to the 2020 Music City Bowl, but the game was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz is one bowl win shy of tying Joe Paterno (10) for most bowl wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference. Ferentz has a 9-9 bowl record. His nine bowl wins tie Barry Alvarez for second in Big Ten history.
- Seventeen coaches have won 10 or more bowl games in their career. Among active coaches, only Nick Saban (17), Mack Brown (14), Kyle Whittingham (11), Mike Gundy (11) and Dabo Swinney (11) have more bowl wins than Ferentz.
- Since the 2001 season, only Ohio State (12) and Wisconsin (11) have more bowl wins (including FCS Playoffs and the BCS championship game), than lowa. Iowa is 17-16-1 all-time in bowl games. The following are the records for Big Ten teams in bowl games since 2001:

Brecht, who has a 100+ mile per hour fastball, went 1-3 with a 3.18 ERA with 44 strikeouts over 22 2/3 innings.

• Brecht made his Hawkeye football debut against South Dakota State on Sept. 3 and made his first career catch against Nevada. The Ankeny, Iowa, native was targeted four times against the Wolfpack – three on deep balls.

BACK ON CAMPUS

Seven former players are on the University of Iowa football staff in 2022.

- Brian Ferentz, a three-year letterman from 2003-05, is in his 11th year on staff, his sixth as offensive coordinator and first as quarterbacks coach.
- LeVar Woods, a three-year letterman from 1998-2000, is in his 15th season on the lowa staff. Woods was named special teams coordinator in 2017. He coached tight ends from 2015-17 and linebackers from 2012-14. He rejoined the program as an administrative assistant in 2008.
- Kelvin Bell joined the Iowa program as a defensive lineman in 2000, but had his career cut short due to injury. He returned to the program as a graduate assistant and served as director of on-campus recruiting from 2012-13. He was named recruiting coordinator and defensive assistant coach in February, 2016, and was named defensive line coach in 2019.
- Ladell Betts joined the lowa coaching staff as running backs coach in 2021. Betts is the second leading rushing in lowa football history, rushing for 3,686 yards from 1998-2001. He is the only running back in school history to lead the team in rushing four straight years.
- Abdul Hodge joined the staff as tight end/fullback coach in 2022. The three-time All-Big Ten linebacker lettered for the Hawkeyes from 2002-05, leading the team to 38 wins, two Big Ten titles and four straight January bowl games. Hodge ranks third all-time in career tackles (453).
- Former Hawkeyes Jason Manson and Sam Brincks lead Iowa's player development unit. Manson, the Hawkeyes' director of player development, was a two-year letterman as a quarterback and wide receiver in 2005 and 2006. Brincks is the assistant director of player development and a 2018 Iowa graduate. He played defensive tackle for the Hawkeyes from 2015-18.

TROPHY COLLECTION

Iowa fell 10-7 to Iowa State in its first trophy game of the 2022 season. It was the Hawkeyes' first loss to the Cyclones since 2014. Iowa is 25-8 in its last 33 trophy games (includes bowl games and conference championships).

- Iowa is 22-7 in its last 29 rivalry trophy games (Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska, Wisconsin).
- Last season, the Hawkeyes defeated Nebraska, 28-21, to capture the Heroes Trophy for the seventh straight year. Iowa retained possession of Floyd of Rosedale with a 27-22 win against Minnesota on Nov. 13. The Hawkeyes lost possession of the Heartland Trophy on Oct. 30 at Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes defeated No. 9 Iowa State, 27-17, on Sept. 11, 2021, to win the Iowa Corn Cy-Hawk Series game for the sixth consecutive time.

- Epenesa is one of two players whose brothers played at Iowa: Eric (A.J. 2017-19) and FB Johnny Plewa (Macon in 2013-15).
- RB Max White is the great, great grandson of Max Hawkins, a member of University of Iowa's famed 'Ironmen" team in 1939 that included Iowa Heisman Trophy winner Nile Kinnick.

