Barbara J. Wilson
President, The University of Iowa

Dr. Barbara J. Wilson is the 22nd president of the University of Iowa. Her leadership priorities are focused on people, and in her first year, the university finalized a new five-year strategic plan, launched transformative faculty recruitment and retention programs, and, through the recently inaugurated First Gen Hawks program, saw increased retention rates among students who are first-in-family to attend college. President Wilson and her development team have raised over \$400 million to support the university, including the largest gift since the institution's founding in 1847.

President Wilson earned a bachelor's degree in journalism and master's and PhD degrees in communication arts from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She came to Iowa having served as the executive vice president/vice president for academic affairs of the University of Illinois System. Prior to that, she served in several administrative positions, including interim chancellor, at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, where she was a member of the communication faculty for 21 years. She was also a professor of communication at the University of California, Santa Barbara, and the University of Louisville. President Wilson's research focuses on the social and psychological effects of the media, particularly on youth.

President Wilson's spouse, John Lammers, is a retired professor of communication. They have two grown daughters.




Beth Goetz

Interim Director of Athletics Chair**

Beth Goetz was named interim Henry B. and Patricia B. Tippie Director of Athletics Chair at the University of Iowa June 1, 2023. Goetz joined the Iowa athletics staff as Deputy Director of Athletics and Chief Operating Officer (COO) on Sept. 7, 2022.

Goetz joined the Iowa athletics staff from Ball State University, where she had served as Director of Athletics since May, 2018. At Ball State, she directly supervised 19 Division I Intercollegiate sports teams, all head coaches, and the senior athletics department professional staff. Goetz previously served as Minnesota's Deputy Athletics Director from 2013-15 and interim Athletics Director during the 2015-16 season.

Ball State won 10 Mid-American Conference championships during the time Goetz served as athletics director, including seven during the 2021-22 athletics campaign, the most since 1999-2000. Goetz also guided Ball State to strong marks in the Reese and Jacoby Trophy standings, which honors the top men's and women's athletics programs in the MAC, respectively. The Cardinals placed third in the Reese Trophy standings in 2021-22, their best finish since taking second in 2013. In addition, Ball State reached heights never achieved in the classroom, including back-to-back years with a 90 percent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) and the highest department GPAs on record.

Among the first projects Goetz tackled at Ball State was the creation of a five-year strategic plan titled, Onward, which was created prior to 2019. During her tenure Goetz also hired eight head coaches, launched the NIL initiative Ball You and as a member of the President's Cabinet served on several key campus committees. Goetz'

fundraising acumen was on full display while at Ball State, producing increases in sport specific giving and the completion of numerous capital projects including the university's \$15 million Scheumann Family Indoor Practice Facility. Revenue generation strategies were highlighted by an increase in ticket sales across all sports and a revamped concessions agreement.

In addition to her previous role as an administrator, Goetz has been selected for national leadership duties. Goetz was named to the NCAA Competition Oversight Committee in 2018 and served as vice chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee in 2021. She was named by Women Leaders in College Sports as the 2022 NCAA Division I FBS Nike Executive of the Year and was recognized by the Indianapolis Business Journal (IBJ) as one of the publications 2021 Women of Influence.

Prior to arriving at Ball State, Goetz was the chief operating officer/senior woman administrator at the University of Connecticut from 2016-18. She served as Minnesota's Deputy Athletics Director from 2013-15 and the interim athletics director during the 2015-16 year. She was the associate athletics director at Butler University from 2008-13 following a 13-year stint at the University of Missouri-St. Louis, where she was an assistant women's soccer coach (1996), head women's soccer coach (1997-2008) and assistant athletics director/senior woman administrator (2001-08). Goetz was inducted into the UMSL Sports Hall of Fame in 2014.

During her college career Goetz was an accomplished Division I student-athlete, playing soccer at Clemson University. She earned All-America recognition at Brevard College (N.C.), where she was inducted into the college's Hall of Fame in 2017. Goetz earned an associate of arts degree from Brevard in 1994 and a Bachelor of Arts degree from Clemson in 1996. She earned her master's degree from the University of Missouri-St. Louis in 2000.

Kirk Ferentz
Moon Family Head Football Coach
25th Year at Iowa

Moon Family Head Football Coach Kirk Ferentz is in his 25th year as the head football coach at the University of Iowa. The position of UI head football coach was endowed in 2021 by Will and Renee Moon. The Bettendorf, Iowa, couple are UI alumni and longtime Hawkeye supporters.

Ferentz and the Hawkeyes closed the 2022 season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the TransPerfect Music City Bowl as Ferentz claimed the 10th bowl win of his career. That mark ties former Penn State coach Joe Paterno for most bowl wins in league history. Nationally, Ferentz is one of 19 coaches with 10 bowl victories.

With Iowa's win at Minnesota in late November, Ferentz tied Amos Alonzo Stagg for third place in Big Ten Conference victories with 115, and his career mark in Big Ten games is 115-83. Overall, Ferentz has a 186-115 record with the Hawkeyes, ranking fourth all-time in wins among Big Ten coaches. As a head coach Ferentz holds a 198-136 record in 27 seasons.

In addition to serving as Iowa's head coach for 24 seasons, Ferentz has been a member of the Iowa coaching staff for 33 seasons. His most recent contract extension extended his agreement with Iowa through the 2029 season.

Under Ferentz' leadership the Iowa football program has earned 20 bowl game invitations since 2001 (2020 Music City Bowl was canceled). That success has been achieved with strong commitments to the program, the University of Iowa, and the ideals that represent Hawkeye football – hard work, determination, player development and character, on and off the field.

Iowa's victory in the Music City Bowl improved Iowa's final 2022 record to 8-5, giving the Hawkeyes eight wins for the seventh consecutive season (Iowa was 6-2 in the 2020 COVID-19 season). Only four other programs (Alabama, Clemson, Georgia, Ohio State) have won eight games every year over that time frame.

The Hawkeyes played the toughest schedule in the West Division in 2022, as two of their five losses came to playoff teams Michigan and Ohio State. Two additional losses were by three-point margins as Iowa improved throughout the season, winning five of its final six games.

In 2021, Ferentz led Iowa to its second Big Ten West Division title (2015), posting a 7-2 conference record and 10-4 overall mark. The Hawkeyes won 10 games for the seventh time under Ferentz and earned an invitation to the Vrbo Citrus Bowl, Iowa's 12th January bowl game and 19th postseason invitation overall in the Ferentz era. Iowa was ranked 23rd in the final 2021 rankings, the fourth straight season the Hawkeyes have ended the year in the Top 25.

With Iowa's 33-7 win over Northern Illinois in the opening game of the 2018 season, Ferentz recorded win No. 144 as Iowa's head coach, surpassing the late Hayden Fry as the winningest football coach in program history. Fry was Iowa's head coach for 20 seasons (1979-98).

Ferentz is the longest tenured head football coach in the nation. Ferentz and Fry are the only head coaches to lead a Division I football program for 20 years, consecutively. With a 63-0 win at Illinois in 2018, Ferentz became just the fifth coach in Big Ten Conference history to win 150 games as a Big Ten head coach. Ferentz earned his 100th career Big Ten win at Penn State (Nov. 21, 2020).

Iowa's appearance in the 2022 Vrbo Citrus Bowl marked the 12th January bowl game for the Hawkeyes under Ferentz, who has posted five January wins as Iowa's head coach. The Hawkeyes have twice won three straight bowl games (2008-10 and 2017-19) under Ferentz.

Iowa won 19 conference games from 2019-21, the most successful three-year stretch since winning 20 league games from 2002-04. Iowa has won at least six conference games in three straight seasons for the first time under Ferentz, with an opportunity for a sixth conference win to close the 2022 season.

Iowa opened the 2021 season with six straight wins, including three victories over ranked opponents while being ranked as high as second in the nation. Following consecutive losses, the Hawkeyes rallied to win their final four regular season games to earn the Big Ten's West Division title. The Iowa defense set a school record with 25 interceptions and Iowa's 78 interceptions over the past four seasons ranks first nationally.

The Hawkeyes won 47 games from 2015-19, the best five-year win total in school history. Just eight programs in the nation won more games during that time frame. Ferentz guided the Hawkeyes to eight wins or more in five consecutive seasons (2015-19) and 13 seasons overall since 2003.

On the field, Ferentz's approach can be described as smart, tough, and physical. Off the field, academics and character development are a focus. In 2021, the University of Iowa outperformed its peers nationally in the classroom for the 10th consecutive year, according to data released by the NCAA.

Following back-to-back narrow losses to open the 2020 season, Iowa won six straight games, all in Big Ten play, to complete the regular season. The Hawkeyes scored at least 26 points in each of the six wins, while holding three opponents to just seven points. The winning streak included road wins at Minnesota, Penn State and Illinois, and trophy game victories over Minnesota, Nebraska and Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes were ranked 15th in the nation in the final CFP rankings and coaches poll, 16th by the Associated Press. Iowa's Music City Bowl date with Missouri in December was canceled due to the pandemic.

Iowa concluded the 2019 season with three straight wins over border rivals Minnesota, Illinois and Nebraska, followed by the 49-24 Holiday Bowl win over No. 22 Southern California. Following a 24-22 loss at Wisconsin to open November, the Hawkeyes handed seventh-ranked Minnesota its first loss of the season to maintain possession of Floyd of Rosedale. Iowa's three losses came by a combined 14 points to three teams who were ranked in the top 20 at the time. Iowa also maintained possession of the Iowa Corn Cy-Hawk Trophy with a non-conference win at Iowa State in September.

Iowa won six of its first seven games in 2018 and closed the season with wins in the final three games, including the 27-22 Outback Bowl win over No. 18 Mississippi State. The four losses came by a total of 23 points, and all were decided in the final minutes of play. Iowa's defense ranked second nationally in interceptions after leading the nation in 2017.

Iowa's 8-5 record in 2017 included wins in three of four trophy games, with victories over Iowa State, Minnesota, and Nebraska, plus the Pin-stripe Bowl win to conclude the season. Iowa also began November with a 55-24 win over third-ranked Ohio State. Nine of Iowa's 12 regular season opponents were bowl eligible (posting an 8-1 record) as the Hawkeyes faced one of the strongest schedules in the nation.

Iowa closed the 2016 regular season with three straight wins, including two over ranked opponents. Iowa posted a 6-3 record in Big Ten play to tie for second place in the West Division and finished the season at 8-5 overall.

Highlights of the year included Iowa defeating second-ranked Michigan and 15th-ranked Nebraska in the final month of the season, as well as earning a January bowl invitation for the 10th time during the Ferentz era.

The Iowa football program enjoyed a historic season in 2015, posting a final 12-2 record. Ferentz led the 2015 Hawkeyes to a perfect regular season, setting a school record with 12 wins. The Hawkeyes won the Big Ten Conference West Division (8-0) before falling to Michigan State, 16-13, in a close championship game that was decided in the final minute of play. The Hawkeyes earned their sixth invitation to the Rose Bowl, which was Iowa's first appearance in Pasadena in 25 years.

Ferentz was recognized with both the Hayes-Schembechler and Dave McClain Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year awards in 2015. He was named Eddie Robinson (FWAA) and Woody Hayes National Coach of the Year (Columbus Touchdown Club), and received the Dodd Trophy, presented by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation. He was also named the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Region 3 Coach of the Year.

Coaching History

Ferentz' coaching career began as a student assistant (1977) at his alma mater, the University of Connecticut. The next two years (1978-79) were spent at Worcester Academy, where he also taught English literature. He then served as a graduate assistant offensive line coach at the University of Pittsburgh during the 1980 season. That Pittsburgh team (coached by Jackie Sherrill) finished with an 11-1 record and a number two national ranking.

Ferentz joined Hayden Fry's Iowa staff as the offensive line coach in 1981, which became Iowa's first winning seasons in 19 years. The season was highlighted by the Hawkeyes winning a conference title and earning a Rose Bowl berth – both of which had not occurred in 20 years.

He continued as Iowa's offensive line coach through the 1989 season and had great success coaching offensive lines that, to date, have anchored four of Iowa's highest scoring offenses. In addition, eight of Iowa's top 10 offensive teams, in terms of yards gained per game, have operated with Ferentz as the head coach or offensive line coach. And Iowa's top nine passing teams of all time have occurred with Ferentz as the head coach, or offensive line coach.

Ferentz was named head coach of the University of Maine Black Bears in 1990 and held that position for three years before being hired by Bill Belichick and the Cleveland Browns to coach the offensive line. He remained with the organization after it moved to Baltimore and became the Baltimore Ravens, serving as assistant head coach and offensive line coach. In all, he worked six years with the Cleveland Browns/Baltimore Ravens of the National Football League.

He rejoined the Hawkeyes as head coach in 1999 and is Iowa's longest tenured head football coach.

Personal History

Off the field, family is the top priority for Ferentz. Ferentz and his wife, Mary, have been married for 43 years. They have five children: Brian, Kelly, Joanne, James, and Steven. They also have five granddaughters (Presley, Blakely, Connolly, Jolie, and Bella), and six grandsons (John, Forest, Nixon, Lincoln, Beckett, and Marshall). All five of their children graduated from City High School in Iowa City and earned degrees from the University of Iowa; and each of the boys had the incredible experience of playing football at the University of Iowa with their father as head coach.

Kirk and Mary are very enthusiastic supporters of the University of Iowa Stead Family Children's Hospital. They serve as advocates for the Children's Hospital, hosting and speaking at events across the state to raise awareness and support for the hospital. Kirk and Mary established the "Ferentz Family Pediatric Research and Education Endowment Fund" in 2007. In honor of their granddaughter, Mary and Kirk donated more than \$1 million in 2017 to establish the Savvy Elizabeth Ferentz Neonatology Research Fund. In addition, the Iowa Ladies' Football Academy has donated \$3 million to the UI Stead Family Children's Hospital, which opened across the street from Kinnick Stadium in December, 2016.

Ferentz has also been involved in supporting several community and university-related initiatives, including serving as the honorary chair of the University of Iowa's United Way campaign. Kirk and Mary have also contributed generously to the University of Iowa, including donations to the University's College of Liberal Arts. Another significant gift was a \$500,000 commitment to support the Iowa Football Legacy Campaign, which included two key projects benefitting the Hawkeye football program; the indoor practice facility; and the Stew and LeNore Hansen Football Performance Center.

Ferentz was born Aug. 1, 1955, in Royal Oak, Michigan. He attended Upper St. Clair High School in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and graduated from the University of Connecticut in 1978 with a bachelor's degree in English Education. He was a football captain and an academic All-Yankee Conference linebacker at Connecticut.

Ferentz received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the Neag School of Education at the University of Connecticut in May, 2009. He was inducted into the Upper St. Clair High School Hall of Fame in September, 2002, and the Western Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in May, 2003.

Brian Ferentz
Offensive Coordinator & Quarterbacks Coach
12th Year at Iowa

Brian Ferentz, a three-year letterman as an offensive lineman at the University of Iowa, was named offensive coordinator following the 2016 season. He also coaches Iowa's quarterbacks. Ferentz coached Hawkeye running backs in 2017 and Iowa's tight ends and fullbacks from 2018-21. Ferentz served as Iowa's offensive line coach for five seasons (2012-16) and served as run game coordinator in 2015 and 2016.

Ferentz joined the Hawkeye staff after spending the previous four years with the NFL's New England Patriots.

Iowa posted an 8-5 record in 2022, concluding the season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl and wins in five of its final six games. Iowa's streak of 10 straight bowl invitations is the longest in school history and the Hawkeyes have been in the Top 25 final rankings in four of the last five seasons. Iowa's streak of 10 straight winning seasons ranks 10th best in the nation.

The Hawkeyes won 10 games in 2021, winning the Big Ten's West Division title and advancing to the conference championship game. Iowa concluded the season with an appearance in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl and was ranked 23rd in the final national rankings.

Iowa closed the 2021 regular season with four straight victories to earn the West Division title for the second time since 2015. Iowa earned 24 conference wins from 2018-21, matching Iowa's highest four-year conference win total since 2002-05.

Following back-to-back narrow losses to open the 2020 season, Iowa won six straight games, all in Big Ten play, to complete the regular season. The Hawkeyes scored at least 26 points in each of the six wins. The winning streak included road wins at Minnesota, Penn State and Illinois, and trophy game victories over Minnesota, Nebraska, and Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes were ranked 15th in the final CFP rankings and coaches poll, and 16th by the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes were selected to compete in the 2020 Music City Bowl, but that event was canceled.

Iowa won 47 games from 2015-19, the highest total in school history over any five-year period, and a total that ranked ninth nationally. Iowa won its final four games in 2019 and ranked 15th in the nation in the final Associated Press and coaches polls.

Tight end Sam LaPorta led Iowa receivers and was named one of three finalists for the John Mackey Award after leading Iowa in receiving for the third straight season. He was named the Kwalick-Clark Big Ten Tight End of the Year while earning first-team All-Big Ten honors. Among Iowa's all-time tight ends LaPorta ranks first in receptions and second in yards. LaPorta was selected in the second round of the 2023 NFL Draft by Detroit. True freshman running back Kaleb Johnson led the team in rushing and earned Freshman All-America recognition.

Junior center Tyler Linderbaum anchored the Iowa offense in 2021, earning unanimous consensus All-America honors and the Rimington Trophy. Running back Tyler Goodson rushed for over 1,100 yards and moved into the top 10 in career rushing, while LaPorta led the team in receiving.

Linderbaum was selected in the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft, taken as the 25th selection by Baltimore. In addition, offensive lineman Kyler Schott (Tampa Bay) and Goodson (Green Bay) each signed free agent contracts immediately following the draft. Linderbaum is the fourth Hawkeye lineman or tight end selected in the first round since 2014.

Iowa's offense in 2020, with first year starting quarterback Spencer Petras, led the Big Ten in red zone offense (0.917), ranked second in scoring (31.8) and third in fewest tackles for loss allowed (5.1). The Hawkeyes scored at least 25 points in all six wins in 2020. Goodson, Linderbaum and senior tackle Alaric Jackson earned first-team All-Big Ten honors. Jackson and tight end Shaun Beyer signed NFL free agent contracts immediately following the 2021 NFL Draft, with Jackson playing his rookie season for the Super Bowl champion Los Angeles Rams.

The Hawkeyes concluded the 2019 campaign with a 10-3 record following a 49-24 win over No. 22 Southern California in the Holiday Bowl. The three losses were all to ranked opponents by a combined 14 points. The Hawkeyes were 4-1 in trophy games for the third straight season.

Iowa completed the 2018 season with a 9-4 mark and a final ranking of 25th in the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes earned a 27-22 Outback Bowl win over No. 18 Mississippi State to close the season with three straight wins. The four losses came by a total of 23 points and all were decided in the final minutes of play. Iowa tied for second in the Big Ten West Division.

Iowa won eight games in both 2016 and 2017, including a PinStripe Bowl victory to conclude the 2017 campaign. The Hawkeyes posted a perfect 12-0 regular season record in 2015, winning the West Division of the Big Ten Conference. Iowa participated in the 2016 Rose Bowl Game and the 2015 Big Ten Championship and ended the season in the top 10 in the final national rankings.

Iowa's most recent bowl game invitations include the 2022 Music City Bowl, 2022 Citrus Bowl, 2020 Music City Bowl, 2019 Holiday Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl, 2017 Outback Bowl, 2016 Rose Bowl Game, 2015 TaxSlayer Bowl and 2014 Outback Bowl. The Hawkeyes have ranked in the final top 10 of both major polls five times in the past 21 seasons.

Iowa has appeared in 12 January bowl games since 2001 and has recorded January bowl wins over Florida (2004 Outback), Louisiana State (2005 Capital One), South Carolina (2009 Outback), Georgia Tech (2010 Orange), and Mississippi State (2019 Outback).

Iowa has won 175 games over the past 21 seasons, including 108 Big Ten games. Along with the 2021 and 2015 division titles, the Hawkeyes earned a share of the Big Ten title in both 2002 and 2004 and tied for second in 2009. Iowa has finished in the Big Ten's first division in 20 of the past 22 years.

Iowa's efficient offense in 2019 featured senior quarterback Nate Stanley and tackle Tristan Wirfs, the Big Ten's Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year. Wirfs earned first-team All-America honors from as many as three national outlets. Wirfs declared for the 2020 NFL Draft following his junior season and was a first-round selection (13th pick overall) of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He started every game at right tackle for the Super Bowl champions in his rookie season and earned All-Pro honors in his second season.

Stanley completed his three-year career with a 27-12 record as the starting quarterback, passing for more than 8,000 career yards. He was selected by Minnesota in the seventh round of the 2020 NFL Draft. The Iowa offense in 2018 set a school record for most points scored in road games. The Hawkeyes averaged 31.2 in all games, the ninth highest single-season total in school history. Stanley led the Iowa offense, passing for 2,852 yards. Stanley threw 26 touchdown passes in both 2017 and 2018, setting a school record for scoring passes over a two-year period. He ranks among Iowa's career leaders in passing yards (8,302), total offense (8,198) and passing touchdowns (68).

Tight end T.J. Hockenson earned the John Mackey Award as the top tight end in the nation and was named the Kwalick-Clark Tight End of the Year in the Big Ten in 2018. Iowa's tight ends combined for 90 receptions for 1,330 yards and 13 touchdowns.

Hockenson was the eighth player selected in the 2019 NFL Draft (Detroit) and earned Pro Bowl honors in 2020 and 2022. Noah Fant was the 20th player selected in the first round (Denver). It marks the only time in the history of the NFL Draft that two tight ends from the same program have been selected in the first round. Senior tight end Nate Wieting was signed to a free agent contract by the Cleveland Browns immediately following the 2020 NFL Draft.

The 2017 Iowa offense featured 1,000-yard rusher in senior Akrum Wadley, and a first year starting quarterback in Stanley, who passed for over 2,400 yards. Senior offensive lineman Sean Welsh earned first team All-Big Ten honors, while redshirt freshman lineman Alaric Jackson earned freshman All-America recognition.

The Iowa offensive line earned the 2016 Joe Moore Award, which is presented to the best offensive line in college football. Iowa boasted two players who rushed for over 1,000 yards in the same season for the first time in school history, as Wadley and senior LeShun Daniels, Jr., each surpassed 1,000 yards. Iowa was a finalist for the award in 2015.

Four members of Iowa's 2016 offensive line earned All-Big Ten recognition, including Ike Boettger, Cole Croston, Daniels, and Welsh. Croston signed a free agent contract with the New England Patriots following the 2017 NFL Draft and was on the active roster the entire 2017 season. In 2015, guard Jordan Walsh earned first team all-Big Ten honors, while center Austin Blythe was one of three finalists for the Rimington Award and a second team selection.

Iowa's offense in 2015 averaged 30.9 points and 386.1 yards total offense, including 181.7 rushing and 204.4 passing yards per game. Iowa ranked in the top 25 nationally in fourth down conversions, fewest penalties and fewest turnovers.

Left tackle Brandon Scherff won the 2014 Outland Trophy, was the Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year in the Big Ten and earned unanimous consensus All-America honors. Scherff was the fifth player selected in the 2015 NFL Draft (Washington Redskins), while right tackle Andrew Donnal was selected by the St. Louis Rams in the fourth round. Scherff was named to the NFL Pro Bowl in 2017, 2020 and 2021.

Iowa's offensive line in 2013 led the way for an offense that averaged 377 yards total offense, including 180 rushing yards and 197 passing yards. The Hawkeye offensive line allowed just 15 sacks in 13 games, a total that led the Big Ten and tied for 12th best in the nation. Iowa won eight games while participating in the 2014 Outback Bowl.

Iowa's offensive line featured the same five starters in all 13 games in 2013, with four of those Hawkeyes earning Big Ten honors. Scherff was a first team selection, while right tackle Brett Van Sloten was second team and Blythe and left guard Conor Boffeli each were named honorable mention. Iowa led the Big Ten and ranked eighth in the nation in fewest penalties per game. Boffeli and Van Sloten signed NFL free agent contracts immediately following the 2014 NFL Draft.

Senior center James Ferentz and senior tackle/guard Matt Tobin led Iowa's offensive line in 2012, as both players earned All-Big Ten recognition. In addition, Blythe earned FWAA Freshman All-America honors. Iowa's offensive line put together a string of four consecutive games without allowing a quarterback sack and allowed less than two sacks in six of 12 games overall.

Ferentz served as New England's tight ends coach in 2011, helping the Patriots win the AFC championship and a spot in the 2012 Super Bowl. Ferentz was an offensive assistant coach in 2010, working exclusively with the tight ends. He spent 2009 as a coaching assistant after serving as a scouting assistant for the Patriots during the 2008 season.

Under his direction, two Patriot rookie tight ends made a big impact in 2010. The New England duo ranked first and second, among all rookie tight ends with 10 and six touchdown catches, respectively. They became the first pair of rookie tight ends with at least five touchdowns in the same season in NFL history. Rob Gronkowski's 10 touchdown receptions rank second in NFL history for a rookie tight end, as only Mike Ditka (12) had more touchdowns as a rookie.