2022 PLAYER COUNCIL

Twenty-three players -- 12 seniors, six juniors and five sophomores -- are on the 2022 Player Council. The purpose of the group is to assist in formulating policies and being involved in team decision-making throughout the year. Players were selected following coaching staff and player input.

The 12 seniors include Seth Benson, Jack Campbell, Joe Evans, Sam LaPorta, Kaevon Merriweather, Riley Moss, Spencer Petras, Monte Pottebaum, Nico Ragaini, Terry Roberts, Noah Shannon and John Waggoner. Junior members of the group include Kyler Fisher, Jermari Harris, Jay Higgins, Logan Lee, Alex Padilla and Tory Taylor. Sophomore members are Arland Bruce, IV, Connor Colby, Cooper DeJean, Mason Richman and Gavin Williams.

THE HAWKEYE WAVE: THE FANS HAVE SPOKEN

The Hawkeye Wave is no longer getting one new song. Instead, the best tradition in college sports is getting a new soundtrack. Two months after the University of Iowa announced it was asking Hawkeye fans to vote for the next song to accompany the Hawkeye Wave, those fans put the decision into the hands of the patients and families at UI Stead Family Children's Hospital.

For every home game the lowa football team plays inside Kinnick Stadium, the UI Department of Athletics, in coordination with the UI Stead Family Children's Hospital Kid Captain program, will ask that week's Kid Captain to help select a new song to accompany the Hawkeye Wave.

SOLD OUT!

All seven University of Iowa home football games are sold out for the 2022 season. It is the first time since 2011 that Iowa has sold out all seven home games.

CELEBRATING #300

The Hawkeyes' 30-7 win against Kent State on Sept. 18, 2021, was their 300th win at Kinnick Stadium since the stadium opened in 1929. The first game played at Kinnick Stadium was Oct. 5, 1929, a 46-0 Hawkeye win against Monmouth. Iowa's 100th win at Kinnick was a 31-19 victory over Arizona on Oct. 4, 1969. The 200th win at Kinnick Stadium was a 44-19 victory against Miami, Ohio, on Sept. 8, 2001. Iowa became the seventh Big Ten school to celebrate at least 300 wins in its home stadium.

IOWA FOOTBALL AND THE NFL

- The Hawkeyes have had 206 former players in the NFL since 1999, Kirk Ferentz's first year as head coach (81 draft picks/125 free agents).
- Iowa and Florida lead all schools with five offensive tackles currently active in the NFL.
- Iowa is tied with Miami, Florida, Notre Dame, Penn State and Stanford with the most tight ends active in the NFL (4).

- At least one Iowa Hawkeye has been selected in every NFL Draft since 1978 (44 consecutive years).
- lowa has had 11 First Round NFL Draft picks under head coach Kirk Ferentz.
- Two former Hawkeyes -- Jake Gervase and Alaric Jackson -- were members of the Los Angeles Rams' 2022 Super Bowl champion team
- OT Tristan Wirfs earned first-team All-Pro and was a Pro Bowl selection in 2021.
- TE T.J. Hockenson (eighth overall, Detroit) and TE Noah Fant (20th overall, Denver) became the first tight ends from the same school to be drafted in the first round of a single NFL Draft (2019).
- OL Brandon Scherff (Washington) was named first-team All-Pro in 2020. TE T.J. Hockenson (Detroit), TE George Kittle (San Francisco) and Scherff (Washington) were named to the 2020 Pro Bowl.
- TE George Kittle (San Francisco) was a first-team All-Pro in 2019. OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) was named second-team All-Pro that same season.
- DB Desmond King (Los Angeles Chargers), LS Casey Kreiter (Denver), TE George Kittle (San Francisco), and OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) were named All-Pro in 2018.
- Over the past 23 years, 199-of-238 (84 percent) of lowa's senior starters have been drafted in the NFL or signed NFL free agent contracts.
- Over the past 14 years, Iowa has had 53 NFL Draft picks, the third most in the Big Ten -- Ohio State (83), Michigan (63), Wisconsin (52).
- Iowa has had eight first round picks in the last 12 NFL drafts -- OL Bryan Bulaga, 2010; DE Adrian Clayborn, 2011; OL Riley Reiff, 2012; OL Brandon Scherff, 2015, TE T.J. Hockenson, TE Noah Fant, 2019; OL Tristan Wirfs, 2020; OL Tyler Linderbaum, 2022.
- Iowa had six players drafted in the 2012 NFL Draft, which tied for the most in the Big Ten and tied for fourth in the country.
- Former Hawkeye Marshal Yanda (Baltimore OL) was an eight-time Pro-Bowler (2011-16, 2018, 2019) and was named NFL All-Pro in 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2018, 2019. He retired following the 2019 season.
- In NFL 2011 regular season statistics, former Hawkeye linebackers Chad Greenway (Minnesota) and Pat Angerer (Indianapolis) finished third and fourth, respectively, in tackles. Greenway was named to the Pro Bowl in 2012 and 2013.
- Three former Hawkeyes were involved in the 2012 Super Bowl. DB Tyler Sash played for the Super Bowl champion New York Giants, while LB Jeff Tarpinian was on the injured reserve roster of the New England Patriots. Former Iowa center Brian Ferentz, now is his 11th year on staff and sixth as Iowa's offensive coordinator, was New England's tight ends coach.
- Former Iowa DB Sean Considine and OL Marshal Yanda won Super Bowl rings with the 2012 Baltimore Ravens in the 2013 Super Bowl.
- Former Iowa LB James Morris (injured reserve) earned a Super Bowl ring with the New England Patriots in 2015. Former TE Tony Moeaki played for the Seattle Seahawks in the same game.
- Former center James Ferentz was a member of the 2016 Super Bowl champion Denver Broncos.



- Former DT Jonathan Babineaux played for the Atlanta Falcons in Super Bowl LI. Former DE Adrian Clayborn and former DB Charles Godfrey were on the Atlanta injured reserve roster.
- Former OL Cole Croston was on the New England Patriots roster in Super Bowl LII. Former C James Ferentz and WR Riley McCarron were on the Patriots practice squad.
- Former DL Adrian Clayborn (active), OL James Ferentz, WR Riley McCarron (injured reserve), and OL Cole Croston (practice squad) earned Super Bowl rings as members of the New England Patriots in Super Bowl LIII.
- Former LB Anthony Hitchens and LB Ben Niemann played for the Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs in 2020. Former QB C.J. Beathard, TE George Kittle, and OL Ross Reynolds were on the NFC Champion San Francisco 49ers.
- Former OL Tristan Wirfs was the starting right tackle as a rookie for the 2021 Super Bowl champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Former DL Anthony Nelson was a reserve defensive end for the Bucs. Former LB Ben Niemann and LB Anthony Hitchens were on the AFC Champion Kansas City Chiefs.
- Entering the 2022 season, every lowa senior starting tight end (16) under Kirk Ferentz has been drafted in the NFL or signed by an NFL team. The NFL has employed 18 lowa tight ends since 1999 (11 drafted/7 free agents).
- All 11 members of Iowa's starting defensive unit in 2008 were either drafted or signed to NFL free agent contracts following the draft.

Head coach Kirk Ferentz is featured on "Hawk Talk with Kirk Ferentz" each week during the regular season. The radio call-in show is hosted by Gary Dolphin, the play-by-play voice of the Iowa Hawkeyes. The show airs live each Wednesday from 6:30-8:30 p.m. (CT) from VUE Rooftop at the Hilton Garden Inn in Iowa City. Fans can attend shows in mperson, listen live on the Hawkeye Radio Network or watch on KCRG 9.2.

The show will not be held on Oct. 12 due to the bye week and the Nov. 16 show will be moved to Nov. 15 because of the men's basketball game at Seton Hall.