Gronkowski set additional records in 2011, including individual records for receiving touchdowns by a tight end (17), total touchdowns by a tight end (18) and receiving yards by a tight end (1,327). As a tandem, the Patriot tight ends also set three NFL single season records: total touchdowns by a tight end tandem (24), receptions by a tight end tandem (169) and total yards by a tight end tandem (2,237).

Ferentz played both offensive guard and center during his Iowa career. He earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors as a senior in 2005 and was Academic All-Big Ten in 2003. He was a team captain as a senior and played on Iowa teams that were among the most successful in school history. Ferentz was part of two Big Ten championship teams (2002 and 2004).

Ferentz started at center in every game as a senior in 2005. He started eight games at right guard in 2004 as the Hawkeyes earned a share of the Big Ten title and a bid to the Capital One Bowl. Iowa won each of the eight games he started after he missed the first four games of the year due to injury. Ferentz earned the starting center position as a sophomore and started five games before missing the second half of the season due to injury.

During his tenure as a player, Iowa participated in the BCS FedEx Orange Bowl, two Outback Bowls, and a Capital One Bowl, compiling an overall record of 38-12. The Hawkeyes defeated Florida in the 2004 Outback Bowl and defending national champion LSU in the 2005 Capital One Bowl.

Ferentz was a member of Iowa's Leadership Council and as a senior was the recipient of the Hayden Fry "Extra Heartbeat Award". The annual award goes to the Hawkeye player who gives extraordinary effort on the field. He was recognized with the "Next Man In" award as a junior.

Ferentz was selected to participate in the 2006 Hula Bowl following his Hawkeye career. He signed a free agent contract with Atlanta and was a member of the Falcons practice squad in 2006. He was with the New Orleans Saints throughout their 2007 training camp.

He earned his bachelor's degree in history from Iowa in 2006.

Ferentz was born March 28, 1983, in Iowa City. He and his wife, Nikki, have three daughters, Presley, Connolly and Jolie, and a son, John.

Defensive Coordinator & Secondary Coach
25th Year at Iowa

Phil Parker, who served as defensive backs coach at the University of Iowa for 13 seasons, is in his 12th season as defensive coordinator. He returned to coaching Iowa's defensive secondary in 2013 as well. Parker was named by Rivals.com in March, 2011, as a first-team member of its College Football Assistant Coach Dream Team.

Iowa posted an 8-5 record in 2022, concluding the season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl and wins in five of its final six games. Iowa's streak of 10 straight bowl invitations is the longest in school history and the Hawkeyes have been in the Top 25 final rankings in four of the last five seasons. Iowa's streak of 10 straight winning seasons ranks 10th best in the nation.

Iowa's defense led the way in 2022, including posting just the second shutout in Iowa's 35 bowl games. The defense led the nation in with seven defensive touchdowns, including two interception return scores in the bowl win. Iowa's defense was in the top 12 in the nation in scoring defense (second), total defense (second), pass efficiency defense (fourth), passing yards per game (sixth), first down defense (10th), third down defense (11th) and rushing defense (12th).

Linebacker Jack Campbell earned unanimous consensus All-America honors, while earning the Butkus Award and the William V. Campbell Trophy. He was the Nagurski-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and Butkus-Fitzgerald Big Ten Linebacker of the Year.

Along with Campbell, defensive backs Riley Moss and Cooper DeJean earned first-team All-Big Ten honors, while linebacker Seth Benson and linemen Lukas Van Ness and Joe Evans were named second team, while three additional members of the defense earned honorable mention recognition.

The Hawkeye defense was well represented in the 2023 NFL Draft. Van Ness (Green Bay) and Campbell (Detroit) were first round selections, with Van Ness being the 13th player selected and Campbell being selected 18th. In addition, Moss was a third-round selection of the Denver Broncos. Benson (Denver) and defensive back Kaevon Merriweather (Tampa Bay) each signed free agent contracts immediately following the draft.

The Hawkeyes won 10 games in 2021, winning the Big Ten's West Division title and advancing to the conference championship game. Iowa concluded the season with an appearance in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl and was ranked 23rd in the final national rankings.

Iowa closed the 2021 regular season with four straight victories to earn the West Division title for the second time since 2015. Iowa earned 24 conference wins between 2018-21, matching Iowa's highest four-year conference win total since 2002-05.

Iowa's defense set a school record and led the nation with 25 interceptions in 2021. The defense ranked among national leaders in takeaways (30, third), defensive touchdowns scored (four, seventh), pass efficiency defense (110.5, sixth), turnover margin (0.8, 11th), rushing defense (114.4, 13th), scoring defense (19.2, 13th) and total defense (328.8, 18th).

Moss was named the Tatum-Woodson Defensive Back of the Year in the Big Ten, Iowa's fifth honoree since 2012 (Amani Hooker, 2018, Josh Jackson, 2017, Desmond King, 2015, Micah Hyde, 2012). Moss, Campbell and defensive back Dane Belton all earned first-team All-Big Ten honors, as Campbell led the nation with 143 total tackles. Defensive end Zach VanValkenburg and defensive back Matt Hankins each earned second-team all-conference recognition.

Belton, who declared for the NFL following his junior season, was selected by the New York Giants in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft. Belton is the 17th defensive back coached by Parker selected in the draft, with nine of those players being selected in the first four rounds. In addition, defensive backs Matt Hankins (Atlanta) and Jack Koerner (New Orleans), along with VanValkenburg (Las Vegas) signed free agent contracts immediately following the 2022 draft.

Following back-to-back narrow losses to open the 2020 season, Iowa won six straight games, all in Big Ten play, to complete the regular season. The Hawkeyes allowed just seven points in three of the six wins. The winning streak included road wins at Minnesota, Penn State and Illinois, and trophy game victories over Minnesota, Nebraska, and Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes were ranked 15th in the final CFP rankings and coaches poll, and 16th by the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes were selected to compete in the 2020 Music City Bowl, but that event was canceled.

Iowa won 47 games from 2015-19, the highest total in school history over any five-year period, and a total that ranked ninth nationally. Iowa won its final four games in 2019 and ranked 15th in the nation in the final Associated Press and coaches polls.

Iowa's defense in 2020 led the nation in allowing opponents just 4.3 yards per play. The Hawkeyes ranked among the national leaders in several additional categories, including scoring (16.0, 7th), pass efficiency defense (110.1, 9th), rushing defense (107.6, 11th), total defense (313.8, 12th), red zone defense (.727, 12th) and interceptions (11, 19th).

Junior tackle Daviyon Nixon earned unanimous consensus All-America honors in 2020. He was named the Big Ten's defensive lineman and defensive Player of the Year. He was a finalist for both the

Outland Trophy and Nagurski Award. Senior end Chauncey Golston also earned first-team All-Big Ten honors. Golston was selected in the third round of the 2021 NFL Draft (Dallas) and Nixon was a fifth-round selection (Carolina). Linebacker Nick Niemann was also a sixth-round selection (Los Angeles Chargers).

The Hawkeyes concluded the 2019 campaign with a 10-3 record following a 49-24 win over No. 22 Southern California in the Holiday Bowl. The three losses were all to ranked opponents by a combined 14 points. The Hawkeyes were 4-1 in trophy games for the third straight season.

Iowa completed the 2018 season with a 9-4 mark and a final ranking of 25th in the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes earned a 27-22 Outback Bowl win over No. 18 Mississippi State to close the season with three straight wins. The four losses came by a total of 23 points and all were decided in the final minutes of play. Iowa tied for second in the Big Ten West Division.

Iowa tied for second in the nation in interceptions (20) in 2018 after leading the nation in 2017 with 21. Iowa's 89 thefts over the past five seasons lead the nation. The 2019 Hawkeye defense ranked among the top 17 nationally in scoring defense (5th, 14.0), first downs allowed (9th, 16.6), total defense (12th, 308.2), rushing defense (14th, 112.5), turnover margin (14th, 0.7) and pass efficiency defense (17th, 116.0).

Defensive end A.J. Epenesa earned multiple All-America honors, first-team All-Big Ten recognition, and was the defensive MVP of the Holiday Bowl win over Southern California in 2019. Defensive backs Michael Ojemudia and Geno Stone each earned second-team All-Big Ten honors. Epenesa and Stone, both juniors in 2019, declared for the 2020 NFL Draft.

Epenesa was selected in the second round of the 2020 NFL Draft (Buffalo), while Ojemudia was selected in the third round by Denver and Stone was taken by Baltimore in the seventh round. In addition to the three draft selections, linebacker Kristian Welch (Baltimore) and tackle Cedrick Lattimore (Seattle) signed free agent contracts immediately following the draft.

Iowa, in 2018, ranked seventh nationally in total defense (293.6), eighth in turnovers gained (27), 11th in scoring defense (17.8) and 12th in rushing defense (109.5). Iowa's defense was second in the Big Ten in red-zone defense and third in total sacks (35).

Hooker earned first-team All-Big Ten honors and second-team All-America recognition and was named Defensive Back of the Year in the Big Ten. Epenesa earned first-team All-Big Ten honors and defensive end Anthony Nelson was named to the second team.

Hooker declared for the NFL following his junior season and was selected in the fourth round of the 2019 NFL Draft (Tennessee), along with junior defensive lineman Anthony Nelson, who was also a fourth-round selection (Tampa).

The Hawkeye defense led the nation with 21 interceptions in 2017, led by defensive back Josh Jackson, who led the nation individually with eight interceptions to match Iowa's single-season record. Jackson and linebacker Josey Jewell each earned unanimous consensus All-America honors. The Hawkeyes ranked 17th in the nation in scoring defense (19.9) and matched a school record with four interception return touchdowns.

Jackson, in his first year as a starter, also led the nation in passes defended, ranked second in interception return yards and return touchdowns, and ranked fourth in pass break-ups. He had two

interception returns for touchdowns and tied Iowa's single-game record with three interceptions in a 55-24 win over third-ranked Ohio State.

Jewell led the Big Ten in tackles for the second time in three seasons (he was second as a junior) and ranked fourth in the nation in tackles per game (11.3). He was named the Big Ten Conference linebacker and defensive Player of the Year, while Jackson was named Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year. Jewell also earned the Lott IMPACT Trophy and was a finalist for the Nagurski Trophy, while Jackson was a finalist for the Thorpe Award.

Jackson declared for the 2018 NFL Draft following his junior season and was a second-round selection of the Green Bay Packers. Jewell was a fourth-round selection of the Denver Broncos.

Jewell also led the Hawkeye defense in 2016, along with All-America defensive back Desmond King. The Hawkeyes ranked 13th in the nation in scoring defense and red zone defense, 19th in pass efficiency defense and 23rd in total defense.

The Hawkeyes posted a perfect 12-0 regular season record in 2015, winning the West Division of the Big Ten Conference. Iowa participated in the 2016 Rose Bowl Game and the 2015 Big Ten Championship and ended the season in the top 10 in the final national rankings.

Iowa's most recent bowl game invitations include the 2022 Music City Bowl, 2022 Citrus Bowl, 2020 Music City Bowl, 2019 Holiday Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl, 2017 Outback Bowl, 2016 Rose Bowl Game, 2015 TaxSlayer Bowl and 2014 Outback Bowl. The Hawkeyes have ranked in the final top 10 of both major polls five times in the past 21 seasons.

Iowa has appeared in 12 January bowl games since 2001 and has recorded January bowl wins over Florida (2004 Outback), Louisiana State (2005 Capital One), South Carolina (2009 Outback), Georgia Tech (2010 Orange), and Mississippi State (2019 Outback).

Iowa has won 175 games over the past 21 seasons, including 108 Big Ten games. Along with the 2021 and 2015 division titles, the Hawkeyes earned a share of the Big Ten title in both 2002 and 2004 and tied for second in 2009. Iowa has finished in the Big Ten's first division in 20 of the past 22 years.

The play of the defense has been a key part of Iowa's success. King earned first-team All-Big Ten honors in both 2015 and 2016 and was a unanimous consensus All-American in 2015. King was a fifth-round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft.

Iowa led the Big Ten and ranked 10th in the nation with 19 interceptions in 2015, with four of those being returned for touchdowns. The Hawkeyes were also among the national leaders in pass break-ups (ninth), turnover margin (11th), turnovers gained (13th) and rushing defense (15th).

Iowa ranked second in the Big Ten and seventh nationally in pass defense in 2014 with a defensive line-up that included three new linebackers and two first-year starters in the secondary. Seven Hawkeye defensive players earned All-Big Ten recognition.

The Hawkeyes collected eight wins in 2013, including a 5-3 Big Ten record to tie for second in the Legends Division. Iowa earned a spot in the 2014 Outback Bowl behind a defense that ranked among the national leaders in total defense (sixth), first downs allowed (seventh) pass defense (ninth), scoring defense (ninth), pass efficiency defense (17th) and rushing defense (19th).

Cornerback B.J. Lowery, a first team selection, was one of eight Hawkeye defensive players to earn All-Big Ten recognition in 2013, while King was named to several All-Freshman honor teams in his first college season.

Following the 2012 season, Micah Hyde was named the recipient of the Tatum-Woodson Defensive Back of the Year in the Big Ten Conference, earning first-team All-Big Ten honors. Hyde was selected by Green Bay in the fifth round of the NFL Draft and has had eight very productive seasons in the NFL with Green Bay and Buffalo.

Iowa's secondary in 2011 was led by senior Shaun Prater, who earned first-team All-Big Ten honors for the second straight season, while Hyde earned second team honors. Prater was selected by Cincinnati in the fifth round of the 2012 NFL Draft, while Jordan Bernstine was selected by Washington in the seventh round.

The defensive secondary played a key role in Iowa's success in 2010. Iowa was second in the Big Ten in pass efficiency defense (115.1) and interceptions (19). Iowa tied for 11th in the nation in interceptions, returning four thefts for touchdowns. Prater and safety Tyler Sash were both named first-team All-Big Ten, while Brett Greenwood earned second team honors and Hyde was honorable mention.

Sash started the final 34 games of his career and ranks fifth in career interceptions. He declared for the NFL following his junior season in 2010 and was a sixth-round selection of the New York Giants. Sash earned a Super Bowl ring in his rookie season with the Giants in 2011.

In 2009, Iowa ranked third in the nation in pass efficiency defense and fourth in pass defense, leading the Big Ten in both categories. The Hawkeyes tied for fifth nationally with 21 interceptions while ranking eighth in scoring defense and 10th in total defense. Sash and cornerback Amari Spivey both earned first-team All-Big Ten recognition, and Greenwood was a second team selection. Spivey declared for the NFL Draft following his junior season in 2009 and was selected in the third round by the Detroit Lions.

In 2008, Iowa ranked fourth in the nation while tying a school record with 23 interceptions. The Hawkeyes led the Big Ten and ranked fifth nationally in pass efficiency defense (98.3) and scoring defense (13.0). Spivey earned second team all-conference honors, while Bradley Fletcher and Greenwood claimed honorable mention recognition. Fletcher was selected by St. Louis in the third round of the 2009 NFL Draft.

Under Parker's direction, safety Bob Sanders became the ninth Iowa player to earn first team all-Big Ten honors for three seasons (2001, 2002, and 2003). Sanders earned second team All-America honors in 2003 and was taken by Indianapolis in the second round of the 2004 NFL Draft. He ranks 11th in career tackles (348). Sanders earned All-Pro recognition with the Colts in 2005 and was selected to the Pro Bowl. He was a key contributor again in 2006 as the Colts won the Super Bowl. He was named the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 2007 and was again an All-Pro selection.

Senior cornerback Charles Godfrey led the Iowa secondary in 2007, recording five interceptions and 65 tackles. He earned second-team All-Big Ten honors. Godfrey was selected in the third round of the 2008 NFL Draft, being selected by the Carolina Panthers. He enjoyed an eight-year NFL career.

In 2006, senior safeties Marcus Paschal and Miguel Merrick combined for 149 tackles to lead the Hawkeye secondary. Paschal was a second team All-Big Ten selection and signed a free agent contract with Philadelphia. Merrick signed a free agent contract with San Diego.

In 2005, senior cornerback Antwan Allen was the only player in the nation to start in four straight January bowl games. He ended his career with 235 tackles and eight interceptions. Jovon Johnson, at the opposite corner, also started throughout his career. He ranks third in career interceptions (17) and had 181 career tackles. Johnson played with the Pittsburgh Steelers and New York Jets in the NFL before a productive career in the Canadian Football League. He was the CFL's Most Outstanding Defensive Player in 2011, becoming the first defensive back to win the award. He is a two-time CFL All-Star.

Safeties Derek Pagel and Sean Considine joined the Iowa program as walk-ons and earned their way into the starting line-up. Each helped the Hawkeyes win a Big Ten title as seniors and both were NFL Draft selections. Pagel earned second-team All-Big Ten honors in 2002 and was selected in the fifth round of the 2003 draft. Considine was a fourth-round selection in 2005 after earning honorable mention All-Big Ten recognition. He joined the Baltimore Ravens in 2012 and played a key role on special teams for the Super Bowl champions.

In 1999, Iowa's secondary was led by the play of safety Matt Bowen. Bowen led the team in tackles as both a junior and senior. He was voted second-team All-Big Ten and was a sixth-round selection of the St. Louis Rams in the NFL Draft. Bowen played several seasons in the NFL (Washington and Buffalo) following his college career.

Parker was the defensive backfield coach at Toledo for 11 seasons prior to joining the Iowa staff. During his tenure at Toledo, Parker coached 10 all-conference selections and helped the Rockets win conference division championships in 1997 and 1998. Three of his Toledo players, Darren Anderson, Clarence Love and Kelly Herndon, went on to play in the NFL. Anderson and Love were NFL Draft selections, while Herndon signed as a free agent and played in the 2006 Super Bowl with Seattle. In 1998, Toledo ranked 19th in the nation in scoring defense.

Toledo won Mid-American Conference championships in 1990 and 1995 and competed in the 1995 Las Vegas Bowl. Toledo ranked 12th in the nation in total defense in 1990 and ninth in pass efficiency defense and 11th in rushing defense in 1992. In 1995 Toledo completed an undefeated season and was ranked 22nd in the final UPI poll and 24th in the CNN poll after leading the nation in turnover margin. Toledo also finished second to perennial power Marshall twice when Parker was a member of the Rocket staff.

Parker served as a graduate assistant coach for one year at Michigan State. He was on the Spartan staff in 1987 when MSU won the Big Ten title and defeated Southern California in the 1988 Rose Bowl.

Parker was a standout defensive back at Michigan State, earning first team all-Big Ten honors in 1983, 1984 and 1985. Parker was named defensive MVP at Michigan State in 1983 and 1985 and was invited to the Hula Bowl following his senior season. During his MSU career the Spartans competed in the 1984 Cherry Bowl and the 1985 All-American Bowl. Parker was named Most Valuable Player in the Cherry Bowl.

Parker earned his bachelor's degree from Michigan State in 1986.

Parker was born March 13, 1963, in Lorain, Ohio. Phil and his wife, Sandy, have two children, Tyler and Paige.

LeVar Woods, a three-year football letterman at the University of Iowa and a veteran of seven seasons in the National Football League, was named special teams coordinator in March 2017, after previously assisting with the Hawkeye special teams.

Woods handles all phases of Iowa's special teams after coaching Hawkeye tight ends for three seasons. Woods coached Iowa linebackers for three seasons (2012-14) and previously served as an administrative assistant with the Iowa program (2008-11).

Iowa posted an 8-5 record in 2022, concluding the season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl and wins in five of its final six games. Iowa's streak of 10 straight bowl invitations is the longest in school history and the Hawkeyes have been in the Top 25 final rankings in four of the last five seasons. Iowa's streak of 10 straight winning seasons ranks 10th best in the nation.

Iowa's special teams performed at a high level in 2022 as the Hawkeyes ranked among the top three in the Big Ten in punt and kickoff returns, and punt and kickoff return defense. Iowa was third in the Big Ten and 15th nationally in net punting, while ranking second in the conference and 19th in the nation with three blocked kicks.

Punter Tory Taylor was named first-team All-America by the FWAA, Pro Football Focus and Phil Steele while earning first-team All-Big Ten honors. Freshman kicker Drew Stevens led the team in scoring while earning Freshman All-America recognition. Taylor was second in the Big Ten and 11th nationally with a 45.3 average.

Led by first-team All-Big Ten selections in kicker Caleb Shudak and return specialist Charlie Jones, special teams made a major contribution throughout the 2021 season. Jones was the Rodgers-Dwight Return Specialist of the Year. Shudak earned first-team honors

after leading the team in scoring (108 points) and setting a school record for career field goal accuracy. He was sixth nationally in field goals per game (1.71).

Shudak signed a free agent contract with the Tennessee Titans immediately following the 2022 NFL Draft.

Iowa's special teams in 2021 ranked among national leaders in kickoff return defense (14th), kickoff returns (17th) and punt return defense (18th). Jones was second in the nation in combined kick return yards and punter Tory Taylor was 12th in the nation in punting average (46.1).

Iowa's special teams played a key role in Iowa's 2020 success as well. Taylor was named the Big Ten Punter of the Year. He was named first-team Freshman All-America by the FWAA, was second-team All-America by The Athletic and was a semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award.

Smith-Marsette was selected in the fifth round of the 2021 NFL Draft (Minnesota) and completed the 2022 season with the Super Bowl Kansas City Chiefs.

Duncan led the nation with 29 field goals (34 attempts), a total that ranks sixth-best in NCAA history. Duncan was named the Bakken-Andersen Kicker of the Year in the Big Ten while ranking 16th in the nation in scoring (119 points).

Smith-Marsette led the Big Ten and ranked second in the nation with two kickoff return touchdowns. He had touchdown returns in back-to-back wins over Nebraska (95 yards) and Southern California (98 yards). Smith-Marsette was named the offensive MVP of the Holiday Bowl, becoming the second Iowa player in school history with a rushing, receiving and kick return touchdown in the same game.

Smith-Marsette helped Iowa's kick return team rank sixth in the nation (26.6), while Iowa was also eighth nationally in kickoff coverage (17.2). Smith-Marsette ranks second in the Big Ten Conference for career kickoff return average (28.7) and ranks 10th at Iowa for all-purpose yards (3,415). He scored 20 career touchdowns.

The 2018 Hawkeyes led the Big Ten and ranked second nationally in kickoff returns, with Smith-Marsette ranking second in the individual rankings with a 29.5 average. Smith-Marsette was named the Rodgers-Dwight Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year. Iowa led the league in kickoff returns for three straight seasons before ranking second in 2019.

Iowa ranked second in the Big Ten in punt return average (10.6), and eighth in the nation in kickoff return coverage (16.4) in 2018. Senior Kyle Groeneweg ranked second in the Big Ten and 19th in the nation in punt return average (9.9).

In addition, senior kicker Miguel Recinos earned honorable mention All-Big Ten recognition. Recinos led Iowa in scoring with 98 points, connecting on all 47 PAT attempts and 17-22 field goals. Recinos ranks 15th in career scoring with 180 points, including all 93 career PAT attempts.

Iowa's special team highlights in 2017 included ranking sixth nationally in kick return defense (17.08), 15th in the nation in kickoff returns (24.44) and 25th in punt return defense (4.65). Senior running back Akrum Wadley set an Iowa bowl record with 171 yards on five kickoff returns in the Pinstripe Bowl victory.

Iowa tight ends also had an impressive season. Sophomore Noah Fant led all FBS tight ends with an average of 16.5 yards per catch, and his 11 touchdown receptions tied as the top figure among tight ends. The 11 touchdowns are also a record for Iowa tight ends. In addition, redshirt freshman T.J. Hockenson added 24 receptions for 320 yards and three touchdowns. Fant earned third-team All-Big Ten recognition.

Fant and Hockenson each declared early for the 2019 NFL Draft. Hockenson was the eighth pick in the first round (Detroit), while Fant followed as the 20th selection overall. Iowa is the first school ever to have two tight ends selected in the first round of the NFL Draft.

Senior George Kittle led the Iowa tight ends in 2016 with 22 receptions for 314 yards, while sharing the team lead with four touchdown receptions. Despite missing two full games and parts of others due to injury, Kittle earned All-Big Ten honorable mention recognition. He

participated in the Senior Bowl and the NFL Combine following the season and was selected by San Francisco in the fifth round of the 2017 NFL Draft. Kittle set an NFL tight end receiving record in 2018, earning All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors. He surpassed 1,000 receiving yards for a second straight season in 2019 while repeating as an NFL All-Pro selection. Hockenson has joined Kittle in earning All-Pro honors.

Iowa's special teams also performed well in 2016, led by return specialist Desmond King, who ranked second in the Big Ten in kickoff returns and third in punt returns. As a team Iowa led the conference and ranked seventh nationally in kickoff returns (25.9), while ranking second in the Big Ten and 11th nationally in punt returns (12.5). King earned NFL All-Pro recognition in 2018 with the Chargers.

Iowa's offense in 2015 averaged 30.9 points and 386.1 yards total offense, including 181.7 rushing and 204.4 passing yards per game. Iowa ranked in the top 25 nationally in fourth down conversions, fewest penalties and fewest turnovers.