IOWA PROGRAM NOTES

- The Hawkeyes earned bowl eligibility in 20 of the last 21 seasons. Iowa is 9-9 in bowl games since 2001. Only Ohio State (12) and Wisconsin (11) have more bowl wins among Big Ten teams since 2001. The Hawkeyes are 17-16-1 in 34 bowl games. Iowa has won five January bowl games under Ferentz.
- lowa is the only school to have two head football coaches since 1979. Hayden Fry took over prior to the 1979 season and coached through the 1998 season, posting a record of 143-89-6. Current coach Kirk Ferentz (178-108) replaced Fry and completed his 23rd season in 2021. Ferentz also served as lowa's offensive line coach from 1981-89 under Fry.
- Iowa won the Big Ten West Division title in 2021 and made its second appearance in the Big Ten Championship game. The Hawkeyes played in the Big Ten title game for the first time in program history on Dec. 5, 2015. Iowa earned Big Ten Conference championships in 2002 and 2004 and placed second in 2009. Iowa (8-0, 2002; 8-0, 2015) is one of three Big Ten teams to post

FIND THE NFL-ER

The Hawkeyes have had NFL talent on their offensive line in each of Kirk Ferentz's 23 seasons. Nineteen lowa offensive linemen have been selected in the NFL Draft, including six in the first round. Former Hawkeye linemen under Ferentz have combined for 14 Pro Bowl appearances. Below is a list of players, by year, that played on the Hawkeyes' offensive line prior to joining the NFL.

- a perfect mark in conference play since 1998 (BCS era), joining Michigan State (1) and Ohio State (5).
- Iowa has ranked in the top 10 in the final Associated Press and CNN/USA Today coaches polls five times since 2002, including a ranking of seventh in both polls at the conclusion of the 2009 season. Iowa ranked eighth in 2002, 2003 and 2004. The Hawkeyes finished 2015 ranked ninth in the AP poll and 10th in the USA Today Coaches Poll. In the Big Ten, only Ohio State has more top 10 finishes since 2002.
- Since 1936 when the first AP poll was released, Iowa has appeared in the poll 354 times, the fifth highest total in the Big Ten (Ohio State, Michigan, Wisconsin, and MSU). Iowa has been the top-ranked team in the country 11 times.
- Iowa set a school record with 12 wins in 2015. The Hawkeyes won 11 games in 2002 (11-2), and 2009 (11-2). In 2009, Iowa started 9-0 and won 10 regular season games for just the fourth time in school history.
- lowa won 10 or more games in three consecutive years (2002-04) for the first time in school history.
- Kirk Ferentz has been named Big Ten Coach of the Year four times (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015) and was named National Coach of the Year in 2002 and 2015. Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year honors. Iowa's Hayden Fry and Penn State's Joe Paterno both won the award three times.
- Iowa has had 11 individual national award winners under head coach Kirk Ferentz. They include Brad Banks (2002 Davey O'Brien, Top Quarterback; 2002 Associated Press National Player of the Year); Dallas Clark (2002 Mackey, Top Tight End); Nate Kaeding (2002 Groza, Top Kicker); Robert Gallery (2003 Outland, Top Lineman); Shonn Greene (2008 Doak Walker, Top Running Back); Brandon Scherff (2014 Outland, Top Lineman), Desmond King (2015 Jim Thorpe), Josey Jewell (2017 Lott IMPACT), T.J. Hockenson (2018, Mackey, Top Tight End), Tyler Linderbaum, (Rimington, Top Center).
- Iowa's offensive line earned the Joe Moore Award in 2016, an honor bestowed upon the top offensive line unit in the country.
- Iowa's football record in the 2000 decade was 80-45 (.640), a record that ranks as the best decade in Iowa football history, based on total wins. Iowa posted a record of 77-40-4 (.652) during the 1980's and the Hawkeyes were 62-53-2 (.538) in the 1990's. Iowa was 81-49 (.623) from 2010-19.
- Iowa had 47 wins from 2015-19, the most of any five-year period in school history.

• The Hawkeyes' seven points are the fewest for a Big Ten team in a win since lowa's 6-4 win at Penn State in 2004.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- LB Jack Campbell had a team high 12 tackles (4 solo, 8 assists). It is his sixth career game with 10 or more tackles, which are tied for the most on the team. Campbell now has 189 career tackles.
- Iowa finished with four sacks in the game. DE Joe Evans tied a career high with two sacks and DT Logan Lee had a career-best 1.5 sacks.
- DB Cooper DeJean finished with a career high four tackles in his first career start; DB Quinn Schulte had a career-high four pass breakups in his first career start.
- RB Leshun Williams had career-highs in carries (24) and yards (72).
- WR Arland Bruce VI had five catches for a career-high 68 yards. Bruce had a team-high 96 all-purpose yards.
- P Tory Taylor had punts downed at the 1, 2, 6, 8, 8 and 12 yard lines. Taylor had a career-high 10 punts for 479 yards, averaging 47.9 yards per punt. Seven of his 10 punts were downed inside the 20-yard line and three went 50 or more yards.
- K Aaron Blom connected on 1-of-2 field goal attempts (good from 46, miss from 40) for his first career points.

MISCELLANEOUS

- Iowa's defense scored four points on two safeties Jack Campbell had a 1-yard tackle for loss on Isaiah Davis in the third quarter and Joe Evans' sack accounted for the game's final points on a safety in the fourth quarter.
- The Hawkeyes have three safeties in their last two regular season games -- (Lukas Van Ness sack on an intentional grounding at Nebraska, 11/26/21).
- lowa's defense allowed 120 total yards, which are the fewest in a season-opening game since 2004 (110 vs. Kent State). The 120 yards are the fewest surrendered by the Hawkeye defense since 2018 against Maryland (115 yards).
- Iowa is the first Big Ten team to win a game without scoring a touchdown since Nebraska in 2018 (beat Michigan State, 9-6). The Hawkeyes' last such win? The 6-4 win at Penn State in 2004.
- Iowa had seven first-time starters in the game: Offense: Logan Jones (OL), Beau Stephens (OL), Alec Wick (WR), Leshun Williams (RB); Defense: Cooper DeJean (DB), Joe Evans (DL), Quinn Schulte (DB).
- Five true freshmen saw the first action of their careers. They include: T.J. Hall (DB), Kaleb Johnson (RB), Xavier Nwankpa (DB), Addison Ostrenga (TE) and Drew Stevens (K).
- lowa is 99-33-2 in season-opening games, including an 20-4 mark under coach Kirk Ferentz.
- Iowa won the toss and elected to receive. The Hawkeyes have played 289 games under head coach Kirk Ferentz. Iowa has opened the game on offense 215 times (137-78). The Hawkeyes have opened the game on defense 74 times (42-32).

IOWA NOTES

• The Hawkeyes attempted a game-tying field goal as time expired, but the kick hooked left, giving Iowa State its first win in the series since 2015. Iowa had won six straight in the series; Iowa State's last three wins over the Hawkeyes have all come by a field goal.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

• DE Lukas Van Ness blocked two lowa State punts, tying a school record. It is the sixth time a Hawkeye has had multiple blocks in a single game and Van Ness is the fifth Hawkeye to accomplish the feat.

Ken Iwebema had two blocks against Syracuse in 2007 and against Illinois in 2005.

- Van Ness tied the school record for blocked punts in a game with two inside lowa State territory. The only other Hawkeye to block two punts in the same game was Sean Considine at Iowa State in 2003.
- His first block of the game set up the Hawkeyes' first touchdown. It was lowa's first punt block of the season and first since the 2021 regular season finale at Nebraska (Henry Marchese).
- Van Ness blocked his second punt in the third quarter, giving lowa possession at the lowa State 20. The possession ended with an lowa turnover at the goal line.
- RB Leshon Williams had a 9-yard touchdown run in the first quarter for his first career touchdown. Williams led the Hawkeye rushing attack with 34 yards on 14 attempts.
- DB Cooper DeJean had his first career interception in the second quarter. The interception occurred in the end zone and was downed for a touchback. DeJean had a career high 11 tackles (six solo), one interception and two pass break-ups.
- DB Terry Roberts had his first interception of the season (second of his career) on Iowa State's opening drive of the second half.
- LB Seth Benson finished with 10 tackles second most on the team. It was his seventh career game with 10 or more tackles.
- DB Quinn Schulte (9), DT Logan Lee (8) and DB Terry Roberts (6) each tallied career highs in tackles. DB Riley Moss tied a career high with nine tackles. LB Jack Campbell also had nine tackles, moving his career total to 198.
- TE Sam LaPorta's 2-yard catch in the second quarter was the 100th of his career. He had a career-high eight receptions for 55 yards.
- WR Alec Wick had his first career reception for 14 yards on the game's final drive.