Iowa's tight end continued to play a key role in the offense in 2015, as Henry Krieger Coble and Kittle combined for 55 receptions for 695 yards and seven touchdowns. Krieger Coble signed a free agent contract with Denver following the 2016 NFL Draft and was a member of the Los Angeles Rams practice squad in 2018. Jake Duzey, who missed the majority of his senior season in 2015 due to injury, earned an invitation to mini-camp with Indianapolis in 2017.

Woods coached Iowa linebackers in 2014, as the Hawkeye defense ranked seventh in the nation in pass defense and 22nd in total defense. Iowa led the Big Ten and ranked second in the nation in fewest penalties and penalty yards. In his first year as a starter, linebacker Quinton Alston ranked second on the team in tackles and earned second team all-Big Ten honors.

In 2013, Woods joined with Jim Reid in coaching three senior linebackers who served as the leaders of Iowa's defense. Anthony Hitchens, Christian Kirksey, and James Morris each recorded over 100 tackles while earning All-Big Ten recognition. The trio each recorded over 250 career tackles and combined for 950 total tackles in helping Iowa appear in three bowl games.

Kirksey was selected in the third round of the 2014 NFL Draft by Cleveland, while Hitchens was selected by Dallas in the fourth round. Hitchens has started in the NFL for five seasons, serving as a team captain for the Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs in 2019. Kirksey has been a starter in the NFL the past five seasons but missed the majority of 2019 due to injury. Morris signed an NFL free agent contract with New England immediately following the draft and was with the Super Bowl champions throughout the season. He spent the majority of the 2015 season with the New York Giants.

Due to the play of the Iowa defense, Reid and Woods were named by FootballScoop as national Linebackers Coaches of the Year. Iowa earned a spot in the 2014 Outback Bowl behind a solid defense that ranked among the national leaders in total defense (sixth), first downs allowed (seventh) pass defense (ninth), scoring defense (ninth), pass efficiency defense (17th) and rushing defense (19th). The Hawkeyes recorded eight wins, including five in the Big Ten to tie for second in the Legends Division.

Under the direction of Woods, Iowa's linebackers also held the top three spots on the tackle chart in 2012. Hitchens not only led Iowa in tackles, but also led the Big Ten and ranked sixth in the nation. Morris ranked third in the Big Ten and 13th nationally. Kirksey was

third on the team in tackles, while ranking second in the nation with four recovered fumbles. He was also one of eight players in the nation with two touchdowns on interception returns.

Woods served as Iowa's defensive line coach in the 2011 Insight Bowl. Despite the loss to 14th-ranked Oklahoma, the Hawkeye defense held the Sooners to a season-low 275 yards total offense and just 114 net rushing yards. Iowa linemen recorded four tackles for loss, two sacks and an interception.

As an administrative assistant, Woods assisted the coaching staff in compiling statistical information, gathering information on opponents and recruits, and assisting in the day-to-day operation of the football office.

During his NFL playing career, Woods played for Arizona, Chicago, Detroit, and Tennessee. Woods signed with the Cardinals as a free agent in 2001 and spent the first four years of his career in Arizona.

In 88 career games Woods totaled 168 tackles, 2.5 sacks, four fumble recoveries and one forced fumble.

Woods teamed with fellow NFL player Kyle Vanden Bosch (both are graduates of West Lyon High School in Inwood, Iowa) in hosting a youth football camp in their hometown. He has also founded the LeVar Woods Football Academy in Okoboji, Iowa, teaching fundamentals and techniques to youth and high school athletes.

During his stint with the Cardinals, Woods was named a finalist for both the Byron "Whizzer" White and Walter Payton Man of the Year awards, recognizing his contributions to charity.

Woods has been involved with several charitable organizations throughout his career, including the Garth Brooks Teammates for Kids foundation, Homeward Bound, Soup Kitchen, Youth Christmas shopping trips and, Milk and Cookies Youth Reading Program, along with speaking engagements to elementary school children. Woods has also been instrumental in developing the Hawkeye Readers youth reading program in conjunction with the Iowa City: UNESCO City of Literature, which helps promote the importance of literacy to children.

He has also been involved with the NFL's Executive and Entrepreneurship programs through the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business, the Kellogg Business School at Northwestern University, and the Stanford School of Business.

Woods lettered as a member of the Hawkeye football team from 1998-2000. He was a two-year starter at outside linebacker, totaling 165 career tackles, including 18 tackles for loss and four sacks.

He was a team captain as a senior in 2000 and earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors from both league coaches and media after recording 97 tackles. He was selected for the Blue-Gray All-Star game following his senior season.

Along with serving as defensive team captain, Woods was co-Most Valuable Player and the recipient of the Hayden Fry "Extra Heartbeat Award", given each year to the Hawkeye player who gives extraordinary effort on the field.

Woods attended West Lyon High School in Inwood, Iowa, where he earned all-state honors and was the Class 2A Player of the Year as a senior. He rushed for 1,226 yards and eight touchdowns as a senior, while totaling 50 tackles, nine QB sacks and two recovered fumbles as a defensive end.

He earned his degree in elementary education from the University of Iowa in December, 2000.

Woods was born March 15, 1978, in Cleveland, Ohio. LeVar and his wife, Meghann, have three children, daughters Sydney and Whitney, and a son, Mason.

George Barnett

Offensive Line Coach
Third Year at Iowa

George Barnett is in his third year as offensive line coach at the University of Iowa after joining the staff in March, 2021. Barnett joined the Hawkeye football program after being named offensive line coach at Tulane University in December, 2020. Barnett has over 20 seasons of offensive line coaching experience at the collegiate level.

Iowa's offensive line in 2022 battled inexperience as the Hawkeyes started the season with just one junior and one senior among the players in the rotation. Sophomore Mason Richman started all 13 games and earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors. Iowa's usual starting line-up included one senior, three sophomores and one redshirt freshman.

In his first season on the Hawkeye staff, Barnett coached an offensive line led by unanimous consensus All-America center Tyler Linderbaum. Linderbaum was the Rimington-Pace Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year and was recognized as the best center in the nation as the recipient of the Rimington Trophy. In addition, senior guard Kyler Schott earned second-team All-Big Ten honors.

Linderbaum was selected in the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft, taken as the 25th selection by Baltimore. In addition, Schott (Tampa Bay) signed a free agent contract immediately following the draft. Linderbaum earned the starting position in Baltimore and was named to All-Rookie teams for his play.

Iowa posted an 8-5 record in 2022, concluding the season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl and wins in five of its final six games. Iowa's streak of 10 straight bowl invitations is the longest in school history and the Hawkeyes have been in the Top 25 final rankings in four of the last five seasons. Iowa's streak of 10 straight winning seasons ranks 10th best in the nation.

The Hawkeyes won 10 games in 2021, winning the Big Ten's West Division title and advancing to the conference championship game. Iowa concluded the season with an appearance in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl and was ranked 23rd in the nation in the final national rankings.

Barnett previously was on the coaching staff at Miami (OH) for seven seasons. Barnett joined the Miami program as co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach (2014-15). He was later elevated to assistant head coach/co-offensive coordinator/offensive line coach in 2016. Miami earned an invitation to the 2016 St. Petersburg Bowl.

During his seven seasons at Miami, Barnett coached seven All-Mid-American Conference award winners, including Tommy Doyle (first team) and Danny Godlevske (third team) in 2019. In 2016, Collin Buchanan was invited to the NFL Combine and later signed a free agent contract with New Orleans.

In Barnett's final season at Miami in 2020 the Redhawks averaged just under 400 yards total offense, while ranking second in the conference by allowing just four sacks.

In 2019, despite starting a pair of true freshmen up front, the offensive line averaged 130.9 rushing yards per game and allowed just 31 sacks in 14 games as the RedHawks won the MAC Championship and participated in the Lending Tree Bowl. In 2018, Miami averaged 159.8 rushing yards per game and allowed just 20 sacks. The Redhawks averaged over 200 rushing yards per game in conference games.

Prior to his stint at Miami, Barnett was the offensive line coach and running game coordinator at Illinois State for four seasons. He was named offensive coordinator prior to the 2013 season. Illinois State participated in the FCS Playoffs in 2012.

In his time with the Redbirds, the offense averaged 145.7 yards per game on the ground and allowed just 1.3 sacks per outing. In 2011, the Redbird offensive line allowed only six sacks in 11 contests, as the team averaged 183.4 rushing yards per game while posting a 7-4 record. The six sacks allowed that season ranked third-best in the country and the Redbirds produced their first 1,000-yard rusher since 2006.

Prior to Illinois State, Barnett had a two-year stint as the offensive line coach at Division II powerhouse Grand Valley State, which advanced to the 2009 NCAA Division II national title game. In his two seasons at GVSU as offensive line coach, he helped the Lakers' offense become one of the best in the country.

In 2009, GVSU ranked third in the country in sacks allowed (.60), giving up just nine sacks in 15 games. The Lakers also ranked 11th in the country in rushing offense (227.5 ypg), 12th in total offense (450.1 ypg) and 14th in scoring offense (35.8 ppg). Barnett also mentored senior Nick McDonald, who was a consensus Division II All-American and the GLIAC Offensive Lineman of the Year.

In 2008, Barnett guided the GVSU offensive line unit that saw all five of its starters earn All-GLIAC honors. The Lakers finished the season ranked 10th in the nation in scoring (38.5 ppg), 13th in sacks allowed (1.08), 14th in rushing (228.4 ypg) and 25th in total offense (429.0 ypg).

Barnett moved to Grand Valley State after a three-year stint as offensive line coach at Indianapolis. The Greyhound offense increased its production every season behind the Barnett-led offensive line. Grand Valley State advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs in both 2008 and 2009.

Indianapolis recorded four-year highs in passing yards (234.1 ypg), rushing offense (189.2 ypg) and total offense (423.3 ypg) in 2007.

Barnett spent the 2004 season as a graduate assistant coach at Illinois, working under Harry Hiestand with the Illini offensive line. Barnett began his coaching career and taught for five years at Mattoon (Ill.)

High School from 1999-2003. He served as assistant head coach for the Green Wave's state semifinalist team in 2003, working as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach.

Barnett earned a bachelor of science degree in physical education in 1998 from Millikin University in Decatur, Illinois. He was a four-year football letterman and earned all-conference recognition.

Barnett was born Jan. 17, 1976, and is a native of Tuscola, Illinois. George and his wife, Lori, have two children, Elle and James.

Defensive Line Coach
11th Year at Iowa

Kelvin Bell, a former member of the University of Iowa football team, is in his fifth season as Iowa's defensive line coach. Bell was named recruiting coordinator and defensive assistant coach in February, 2016. Bell also held the position of director of on-campus recruiting for two years (2014-15). He served as a graduate assistant coach for two years (2012-13), assisting with special teams.

Throughout his coaching stint at Iowa, Bell has been involved in all aspects of prospect identification, working with the coaching staff in off-campus recruiting efforts, and coordinated all aspects of on-campus recruiting activities.

Iowa posted an 8-5 record in 2022, concluding the season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl and wins in five of its final six games. Iowa's streak of 10 straight bowl invitations is the longest in school history and the Hawkeyes have been in the Top 25 final rankings in four of the last five seasons. Iowa's streak of 10 straight winning seasons ranks 10th best in the nation.

Iowa's defense led the way in 2022, including posting just the second shutout in Iowa's 35 bowl games. The defense led the nation in with seven defensive touchdowns. Iowa's defense was in the top 12 in the nation in scoring defense (second), total defense (second), pass efficiency defense (fourth), passing yards per game (sixth), first down defense (10th), third down defense (11th) and rushing defense (12th).

Four of Iowa's defensive linemen in 2022 earned All-Big Ten recognition. Joe Evans and Lukas Van Ness earned second team honors, while tackles Logan Lee and Noah Shannon were named honorable mention. Evans and Shannon will return for a fifth season in 2023, while Lee will be a senior. Van Ness declared for the 2023 NFL Draft and was selected in the first round by the Green Bay Packers (13th overall selection).

The Hawkeyes won 10 games in 2021, winning the Big Ten's West Division title and advancing to the conference championship game. Iowa concluded the season with an appearance in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl and was ranked 23rd in the nation in the final national rankings.

Iowa closed the 2021 regular season with four straight victories to earn the West Division title for the second time since 2015. Iowa earned 24 conference wins between 2018-21, matching Iowa's highest four-year conference win total since 2002-05.

Iowa's defense set a school record and led the nation with 25 interceptions in 2021. The defense ranked among national leaders in takeaways (30, third), defensive touchdowns scored (four, seventh), pass efficiency defense (110.5, sixth), turnover margin (0.8, 11th), rushing defense (114.4, 13th), scoring defense (19.2, 13th) and total defense (328.8, 18th).

Senior end Zach VanValkenburg led the play of Iowa's defensive front, earning second-team All-Big Ten honors, while Shannon earned honorable mention recognition following his first season as a starter. Iowa's defensive line in 2021 featured three players in their first year as starters.

VanValkenburg signed a free agent contract with the Las Vegas Raiders immediately following the 2022 NFL Draft. In three consecutive years, 2019-21, the Hawkeyes had a defensive lineman selected in the first four rounds of the NFL Draft, while Van Ness added to that total in 2023.

Iowa's most recent bowl game invitations include the 2022 Music City Bowl, 2022 Citrus Bowl, 2020 Music City Bowl, 2019 Holiday Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl, 2017 Outback Bowl, 2016 Rose Bowl Game, 2015 TaxSlayer Bowl and 2014 Outback Bowl. The Hawkeyes have ranked in the final top 10 of both major polls five times in the past 21 seasons.

Iowa has appeared in 12 January bowl games since 2001 and has recorded January bowl wins over Florida (2004 Outback), Louisiana State (2005 Capital One), South Carolina (2009 Outback), Georgia Tech (2010 Orange), and Mississippi State (2019 Outback).

Iowa has won 175 games over the past 21 seasons, including 108 Big Ten games. Along with the 2021 and 2015 division titles, the Hawkeyes earned a share of the Big Ten title in both 2002 and 2004 and tied for second in 2009. Iowa has finished in the Big Ten's first division in 20 of the past 22 years.

Following back-to-back narrow losses to open the 2020 season, Iowa won six straight games, all in Big Ten play, to complete the regular season. The Hawkeyes allowed just seven points in three of the six wins. The winning streak included road wins at Minnesota, Penn State and Illinois, and trophy game victories over Minnesota, Nebraska, and Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes were ranked 15th in the nation in the final CFP rankings and coaches poll, and 16th by the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes were selected to compete in the 2020 Music City Bowl, but that event was canceled.

Iowa's defense in 2020 led the nation in allowing opponents just 4.3 yards per play. The Hawkeyes ranked among the national leaders in several additional categories, including scoring (16.0, 7th), pass efficiency defense (110.1, 9th), rushing defense (107.6, 11th), total defense (313.8, 12th), red zone defense (.727, 12th) and interceptions (11, 19th).

Junior tackle Daviyon Nixon earned unanimous consensus All-America honors. He was named the Big Ten's defensive lineman and defensive player of the year while earned first-team All-Big Ten

honors. He was a finalist for both the Outland Trophy and Nagurski Award. Senior end Chauncey Golston also earned first-team All-Big Ten honors, while VanValkenburg earned second-team honors. Golston was a third-round selection in the 2021 NFL Draft (Dallas) and Nixon was selected by Carolina in the fifth round. Tackle Jack Heflin signed a free agent contract with Green Bay immediately following the draft.

Iowa won 47 games from 2015-19, the highest total in school history over any five-year period, and a total that ranked ninth nationally. Iowa won its final four games in 2019 and ranked 15th in the final Associated Press and coaches polls.

The Hawkeyes concluded the 2019 campaign with a 10-3 record following a 49-24 win over No. 22 Southern California in the Holiday Bowl. The three losses were all to ranked opponents by a combined 14 points. The Hawkeyes were 4-1 in trophy games for the third straight season.

The 2019 Hawkeye defense ranked among the top 17 in the nation in scoring defense (5th, 14.0), first downs allowed (9th, 16.6), total defense (12th, 308.2), rushing defense (14th, 112.5), turnover margin (14th, 0.7) and pass efficiency defense (17th, 116.0). The Hawkeyes ranked in the top five nationally in fewest penalties and fewest penalty yards. Iowa opponents have averaged less than 20 points per game in each of the last five seasons.

Iowa completed the 2018 season with a 9-4 mark and a final ranking of 25th in the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes earned a 27-22 Outback Bowl win over No. 18 Mississippi State to close the season with three straight wins. The four losses came by a total of 23 points and all were decided in the final minutes of play. Iowa tied for second in the Big Ten West Division.

Iowa, in 2018, ranked seventh nationally in total defense (293.6), eighth in turnovers gained (27), 11th in scoring defense (17.8) and 12th in rushing defense (109.5). Iowa's defense was second in the Big Ten in red zone defense and third in total sacks (35).

The Hawkeyes posted a perfect 12-0 regular season record in 2015, winning the West Division of the Big Ten Conference. Iowa participated in the 2016 Rose Bowl Game and the 2015 Big Ten Championship and ended the season in the top 10 in the final national rankings.

Junior defensive end A.J. Epenesa earned first and second-team All-America honors while leading Iowa in sacks for the second straight season in 2019. Epenesa earned first-team All-Big Ten honors and was the defensive MVP in Iowa's holiday Bowl win over Southern California. Epenesa, who declared for the 2020 NFL Draft, had 2.5 sacks vs. Southern California as Iowa allowed the Trojans just 22 net rushing yards. Golston and senior tackle Cedrick Lattimore earned honorable mention All-Big Ten recognition.

Epenesa was selected by Buffalo in the second round of the 2020 NFL Draft. In addition, Lattimore signed a free agent contract with Seattle immediately following the draft.

In 2018, Epenesa earned first-team all-Big Ten honors and defensive end Anthony Nelson was named to the second team. End Parker Hesse and tackle Matt Nelson earned honorable mention recognition. Nelson declared for the NFL Draft following his junior season and was selected by Tampa Bay in the fourth round. Matt Nelson, Hesse and Sam Brincks were all invited to NFL workouts immediately following the draft.

The 2017 Iowa defense ranked 17th in the nation in scoring defense (19.9). Anthony Nelson earned second team All-Big Ten and first-team Academic All-America honors, while senior tackle Nathan Bazata was honorable mention All-Big Ten.

The 2016 Hawkeyes ranked 13th in the nation in scoring defense and red zone defense, 19th in pass efficiency defense and 23rd in total defense. Tackle Jaleel Johnson earned first-team All-Big Ten honors, while Bazata and Hesse earned honorable mention recognition.

Johnson and Faith Ekakitie, also a senior tackle in 2016, moved to the professional football ranks. Johnson was a fourth-round selection of the Minnesota Vikings in the 2017 NFL Draft, while Ekakitie was the first player selected in the 2017 CFL Draft (Winnipeg).

Bell interned with four NFL organizations (Minnesota Vikings, 2013; New York Giants, 2014; Miami Dolphins and Cincinnati Bengals, 2015) as part of the Bill Walsh Minority Coaching Fellowship.

Bell joined the Iowa staff after serving as an assistant coach at Trinity International University, where he served as the offensive line coach and run game coordinator in 2011. Two of his offensive linemen earned all-conference honors in 2011.

Bell served two seasons (2008-09) as offensive line coach at Wayne State College in Wayne, Nebraska. He helped lead the Wildcats to their first-ever appearance in the NCAA Division II playoffs in 2008 while posting a two-year record of 17-6. Bell coached five offensive linemen who went on to earn all-conference, all-region and All-America honors.

Before coaching at WSC, Bell coached the offensive line at Cornell College for two seasons (2006-2007). He gained his first coaching experience at Regina High School in Iowa City (2004-06), where he served as junior high coach, varsity weight room supervisor, and assistant varsity coach. Regina earned its first-ever state football championship in 2005 after reaching the semifinals in 2004.

Bell first joined the Iowa program as a defensive lineman in 2000. He redshirted in his first year at Iowa and later had his career cut short due to injury. As a prep, he earned first team all-conference honors for three straight seasons as an offensive and defensive lineman. He earned all-district, all-region and all-county recognition as a senior.

Bell earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics, with a computer science concentration, from the University of Iowa in 2005. He earned his master's degree in sports management in 2014.

Bell is a native of Olive Branch, Mississippi. His wife's name is Natalee.

Running Backs Coach
Third Year at Iowa

Former University of Iowa running back Ladell Betts, the second leading rusher in Iowa football history, is in his third year as running backs coach after being named to the position in March, 2021.

Iowa posted an 8-5 record in 2022, concluding the season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl and wins in five of its final six games. Iowa's streak of 10 straight bowl invitations is the longest in school history and the Hawkeyes have been in the Top 25 final rankings in four of the last five seasons. Iowa's streak of 10 straight winning seasons ranks 10th best in the nation.

True freshman Kaleb Johnson led Iowa's ground game in 2022, rushing for a freshman-record 779 yards and six touchdowns. Johnson earned Freshman All-America recognition while also averaging 25 yards on 13 kickoff returns. Sophomore Leshon Williams supported the rushing attack with 413 yards.

In his first season on the Hawkeye staff, Betts coached Hawkeye junior Tyler Goodson, who led the Iowa rushing attack with 1,151 yards and six touchdowns, while also collecting 247 receiving yards and one touchdown. Goodson earned third-team All-Big Ten honors after leading Iowa in rushing for the third straight season. Goodson, who declared for the NFL Draft, ranks 10th in career rushing with 2,551 yards. Goodson signed a free agent contract with Green Bay immediately following the 2022 NFL Draft.

The Hawkeyes won 10 games in 2021, winning the Big Ten's West Division title and advancing to the conference championship game. Iowa concluded the season with an appearance in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl and was ranked 23rd in the nation in the final national rankings.

Betts joined the Hawkeye coaching staff after serving as head coach at Pine Crest School in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. He served as the head coach at Pine Crest for two seasons and was previously the offensive coordinator (2016-18).

Betts previously was the offensive coordinator at Boca Raton High School for two years (2014-15) after coaching running backs at Coral Spring Christian Academy in 2013. Pine Crest posted an undefeated season in 2020 and Boca Raton posted a 10-3 mark in 2015. Betts was offensive coordinator with the NFL Prep 100 Series from 2011-14.

Following his Iowa career, Betts was selected by Washington in the second round of the 2002 NFL Draft. Betts played in the NFL for nine seasons, including eight with Washington and his final season with the New Orleans Saints. Betts played in 111 career NFL games, rushing for 3,326 yards and 15 touchdowns. He also had 1,646 career receiving yards and three touchdown receptions, along with 2,085 career kickoff return yards. His best single season included 1,154 rushing yards and 445 receiving yards in 2006. His career totals include 7,057 all-purpose yards.

Betts concluded his Iowa career in 2001 as a four-year letterman and is the only running back in program history to lead the team in rushing four straight years. Betts ranks second in career rushing yards (3,686), fourth in all-purpose yards (4,397) and 19th in career scoring (162).

Betts rushed for over 1,000 yards in his final two seasons (2000-01). He gained 1,090 yards as a junior and 1,060 as a senior. He scored 25 career rushing touchdowns, including 10 in his final season. His career totals also include 702 receiving yards and two touchdowns.

Betts earned second-team All-Big Ten honors as a junior and senior. He was elected a team captain in 2001 and shared team Most Valuable Player honors in 1999 and 2001. Betts was a three-year member of the Leadership Committee during his Iowa career and served as an Ambassador with the University of Iowa Foundation during his final semester as a Hawkeye.

Betts earned his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 2001 and completed the Business Management and Entrepreneurship Program through the Aresty Institute of Executive Education & The Wharton Sports Business Initiative.

Betts is a native of Blue Springs, Missouri. He and his wife, Shatarah, are the parents of five daughters, Tamryn, Saire, Soleil, Saavi, and Suraj, and one son, Torino.

Wide Receivers Coach
Seventh Year at Iowa

Kelton Copeland was named wide receivers coach at the University of Iowa in February, 2017. Copeland joined the Hawkeye coaching staff after coaching at Northern Illinois the previous four seasons.

Iowa posted an 8-5 record in 2022, concluding the season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl and wins in five of its final six games. Iowa's streak of 10 straight bowl invitations is the longest in school history and the Hawkeyes have been in the Top 25 final rankings in four of the last five seasons. Iowa's streak of 10 straight winning seasons ranks 10th best in the nation.

Senior Nico Ragaini led Iowa's wide receivers in 2022 with 34 receptions for 386 yards, increasing his career totals to 124 receptions for 1,352 yards. Ragaini will return in 2023 for a fifth season as a veteran among several younger players among the wide receivers. His totals a year ago came despite missing time in the early season due to injury.

The Hawkeyes won 10 games in 2021, winning the Big Ten's West Division title and advancing to the conference championship game. Iowa concluded the season with an appearance in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl and was ranked 23rd in the final national rankings.