MISCELLANEOUS

- lowa scored on its first offensive possession, going 16 yards on two plays following the first blocked punt. It was the first game since last season against Minnesota (10 plays, 39 yards, FG) that the Hawkeyes scored on their first possession of the game.
- Iowa's defense forced three turnovers two interceptions, one forced fumble.
- The defense notched its first turnover of the season in the second quarter with a forced fumble at its own goal line. DB Kaevon Merriweather had his first career forced fumble, jarring the ball loose from ISU RB Jirehl Brock. LB Logan Klemp recovered in the end zone for the touchback.
- lowa had interceptions on consecutive possessions in the second and third quarter. Cooper DeJean had an interception in the end zone with 57 seconds left in the first half. Terry Roberts intercepted Dekkers at midfield on the first possession of the second half.
- Iowa State had three possessions in the red zone (0, 4, 12) in the first half, but came away with just a field goal. The Hawkeye defense did not allow a touchdown in the first seven quarters of the season.
- Freshman Aaron Graves became the sixth Hawkeye freshman to see action this season. He joins a list that includes: T.J. Hall (DB), Kaleb Johnson (RB), Xavier Nwankpa (DB), Addison Ostrenga (TE) and Drew Stevens (K).

- Johnson is the first Hawkeye freshman to rush for 100 yards in a game since Tyler Goodson (13-116-1 TD) at Nebraska in 2019.
- QB Spencer Petras completed 14-of-26 attempts for a season-high 175 yards and one touchdown. Petras moved into 12th place on the lowa career passing yards list with 3.850 yards.
- WR Arland Bruce IV caught a 21-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter for his second career receiving touchdown (fifth TD overall). Bruce IV had a team-high three catches for 50 yards.
- WR Nico Ragaini and WR Keagan Johnson made their season debuts after missing the first two games because of injury. Ragaini had two catches for 56 yards, including a 46-yarder in the third quarter. Johnson had one catch for seven yards and was targeted five times.
- RB Jaziun Patterson became the seventh true freshman to see action this season. He rushed six times for 20 yards.
- DB Cooper DeJean intercepted a pass in the first quarter for his second interception in as many games and second of his career. DeJean also had two tackles and two pass breakups.
- LB Jack Campbell had a game high 10 tackles. It is his second game this season and seventh career contest with 10 or more tackles. Campbell surpassed the 200-career tackle mark in the game; he now has 208 tackles, which puts him in 68th in program history. He moved past the likes of Leroy Smith, Ben Niemann and Ed Miles.
- DL Lukas Van Ness had a career-high eight tackles and DL John Waggoner had a career-high six tackles. Van Ness also had 2.5 TFL and 1.5 sacks, giving him nine career sacks.
- DL Aaron Graves had his first career sack in the third quarter. Graves finished with a career-high four tackles and 1.5 TFL in the game.
- K Drew Stevens went 2-for-2 on field goal attempts in the first two attempts of his career. He made a 43-yard field goal on his first attempt in the second quarter and connected on a 32-yarder in the third quarter.