Iowa closed the 2021 regular season with four straight victories to earn the West Division title and a berth in the league championship game for the second time since 2015. Iowa has earned 24 conference

wins in the past four seasons, matching Iowa's highest four-year conference win total since 2002-05.

Following back-to-back narrow losses to open the 2020 season, Iowa won six straight games, all in Big Ten play, to complete the regular season. The Hawkeyes scored at least 26 points in each of the six wins. The winning streak included road wins at Minnesota, Penn State and Illinois, and trophy game victories over Minnesota, Nebraska and Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes were ranked 15th in the final CFP rankings and coaches poll and 16th by the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes were selected to compete in the 2020 Music City Bowl, but that event was canceled.

Iowa won 47 games from 2015-19, the highest total in school history over any five-year period, and a total that ranked ninth nationally. Iowa won its final four games in 2019 and ranked 15th in the final Associated Press and coaches polls.

Iowa's most recent bowl game invitations include the 2022 Citrus Bowl, 2020 Music City Bowl, 2019 Holiday Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl, 2017 Outback Bowl, 2016 Rose Bowl Game, 2015 TaxSlayer Bowl and 2014 Outback Bowl. The Hawkeyes have ranked in the final top 10 of both major polls five times in the past 20 seasons.

Iowa's offense in 2020 led the Big Ten in red zone offense (.917) and ranked second in scoring (31.8). The Hawkeyes scored at least 25 points in all six wins. Among wide receivers, senior Ihmir Smith-Marsette earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors (25-345-4 TDs), while senior Brandon Smith recorded 23 receptions for 231 yards and two scores. Smith-Marsette totaled over 1,600 career receiving yards and ranks 10th with 3,415 career all-purpose yards. Smith totaled over 1,000 career receiving yards.

Smith-Marsette was selected in the fifth round of the 2021 NFL Draft by Minnesota and concluded the 2022 season with the Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs. Smith signed a free agent contract with Dallas immediately following the draft and signed a free agent contract with the Cardinals in 2023.

The Hawkeyes concluded the 2019 campaign with a 10-3 record following a 49-24 win over No. 22 Southern California in the Holiday Bowl. The three losses were all to ranked opponents by a combined 14 points. The Hawkeyes were 4-1 in trophy games for the third straight season.

Iowa completed the 2018 season with a 9-4 mark and a final ranking of 25th in the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes earned a 27-22 Outback Bowl win over No. 18 Mississippi State to close the season with three straight wins. The four losses came by a total of 23 points and all were decided in the final minutes of play. Iowa tied for second in the Big Ten West Division.

Iowa won eight games in both 2016 and 2017, including a Pinstripe Bowl victory to conclude the 2017 campaign. The Hawkeyes posted a perfect 12-0 regular season record in 2015, winning the West Division of the Big Ten Conference. Iowa participated in the 2016 Rose Bowl Game and the 2015 Big Ten Championship and ended the season in the top 10 in the final national rankings.

Iowa's efficient offense in 2019 featured senior quarterback Nate Stanley completing just under 60 percent of his passes to a talented and deep wide receiver corp. Redshirt freshman Nico Ragaini (46-439) and Smith-Marsette (44-722) each had over 40 receptions, while Smith (37-439) and redshirt freshman Tyrone Tracy Jr., both totaled over 35 receptions.

Iowa's offense in 2018 also featured Stanley, who tossed 26 touchdown passes for the second straight year. The improved play of Iowa's wide receivers played a big role as the Hawkeyes averaged 31.2 points per game, including a school-record 42.8 points per game in five Big Ten road games.

Senior wide receiver Nick Easley led Iowa with 52 receptions in 2018. He was named MVP of the 2019 Outback Bowl after grabbing eight receptions for 104 yards and two touchdowns. Easley surpassed 100 career receptions and 1,000 career receiving yards in his two seasons under Copeland's direction. He signed a free agent contract with Buffalo following the 2019 NFL Draft.

The Hawkeyes won eight games in 2017, including a 27-20 win over Boston College in the Pinstripe Bowl. In addition to the bowl victory the Hawkeyes won three of four rivalry trophy games while facing one of the toughest schedules in the nation.

Wide receiver Matt VandeBerg played his final two seasons under Copeland, returning from injury as a junior to record 28 receptions for 384 yards and two touchdowns in 2017. He had at least one reception in his final 32 games. His 134 career receptions rank 10th in school history and he ranks 17th in career receiving yards (1,686).

Copeland served as wide receivers coach and specials teams coordinator at Northern Illinois in 2016 after coaching the NIU running backs from 2013-15. Northern Illinois had a first team all-conference selection at both wide receiver and as return specialist while leading the conference in both kickoff returns and kickoff coverage in 2016.

In 2015, Northern Illinois running back Joel Bouagnon earned first team all-conference honors after rushing for 1,285 yards and 18 touchdowns. NIU averaged 190.1 rushing yards per game while playing in the conference title game for the sixth straight year and earning an eighth straight bowl invitation.

The NIU offense rushed for 3,488 yards and 36 touchdowns in 2014, as three running backs each averaged over five yards per carry. In 2013 the Huskies featured two players who each rushed for over 1,000 yards, including quarterback Jordan Lynch, a Heisman Trophy finalist.

Copeland joined the NIU staff after coaching wide receivers at South Dakota for two seasons (2011-12).

He was on the staff at Coffeyville Community College from 2007-10, coaching wide receivers (2008-10) and the defensive secondary (2007). Coffeyville advanced to the Region IV playoffs in three different seasons, while boasting one of the top offenses in the Jayhawk Conference in 2010. Copeland was promoted to offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Coffeyville prior to accepting the position at South Dakota.

Copeland coached defensive backs at Northwood University in 2006, helping Northwood reach the Division II playoffs. He was on the coaching staff at Emporia State University from 2003-05, coaching linebackers, running backs, and wide receivers, while also working with special teams. He also served as an assistant strength and conditioning coach.

As a player at Emporia State from 1999-02, Copeland was the starting quarterback and a team captain for three seasons. He set school records for rushing yards by a quarterback in a season and career, leading the team in total offense as both a junior and senior. He

ranked third all-time in total offense and fourth in passing yards following his final season.

A native of Miami, Florida, Copeland attended Southridge High School. He graduated from Emporia State University in 2003 with a bachelor's degree in recreation.

Copeland was born June 9, 1980. He is married to the former Bridgette Eldridge, and the couple have three daughters, Marlea, Devyn and Kabryn.

Tight Ends/Fullbacks Coach
Second Year at Iowa

Three-time All-Big Ten linebacker and Hawkeye team captain Abdul Hodge joined the University of Iowa coaching staff in March, 2022. Hodge coaches the tight end and fullback positions. Hodge joined the Hawkeye coaching staff after coaching at the University of South Dakota the previous three seasons.

Hodge coached outside linebackers and was the staff NFL liaison at South Dakota.

In his first season on the Iowa, staff Hodge coached senior Sam LaPorta, who led the Hawkeyes in receiving with 58 receptions for 657 yards. LaPorta was one of three finalists for the John Mackey Award and was named the Kwalick-Clark Big Ten Tight End of the Year. LaPorta completed his career with 153 receptions for 1,786 yards. He ranks first all-time among Iowa tight ends in receptions and second in receiving yards.

LaPorta was selected by Detroit in the second round of the 2023 NFL Draft, the 34th overall selection. In addition, fullback Monte Pottebaum signed a free agent contract with Pittsburgh immediately following the draft.

In addition to LaPorta, Hodge also worked with sophomore Luke Lachey, who improved throughout the season and ended the campaign with 28 receptions for 398 yards while leading the team with four touchdown receptions.

Hodge, a native of Fort Lauderdale, Florida (Boyd Anderson High School), lettered for the Hawkeyes from 2002-05. He was a key player for the Hawkeyes in one of the most successful periods in school history, helping Iowa post a four-year mark of 38-12. The Hawkeyes won

at least 10 games in three straight seasons. Iowa shared Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004 and appeared in four straight January bowl games, winning the 2004 Outback Bowl and the 2005 Capital One Bowl.

Hodge led the Big Ten and ranked third in the country in tackles per game (13.2) and solo tackles per game (8.2) in 2005. Hodge ranks third in career tackles at Iowa (453) and is one of three Hawkeyes to lead the team in tackles three consecutive years (2003-05). His 158 tackles in 2005 rank second best at Iowa for a single season and his 141 tackles in 2003 ranks sixth.

Hodge earned first-team All-Big Ten honors in 2003 and 2004 and second team recognition in 2005. He served as a team captain as a senior and shared Most Valuable Player honors following the season. He also earned the Hayden Fry "Extra Heartbeat" Award and the Iron Hawk Award.

Hodge was a quarterfinalist for the 2005 Lott Trophy and earned All-America accolades as a junior and senior. He was selected to participate in the Senior Bowl following his final season and was later selected in the third round of the 2006 NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers. Hodge played for Green Bay, Cincinnati and Carolina during his NFL career that concluded with the 2010 season.

Following his career in the NFL, Hodge founded Professional Interactive Solutions in his hometown of Fort Lauderdale, Florida, a company that helps businesses grow their online presence. In addition to running the business, Hodge served as an assistant coach for several high schools in Sarasota, Florida, from 2013-16. He was a coaching intern for the NFL's Tennessee Titans before joining the South Dakota staff.

Hodge's first year coaching at South Dakota was highlighted by a three-game win streak in the first half of the season in which the Coyotes held their three foes to a combined 745 yards and 16 points. It marked the first time since 2008 that USD held three consecutive foes to 16 points or fewer. USD went on to knock off fifth-ranked South Dakota State on Senior Day inside the DakotaDome when the Coyotes stopped three fourth-quarter drives to preserve a 24-21 victory.

Year two was unique at South Dakota in that it was reduced to four games due to the COVID-19 pandemic and was conducted in the spring of 2021. Rush linebacker Jacob Matthew led the team in sacks and tackles-for-loss for the second year in a row and was rewarded with honorable mention All-MVFC honors. South Dakota forced nine turnovers and produced seven sacks in four games, highlighted by a 27-20 upset at No. 7 Illinois State in the season opener. Two of the team's four games were against FCS Top 10 teams.

South Dakota posted an 7-5 record in 2021, including a 5-3 conference mark. That record included wins over No. 13 North Dakota, No. 16 Northern Iowa, and No. 7 South Dakota State. South Dakota qualified for the FCS playoffs for the second time in program history, hosting a playoff game for the first time.

At South Dakota, Hodge was the first defensive assistant hired by defensive coordinator Travis Johansen prior to the 2019 season. Prior to the 2020 season former Hawkeye Miles Taylor joined Hodge on the defensive staff as defensive pass game coordinator and defensive backs coach. Prior to the 2021 season former Hawkeye Corey Brown was named USD's defensive line coach.

Hodge earned his bachelor's degree in communications from Iowa in 2005.

Hodge and his wife, Chabli, have two children, a daughter, Amari, and a son, Abdul Jr.

Fifth Year at Iowa**

Jay Niemann was named assistant defensive line coach and defensive recruiting coordinator in May, 2019. Niemann joined the Hawkeye coaching staff after serving as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Rutgers University for three seasons (2016-18).

Iowa posted an 8-5 record in 2022, concluding the season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl and wins in five of its final six games. Iowa's streak of 10 straight bowl invitations is the longest in school history and the Hawkeyes have been in the Top 25 final rankings in four of the last five seasons. Iowa's streak of 10 straight winning seasons ranks 10th best in the nation.

Iowa's defense led the way in 2022, including posting just the second shutout in Iowa's 35 bowl games. The defense led the nation in with seven defensive touchdowns. Iowa's defense was in the top 12 in the nation in scoring defense (second), total defense (second), pass efficiency defense (fourth), passing yards per game (sixth), first down defense (10th), third down defense (11th) and rushing defense (12th).

Four of Iowa's defensive linemen in 2022 earned All-Big Ten recognition. Joe Evans and Lukas Van Ness earned second team honors, while tackles Logan Lee and Noah Shannon were named honorable mention. Evans and Shannon will return for a fifth season in 2023, while Lee will be a senior. Van Ness declared for the 2023 NFL Draft and was selected in the first round by the Green Bay Packers (13th overall selection).

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Iowa closed the 2021 regular season with four straight victories to earn the West Division title for the second time since 2015. Iowa earned 24 conference wins between 2018-21, matching Iowa's highest four-year conference win total since 2002-05.

Iowa's defense set a school record and led the nation with 25 interceptions in 2021. The defense ranked among national leaders in takeaways (30, third), defensive touchdowns scored (four, seventh), pass efficiency defense (110.5, sixth), turnover margin (0.8, 11th), rushing defense (114.4, 13th), scoring defense (19.2, 13th) and total defense (328.8, 18th).

Senior end Zach VanValkenburg led the play of Iowa's defensive front, earning second-team All-Big Ten honors, while Shannon earned honorable mention recognition following his first season as a starter. Iowa's defensive line in 2021 featured three players in their first year as starters.

VanValkenburg signed a free agent contract with the Las Vegas Raiders immediately following the 2022 NFL Draft. In three consecutive years (2019-21), the Hawkeyes had a defensive lineman selected in the first four rounds of the NFL Draft, while Van Ness added to that total in 2023.

Iowa's most recent bowl game invitations include the 2022 Music City Bowl, 2022 Citrus Bowl, 2020 Music City Bowl, 2019 Holiday Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl, 2017 Outback Bowl, 2016 Rose Bowl Game, 2015 TaxSlayer Bowl and 2014 Outback Bowl. The Hawkeyes have ranked in the final top 10 of both major polls five times in the past 21 seasons.

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Iowa has won 175 games over the past 21 seasons, including 108 Big Ten games. Along with the 2021 and 2015 division titles, the Hawkeyes earned a share of the Big Ten title in both 2002 and 2004 and tied for second in 2009. Iowa has finished in the Big Ten's first division in 20 of the past 22 years.

Iowa's defense in 2020 led the nation in allowing opponents just 4.3 yards per play. The Hawkeyes ranked among the national leaders in several additional categories, including scoring (16.0, 7th), pass efficiency defense (110.1, 9th), rushing defense (107.6, 11th), total defense (313.8, 12th), red zone defense (.727, 12th) and interceptions (11, 19th).

Junior tackle Daviyon Nixon earned unanimous consensus All-America honors. He was named the Big Ten's defensive lineman and defensive player of the year while earned first-team All-Big Ten honors. He was a finalist for both the Outland Trophy and Nagurski Award. Senior end Chauncey Golston also earned first-team All-Big Ten honors, while VanValkenburg earned second-team honors. Golston was selected by Dallas in the third round of the 2021 NFL Draft, while Nixon was selected in the fifth round by Carolina. DT Jack Heflin signed a free agent contract (Green Bay) immediately following the draft and was with the Packers throughout the 2021 season.

The Hawkeyes concluded the 2019 campaign with a 10-3 record following a 49-24 win over No. 22 Southern California in the Holiday Bowl. The three losses were all to ranked opponents by a combined 14 points. Iowa posted a 4-1 record in trophy games for the third straight season.

The 2019 Hawkeye defense ranked among the top 17 in the nation in scoring defense (5th, 14.0), first downs allowed (9th, 16.6), total defense (12th, 308.2), rushing defense (14th, 112.5), turnover margin (14th, 0.7) and pass efficiency defense (17th, 116.0). The Hawkeyes ranked in the top five nationally in fewest penalties and fewest penalty yards. Iowa opponents have averaged less than 20 points per game in each of the last five seasons.

Junior defensive end A.J. Epenesa earned first and second-team All-America honors while leading Iowa in sacks for the second straight season in 2019. Epenesa earned first-team All-Big Ten honors and was

the defensive MVP in Iowa's Holiday Bowl win over Southern California. Epenesa, who declared for the 2020 NFL Draft, had 2.5 sacks vs. Southern California as Iowa allowed the Trojans just 22 net rushing yards. Golston and senior tackle Cedrick Lattimore earned honorable mention All-Big Ten recognition.

Along with his three seasons at Rutgers, Niemann was the defensive coordinator at Northern Illinois from 2011-15. He coached linebackers at Rutgers and safeties at Northern Illinois and was the co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Hardin-Simmons from 2008-10.

Niemann's 2018 defense at Rutgers ranked 19th in the nation and fourth in the Big Ten in pass defense, allowing opponents 186.7 yards per game. The Scarlet Knights ranked 45th in the nation in pass defense efficiency, with a rating of 123.29, and 46th in the nation in red-zone defense (.814).

Three Rutgers defenders earned postseason honors from the Big Ten. Senior safety Saquan Hampton and senior linebacker Trevor Morris earned honorable mention recognition, and senior cornerback Isaiah Wharton received the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award. Two Scarlet Knights ranked among Big Ten leaders in tackles in 2018. Morris ranked No. 3, averaging 9.1 tackles per game, and senior linebacker Deonte Roberts ranked No. 11, averaging 7.9 tackles.

Niemann's Scarlet Knight defense in 2017 was key in victories over Purdue (14-12), Illinois (35-24) and Maryland (31-24). Rutgers' defense ranked No. 48 in the nation in fewest opponent first downs allowed (243) and No. 55 in fewest passing yards allowed (216.8). In Niemann's first season at Rutgers the Scarlet Knights ranked No. 6 in the nation in red zone defense (.727) and 18th in passing yards allowed per game (186.5).

Niemann's top defensive player at NIU was safety Jimmie Ward, who was selected by San Francisco in the first round of the 2014 NFL Draft. The 30th overall pick, Ward led the Huskies in tackles in each of his final two seasons. In all, Niemann's Huskie defense produced seven players who signed with NFL teams.

In 2015, NIU ranked eighth in the nation in turnovers gained (29) and fourth in interceptions (22). Sophomore cornerback Shawun Lurry led the FBS with nine interceptions and earned multiple All-America honors. The defensive unit posted 26 sacks with 15 different players involved in at least a half sack.

Six NIU defensive players earned All-MAC honors in 2014 as six opponents were held to 17 points or less. In 2012, the NIU defense held five opponents to nine points or less en route to a second straight MAC title and a historic berth in the Orange Bowl at the conclusion of the season. In the 2011 MAC Championship game, the NIU defense shut out Ohio in the second half en route to a 23-20 victory, the school's first MAC football title in 28 years.

NIU won the Mid-American Conference West Division all five seasons (2011-15) Niemann was on the staff, capturing the MAC Championship three times (2011, '12 and '14). The Huskies played in a bowl game each of those five seasons. Northern Illinois won the 2011 GoDaddy Bowl and played in the Orange Bowl following the 2012 season.

During his tenure at Hardin-Simmons, Niemann helped turn a defense that ranked last in the nation prior to his arrival into the No. 2 unit in the American Southwest Conference in 2009. He helped guide Hardin-Simmons to the first round of the 2008 NCAA Division III playoffs.

Niemann served as the head coach at Simpson College from 2002-07. Niemann compiled a 32-29 record in his six seasons (2002-07) as head coach at Simpson. He led the Storm to the 2003 NCAA Division III Playoffs while also serving as defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach. He was named the 2003 Iowa Conference Coach of the Year.

Niemann was on the Northern Iowa coaching staff from 1997-2001. He was defensive coordinator in 1999 and 2000, and coached the secondary (1997, 2001), and linebackers (1998-2000). The Panthers advanced to the semifinals of the 2001 NCAA Football Championship Subdivision playoffs.

Prior to his arrival at UNI, Niemann spent eight seasons at Drake University (1989-96), where he was the defensive coordinator and secondary coach. He was promoted to assistant head coach in 1995. In his final three seasons, the Bulldog defense ranked in the top 10 nationally in scoring defense, pass efficiency defense and total defense.

The Chiefs won the Super Bowl following the 2019 season and returned to the Super Bowl in 2020. Nick completed his senior season as a Hawkeye linebacker in 2020. Nick was selected by the Los Angeles Chargers in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and has been with the Chargers for two seasons.

Linebackers Coach
13th Year at Iowa

Seth Wallace was named linebackers coach at the University of Iowa in January, 2016, and was named assistant defensive coordinator in July, 2017. He served as Iowa's recruiting coordinator in 2014 and 2015, while also coaching cornerbacks and nickelbacks in 2015. Wallace worked with the defensive line in 2014. Wallace previously served as a graduate assistant coach on the Iowa staff for three seasons (2006-08).

Iowa posted an 8-5 record in 2022, concluding the season with a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl and wins in five of its final six games. Iowa's streak of 10 straight bowl invitations is the longest in school history and the Hawkeyes have been in the Top 25 final rankings in four of the last five seasons. Iowa's streak of 10 straight winning seasons ranks 10th best in the nation.

Iowa's defense led the way in 2022, including posting just the second shutout in Iowa's 35 bowl games. The defense led the nation in with seven defensive touchdowns, including two interception return scores in the bowl win. Iowa's defense was in the top 12 in the nation in scoring defense (second), total defense (second), pass efficiency defense (fourth), passing yards per game (sixth), first down defense (10th), third down defense (11th) and rushing defense (12th).

Linebacker Jack Campbell earned unanimous consensus All-America honors, while earning the Butkus Award and the William V. Campbell Trophy. He is the first Hawkeye player to win each of the awards. He was the Nagurski-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and Butkus-Fitzgerald Big Ten Linebacker of the Year. Senior linebacker Seth Benson also earned second-team All-Big Ten honors.

Campbell was selected in the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft, taken by the Detroit Lions as the 18th player selected. Benson signed a free agent contract with Denver immediately following the draft.

The Hawkeyes won 10 games in 2021, winning the Big Ten's West Division title and advancing to the conference championship game. Iowa concluded the season with an appearance in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl and was ranked 23rd in the final national rankings.

Iowa closed the 2021 regular season with four straight victories to earn the West Division title for the second time since 2015. Iowa earned 24 conference wins between 2018-21, matching Iowa's highest four-year conference win total since 2002-05.

Iowa's defense set a school record and led the nation with 25 interceptions in 2021. The defense ranked among national leaders in takeaways (30, third), defensive touchdowns scored (four, seventh), pass efficiency defense (110.5, sixth), turnover margin (0.8, 11th), rushing defense (114.4, 13th), scoring defense (19.2, 13th) and total defense (328.8, 18th).

Campbell led the Hawkeye defense and ranked first in the nation with 143 tackles. Campbell earned first-team All-Big Ten and earned second-team All-America honors from two media outlets. He scored two of Iowa's four defensive touchdowns in 2021, including a fumble return and an interception return. Benson was second on the team with 105 tackles while earning third-team all-conference honors.

Following back-to-back narrow losses to open the 2020 season, Iowa won six straight games, all in Big Ten play, to complete the regular season. The Hawkeyes allowed just seven points in three of the six wins. The winning streak included road wins at Minnesota, Penn State and Illinois, and trophy game victories over Minnesota, Nebraska, and Wisconsin. The Hawkeyes were ranked 15th in the nation in the final CFP rankings and coaches poll, and 16th by the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes were selected to compete in the 2020 Music City Bowl, but that event was canceled.

Iowa's defense in 2020 led the nation in allowing opponents just 4.3 yards per play. The Hawkeyes ranked among the national leaders in several additional categories, including scoring (16.0, 7th), pass efficiency defense (110.1, 9th), rushing defense (107.6, 11th), total defense (313.8, 12th), red zone defense (.727, 12th) and interceptions (11, 19th).

Iowa won 47 games from 2015-19, the highest total in school history over any five-year period, and a total that ranked ninth nationally. Iowa won its final four games in 2019 and ranked 15th in the final Associated Press and coaches polls.

Senior linebacker Nick Niemann led the Hawkeyes in tackles and ranked fourth in the Big Ten in tackles per game (9.6) in 2020. Niemann earned third-team All-Big Ten honors while Benson earned honorable mention recognition. Niemann was selected by the Los Angeles Chargers in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft, while Barrington Wade signed a free agent contract (Baltimore) immediately following the draft.

The Hawkeyes concluded the 2019 campaign with a 10-3 record following a 49-24 win over No. 22 Southern California in the Holiday Bowl. The three losses were all to ranked opponents by a combined 14 points. The Hawkeyes were 4-1 in trophy games for the third straight season.

Iowa completed the 2018 season with a 9-4 mark and a final ranking of 25th in the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes earned a 27-22 Outback Bowl win over No. 18 Mississippi State to close the season with three straight wins. The four losses came by a total of 23 points and all were decided in the final minutes of play. Iowa tied for second in the Big Ten West Division.

The Hawkeyes posted a perfect 12-0 regular season record in 2015, winning the West Division of the Big Ten Conference. Iowa participated in the 2016 Rose Bowl Game and the 2015 Big Ten Championship and ended the season in the top 10 in the final national rankings.

Iowa's most recent bowl game invitations include the 2022 Music City Bowl, 2022 Citrus Bowl, 2020 Music City Bowl, 2019 Holiday Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl, 2017 Outback Bowl, 2016 Rose Bowl Game, 2015 TaxSlayer Bowl and 2014 Outback Bowl. The Hawkeyes have ranked in the final top 10 of both major polls five times in the past 21 seasons.

Iowa has appeared in 12 January bowl games since 2001 and has recorded January bowl wins over Florida (2004 Outback), Louisiana State (2005 Capital One), South Carolina (2009 Outback), Georgia Tech (2010 Orange) and Mississippi State (2019 Outback).

Iowa has won 175 games over the past 21 seasons, including 108 Big Ten games. Along with the 2021 and 2015 division titles, the Hawkeyes earned a share of the Big Ten title in both 2002 and 2004 and tied for second in 2009. Iowa has finished in the Big Ten's first division in 20 of the past 22 years.

The 2019 Hawkeye defense ranked among the top 17 in the nation in scoring defense (5th, 14.0), first downs allowed (9th, 16.6), total defense (12th, 308.2), rushing defense (14th, 112.5), turnover margin (14th, 0.7) and pass efficiency defense (17th, 116.0). Iowa tied for second in the nation in interceptions (20) in 2018 after leading the nation in 2017 with 21. Iowa's 64 thefts over the past four seasons tie for the most in the nation.

Senior linebacker Kristian Welch led the Iowa defense in 2019, recording 87 tackles to lead the team despite missing three full games. Welch earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors. He signed a free agent contract with Baltimore immediately following the 2020 NFL Draft and was with the Ravens throughout the season.

Iowa's linebackers were an inexperienced crew in 2018 but contributed greatly to Iowa's high national ranking in several team categories. Amani Hooker, splitting time between safety and outside linebacker, earned All-America recognition while being named the Tatum-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year. Hooker declared for the NFL following his junior season and was selected in the fourth round of the 2019 NFL Draft by Tennessee.

The Hawkeye defense led the nation with 21 interceptions in 2017, led by defensive back Josh Jackson, who led the nation individually with eight interceptions to match Iowa's single-season record. Jackson and linebacker Josey Jewell each earned unanimous consensus All-America honors. The Hawkeyes ranked 17th in the nation in scoring defense (19.9), allowing less than 20 points per game for the third consecutive season. Iowa matched a school record with four interception return touchdowns.

Jewell led the Big Ten in tackles for the second time in three seasons (he was second as a junior) and ranked fourth in the nation in tackles per game (11.3). He earned unanimous consensus All-America honors and was named the Big Ten Conference linebacker and defensive Player of the Year. Jewell earned the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Jack Lambert Trophy and was a finalist for the Nagurski Trophy.

Jewell became the third Hawkeye selected in the 2018 NFL Draft when he was selected in the fourth round by the Denver Broncos. Ben Niemann, also a three-year starter for the Hawkeyes, was a key defensive contributor for the Kansas City Chiefs for four seasons before signing with Arizona for 2022.

Jewell led the Iowa defense in 2016, ranking second in the conference in tackles while earning second-team All-Big Ten honors for the second consecutive season. The Hawkeyes ranked 13th in the nation in scoring defense and red zone defense, 19th in pass efficiency defense and 23rd in total defense.

Iowa ranked first in the Big Ten and 10th in the nation in pass interceptions in 2015, while also ranking in the top 20 nationally in pass break-ups, turnover margin, turnovers gained, and rushing defense. Seven defensive players earned All-Big Ten recognition.

In 2014, Wallace assisted with an Iowa defense that ranked seventh in the nation in pass defense and 22nd in total defense. Iowa led the Big Ten and ranked second in the nation in fewest penalties and penalty yards. Senior tackles Carl Davis and Louis Trinca-Pasat, along with junior end Drew Ott, were each named second-team All-Big Ten.

Wallace returned to the Iowa staff from Valdosta State University, where he served as defensive coordinator from 2010-13. Wallace coached the Valdosta State defensive line in 2013 and the defensive backs from 2009-2012. He joined the Valdosta State staff after his three-year stint with the Iowa program.

In his 21 seasons coaching on the collegiate level, Wallace has served as both offensive and defensive coordinator, coached defensive backs, defensive line, and wide receivers, along with holding special teams duties in 13 seasons.

Iowa won the Outback Bowl following the 2008 season and also played in the 2006 Alamo Bowl. Valdosta State appeared in the NCAA Division II playoffs in 2010 and won the national title in 2012, while Coe College advanced to the Division III quarterfinals in 2002. He has coached 14 players who have earned All-America recognition and 18 players who have gone on to play professional football.

Wallace helped Valdosta State win the 2012 NCAA Division II national title with a 12-2 overall record. Valdosta State won the 2010 Gulf South Conference title and advanced to the NCAA playoffs. Since 2010, Valdosta State has ranked in the top 25 percent nationally in several defensive categories, including scoring defense, pass efficiency defense, red-zone defense, interceptions and turnovers gained.

In both 2010 and 2011, Valdosta State ranked in the top three in the conference in seven defensive categories. The Valdosta State defense scored seven touchdowns and recorded three safeties. Valdosta State special teams led the league in kickoff coverage in 2010 and ranked second in 2011.

During his previous time on the Iowa coaching staff, Wallace worked with the Iowa defense, primarily the defensive secondary. The Hawkeyes posted a 9-4 record in 2008, including a win over South Carolina in the 2009 Outback Bowl. Iowa ranked fourth in the nation while tying a school record with 23 interceptions in 2008. Iowa led the Big Ten and ranked fifth nationally in pass efficiency defense (98.3) and scoring defense (13.0). Iowa also led the Big Ten in fewest touchdowns allowed, turnovers gained, pass efficiency defense and punt return defense.

Wallace also gained college coaching experience at Lake Forest College (2003-05) in Lake Forest, Illinois, and Coe College (2001-02) in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He was offensive coordinator at Lake Forest in 2004 and 2005 as the team set school records for passing offense and total offense.

Lake Forest posted an 8-2 record in 2004 after a 7-3 mark the previous season. Wallace was defensive secondary coach and special teams coordinator in 2003 as Lake Forest led the conference in scoring defense, pass defense and total defense.

Wallace began his coaching career at Coe College in 2001, serving as wide receivers and tight ends coach, while assisting with special teams for two seasons. Coe posted a 10-2 record in 2002, winning the Iowa Conference title while ranking 14th nationally in Division III. The 10 wins set a school record for single season victories as Coe ranked first in the league in total offense in 2002 and first in passing offense in 2001. The Kohawks ranked first in the league and second in the nation in kickoff returns in 2001 and first and 11th in that category, respectively, the following season.

Wallace attended Grinnell High School in Grinnell, Iowa, and was a four-year letterman (1997-2000) in football at Coe College. He was a team captain and twice earned all-conference honors as a wide receiver at Coe. He led the league in receiving in 2000 and ranks in the top four at Coe in season and career receiving. Wallace led the nation in punt returns in 1997 and is Coe's career leader. He earned all-state honors as a prep and competed in the Iowa Shrine Bowl following his senior season.

Wallace earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Coe College in 2001 and his master's degree in sports management from Iowa in 2008.

Wallace was born Jan. 8, 1979, in Danville, Kentucky. He and his wife, Erica, have a son, Landry, and a daughter, Maci.

Jon Budmayr
Senior Special Assistant To Head Coach
Second Year at Iowa

Jon Budmayr is in his first season as the senior special assistant to the head coach after being an offensive analyst in 2022.

In his first season at Iowa the Hawkeyes posted an 8-5 overall record, including a 21-0 win over Kentucky in the TransPerfect Music City Bowl.

Iowa won five of its final six games of the season, earning a second place finish in the Big Ten's West Division.

Budmayr joined the Iowa staff from Colorado State, where he served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2021.

Budmayr spent six seasons at Wisconsin, including the final three as quarterbacks coach. He also served as a quality control assistant (2016-17) and graduate assistant (2015) with the Badgers. His first year in college coaching was as a graduate assistant at Pittsburgh in 2014.

Under Budmayr's direction, Badger quarterbacks set Wisconsin program records, including a school-record 236 completions by then-junior Jack Coan in 2019. Coan's 2019 season also included the third-most passing yards in a season in Wisconsin history (2,727), and his 69.6 percent completion rate ranked third in school history and was No. 7 nationally that year. Coan's passing efficiency rating of 151.8 is also the third-highest at Wisconsin for a single season.

Budmayr was also integral in the recruitment and development of Graham Mertz, one of the highest rated quarterbacks in Wisconsin history. In his first career start at Illinois in 2020 as a redshirt freshman, Mertz was a stellar 20-of-21 (95.2%) for 248 yards and five touchdowns.

Prior to his promotion to quarterbacks coach at the start of the 2018 season, Budmayr served as a quality control assistant for two seasons and spent 2015 as a graduate assistant with UW's quarterbacks.

In 2017, sophomore Alex Hornibrook threw for 2,644 yards and 25 touchdowns, second-most in Wisconsin history. Four of his TD passes came in the Orange Bowl, earning him MVP honors in the Badgers' 34-24 win over Miami. Sharing the quarterback duties in 2016, senior Bart Houston and Hornibrook combined to give UW a pair of 1,000-yard passers and had the Badgers ranked fourth in the Big Ten in passing efficiency (135.9).

His first season on staff saw Budmayr assisting the second-leading passer in Wisconsin history, Joel Stave, who threw for 2,687 yards as a senior and was named MVP of the Holiday Bowl for leading the Badgers past USC.

Budmayr returned to Wisconsin after spending a year as an offensive graduate assistant at Pittsburgh under head coach Paul Chryst.

Injuries derailed Budmayr's playing career at Wisconsin after the 2010 season, when he lettered for the UW team that posted an 11-2 record and won the Big Ten title. He went on to serve as a student assistant coach for the Badgers in 2012 and 2013.

As a prep, Budmayr quarterbacked Marian Central Catholic to the Illinois Class 5A title game as a sophomore and the state semifinals as a junior before missing his senior season due to injury. A three-year starter, he finished his prep career with 5,172 passing yards and 38 touchdowns.

Budmayr earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from Wisconsin in 2013. He was born Dec. 15, 1990, and is native of Woodstock, Illinois. He and his wife, Kaitlyn, have a daughter, Sienna, and a son, Jack.

19th Year at Iowa

Raimond Braithwaite is in his 19th year as a member of the strength and conditioning staff with the University of Iowa football program. He was named director in March, 2021, after being named interim director in June, 2020. Braithwaite was a member of the Iowa staff from 2002-04 and rejoined the Hawkeye

Braithwaite worked with the football and women's golf teams at Florida State, where his responsibilities included lifting technique instruction, organization of football lifting groups, assisting in the administration of torso development and dynamic warm-up to football lifting groups and assisting in the maintenance of equipment in the weight room facility.

Braithwaite served as an intern at Florida State during the fall of 2001, assisting in the instruction of workout programs for various FSU athletic teams, including football, softball and men's and women's golf.

Braithwaite earned a bachelor's degree in sports science from the University of West Florida in 1999 and earned his master's degree in science in exercise physiology from Florida State University in 2001.

He is a certified member of the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCa).

Kohle Helle is in his seventh year with the Iowa football program. Helle is in his fourth year as assistant strength and conditioning coach. He served as the manager of nutrition and performance analytics for Iowa football in 2019 after joining Iowa's strength and conditioning refueling and analytics staff in August, 2018.

First Year at Iowa

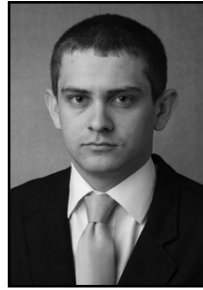
Keller Chryst is in his first year as a football analyst with the University of Iowa football program.

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Following back-to-back narrow losses to open the 2020 season, Iowa won six straight games, all in Big Ten play, to complete the regular season. The Hawkeyes were ranked 15th in the final CFP rankings and coaches poll, and 16th by the Associated Press.

Iowa completed the 2018 season with a 9-4 mark and a final ranking of 25th in the Associated Press. The Hawkeyes earned a 27-22 Outback Bowl win over No. 18 Mississippi State to close the season with three straight wins. The four losses came by a total of 23 points and all were decided in the final minutes of play. Iowa tied for second in the Big Ten West Division.

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Iowa tied for second in the nation in interceptions (20) in 2018 after leading the nation in 2017 with 21. Iowa's 53 thefts over the past three seasons lead the nation. The 2019 Hawkeye defense ranked among the top 17 in the nation in scoring defense (5th, 14.0), first downs allowed (9th, 16.6), total defense (12th, 308.2), rushing defense (14th, 112.5), turnover margin (14th, 0.7) and pass efficiency defense (17th, 116.0).

In 2018, junior defensive back Amani Hooker was named the Tatum-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year, marking the fourth Hawkeye to earn that honor since 2012 (Josh Jackson, 2017, Desmond King, 2015, Micah Hyde, 2012). Hooker earned first-team All-Big honors and second-team All-America recognition and declared for the NFL Draft following his junior season. Defensive end A.J. Epenesa earned first-team All-Big Ten honors and defensive end Anthony Nelson was named to the second team.

The Hawkeye defense led the nation with 21 interceptions in 2017, led by defensive back Josh Jackson, who led the nation individually with eight interceptions to match Iowa's single-season record. Jackson and linebacker Josey Jewell each earned unanimous consensus All-America honors. The Hawkeyes ranked 17th in the country in scoring defense (19.9), allowing less than 20 points per game for the third consecutive season. Iowa matched a school record with four interception return touchdowns.

Jackson, in his first year as a starter, also led the nation in passes defended, ranked second in interception return yards and return touchdowns, and ranked fourth in pass break-ups. He had two interception returns for touchdowns and tied Iowa's single-game record with three interceptions in a 55-24 win over third-ranked Ohio State.

Jewell led the Big Ten in tackles for the second time in three seasons (he was second as a junior) and ranked fourth in the nation in tackles per game (11.3). He earned unanimous consensus All-America honors and was named the Big Ten Conference linebacker and defensive Player of the Year. Jewell earned the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Jack Lambert Trophy and was a finalist for the Nagurski Trophy.

Viilo earned his bachelor's degree in sport and recreation management from Iowa in 2016, with a coaching and sport instruction concentration. He also attended Central Michigan University (2012-15). He earned his master's degree in sports and recreation management in December, 2020.

Viilo was born February 6, 1994. He is a native of Drummond Island, Michigan, and attended DeTour High School in DeTour Village, Michigan. His wife's name is Alyssa.

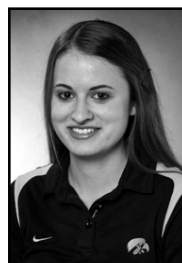

TROPHY COLLECTION

Iowa went 3-2 in trophy games in 2022. The Hawkeyes fell 10-7 to Iowa State in their first trophy game – the team's first loss to the Cyclones since 2014. Iowa reclaimed the Heartland Trophy on Nov. 12, downing Wisconsin, 24-10, in Kinnick Stadium, and defeated Minnesota for the eighth straight time, winning 13-10, to retain the Floyd of Rosedale trophy. Nebraska downed Iowa, 24-17, in the regular season finale to claim the Heroes Trophy for the first time since 2013.

The Hawkeyes closed out the season with a 21-0 win to hoist the TransPerfect Music City Bowl trophy.

Iowa is 28-9 in its last 37 trophy games (includes bowl games and conference championships). The Hawkeyes are 24-8 in their last 32 rivalry trophy games (Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska, Wisconsin).

IN THE RANKINGS

The Hawkeyes finished the season receiving votes in the final AP and AFCA Coaches Polls. Iowa was 33rd in the coaches' poll with nine votes and 34th in the AP poll with four votes.

Prior to 2022, Iowa had been ranked in the AP Top 25 at least once in each of the last seven seasons, the third-longest streak in school history.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,294 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 684-571-39 (.544). That includes a 424-227-16 (.648) record in home games, a 260-344-23 (.433) record in games away from Iowa City, a 353-389-25 (.477) mark in Big Ten games and a 308-192-15 (.613) record in Kinnick Stadium.

FERENTZ AMONG BIG TEN'S BEST

Moon Family Head Football Coach Kirk Ferentz has 115 Big Ten wins as Iowa's head coach, tied for the third most of any coach in Big Ten Conference history. The Hawkeyes defeated Penn State, 41-21, on Nov. 21, 2020, to earn Ferentz' 100th conference win.

Ferentz' 186 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten Conference rank fourth all-time in league history. He is one of five coaches in Big Ten Conference history to win at least 150 games as a member of the Big Ten Conference. The top five include Woody Hayes (202), Amos Alonzo Stagg (199), Bo Schembechler (194), Ferentz (186) and Joe Paterno (162).

Ferentz (186-115) became Iowa's all-time winningest coach on Sept. 1, 2018. The Hawkeyes defeated Northern Illinois, 33-7. It was Ferentz's 144th win as Iowa's head coach, one more than his predecessor, Hayden Fry (143-89-6). Fry coached Iowa for 20 years (1979-98).

Ferentz has 115 Big Ten victories, which are tied with Amos Alonzo Stagg for third place on the league's all-time conference wins list.

Both Ferentz (186, 115) and Fry (143, 96) rank in the top 10 in overall wins and Big Ten wins. Only Iowa and Michigan have two coaches ranked in the top 10 of both win categories (Bo Schembechler 194, 143; and Lloyd Carr 122, 81).

The Hawkeyes have won 10 bowl games under Ferentz, which ties Joe Paterno for the most bowl wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference. Ferentz has a 10-9 career bowl record (20 bowl invites, 2020 Music City Bowl was canceled).

Ferentz is fourth among active coaches with 198 career victories.

Iowa is the only school in the country to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

FERENTZ TOPS IN LONGEVITY

Kirk Ferentz concluded his 24th season as Iowa's head football coach in 2022. He is the longest tenured active head coach in college football. Ferentz was named Iowa head coach on Dec. 2, 1998. Among Big Ten coaches, only Pat Fitzgerald (2006) has been at his current school for 10 seasons or more.

Defensive coordinator Phil Parker has been with Ferentz throughout his tenure, as he is in his 24th season on Iowa's staff, including his 11th as defensive coordinator. He is the longest tenured defensive coordinator in FBS.

CAMPBELL IS THE ACADEMIC HEISMAN

Senior LB Jack Campbell is the recipient of the 2022 William V. Campbell Trophy, while also being member of the National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athlete class. The award is presented to an individual as the absolute best in the nation for their combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.

Campbell is the first Hawkeye football player to earn the honor and he was the seventh Hawkeye to be named a NFF National Scholar-Athlete.

THE NATION'S BEST LINEBACKER

Senior LB Jack Campbell is the first Hawkeye to win the Butkus Award, which is presented annually to the nation's best linebacker. The Cedar Falls, Iowa, native finished the 2022 season with 128 tackles – his second straight 100+ tackle season.

Campbell was also named the Nagurski-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and the Butkus-Fitzgerald Big Ten Linebacker of the Year in 2022. He is the fourth Hawkeye to be named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year, joining Leroy Smith (1991), Josey Jewell (2017) and Daviyon Nixon (2020). Iowa has won two of the last three top defensive honors.

Campbell is the second Hawkeye to take home the Big Ten's top linebacker honors, joining Jewell in 2017.

Campbell was also a semifinalist for the Bednarik and Rotary Lombardi Awards.

Head coach Kirk Ferentz has now coached 11 players to 13 national awards during his Hawkeye tenure.

THE BIG TEN'S BEST TIGHT END IS A MACKEY FINALIST

Senior TE Sam LaPorta was named the Kwalick-Clark Big Ten Tight End of the Year for the 2022 season. The Highland, Illinois, native is the second Hawkeye to earn the distinction, joining T.J. Hockenson in 2018.

LaPorta led the team with 58 receptions for 657 yards and one touchdown in 2022. It was the second straight year LaPorta led the Hawkeyes in catches and receiving yards.

LaPorta was one of three finalists for the John Mackey Award, which is presented to the nation's top tight end, along with Notre Dame's Michael Mayer and Georgia's Brock Bowers.

HAWKEYE ALL-AMERICANS

Five Hawkeyes – LB Jack Campbell, P Tory Taylor, DB Kaevon Merriweather, K Drew Stevens and RB Kaleb Johnson – earned All-America distinction.

Campbell earned unanimous consensus first-team All-America honors by each of the five outlets recognized by the NCAA in consensus balloting (Walter Camp, FWAA, Associated Press, Sporting News, AFCA). The Cedar Falls, Iowa, native is the 13th Iowa player to earn unanimous honors.

Taylor was named first-team All-America by the FWAA, Phil Steele and Pro Football Focus. The Australian averaged 45.4 yards on 82 punts and opponents averaged just 4.4 yards on 21 returns.

Merriweather earned first-team All-America honors by Pro Football Focus, second team by Sporting News and The Associated Press and third-team by Phil Steele. The Michigan native had 47 tackles, three interceptions and scored a defensive touchdown via fumble return at Rutgers.

Stevens was named second-team Freshman All-America by College Football News, while Johnson earned honorable mention honors. Stevens had an Iowa freshman record 16 field goals and a team-best 72 points in 2022, while Johnson had a freshman record 779 rushing yards and six touchdowns, including three 100-yard games.

BIG TEN ALL-CONFERENCE HONOREES

Fifteen University of Iowa football student-athletes garnered All-Big Ten recognition for the 2022 season. Five Hawkeyes – LB Jack Campbell, DB Riley Moss, DB Cooper DeJean, TE Sam LaPorta and P Tory Taylor – earned first-team honors by either the coaches or media.

Campbell was a first-team selection by both the coaches and media, while Moss earned first-team honors by the coaches and DeJean by the media. (Moss was a second-team selection by media; DeJean was second team by coaches.)

LB Seth Benson and DL Lukas Van Ness earned second-team honors on both teams, while DL Joe Evans was a second-team selection by the media and honorable mention by the coaches. Defensive tackles Logan Lee and Noah Shannon and DB Kaevon Merriweather also earned honorable mention honors on both teams.

Offensively, LaPorta earned first-team All-Big Ten honors by both the coaches and media. RB Kaleb Johnson earned honorable mention recognition by the coaches and media and OL Mason Richman was an honorable mention selection by the coaches.

Taylor was a first-team All-Big Ten selection by the media and third team by the coaches, while K Drew Stevens earned second-team honors from the media and was a third teamer by the coaches.

Merriweather was also tabbed as Iowa's Big Ten Sportsmanship Award honoree.

DEJEAN: MUSIC CITY BOWL MVP

DB Cooper DeJean was named the 2022 TransPerfect Music City Bowl Most Valuable Player after recording a 14-yard pick six, making seven tackles (one TFL) and finishing with 42 punt return yards – an Iowa bowl record. DeJean finished with 56 all-purpose yards in the Hawkeyes' 21-0 win over Kentucky.

DeJean's pick six was his third of the season, setting a single season program record. It also tied a career school record with Tom Knight, Desmond King and Riley Moss.

ONE OF THE BEST HAWKEYE D'S

Iowa's defense limited opponents to 270.8 yards and 13.3 points during the 2022 season. The Hawkeyes ranked second nationally in both statistical categories.

The 270.8 yards are the lowest yards allowed by a Hawkeye defense since 1981 (253.6).

The 13.3 points allowed are the fewest for the unit since 2008 (13.0).

LAPORTA BREAKS TIGHT END MARK

Senior TE Sam LaPorta became Iowa's career receptions leader amongst tight ends during Iowa's road game at No. 2 Ohio State when he totaled six catches for 55 yards. The Illinois native moved past the 1,500 career receiving yards mark against Northwestern; he finished his career with 153 receptions for 1,786 yards. He finished his career 14th in program history in receiving yards and second all-time amongst Hawkeye tight ends -- just 39 yards behind Hawkeye All-American Marc Cook.

LaPorta was targeted 16 times at Illinois on Oct. 8 and finished with a career-high nine receptions for 101 yards. He finished with three receptions for 71 yards and one touchdown – his first of the season – in Iowa's road win at Purdue. He had a career-long 58-yard reception on Iowa's first offensive play in the win at Minnesota and had four catches for 95 yards before leaving the game because of injury late in the first quarter. LaPorta missed Iowa's regular season finale against Nebraska because of injury.

LaPorta had two career 100-yard receiving games as he also had seven catches for 122 yards and one touchdown against Kentucky in the Citrus Bowl.

LaPorta led the team and Big Ten tight ends in both receptions and receiving yards in 2022. He was fourth in the nation amongst tight ends in receptions and receiving yards. He is the first tight end to lead the team in both categories in consecutive seasons.

LaPorta had at least one reception in his final 15 straight games and in 24 of his last 25 contests. He was Iowa's top receiver in 10 of 13 games in 2022.

LaPorta led the team in receptions, receiving yards and touchdowns (tied) in 2021 when he had 53 catches for 670 yards and three touchdowns. He led Big Ten tight ends in receptions, yards, yards after catch (299), yards after contact (206) and catches of 15+ yards (18) in 2021.

THE NUMBERS BEHIND THE WINNING STREAK

The Hawkeyes averaged 23.5 points during their four-game winning streak. Offensively, Iowa averaged 300 yards in the four games with the rushing attack averaging 105.8 yards per game.

Iowa put together its two best offensive performances in consecutive weeks, finishing with a season-high 33 points and 398 yards total offense against Northwestern and 376 yards total offense at Purdue.