MISCELLANEOUS

- Saturday's game included three weather delays -- 80-minutes (8:36 p.m. to 9:56 p.m.), 110 minutes (10:05 p.m. to 11:55 p.m.) and 46 minutes (11:57 p.m. to 12:43 a.m.) for a total of 3:56.
- It is the second weather delay in Kinnick Stadium tory. Iowa's game against Tennessee Tech was delayed 84 minutes on Sept. 3, 2011.
- lowa's last game that included a weather delate came on Sept. 14, 2019, at lowa State. There was a 2:55 delay at Jack Trice Stadium in Ames, lowa.
- lowa had a season-high 337 yards of total offense, rushing for a season-high 162 yards on 35 attempts, averaging 4.6 yards per carry. Seven different receivers caught a pass in the game and the passing attack had a season-high 175 yards and one touchdown.
- lowa's defense posted its first shutout since 2019 a 20-0 win at Northwestern (10/26/19). It was the Hawkeyes' first shutout in Kinnick Stadium since defeating Rutgers, 30-0, on Sept. 7, 2019.
- The Hawkeye defense limited Nevada to 151 yards of total offense. The Wolfpack entered the game averaging 336.3 yards.
- lowa has limited two of its first three opponents to 151 yards or less. (South Dakota State, 120 yards; Nevada, 151 yards). It is the first time since 1986 that the Hawkeye defense has held two of the first three opponents to 160 yards or fewer (125 at Iowa State; 159 vs. NIU; 150 at UTEP).
- Iowa improves to 14-7 all-time in night games at Kinnick Stadium.

• The Hawkeyes have won eight of its last 11 Big Ten openers. Iowa is now 3-0 all-time against Rutgers.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- DB Cooper DeJean intercepted a pass for a third straight game and returned it 45 yards for his first career touchdown. The 45-yard touchdown return is the 30th longest in school history and it is the 50th pick six in school history.
- lowa has had at least one interception return for a touchdown in each of the last 15 seasons and 20 of the last 22.
- The last Hawkeye to have an interception in three straight games was Jermari Harris in 2021 (at Nebraska, vs. Michigan, vs. Kentucky).
- DB Kaevon Merriweather returned a fumble 30 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter. It is the eighth fumble return for a touchdown in school history and the fifth longest in the record books. CASH Sebastian Castro forced the fumble – the second forced fumble of his career.
- Merriweather also had a third quarter interception the second of his career and he returned it 33 yards into Rutgers territory.
- LB Jack Campbell had eight tackles. Campbell now has 216 tackles, which puts him in 61st in program history.
- CASH Sebastian Castro made his first career start. Castro finished with four tackles, one forced fumble and one pass break up in the game.
- RB Leshon Williams had a 2-yard touchdown run in the third quarter to cap a nine play, 75-yard scoring drive the team's longest of the season. Williams had 40 yards rushing on the scoring drive.
- TE Sam LaPorta had a career long 42-yard reception on lowa's final drive of the first half. He finished with a team-high four catches for 77 yards.
- K Drew Stevens converted a 25-yard field goal in the second quarter and a career-long 51 yarder in the fourth quarter. The 51-yarder is tied for the 11th longest in school history. Stevens is now 4-for-4 on field goal attempts this season.

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

- lowa's defense has allowed 23 points in the first four games of the season, the fewest points allowed in the last 66 years. The Hawkeyes gave up 20 points in the first four games in 1956.
- lowa's defense scored two touchdowns against Rutgers via a Cooper DeJean pick six in the first quarter and a Kaevon Merriweather scoop and score in the second quarter. It is the first time since the 2021 season opener against Indiana that Iowa's defense has scored two touchdowns in the same game (Riley Moss, two INTs for TDs).
- With the two defensive touchdowns, the Hawkeye defense has now scored 16 points this season via two touchdowns and two safeties.
- lowa didn't commit a turnover for a second straight game. The Hawkeyes were +3 in the turnover battle, converting the Rutgers miscues into 14 points. For the season, the Hawkeyes are +2 in turnover margin and they have a 21-10 advantage in points off turnovers.
- The Hawkeyes have two games with multiple interceptions and have all five picks have come in the last three games.
- Iowa led 7-3 at the end of the first quarters. Rutgers field goal was the first points allowed in the first quarter this season by the Iowa defense. The Hawkeyes are outscoring their opponents, 31-3, in the opening quarter and 12-0 in the third quarter.