The team's rushing attack churned out 178 yards against the Wildcats and a season-high 184 yards in West Lafayette.

The 398 yards against Northwestern were the most for the team since gaining 428 yards at Maryland (W, 51-14) in 2021.

Iowa had a season-long 91-yard scoring drive at Purdue, which was capped by Sam LaPorta's first touchdown reception of the season.

The Hawkeyes scored on their first four offensive possessions to start the game (FG, TD, FG, TD) against Northwestern and on seven of their eight offensive possessions. (Iowa scored on nine straight offensive possessions at Maryland in 2021).

KJ2 = RECORD

Freshman RB Kaleb Johnson led the team with 779 rushing yards on 151 carries, which are the most rushing yards by a Hawkeye freshman in program history (passing Tyler Goodson's 638 yards, 2019). Johnson had three 100-yard games and a team-high six touchdowns.

Johnson had his first career 200-yard game (second career 100-yard game), finishing with 200 yards on 22 attempts with one touchdown – his fourth of the season – in the road win at Purdue. The yardage and attempts were both career highs.

The 200 rushing yards were the 18th-most in a single game in program history and the second-most by a Hawkeye freshman all-time (Marcus Coker, 219 vs. Missouri, Insight Bowl). He was the first Hawkeye to rush for 200 yards in a game since 2015.

Johnson tallied his third 100-yard game, rushing for 109 yards on 16 attempts with one touchdown against Nebraska. He had a 44-yard touchdown run in the third quarter, tying his third longest rush of the season. Johnson is the first Hawkeye freshman with three 100+ yard rushing games in a single season.

Johnson had a career-long 75-yard touchdown run on the second play of the third quarter at Purdue. It was Iowa's longest rush since Tyler Goodson's 80-yard touchdown run against Wisconsin in 2020.

Johnson rushed for his first 100-yard game in his third career contest, finishing with 103 yards on seven carries and scoring two touchdowns against Nevada on Sept. 17. The Ohio native had touchdown runs of 40 and 55 yards to become the first Hawkeye in at least the last 20 years to have two rushing touchdowns of 40+ yards in a single game.

Johnson was the first Iowa freshman to eclipse 100 yards since Tyler Goodson (13-116-1 TD) at Nebraska in 2019. Johnson was also the first Iowa freshman with 100+ yards and two touchdowns in a game since Coker in the 2010 Insight Bowl.

Johnson led the team with 1,131 all-purpose yards, averaging 87.0 yards per game. He averaged 25 yards per kickoff return.

TURNOVER FREE

The Hawkeyes posted a 6-1 record during the season when they didn't commit a turnover. The lone loss was the 27-14 home loss to No. 4 Michigan on Oct. 1.

IOWA'S DEFENSE...

- led the nation, allowing 3.99 yards per play -- tied for the best nationally in the last 10 years. It was the Big Ten's best since 2007 and the program's best since 1981. In the last decade only 2016 Alabama and 2017 Alabama held their opponents to less than four yards per play.
- also had the best passing yards per attempt (5.3) and second-best in yards per rush (2.8) in the nation.
- led the nation for the second time in three years in stop rate (drives that end in punts, turnovers or turnover on downs). The Hawkeyes got stops on nearly 79 percent of their drives against FBS offenses.
- gave up just 1.09 points per drive -- tops in the nation.
- surrendered just 24 plays of 20-plus yards and nine of 30-plus yards over 13 games.
- gave up 200 or fewer yards in six games.
- held opponents to 13 or fewer points in 10 of 13 games, nine opponents at 10 or fewer points and four at three or fewer points. It is the first time since 1903 that the defense has allowed 10 or fewer points in nine games.
- held nine opponents under 100 yards rushing. Iowa limited Northwestern to 18 yards on Oct. 29 -- the fewest since holding Northern Iowa to six yards in 2018. They were the sixth-fewest rushing yards allowed in the Kirk Ferentz era and the fewest allowed against a Big Ten foe since limiting Minnesota to seven yards in 2008.
- held 11 opponents below their season scoring average and all 13 opponents below their season total offense average.
- kept Purdue out of the end zone, allowing only a second quarter field goal. It was the first time in 62 games (dating back to 2017) that the Boilermakers didn't score a touchdown.
- led the nation with six defensive touchdowns in 2022. The unit also was second in scoring defense (13.3) and total defense (270.8), fourth in team passing efficiency defense (105.97), 10th in first downs defense (203), 11th in third down conversion defense (.306), 12th in rushing defense (101.3), 14th in interceptions (15), 20th in turnovers (23), 27th in sacks (2.69), 30th in tackles for loss (6.7) and 32nd in red zone defense (.794).

SACK YOU VERY MUCH

Iowa registered a season-high seven sacks against Northwestern, with all seven sacks coming from different Hawkeyes -- DL Lukas Van Ness, DL Deontae Craig, DL Ethan Hurkett, DL Logan Lee, DL Noah Shannon, LB Seth Benson and DL Joe Evans. The seven sacks were the most for the program against a Big Ten team since tallying seven sacks against Northwestern in 2000 (Iowa had seven sacks last season against Kent State).

Iowa also had 10 tackles for loss against Northwestern -- its second game with 10+ TFL this season.

The defense had 14 different players tally a sack during the 2022 season with DL Joe Evans, DL Lukas Van Ness and DL Deontae Craig tying for the team lead with 6.5 sacks apiece.

DYNAMO DREW

True freshman walk-on K Drew Stevens made 16-of-18 field goal attempts during the 2022 season -- the most by a Hawkeye freshman all-time (passing Mike Meyer and Nate Kaeding). The South Carolina native went 7-for-7 from 20-29 yards, 3-for-3 from 30-39 yards, 4-of-6 from 40-49 and 2-for-2 from 50+. Stevens finished tops in the Big Ten and 16th nationally with an .889 field goal percentage and he was sixth in the Big Ten in field goals per game (1.23).

Stevens was one of 20 semifinalists for the Lou Groza National Collegiate Place-Kicker Award.

Stevens made a career-long 54-yard field goal in Iowa's 33-13 win over Northwestern. It was one of a career-high four field goal makes against the Wildcats, which led to him earning Big Ten Freshman of the Week and Groza Stars of the Week honors on Oct. 31. The 54-yarder tied for the seventh-longest in program history and was the longest by a Hawkeye since Marshall Koehn drilled a 57-yarder in 2015.

He made two field goals at Minnesota -- from 38 and 21 yards. The 21-yard field goal was a game-winner with 28 seconds remaining in the game.

Stevens had his string of seven straight makes snapped at Purdue when he missed a 44-yarder in the 20+ mph windy conditions (hit the left upright).

Stevens also drilled a 51-yarder on the road at Rutgers, which was tied for the 11th-longest all-time, and he converted from 49 yards at Ohio State.

He led the team with 72 points via 16 field goals and 24 extra points. Stevens was Iowa's first true freshman kicker since Keith Duncan in 2016.

On the year, Iowa's placekickers made 17-for-21 field goals. Sophomore Aaron Blom made 1-of-3 attempts in the first two games with a make from 46 yards.

Stevens also handled kickoff duties, where he had 31 touchbacks in 55 kickoffs.

TRUE FRESHMAN STARTER

RB Kaleb Johnson became the 32nd freshman of the Kirk Ferentz era to start a game when he was in the starting lineup at No. 2 Ohio State on Oct. 22. Johnson, who started six games, was the sixth Hawkeye running back to start as a freshman under Ferentz, joining Brandon Wegher (2009), Marcus Coker (2010), Jordan Canzeri (2011), Greg Garmon (2012) and Tyler Goodson (2019).

DB Xavier Nwankpa became the 33rd freshman to start when he made his first career start in the Music City Bowl against Kentucky. He was the first true freshman to start on defense since Dane Belton and Jack Campbell in 2019.

FORCING TOs

The Hawkeyes forced two or more turnovers in eight games this season, including three against Iowa State, Rutgers, Illinois and Wisconsin. Iowa had two fourth-quarter turnovers in the road win at Minnesota and two pick six touchdowns in the TransPerfect Music City Bowl victory over Kentucky.

Iowa forced 23 turnovers (eight fumble recoveries, 15 interceptions), and scored 66 points off the miscues during the 2022 season.

NICO REACHES 100

WR Nico Ragaini made his 100th career reception during Iowa's Oct. 8 road game at Illinois. The Connecticut native has 125 career receptions for 1,354 yards with four touchdowns. Ragaini had his first touchdown of the season – a 29-yarder – at Purdue on Nov. 5.

During bowl prep in Nashville, Ragaini announced he would return in 2023 for his sixth season.

LACHEY'S CAREER DAY

Sophomore Luke Lachey filled in as tight end No. 1 in the season finale against Nebraska and he enjoyed a career day. The Ohio native had a career-high seven receptions for 89 yards with one touchdown filling in for the injured Sam LaPorta. It came on the heels of a five catch, 77-yard game in the road win at Minnesota, where he had a key 33-yard reception in the seam to set up Iowa's game-winning field goal.

Lachey had four receptions for 84 yards against Michigan on Oct. 1, which included a 5-yard touchdown catch for his first career score. In consecutive games against Rutgers and Michigan, Lachey had six catches for 121 yards and one touchdown. He had a career-long 37-yard reception against the Scarlet Knights on Sept. 24.

During the Music City Bowl, Lachey had three catches for 36 yards, including a 15-yard touchdown reception for the game's only offensive points.

Lachey finished the season third on the team with 28 receptions for 398 yards and a team-high four receiving touchdowns.

DEFENSIVE SCORING

Iowa's defense extended its pick six streak to 15 consecutive years at Rutgers when sophomore DB Cooper DeJean made an over the shoulder catch and returned the interception 45 yards for his first career touchdown. It was the 30th longest interception return for a touchdown in school history and the 50th all-time.

Iowa led the Big Ten and the nation with six defensive touchdowns (four interceptions, two fumble returns).

Iowa's defense found the end zone a second time in Piscataway when DB Kaevon Merriweather scooped up a Rutgers fumble (forced on a hit by DB Sebastian Castro) and returned it 30 yards for a touchdown. It was the eighth fumble return for a touchdown in school history and the fifth longest in the record books.

The Hawkeye defense scored its third touchdown at No. 2 Ohio State when DL Joe Evans sacked C.J. Stroud to force a fumble, recovered and returned it 11 yards for his first career touchdown. The score gave Iowa a 7-3 lead in Columbus.

Iowa had its second pick six of the season against Wisconsin when DeJean picked off Graham Mertz and returned it 32 yards for the touchdown.

The Hawkeyes had two pick sixes in the first half in the Music City Bowl victory over Kentucky. DB Xavier Nwankpa had a 52-yard interception return for a touchdown in the second quarter for his first career interception and touchdown. It was the second-longest interception return for a touchdown in a bowl game in program history.

DeJean made the score 21-0 against the Wildcats when he had a 14-yard pick six in the second quarter. It was his third pick six of the season, setting a single-season program record.

Iowa's defense scored 40 points in 2022 via six touchdowns and two safeties.

MIGHTY D

The Hawkeyes gave up 59 points (9.8 per game) in the first six games. It was the lowest point total for the program through six games since 1956.

The unit gave up just 20 points in the first four games -- the fewest points allowed for the program in 66 years.

Iowa gave up 185 yards of total offense, including just 68 on the ground, forced two turnovers and shut out Kentucky in the TransPerfect Music City Bowl victory. The Wildcats averaged 22.1 points and 336.3 yards of total offense entering the game.

Iowa held Purdue to season lows in points (3) and total yards (255), 189.6 below its season average (444.6). The unit held Purdue QB Aidan O'Connell to a season-low 168 yards and to a 46.5 completion percentage – his lowest of the season. Purdue was just 2-of-16 on third down.

Iowa held Wisconsin to 10 points and just 51 rushing yards. The 10 points tied a season low and it was just the second time all season the Badgers didn't rush for 100+ yards.

The Hawkeyes gave up 360 total yards and 66 rushing yards to No. 2 Ohio State, an offense that was averaging 543.7 yards and 228.0 rushing yards per game.

Iowa gave up 151 yards of total offense to a Nevada offense that was averaging 336.3 yards per game. It was the second time this season Iowa allowed 151 yards or fewer (120 vs.

- K Aaron Blom connected on 1-of-2 field goal attempts (good from 46, miss from 40) for his first career points.
- Iowa's defense scored four points on two safeties -- Jack Campbell had a 1-yard tackle for loss on Isaiah Davis in the third quarter and Joe Evans' sack accounted for the game's final points on a safety in the fourth quarter.
- The Hawkeyes have three safeties in their last two regular season games -- (Lukas Van Ness sack on an intentional grounding at Nebraska, 11/26/21).
- Iowa's defense allowed 120 total yards, which are the fewest in a season-opening game since 2004 (110 vs. Kent State). The 120 yards are the fewest surrendered by the Hawkeye defense since 2018 against Maryland (115 yards).
- Iowa is the first Big Ten team to win a game without scoring a touchdown since Nebraska in 2018 (beat Michigan State, 9-6). The Hawkeyes' last such win? The 6-4 win at Penn State in 2004.
- Iowa had seven first-time starters in the game: Offense: Logan Jones (OL), Beau Stephens (OL), Alec Wick (WR), Leshun Williams (RB); Defense: Cooper DeJean (DB), Joe Evans (DL), Quinn Schulte (DB).
- Five true freshmen saw the first action of their careers. They include: TJ Hall (DB), Kaleb Johnson (RB), Xavier Nwankpa (DB), Addison Ostrenga (TE) and Drew Stevens (K).
- Iowa is 99-33-2 in season-opening games, including an 20-4 mark under coach Kirk Ferentz.
- Iowa won the toss and elected to receive. The Hawkeyes have played 289 games under head coach Kirk Ferentz. Iowa has opened the game on offense 215 times (137-78). The Hawkeyes have opened the game on defense 74 times (42-32).

GAME NOTES

- The Hawkeyes attempted a game-tying 48-yard field goal as time expired, but the kick hooked left, giving Iowa State its first win in the series since 2015. Iowa had won six straight in the series; Iowa State's last three wins over the Hawkeyes have all come by a field goal.
- DE Lukas Van Ness blocked two Iowa State punts, tying a school record. It is the sixth time a Hawkeye has had multiple blocks in a single game and Van Ness is the fifth Hawkeye to accomplish the feat. Ken Iwebema had two blocks against Syracuse in 2007 and against Illinois in 2005.
- Van Ness tied the school record for blocked punts in a game with two inside Iowa State territory. The only other Hawkeye to block two punts in the same game was Sean Considine at Iowa State in 2003. Van Ness' first block of the game set up Iowa's first touchdown. It was Iowa's first punt block of the season and first since the 2021 regular season finale at Nebraska (Henry Marchese). Van Ness blocked his second punt in the third quarter, giving Iowa possession at the Iowa State 20. The possession ended with an Iowa turnover at the goal line.
- RB Leshun Williams had a 9-yard touchdown run in the first quarter for his first career touchdown.
- DB Cooper DeJean had his first career interception in the second quarter. The interception occurred in the end zone and was downed for a touchback. DeJean had a career high 11 tackles (six solo), one interception and two pass break-ups.
- LB Seth Benson finished with 10 tackles -- second most on the team. It was his seventh career game with 10 or more tackles.
- DB Quinn Schulte (9), DT Logan Lee (8) and DB Terry Roberts (6) each tallied career highs in tackles. DB Riley Moss tied a career high with nine tackles. LB Jack Campbell also had nine tackles, moving his career total to 198.
- TE Sam LaPorta's 2-yard catch in the second quarter was the 100th of his career. He had a career-high eight receptions for 55 yards.
- Iowa scored on its first offensive possession, going 16 yards on two plays following the first blocked punt. It was the first game since last season against Minnesota (10 plays, 39 yards, FG) that the Hawkeyes scored on their first possession of the game.
- Iowa's defense forced three turnovers -- two interceptions, one forced fumble. The defense notched its first turnover of the season in the second quarter with a forced fumble at its own goal line. DB Kaevon Merriweather had his first career forced fumble, jarring the ball loose from ISU RB Jirehl Brock. LB Logan Klemp recovered in the end zone for the touchback.
- Iowa had interceptions on consecutive possessions in the second and third quarters. Cooper DeJean had an interception in the end zone with 57 seconds left in the first half. Terry Roberts intercepted Dekkers at midfield on the first possession of the second half.
- Iowa State had three possessions in the red zone (0, 4, 12) in the first half, but came away with just a field goal.
- Freshman Aaron Graves became the sixth Hawkeye freshman to see action this season.

- WR Arland Bruce IV caught a 21-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter for his second career receiving touchdown (fifth TD overall). Bruce IV had a team-high three catches for 50 yards.
- WR Nico Ragaini and WR Keagan Johnson made their season debuts after missing the first two games because of injury. Ragaini had two catches for 56 yards, including a 46-yarder in the third quarter. Johnson had one catch for seven yards and was targeted five times.
- DB Cooper DeJean intercepted a pass in the first quarter for his second interception in as many games and second of his career.
- LB Jack Campbell had a game high 10 tackles. It is his second game this season and seventh career contest with 10 or more tackles. Campbell surpassed the 200-career tackle mark in the game; he now has 208 tackles, which puts him in 68th in program history.
- DL Lukas Van Ness had a career-high eight tackles and DL John Waggoner had a career-high six tackles. Van Ness also had 2.5 TFL and 1.5 sacks.
- DL Aaron Graves had his first career sack in the third quarter. Graves finished with a career-high four tackles and 1.5 TFL in the game.
- K Drew Stevens went 2-for-2 on field goal attempts in the first two attempts of his career. He made a 43-yard field goal on his first attempt in the second quarter and connected on a 32-yarder in the third quarter.
- The game included three weather delays -- 80-minutes (8:36 p.m. to 9:56 p.m.), 110 minutes (10:05 p.m. to 11:55 p.m.) and 46 minutes (11:57 p.m. to 12:43 a.m.) -- for a total of 3:56. It is the second weather delay in Kinnick Stadium history. Iowa's game against Tennessee Tech was delayed 84 minutes on Sept. 3, 2011.
- Iowa had a season-high 337 yards of total offense, rushing for a season-high 162 yards on 35 attempts, averaging 4.6 yards per carry. Seven different receivers caught a pass in the game and the passing attack had a season-high 175 yards and one touchdown.
- Iowa's defense posted its first shutout since 2019 -- a 20-0 win at Northwestern (10/26/19). It was the Hawkeyes' first shutout in Kinnick Stadium since defeating Rutgers, 30-0, on Sept. 7, 2019.
- The Hawkeye defense limited Nevada to 151 yards of total offense. The Wolfpack entered the game averaging 336.3 yards.
- Iowa improved to 14-7 all-time in night games at Kinnick Stadium.

- DB Cooper DeJean intercepted a pass for a third straight game and returned it 45 yards for his first career touchdown. The 45-yard touchdown return is the 30th longest in school history and it is the 50th pick six in school history.
- Iowa has had at least one interception return for a touchdown in each of the last 15 seasons and 20 of the last 22.
- The last Hawkeye to have an interception in three straight games was Jermari Harris in 2021 (at Nebraska, vs. Michigan, vs. Kentucky).

- Iowa's defense has allowed 23 points in the first four games of the season, the fewest points allowed in the last 66 years. The Hawkeyes gave up 20 points in the first four games in 1956.
- Iowa's defense scored two touchdowns against Rutgers via a Cooper DeJean pick six in the first quarter and a Kaevon Merriweather scoop and score in the second quarter. It is the first time since the 2021 season opener against Indiana that Iowa's defense has scored two touchdowns in the same game (Riley Moss, two INTs for TDs).
- Iowa didn't commit a turnover for a second straight game. The Hawkeyes were +3 in the turnover battle, converting the Rutgers miscues into 14 points. For the season, the Hawkeyes are +2 in turnover margin and they have a 21-10 advantage in points off turnovers.
- Iowa led 7-3 at the end of the first quarter. Rutgers' field goal is the first points allowed in the first quarter this season by the Iowa defense. The Hawkeyes are outscoring their opponents, 31-3, in the opening quarter and 12-0 in the third quarter.

- QB Spencer Petras completed 21-of-30 passes for 220 yards and one touchdown -- his third of the season. Petras also had a 1-yard touchdown run in the first quarter -- his first of the season and ninth of his career.
- TE Sam LaPorta had a team-high five receptions for 53 yards, moving him past the 1,500-yard mark into the top 20 in program history in career receiving yards.
- TE Luke Lachey had a 6-yard touchdown reception late in the second quarter. It was his second career touchdown catch.
- WR Arland Bruce IV had a career-high 27 rushing yards, including a 23-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter.
- LB Jay Higgins had a career-high 11 tackles, including six solo stops (also a career-high). Higgins is the fourth player this season to have 10 or more tackles (Seth Benson, Jack Campbell, Cooper DeJean).
- LB Jack Campbell finished with 11 tackles, his fifth game with 10+ tackles this season (10th of his career). He has had eight or more tackles in all eight games.
- DB Kaevon Merriweather had his second interception of the season (third of his career) on the final play of the first half. It was Iowa's eighth interception this season.
- K Drew Stevens made a career-high four field goals, connecting from 29, 24, 54 and 25 yards. The 54-yarder is tied for the seventh-longest in program history and is the longest by a Hawkeye since 2015 (Marshall Koehn, 57 yards).
- The Hawkeyes scored a season-high 33 points and finished with a season-high 398 yards of total offense. Iowa had a season-high 178 rushing yards and 220 passing yards -- second-most this season. Iowa scored on its opening drive for the third time this season, going 63 yards over nine plays to start the game. K Drew Stevens connected on a 29-yard field goal, giving Iowa a 3-0 lead.
- The Hawkeyes scored on their first four possessions to start the game (FG, TD, FG, TD). It is the first time since the game at Maryland during the 2021 season that Iowa has scored on four straight possessions (Iowa scored on nine straight possessions in College Park). Iowa drove 85 yards on 15 plays before Stevens made a 24-yard field goal to make the score 13-0. The 15-play drive was the longest of the season, while the 85 yards were second-most.
- Iowa did not commit a turnover for the fourth game this season. The Hawkeyes are 3-1 when they don't commit a turnover.
- Iowa's defense allowed 13 points. Iowa registered a season-high seven sacks (Lukas Van Ness, Deontae Craig, Ethan Hurkett, Logan Lee, Noah Shannon, Seth Benson and Joe Evans.) Iowa finished with 10 tackles for loss -- its second game with 10+ TFL (11 vs. Nevada). Craig led the team with 2.0 TFL.

GAME NOTES

- RB Kaleb Johnson had his first career 200-yard game (second career 100-yard game), finishing with 200 yards on 22 attempts with one touchdown – his fourth of the season. The yardage and attempts were both career highs. The 200 rushing yards are the 18th-most in a single game in program history and the second-most by a Hawkeye freshman all-time (Marcus Coker, 219 vs. Missouri, Insight Bowl). Johnson had a career-long 75-yard touchdown run on the second play of the second half. It is Iowa's longest rush since Tyler Goodson's 80-yard touchdown run against Wisconsin in 2020. Johnson also had a career-best two receptions for 17 yards.
- QB Spencer Petras completed 13-of-23 passes for 192 yards and a season-high two touchdowns. It was his sixth career game with two or more touchdown passes.
- TE Sam LaPorta had a 16-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter – his first TD reception of the season and fifth of his career – to give the Hawkeyes a 7-0 lead. LaPorta had 71 yards receiving (on three receptions) during Iowa's nine-play, 91-yard scoring drive.
- WR Nico Ragaini had a 29-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter to give Iowa a 14-0 lead. It was his first touchdown of the season and fifth receiving touchdown of his career.
- DB Kaevon Merriweather had his third interception of the season (and second in as many games) in the second quarter. It was Merriweather's fourth career pick.
- LB Seth Benson had his first interception of the season (second of his career) in the second quarter.
- P Tory Taylor had a career-long 70-yard punt in the fourth quarter. Taylor had eight punts for 414 yards (51.8 avg.) in the game. Three punts were downed inside the 20 and five went 50+ yards.
- Iowa's 91-yard (nine-play) scoring drive spanning the first and second quarters was a season long.
- Iowa had a season-high 184 rushing yards – the most since the regular season finale at Nebraska in 2021.
- The Hawkeyes had their ninth and 10th interceptions of the season in the second quarter. Iowa turned the turnovers into 10 points, giving them a 41-27 advantage in points off turnovers this season.
- Iowa's defense held Purdue to season lows in points (3) and total yards (255), 189.6 below its season average (444.6).
- The Hawkeyes held Purdue QB Aidan O'Connell to a season-low 168 yards passing (20-of-43). He completed 46.5 percent of his attempts – a season low and it was the first time he didn't hit the 50 percent mark this season.
- The Hawkeyes have held seven of their nine opponents to 13 or fewer points, five at 10 or fewer points and three at three or fewer points.
- The Hawkeyes did not commit a turnover for the fifth game this season. Iowa is 4-1 when it doesn't commit a turnover.

- Iowa earned its sixth win of the season to become bowl eligible for the 21st time in the last 22 seasons under head coach Kirk Ferentz. The Hawkeyes have won 13 straight games in November dating back to the 2019 season. Iowa's victory is head coach Kirk Ferentz's 114th career Big Ten victory. Ferentz is one victory shy of tying Amos Alonzo Stagg (115) for third place on the league's all-time conference wins list.
- RB Kaleb Johnson had a team-high 57 rushing yards. It is the fourth game this season he has led the team in rushing.
- QB Spencer Petras had a 1-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter – his second rushing touchdown of the season and 10th of his career.
- TE Sam LaPorta had a team-high five catches for 48 yards. LaPorta has had at least one reception in 13 straight games and in 22 of his last 23 contests.
- DB Cooper DeJean had a 32-yard pick six in the second quarter, giving Iowa a 14-3 lead. It was DeJean's fourth interception of the season and second touchdown (45-yard INT at Rutgers). He also had 10 tackles. DeJean had a career-long 41-yard punt return in the third quarter that set up the team's third touchdown. DeJean had a career-high four returns for 82 yards in the game, and a team-best 114 all-purpose yards.
- DB Riley Moss had his first interception of the season, corralling a Kaevon Merriweather pass breakup on Wisconsin's first drive of the second half.
- LB Jack Campbell finished with 11 tackles, his sixth 10+ tackle game this season and 11th of his career. Campbell now has 100 tackles this season, moving over the century mark for a second straight season. He is the first Hawkeye since Josey Jewell to have 100 or more tackles in consecutive seasons.
- DL Deontae Craig blocked a Wisconsin punt in the second quarter – his first career block – and LB Jay Higgins returned it 3 yards to the UW 17 to set up Iowa's first touchdown. It was the team's third block of the season. Craig tied a career high with five tackles and had a career-high 1.5 sacks.
- DL Joe Evans had a sack and forced fumble in the fourth quarter. It is his second forced fumble (at Ohio State) of the season. Evans has had at least one sack in Iowa's last four games.
- K Drew Stevens made a 44-yard field goal in the fourth quarter – his fifth make from 40 or more yards this season. Stevens is 13-of-15 in field goal attempts – the most makes by a freshman since Mike Meyer's 14 in 2010.
- Iowa scored its fourth defensive touchdown in the second quarter, courtesy of DB Cooper DeJean's 32-yard pick six. The Hawkeyes have scored 28 points via four touchdowns and two safeties.
- Iowa had two interceptions (Cooper DeJean/Riley Moss) for the second straight game and for the third time this season. The Hawkeyes have 12 interceptions this season and have four games with two picks.
- Iowa forced three turnovers (2 INT, 1 Fumble) and blocked a punt, tying a season high for the fourth time.
- The Hawkeyes held Wisconsin to 10 points. The defense has held seven opponents to 10 or fewer points and eight opponents to 13 points or less. It is the first time since 1991 that the defense has held seven opponents under 10 points and eight opponents under 13 points. The 1991 team finished 10-1-1 and played in the Holiday Bowl.

- The win is head coach Kirk Ferentz's 115th career Big Ten Conference victory, tying him with Amos Alonzo Stagg for the third-most in conference history.
- LB Jack Campbell had a fourth-quarter interception following a DB Riley Moss pass break-up and he returned it 30 yards to the Minnesota 45 to set up Iowa's game-winning field goal. The pick is Campbell's second interception of the season and fifth of his career. He had his third career forced fumble, jarring the ball loose from Mohamed Ibrahim in the fourth quarter with the Gophers driving in the red zone. DL Deontae Craig recovered at the Iowa 9-yard line for his first career fumble recovery. Campbell finished with 10 tackles – his seventh 10+ tackle game this season and 12th of his career.
- QB Spencer Petras was 15-of-24 for 221 yards, completing 63 percent of his attempts.
- TE Sam LaPorta had a career-long 58-yard reception on Iowa's first offensive play of the game. LaPorta finished the game with four catches for 95 yards before leaving the game with an injury in the first quarter.
- TE Luke Lachey had a career-high five receptions to finish with 77 yards. His 33-yard reception in the fourth quarter was the second-longest of his career.
- K Drew Stevens made a 38-yard field goal in the first quarter and the go-ahead 21-yard field goal with 28 seconds remaining. Stevens is 15-of-17 in field goal attempts this season. His 15 field goals are the most by a Hawkeye freshman in program history, moving past Mike Meyer and Nate Kaeding.
- The temperature at kickoff was 17 degrees at Huntington Bank Stadium, which is the second coldest temperature in stadium history.
- Iowa forced two or more turnovers for the third straight game. The defense has forced two or more turnovers in seven games this season. Iowa has scored 51 points off 20 opponent turnovers.
- The Hawkeyes limited Minnesota to 87 passing yards. It is the third time this season an opponent's passing attack hasn't reached 100 yards (South Dakota State, Nevada).
- It is the first time since 1929 that the defense has allowed 10 or fewer points in eight games. The 1929 team gave up 28 points the entire eight-game season.
- Iowa has held 10 of its 11 opponents below their season scoring average and all 11 opponents under their season total offense average.
- Neither Iowa or Minnesota committed a penalty; it is the first time since Dec. 6, 1986 (Army vs. Navy) that there was a game that was penalty free. It is the first time the Hawkeyes haven't committed a penalty since 2019 against Mississippi State (Outback Bowl) and it is the first time an opponent has gone penalty free since Wisconsin in 2016.

1889 - Played first intercollegiate game.

1899 - Admitted to Western Conference of Big Ten on Dec. 1. First undefeated season (8-0-1) was recorded under Coach Alden Knipe. Hawkeyes posted shutouts in every game except 5-5 tie with Chicago.

1900 - Second consecutive undefeated season highlighted by five shutouts to open the year. A 5-5 tie at Northwestern was only blemish.

1901 - Loss to Minnesota ended string of 23 games in a row without defeat.

1919 - Lester Belding became Iowa's first consensus All-American.

1921 - First unbeaten and untied team (7-0) won an outright Big Ten title under direction of Coach Howard Jones. Aubrey Devine was the consensus all American quarterback.

Recognized as national champions by at least two research outlets (Parke Davis and Billingsley Report).

1922 - Another perfect season (7-0) included outright conference championship and selection of consensus all American FB Gordon Locke.

Recognized as national champions by Billingsley Report.

1923 - Loss to Illinois ended string of 20 straight victories.

1939 - Dr. Eddie Anderson coached the legendary Ironmen team to 6-1-1 mark. Halfback Nile Kinnick was recipient of the Heisman, Maxwell and Walter Camp Trophies.

1955 - Guard Calvin Jones received the Outland Award and was consensus all American for the second year in a row.

1956 - Won the Big Ten race and appeared in first Rose Bowl for Coach Forest Evashevski. Finished 9-1 in all games and beat Oregon State at Pasadena.

Recognized as national champions by the College Football Researchers Association.

1957 - Consensus all American tackle Alex Karras received the Outland Award.

1958 - Big Ten champions again and defeated California in the Rose Bowl. Recognized as national champions by the Football Writers Association of America and earned Grantland Rice Trophy by Look Magazine. Led the nation in total offense. Consensus all American Randy Duncan was named the Helms Foundation Player of the Year and received Walter Camp Trophy.

1960 - Shared Big Ten title with Minnesota and compiled 8-1 record. Recognized as national champions by four different research outlets (Berryman, Boand System, Litkenhous, Sagarin Ratings).

1963 - Notre Dame game was cancelled following the assassination of President Kennedy.

1964 - Some 28 Iowa and Big Ten offensive records were broken despite 3-6 season.

1968 - Set Big Ten scoring and total offense marks. Ed Podolak rushed for an Iowa record 286 yards (17 attempts) against Northwestern.

1972 - Iowa Stadium was renamed Kinnick Stadium in honor of Iowa's Heisman Trophy winner of 1939. AstroTurf was installed.

1981 - Coach Hayden Fry's third season produced a Big Ten co championship and Rose Bowl berth, earning Iowa's first winning season in 19 years. DE Andre Tippett and P Reggie Roby were consensus all Americans.

1982 - Fourth straight first division Big Ten finish and a 28-22 Peach Bowl win over Tennessee.

1983 - Offense breaks 35 school records on way to 9-3 mark and third straight bowl trip (Gator) under Coach Hayden Fry.

1984 - Played in a postseason bowl game for the fourth straight year, defeating Texas 55-17 in the inaugural Freedom Bowl. Shut out Michigan for the first time since 1929 and won first game in 28 years at Purdue.

1985 - Won a school record 10 games enroute to the Big Ten championship and played in the Rose Bowl (vs. UCLA) for the second time in five seasons. Spent five weeks ranked No. 1 in the nation. QB Chuck Long (winner of the Maxwell Trophy and Davey O'Brien Quarterback Award) and Larry Station were consensus all Americans.

1986 - Champion of the ninth annual Holiday Bowl with a 39-38 triumph over San Diego State. A 9-3 overall mark helped Hayden Fry's Hawkeyes win at least eight games for the sixth consecutive season.

1987 - Ten victories tied the school record and included Holiday Bowl triumph over Wyoming (20-19). Six-game winning streak to end the year earned Iowa its fifth consecutive Top 20 finish.

1988 - Iowa played North Carolina State in the Peach Bowl, the school's eighth straight postseason appearance. A 6-4-3 season set an Iowa record for ties. TE Marv Cook was a consensus all American.

1989 - A natural grass playing surface (PAT) was installed in Kinnick Stadium.

1990 - The capacity of Kinnick Stadium was expanded to 70,220. Iowa earned its third Big Ten title and Rose Bowl berth under Hayden Fry, posting an 8-4 overall record. Iowa's "Road Warriors" earned the trip to Pasadena by defeating Michigan State, Michigan and Illinois, all on the road. Hawkeyes ended season ranked 18th nationally. RB Nick Bell was named Big Ten MVP.

1991 - Iowa tied the school record of 10 wins, posting a 10-1-1 record. The only loss came at the hands of Big Ten champion Michigan as the Hawkeyes were 7-1 in league play. The Hawkeyes made their third appearance in the Holiday Bowl, which ended in a 13-13 tie with BYU. DE Leroy Smith earned consensus All-America status and was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year. Iowa ended the season ranked 10th nationally by both the AP and CNN/USA Today.

1992 - Iowa appeared in its second Kickoff Classic and hosted No. 1 Miami (FL) in first night game ever played in Kinnick Stadium. Iowa's fifth place Big Ten finish was the 13th first-division finish for Iowa in 14 seasons under Hayden Fry.

1993 - Iowa closed the regular season with four straight wins to earn an invitation to the inaugural Alamo Bowl in San Antonio, Texas. Iowa lost to California (37-3) in the bowl game and ended the season with a 6-6 record. Iowa's 21-3 win over Minnesota in the season finale not only assured the bowl invitation, but was also win No. 200 in the coaching career of Hayden Fry.

1994 - Iowa again closed the season fast, earning three wins and a tie in the last four games to post a 5-5-1 mark. The Hawkeyes fought back from injuries at the quarterback position to score 98 points in the final two games, wins over Northwestern and Minnesota. Five Iowa quarterbacks were injured during the year.

1995 - Following the trend of the past few seasons, Iowa closed fast, winning its final two games of the regular season to earn an invitation to the Sun Bowl. Iowa ended the year in fine fashion, racing past Pac-10 co-champion Washington 38-18 in the Sun Bowl and ending the year with an 8-4 record, including a 4-4 Big Ten mark. Iowa was ranked in the top 25 in the final polls by the Associated Press, UPI and CNN/USA Today.

1996 - Iowa posted a 9-3 record, including a 27-0 win over Texas Tech in the Builder's Square Alamo Bowl. The Hawkeyes posted a 6-2 Big Ten record, earning a tie for third place with Penn State. Iowa ended the season ranked 18th in the nation in both the AP poll and the CNN/USA Today Coaches Poll. PR Tim Dwight and DT Jared DeVries earned All-American honors and RB Sedrick Shaw rushed for over 1,000 yards for the third consecutive season.

1997 - If ever the Hawkeyes had a season that could have been, 1997 would be the year. Iowa posted a 7-5 overall record (4-4 in the Big Ten) and participated in the Norwest Sun Bowl, earning its third straight bowl invitation. But narrow road losses at national champion Michigan (28-24), Wisconsin (13-10) and Northwestern (15-14) put a damper on what could have been a great season. RB Tavian Banks, WR Tim Dwight and DT Jared DeVries earned All-American honors and Dwight led the nation in punt returns.

1998 - On Nov. 25, 1998, Hayden Fry announced his retirement as head coach after a successful 20-year career with the Hawkeyes. Fry had a record of 143-89-6 at Iowa and a 232-178-10 mark over his 37 seasons as a college head football coach.

Iowa struggled to a 3-8 record on the field, with five of the eight losses coming to teams ranked in the final top 25. Three Hawkeye losses came at the hands of teams ranked in the top six in the country.

Iowa was led on offense by three freshmen, as QB Kyle McCann led the team in passing, RB Ladell Betts led the team in rushing and WR Kahlil Hill led the team in receiving. Senior DT Jared DeVries earned consensus All-America honors.

1999 - Kirk Ferentz began a new coaching era as Iowa finished the season with a 1-10 record while facing what was regarded as the fourth strongest schedule in the nation. Three of Iowa's losses went down to the final play of the game, with the Hawkeyes allowing a score at Northwestern and failing to score from inside the 10-yardline in home losses to Indiana and Minnesota.

2000 - Iowa opened the season in the Eddie Robinson Classic against Kansas State on Aug. 26, marking the earliest date ever for an Iowa football game. The Hawkeyes, facing the sixth-strongest schedule in the nation, posted a 3-9 overall record. The Hawkeyes won their first overtime game ever, 26-23 at Penn State, in double overtime. A late season 27-17 win over Northwestern forced the Wildcats to share the Big Ten title. Iowa finished strong, winning two of final three games to set the table for the success of 2001 and 2002.

2001 - Iowa opened the season with three straight wins and ended the season winning three of its final four games, including a 19-16 victory over Texas Tech in the Alamo Bowl. The Hawkeyes posted an overall 7-5 record and tied for fourth in the Big Ten with a 4-4 mark. All five of Iowa's setbacks came by less than 10 points. Iowa led the Big Ten in scoring (32.6) as Coach Kirk Ferentz led Iowa to a bowl win in just his third season.

2002 - Iowa posted a perfect 8-0 record in Big Ten play to earn a share of the conference title with Ohio State. After a 3-1 start in non-conference play, the Hawkeyes began league play with a 42-35 overtime win at Penn State and went on to earn the league title in Coach Kirk Ferentz' fourth year. Iowa posted a final mark of 11-2 after a loss to Southern California in the 2003 Orange Bowl in Miami. Iowa earned its first-ever Bowl Championship Series invitation.

Ferentz earned Big Ten and national Coach of the Year honors, while 11 Hawkeyes were named first team all-Big Ten. QB Brad Banks placed second in the voting for the Heisman Trophy and was the Big Ten Conference MVP. Banks was also the Associated Press Player of the Year and earned the Davey O'Brien Award as the top quarterback in the nation. OL Eric Steinbach was the Big Ten Lineman of the year, while TE Dallas Clark earned the John Mackey Award and PK Nate Kaeding earned the Lou Groza award.

Iowa averaged over 37 points a game in leading the Big Ten in scoring for the second straight season, while the Hawkeye defense ranked fifth in the nation against the run.

2003 - For the first time in school history, Iowa won 10 or more games in consecutive seasons after posting a 10-3 mark in 2003, putting an exclamation mark on the season with a 37-17 win over Florida in the 2004 Outback Bowl.

Iowa's 21 wins over the past two seasons are the most ever for Iowa football in a two-year period. The Hawkeyes finished the season ranked eighth in the final polls, the first back-to-back top 10 finishes for Iowa football since the 1950's. Coupled with the 2003 Orange Bowl, Iowa also has played in January bowl games in consecutive seasons for the first time in the history of the program.

The Hawkeyes opened the season with four straight wins in non-conference play. After a loss at Michigan State, Iowa returned home for a 30-27 win over Michigan, handing the Wolverines their only loss in Big Ten play. After a loss at Purdue in early November, Iowa closed the regular season with wins over Minnesota and Wisconsin. The bowl win over Florida gave the Hawkeyes three straight wins over ranked opponents.

Offensive tackle Robert Gallery was named a consensus All-American and became Iowa's third Outland Trophy winner as the nation's top interior lineman. PK Nate Kaeding was also a first team all-American for the second straight season, becoming Iowa's all-time scoring leader while setting 14 school records during his career.

2004 - Winning its last eight games of the season, Iowa posted a 10-2 record, sharing the Big Ten Conference title for the second time in three seasons. The Hawkeyes defeated Wisconsin in Kinnick Stadium on the final day of the regular season to earn the title share with Michigan.

Playing in its third straight January bowl game, Iowa scored a thrilling 30-25 win over defending national champion LSU in the 2005 Capital One Bowl. The Hawkeyes scored the winning touchdown on a 56-yard pass from QB Drew Tate to senior WR Warren Holloway on the final play of the game.

Iowa started the season with a 2-2 mark before making its championship run. The win over Wisconsin increased Iowa's winning streak to 18 straight home games and 13 straight conference games, both school records.

Tate, DE Matt Roth, LB Chad Greenway and LB Abdul Hodge were named first team All-Big Ten, while Coach Kirk Ferentz was named Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year for the second time in three seasons.

2005 - Iowa finished the 2005 season with a 7-5 record and in a third-place tie in the Big Ten standings. A pair of heartbreaking, last minute losses to Michigan and Northwestern is all that separated Iowa from at least a piece of its third league title in four years. The Hawkeyes' success earned them their second Outback Bowl appearance in three years.

Despite a year of triumphs and disappointments, Iowa finished the year as one of only four teams in the nation to have played in January bowl games the last four years.

LB Chad Greenway, DB Jovon Johnson and DE Kenny Iwebema were named All-Big Ten first team, while LB Abdul Hodge, RB Albert Young and PK Kyle Schlicher earned second team accolades.

2006 - Iowa started the season winning five of its first six games and becoming a fixture in the nation's top 20. The second half of the season was just the opposite as injuries took their toll and the Hawkeyes dropped five of their final six regular season contests.

But, Iowa did well enough to get invited to its sixth straight bowl game and came excruciatingly close to an upset of the defending national champion Texas Longhorns in the Alamo Bowl, before succumbing (26-24). The game was played before the biggest sports crowd ever to witness a sporting event in the Alamodome.

OL Mike Jones was named to the coaches first All-Big Ten team. OL Marshal Yanda, LB Mike Klinkenborg, TE Scott Chandler and DB Marcus Paschal were second team choices.

Iowa was the only team in the country to have three players (OL Mike Elgin, DB Adam Shada and LB Mike Klinkenborg) represented on the first Academic All-America team.

2007 - Iowa finished the season with a 6-6 overall record. Iowa finished tied for fifth in the Big Ten with a 4-4 mark. After starting the season with a 2-4 record, Iowa won four of its last six and just missed being selected for a bowl game. The Hawkeyes were bowl eligible for the seventh straight season and finished in the Big Ten's upper division for the sixth time in seven years. Iowa broke the school record for fewest turnovers in a season (13).

DT Mitch King earned first team All-Big Ten laurels by the coaches and second team honors by the media. CB Charles Godfrey was recognized on the second team by the coaches and was an honorable mention honoree by the media.

Iowa's offense won't make any excuses, but... at least 11 players who appeared on the spring, or early fall, two-deep were either off the roster or injured for a significant amount of time. The Iowa offense could have looked much different with some of the following names on the two-deep: WR Andy Brodell, OL Dace Richardson, OL Rob Bruggeman, OL Bryan Bulaga, OL Alex Kanellis, TE Tony Moeaki, WR Colin Sandeman, WR Dominique Douglas, WR Anthony Bowman, WR Trey Stross and RB Shonn Greene.

2008 - Led by a great group of 15 seniors, Iowa won five of its last six games and earned a spot in the prestigious Jan. 1 Outback Bowl against South Carolina, winning 31-10.

The 2008 Hawkeyes finished the season with a 9-4 record and were ranked 20th in both final major polls. The Outback Bowl champions became the fourth Iowa team in the last seven years to win at least nine games. The Hawkeyes also played in a January bowl game for the fifth time in seven years.

Along the way, running back Shonn Greene broke seven school records and three school individual bowl records en route to becoming a consensus all-American and won the Doak Walker Award as the nation's top running back. Greene also was named the Big Ten's Most Valuable Player. On the defensive side, Mitch King also earned All-America honors and was named Big Ten Defensive Lineman of the Year.

The Hawkeyes tied for fourth (5-3 league record) and wound up as the league's only winner in the bowl season. Iowa's four losses came by a combined 12 points.

Iowa ranked in the top 20, nationally, in six statistical categories (5th - Pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and fewest penalty yards; 9th - rushing defense; 12th - total defense; 19th - red zone defense).

2009 - The 2009 Hawkeyes will be remembered as one of the most entertaining, talented and successful teams in Hawkeye history. The 11 wins equal (2002) the program record for victories in a season. The regular season win total of 10 was achieved for only the fourth time. For the first time ever, the Hawkeyes won their first nine games of a season. And, for the sixth time in eight years, Iowa played in a January bowl game. And, more importantly, Iowa won a BCS caliber bowl game for the first time since 1959.

Iowa posted an 11-2 overall record and a 6-2 Big Ten mark, good enough for a second-place tie with Penn State. The Hawkeyes won at least nine games for the fifth time in the last eight years and won 10 games or more for the seventh time in school history.

In addition to Iowa's 24-14 win over ninth-ranked Georgia Tech in the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Hawkeyes posted road wins at Penn State, Wisconsin, Michigan State and Iowa State. An overtime loss at eventual league champion Ohio State was the only road blemish. A seven-point home loss to Northwestern was Iowa's only other setback. The Hawkeyes posted four wins by three points or less for the first time in school history.

Another road block during the 2009 season was an unusually high number of injuries to several starters. The loss of two offensive linemen, tight end, quarterback, running backs, receivers, defensive backs and a linebacker were all part of the scenario Iowa's coaching staff had to deal with. All of the above mentioned positions lost starters for at least part of the season.

The Hawkeyes ranked seventh in both major polls at the conclusion of the season, the highest final ranking for the program since 1960.

Individually, several Hawkeyes reaped the rewards of the successful season. Defensive end Adrian Clayborn was named MVP of the FedEx Orange Bowl. Coach Kirk Ferentz was named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the third time. Offensive tackle Bryan Bulaga was picked as the league's Offensive Lineman of the Year. He joined Dace Richardson (OL), Tony Moeaki (TE), Clayborn (DE), Pat Angerer (LB), Tyler Sash (DB) and Amari Spivey (DB) on the first All-Big Ten team. Six Hawkeyes were selected in the 2010 NFL Draft.

2010 - Iowa concluded the season with a 27-24 win over 12th-ranked Missouri in the Insight Bowl. The Hawkeyes earned their second straight bowl victory over a top-15 opponent and won three consecutive bowl games for the first time in school history.

The Insight Bowl win over the Tigers marked Iowa's fourth 2010 victory over a ranked opponent, the most by an Iowa team since 2003. Iowa played seven ranked opponents in 2010, the most for the Hawkeyes under Kirk Ferentz.

Iowa posted a 7-5 regular season record, including a 4-4 mark in Big Ten Conference play (fourth). The Hawkeyes placed in the first division of the Big Ten for the ninth time in the last 10 years.

Iowa's record came against one of the toughest schedules in the nation. In each of Iowa's five losses, the Hawkeyes were either tied or leading in the fourth quarter. The five losses came by a total of 18 points and the four league losses were by a collective 11 points. Iowa's most impressive wins were a 37-6 win over Michigan State, which shared the Big Ten title while posting an 11-2 overall record, and the Insight Bowl win over Missouri (10-3), which tied for the North Division title in the Big 12 Conference.

Sophomore DB Micah Hyde was named Defensive Player of the Game, as his 72-yard interception return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter provided Iowa's winning margin.

Four Hawkeyes earned first team All-Big Ten honors, including DE Adrian Clayborn, DB Tyler Sash, DB Shaun Prater and WR Derrell Johnson-Koulianos. Clayborn earned consensus All-America honors and was a finalist for both the Rotary Lombardi Award and the Ted Hendricks Award. QB Ricky Stanzi was a finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award. Punter Ryan Donahue was one of three finalists for the Ray Guy Award.

2011 - Iowa completed the season with a 7-6 overall record and a 4-4 mark in Big Ten play. The Hawkeyes were bowl eligible for the 11th straight season, dropping a 31-14 decision to Oklahoma in the 2011 Insight Bowl at Tempe, Arizona.

Iowa posted a 3-1 mark in nonconference action, with the only blemish being a three-overtime loss at Iowa State. The Hawkeyes were 1-3 against ranked opponents. Iowa defeated 13th-ranked Michigan (24-16) and lost to 13th-ranked Michigan State (37-21), both at home. Iowa lost at 22nd-ranked Nebraska (20-7) and to 14th-ranked Oklahoma at the Insight Bowl.

Iowa's offense was led by senior WR Marvin McNutt Jr., and junior QB James Vandenberg. McNutt set single-season (1,315) and career (2,861) records for receiving yards and touchdowns (12 and 28). His 82 receptions tied the single-season record. Vandenberg threw for 3,022 yards and 25 touchdowns, completing 58.7% of his pass attempts. Marcus Coker's rushing total of 1,384 yards ranks fourth best for a single season at Iowa.

Sophomore linebackers James Morris and Christian Kirksey led the Hawkeyes in tackles, each with 110. Senior DT Mike Daniels (13.5-63) and senior DE Broderick Binns (12-58) led the team in tackles for loss. Junior CB Micah Hyde and sophomore safety Tanner Miller each had three interceptions and Hyde matched Binns with eight pass break-ups.

McNutt was named the top receiver in the Big Ten Conference, while McNutt, OL Riley Reiff and DB Shaun Prater earned first team All-Big Ten recognition. For the third straight year, Iowa had six players selected in the annual NFL Draft, including Reiff, who gave the Hawkeyes a first-round selection for the third straight year.

2012 - Iowa posted a 4-8 overall record, including a 2-6 mark in Big Ten play. The Hawkeyes were the only team in the nation to play in six games decided by three points or less during the regular season, posting a 2-4 mark in those games. Iowa had two games decided by a single point (1-1) and won at Michigan State in overtime. In two losses, at home to Central Michigan and Purdue, the visitors scored the winning points on a field goal on the final play.

The Hawkeyes played nine games against teams that were selected for bowl games, in addition to an eight-win Penn State team.

The Hawkeyes started fast in Big Ten play, earning a win over previously undefeated Minnesota (31-13) and the double-overtime win at Michigan State (19-16).

Senior DB Micah Hyde led the Iowa defense by earning the Tatum-Woodson Award as the top defensive back in the Big Ten. Hyde was a first team All-Big Ten selection, while senior center James Ferentz earned second team laurels.

Junior linebackers Anthony Hitchens led the team in tackles (124), while junior linebacker Christian Kirksey was third in tackles (95) had two pass interceptions and four recovered fumbles.

The Iowa offense was led by sophomore running backs Mark Weisman and Damon Bullock, despite the fact that both battled injuries throughout the season. Weisman played in 10 games and rushed for 815 yards and eight scores. QB James Vandenberg passed for 2,249 yards and seven touchdowns.

Hyde was drafted in the fifth round of the NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers.

2013 - Iowa finished the season 8-5 overall and 5-3 in the Big Ten. The Hawkeyes placed second in the Legends Division. Iowa accepted an invitation to play in the 2014 Outback Bowl in Tampa, Florida, dropping a 21-14 decision to No. 14 LSU.

The 2014 Outback Bowl marked Iowa's 11th appearance overall, and seventh January bowl appearance, since 2001. Iowa's 2013 schedule included eight bowl teams, including two teams that competed in BCS bowl games. With the 8-5 final record, Iowa was one of six BCS conference teams to have improved by four victories or more from 2012.

Iowa's five losses were to teams that finished with a combined record of 56-12, for a winning percentage of .824. The Hawkeyes earned four road wins, their highest total since 2009 (4). Iowa won three of four trophy games, winning at Iowa State, Minnesota and Nebraska, while falling to Wisconsin in Iowa City.

Iowa rushed for 2,339 rushing yards, its highest single-season total since 2008 (2,453). Junior Mark Weisman led the ground game with 975 yards and eight touchdowns on 227 attempts. QB Jake Rudock completed 204-346 attempts for 2,383 yards and 18 touchdowns, while junior Kevonte Martin-Manley led the receivers with 40 receptions for 388 yards and five scores.

Three Hawkeye linebackers recorded over 100 tackles (Anthony Hitchens 112, James Morris 107, Christian Kirksey 104). It is the first time in program history three players recorded 100 tackles (tackles became official stat in 1968). Hitchens and junior OT Brandon Scherff were named the Roy J. Carver Most Valuable Players.

Three Hawkeyes were selected in the 2014 NFL Draft, including tight end C.J. Fiedorowicz (Houston, third round), Kirksey (Cleveland, third round) and Hitchens (Dallas, fourth round).

2014 - Iowa posted a 7-6 overall record, including a 4-4 record in Big Ten play. The Hawkeyes were bowl eligible for the 13th time in the last 14 seasons, dropping a 45-28 decision to Tennessee in the 2015 TaxSlayer Bowl in Jacksonville, Florida.

Iowa posted a 3-1 record in nonconference action, defeating UNI, Pittsburgh and Ball State while dropping a 20-17 decision to Iowa State on the final play of the game. In league play, the Hawkeyes lost a two-point decision to West Division champion Wisconsin and an overtime contest to Nebraska.

The Hawkeyes had three road wins, marking the first time in the Ferentz era Iowa has had back-to-back winning seasons on the road. Offensive tackle Brandon Scherff became Iowa's fourth recipient of the Outland Trophy, which goes annually to the top offensive lineman in college football. Scherff was named the Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year in the Big Ten and was a unanimous consensus All-American.

Second team All-Big Ten accolades went to OL Austin Blythe, LB Quinton Alston, DT Carl Davis, and DT Louis Trinca-Pasat and DL Drew Ott. TE Jake Duzey, SS John Lowdermilk, FS Jordan Lomax, DB Desmond King, WR Tevaun Smith and RT Andrew Donnal earned honorable mention.

Three Hawkeyes were selected in the 2015 NFL Draft. OL Brandon Scherff was selected by Washington in the first round, being the fifth player taken in the draft. DL Carl Davis was selected by Baltimore in the third round and OL Andrew Donnal was a fourth-round selection of the St. Louis Rams.

2015 - Iowa opened the season 12-0 for the first time in school history, winning the Big Ten Conference West Division. The 12 wins are a program record, and the 12-game winning streak ranked fourth all-time (20, 1920-23; 14, 1899-00; 13, 2008-09). The Hawkeyes completed the year with a 12-2 record, falling in the Big Ten title game to Michigan State (19-16) and dropping a 45-16 decision to Stanford in the 2016 Rose Bowl.

Iowa finished the season ranked No. 9 in the Associated Press Poll. It was the fifth time since 2002 that Iowa finished the season ranked in the top 10 (7th in 2009, 8th in 2004, 8th in 2003, 8th in 2002) and 13th time in program history.

Head coach Kirk Ferentz was named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the fourth time in his career (2002, 2004, 2009, and 2015). Ferentz was also named Eddie Robinson and Woody Hayes national Coach of the Year and earned the Bobby Dodd Award.

The Hawkeyes were 5-0 in true road games with a pair of wins over ranked opponents (#18 Wisconsin; #20 Northwestern). Iowa was one of only five schools with multiple road wins over ranked opponents.

QB C.J. Beathard became the only quarterback in school history to win his first 13 career starts, and one of only three Power 5 quarterbacks to win each of their first 13 career starts since 2010.

DB Desmond King became the 23rd consensus All-American in school history and the eighth different Hawkeye under Kirk Ferentz to earn consensus All-America distinction. King tied the single-season school record (Lou King, 1981; Nile Kinnick, 1939) with eight interceptions. He also earned the Jim Thorpe Award, which is presented to the top defensive back in the nation.

Jordan Canzeri (256 vs. Illinois), Akrum Wadley (204 at Northwestern), and LeShun Daniels (195 vs. Minnesota) each rushed for at least 195 yards in a single game, making Iowa the first FBS team since LSU in 1997 to have at least three different players rush for 195-plus yards in a single game in the same season.

2016 - Iowa posted an overall 8-5 record, making its fourth straight appearance in a January bowl game. The Hawkeyes finished the regular season with three straight wins, tied for second in the Big Ten Conference West Division and played in a bowl game for the 14th time in the last 16 seasons. The Hawkeyes fell to Florida, 30-3, at the 2017 Outback Bowl. It was Iowa's fifth Outback Bowl appearance and 10th January bowl game under Kirk Ferentz. The Hawkeyes allowed only 11 first downs in the game, tying an Outback Bowl record.

Iowa's stretch run in November included home wins over No. 2 Michigan (14-13) and No. 15 Nebraska (40-10). Earlier in the year the Hawkeyes won trophy games over Iowa State (42-3) and at Minnesota (14-7).

DB Desmond King earned first team All-America distinction for the second straight season to highlight Iowa's individual awards. DT Jaleel Johnson joined King as a first team selection on the All-Big Ten honor squad, while junior linebacker Josey Jewell was a second team honoree for the second consecutive season.

Iowa's offensive line earned the Joe Moore Award, presented to the best offensive line in college football. That group led the way as two Iowa running backs, senior LeShun Daniels, Jr., and junior Akrum Wadley, each rushed for over 1,000 yards.

Jewell led the Hawkeye defense for the second straight year, recording 124 tackles. King and Brandon Snyder each had three interceptions. King is the only Big Ten player in the last 20 years to have 12 or more interceptions and 1,500 or more combined kickoff and return yards. King had 14 career interceptions, tied for fourth most in program history, and 1,962 combined return yards on kickoff and punt returns. The combined punt and kick return yards rank third all-time in school history.

2017 - Iowa posted an 8-5 overall record, concluding the season with a 27-20 win over Boston College in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl. Iowa advanced to postseason play for the 15th time in the last 17 seasons while posting a 4-5 Big Ten record (T-3rd, West Division).

The season highlights included a 55-24 win over No. 3 Ohio State in Kinnick Stadium, and a 56-14 win at Nebraska to close the regular season. With wins over Minnesota and at Iowa State, the Hawkeyes won three of four trophy games. In addition to the win over Ohio State, Iowa lost to No. 4 Penn State on the final play of the game and lost to No. 6 Wisconsin in Madison. Three of Iowa's five losses came by seven points or less, while the Hawkeyes split a pair of overtime contests (won at Iowa State, lost at Northwestern).

LB Josey Jewell and DB Joshua Jackson led the Iowa defense. Both Jewell and Jackson earned unanimous consensus All-America honors. Jewell earned the Lott IMPACT Trophy and was a finalist for the Nagurski Trophy. Jackson was one on three finalists for the Jim Thorpe Award. Jackson led the nation with eight interceptions, while Jewell led the team in tackles and completed his career in fourth place on the career tackle chart.

Jewell was named defensive Player of the Year and Linebacker of the Year in the Big Ten, while Jackson was named the Defensive Back of the Year.

Senior offensive lineman Sean Welsh joined Jackson and Jewell in earning first-team All-Big Ten accolades. DE Anthony Nelson was named first team CoSIDA Academic All-America, while junior DE Parker Hesse earned second team honors.

RB Akrum Wadley led the Hawkeye offense, rushing for over 1,000 yards for the second consecutive season. Wadley was named MVP of the Pinstripe Bowl after collecting 283 all-purpose yards. Wadley ended his career ranked fifth in career rushing and ninth in all-purpose yards.

The Iowa defense allowed just 19.9 points per game and led the nation with 21 pass interceptions. The Hawkeyes had four interception returns for touchdowns.

2018 - Iowa completed the season with a 9-4 overall record, following a 27-22 win over No. 18 Mississippi State in the 2019 Outback Bowl. Iowa finished the season ranked 25th in the final Associated Press Poll. The Hawkeyes tied for second in the Big Ten's West Division with a 5-4 league record.

Kirk Ferentz, who completed his 20th season as Iowa's head coach, became the winningest head football coach in school history with win No. 144 in the season opener versus Northern Illinois. Ferentz notched his 152nd career victory with his eighth bowl win.

Iowa claimed wins in trophy games against Iowa State, Minnesota and Nebraska, along with the Outback Bowl. Three of Iowa's four losses came by six points or less, with Wisconsin and Purdue each taking the lead in the final minute of play.

Tight end T.J. Hockenson led the Hawkeyes in receiving yards and was recognized with the John Mackey Award as the top tight end in the nation. In addition, Hockenson was named to multiple All-America teams and was the Kwalick-Clark Big Ten Tight End of the Year while earning first team honors.

DB Amani Hooker was named the Tatum-Woodson Defensive Back of the Year in the Big Ten, while WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette was recognized as the Rodgers-Dwight Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year.

QB Nate Stanley completed 26 touchdown passes for the second straight season as Iowa averaged 31.2 points per game. Stanley has thrown 52 scoring passes and passed for over 5,300 yards in two seasons.

Defensively, Iowa ranked third in the nation in interceptions (20), after leading the nation in 2017. The Iowa defense also ranked seventh in total defense (293.6), eighth in turnovers gained (27), 11th in scoring defense (17.8) and 12th in rushing defense (109.5).

On special teams Iowa ranked fourth nationally in kickoff returns (27.3) and eighth in KO return defense (16.4).

2019 - Iowa completed the season with a 10-3 overall record, following a 49-24 win over No. 22 Southern California in the 2019 Holiday Bowl, recording the sixth 10-win season since 1999. Iowa won its final four games of the season and finished the season ranked 15th in the final rankings poll. The Hawkeyes were third in the Big Ten's West Division with a 6-3 league record.

Kirk Ferentz completed his 21st season as Iowa's head coach. He has nine bowl wins to tie for second among Big Ten coaches. His 97 Big Ten Conference wins rank fourth in Big Ten Conference history.

Iowa claimed wins in trophy games against Iowa State, Minnesota and Nebraska, along with the Holiday Bowl, its third straight bowl victory.

Iowa's defense ranked in the top 20 in scoring, rushing, passing and total defense. Iowa was fifth in the country in scoring defense (14.0 ppg), 12th in total defense (308.2 ypg), 14th in rushing defense (112.5), and 19th in passing defense (195.7 ypg). Iowa's scoring defense ranked second in the Big Ten to Ohio State (13.7). The Hawkeyes held seven-of-13 opponents to their season-low point total.

Three Iowa players landed on postseason All-America teams. K Keith Duncan was a consensus All-American, the 26th in school history and 11th under Ferentz. OL Tristan Wirfs was named to the FWA and Walter Camp first teams, and the AP and AFCA second teams. DE A.J. Epenesa was an AP, AFCA, and Walter Camp second-team All-American. Duncan was named the Bakken-Anderson Kicker of the Year in the Big Ten Conference, while Wirfs was named Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year in the Big Ten.

QB Nate Stanley started all 13 games in 2019 and all 39 games from 2017-19. Iowa posted a 27-12 record in Stanley's three seasons as starting quarterback. Stanley passed for 2,951 yards with 16 touchdowns in 2019. He ranks second in career passing touchdowns (68), career passing yards (8,302), career completions.

Freshman RB Tyler Goodson started the final four games of the season and became the first true freshman to ever lead the team in single-season rushing yards (638). LB Kristian Welch led the team with 87 tackles despite missing three games due to injury.

2020 - The 2020 season started late and ended early, due to COVID-19. The Hawkeyes did not open the season until Oct. 24 and began by dropping close decisions at Purdue (24-20) and to Northwestern (21-20). From that point the Hawkeyes won their final six games of the year. A final home game with Michigan was canceled due to COVID, as was the 2020 Music City Bowl, where Iowa was scheduled to face Missouri. The Hawkeyes earned 18 bowl invitations over the last 20 seasons.

With Iowa's 41-21 win at Penn State, Kirk Ferentz earned Big Ten win No. 100. Ferentz ranks fourth in Big Ten history in both conference wins and overall wins (168).

Iowa ranked 15th in the nation in the final CFP rankings coaches poll, and 16th in the Associated Press rankings. The current streak of eight straight bowl invitations matches the longest streak in program history.

Iowa won six straight Big Ten games for the fifth time in the last 30 years (2020, 2015, 2008, 2004, 1991). During the win streak Iowa outscored its opponents 214-83.

Iowa was 3-0 in trophy games in 2020, defeating Minnesota, Nebraska, and Wisconsin. Iowa and Iowa State did not play for the Cy-Hawk Trophy due to Iowa playing Big Ten games only.

DT Daviyon Nixon earned first team All-America distinction on all five All-America teams to become the ninth unanimous consensus All-America honoree in school history. He was named Big Ten Defensive Player and Defensive Lineman of the Year. Freshman Tory Taylor was named the Big Ten Punter of the Year and was named Freshman All-America by the FWA.

Those earning first team All-Big Ten honors included Nixon, Taylor, DE Chauncey Golston, center Tyler Linderbaum, OL Alaric Jackson and RB Tyler Goodson. Nixon was a finalist for the Outland Trophy and Nagurski Award, and a semifinalist for the Bednarik Award. Linderbaum was one of three finalists for the Rimington Trophy, Taylor a semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award and Golston was a semifinalist for the Lott IMPACT Trophy.

Senior kicker Keith Duncan completed his career with the best career field goal percentage (.825, 52-63) in program history. His 20 field goals of 40 yards or more are the most by an Iowa kicker, and he ranks fourth in career field goals and sixth in scoring (252).

Iowa extended its streak to 22 straight games without surrendering 25 points, the longest streak in the nation among Power 5 teams. The Hawkeyes ranked No. 1 in the nation in 2020 in defensive yards per play (4.3). Iowa ranked No. 2 in the Big Ten in total defense (313.8) and scoring defense (16.0), No. 3 in rush defense (107.6) and No. 5 in pass defense (206.1). The Hawkeyes ranked third in the Big Ten with 11 interceptions (Indiana 17; Northwestern 14). Iowa has 64 interceptions since 2017, tied for the most by any team in the country. Senior linebacker Nick Niemann led the team with 77 tackles, ranking fourth in the Big Ten.

2021 - Iowa won the Big Ten West Division title for the second time (2015) and put together a 10-win season for the seventh time under Kirk Ferentz (2002, 2003, 2004, 2009, 2015, 2019, 2021). The Hawkeyes posted a 10-4 overall record, completing the season ranked 23rd in both the AP poll and coaches poll. Iowa was ranked in the final AP poll for the fourth straight season, which is the longest streak under Ferentz and the second longest in program history (five straight years from 1983-87).

Iowa had three wins over ranked opponents (vs. #17 Indiana, 34-6; at #9 Iowa State, 27-17; vs. #4 Penn State, 23-20), with all three victories coming in the first half of the season that saw Iowa win its first six games and move as high as No. 2 in the national rankings.

Iowa won its final four regular season games to post a 7-2 league mark before a loss in the Big Ten title game to Michigan. The Hawkeyes participated in the Citrus Bowl, falling in the final minutes of play to Kentucky, 20-17. Iowa has won 19 conference games over the last three seasons, the most successful three-year stretch since winning 20 conference games from 2002-04.

Iowa led the country with a school-record 25 interceptions and tied for third nationally in takeaways (31). Linebacker Jack Campbell led the nation in tackles (143) while defensive backs Riley Moss and Matt Hankins each joined Campbell in earning All-America recognition.

On offense, center Tyler Linderbaum became the 12th Hawkeye to earn unanimous consensus All-America distinction and the 28th Hawkeye to earn consensus All-America status. Linderbaum was also the 2021 Rimington Trophy winner, which is awarded to the nation's premier center in college football, and was also selected as the 2021 Big Ten Conference Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year.

Moss was named the Tatum-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year, while wide receiver and return specialist Charlie Jones was named the Rodgers-Dwight Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year. In addition, kicker Caleb Shudak was named third team All-American by the Associated Press.

RB Tyler Goodson led Iowa's rushing attack for the third straight season, rushing for 1,151 yards and six touchdowns. Tight end Sam LaPorta led Iowa in receptions (53) and receiving yards (670).

2022 - Iowa completed the 2022 season with an overall 8-5 record after defeating Kentucky 21-0 in the TransPerfect Music City Bowl. The Hawkeyes were 5-4 in Big Ten West play, earning a tie for second in the division. Iowa has won eight or more games in eight consecutive seasons (except for the 6-2 record in the COVID-shortened 2020 season). Iowa is one of six teams in the nation to win eight or more games each year during that span (Alabama, Clemson, Georgia, Michigan, Ohio State).

The Hawkeyes finished strong, winning five of their final six games. Of the five losses, three came by three points or less, while two losses were at the hands of highly ranked teams that each advanced to the playoffs at the end of the season. Among the eight wins were trophy games against Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Iowa's defense held nine opponents to 10 or fewer points, a first for the program since 1903. Opponents gained just 270.8 yards total offense and averaged just 13.3 points per game. Nine defensive players earned all-conference honors.

LB Jack Campbell led the defense while earning unanimous consensus All-America laurels. Campbell won the Butkus Award as the top linebacker in the nation, and received the William V. Campbell Trophy, which is recognized as the academic Heisman for college football. He is the 13th Hawkeye to earn unanimous consensus All-America honors and the 29th Hawkeye to earn consensus All-America status.

Campbell was named the Butkus-Fitzgerald Big Ten Linebacker of the Year and the Nagurski-Woodson Defensive Player of the Year. Campbell led Iowa with 128 tackles. In addition, linebacker Sam LaPorta was named the Kwalick-Clark Big Ten Tight End of the Year and was one of three finalists for the John Mackey Award. LaPorta led Iowa receivers with 58 receptions for 657 yards.

Five different Hawkeyes earned All-America distinction. Along with Campbell, safety Kaevon Merriweather on defense and punter Tory Taylor on special teams were recognized. RB Kaleb Johnson and kicker Drew Stevens earned Freshman All-America accolades in their first collegiate season.

HAWKEYES AT NIGHT IN KINNICK STADIUM

Iowa has hosted 21 night games in Kinnick Stadium's history, holding a 14-7 record in those contests. The Hawkeyes have won seven of their last 10 night games in Kinnick Stadium, including winning two games in both 2015 and 2016, and splitting two night games in 2017, 2018 and 2019. Iowa's first ever night game took place at George Washington University on Oct. 28, 1932 (7 p.m.). Below is a list of night games in Kinnick Stadium:

Hawkeyes Set Records in Bowl Games

- Iowa set a team record for points allowed (zero) vs. Kentucky in the 2022 Music City Bowl, while the team punting average of 48.2 yards was also a record (though not an individual record). Iowa's defense also tied the Music City Bowl record with five sacks.
- Iowa WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette tied a bowl record with a 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown vs. Southern California in the 2019 Holiday Bowl. He also set a record for kickoff return average with a 47.3 average (3-142 yards) in the Holiday Bowl.
- Iowa set individual and team marks for kickoff return yards in the 2019 Outback Bowl, as Ihmir Smith-Marsette had 150 yards on five returns.
- Iowa set team records for the Outback Bowl for fewest first downs allowed (11 vs. Florida, 2017), and fewest penalties (0) and fewest penalty yards (0) vs. Mississippi State in 2019.

GAME RECAP

Nate Kaeding kicked a 47-yard field goal with 44 seconds to play in the game and defensive back Bob Sanders intercepted a Texas Tech pass in the endzone on the final play as Iowa defeated the Red Raiders 19-16 in the 2001 Alamo Bowl. The Hawkeyes ended the season with a 7-5 overall record with the bowl victory. The crowd of 65,232 marked the second largest crowd in Alamo Bowl history.

The Hawkeye drove 53 yards in eight plays for the final score of the game, which was the fourth field goal of the day for Kaeding. Texas Tech had tied the score at 16-16 with 2:05 remaining before Iowa's game winning drive. Iowa QB Kyle McCann accounted for most of the yardage in the final scoring drive. He completed three straight passes for 41 totals yards and then scrambled for 16 yards to the Tech 26-yardline to set up Kaeding's game winning kick.

Kaeding tied an Iowa record with the four field goals, which came from 36, 31, 46 and 47 yards. Iowa took an early 10-0 lead in the first half, using a ball control offense to keep the Red Raider passing attack on the sidelines. Tech got on the scoreboard on the final play of the half on a 50-yard field goal and tied the score at 10-10 on its first possession of the third quarter.

An interception by Iowa's Derrick Pickens led to an Iowa field goal for a 13-10 advantage and good field position led to Kaeding's 46-yard effort that put Iowa in front 16-10. Pickens was named the Outstanding Defensive Player of the Game, while RB Aaron Greiving earned that award for offense. Filling in for the injured Ladell Betts, Greiving rushed 25 times for 115 yards, including a one-yard scoring run for Iowa's only touchdown. McCann completed 19-26 passes for 161 yards, with no interceptions.

Along with the interception on the final play of the game, Sanders led the Iowa defense with 11 tackles. Grant Steen added eight stops and Benny Sapp had seven tackles and an interception. Iowa's defense held Texas Tech to just 80 net rushing yards.

GAME RECAP

Southern Cal's big second half lifted the Trojans past Iowa, 38-17 in the 2003 FedEx Orange Bowl. Iowa, which saw its nine-game winning streak come to an end, completed the season with an 11-2 overall record and an eighth place ranking in the final polls.

Hawkeye C. J. Jones opened the game by returning the kickoff an Orange Bowl record 100 yards, giving Iowa an early 7-0 lead. The Trojans quickly answered with a four-play, 79-yard drive that ended with a Justin Fargas four-yard run.

Iowa and USC each added 35-yard field goals before the half. Iowa had an opportunity to take the lead, but a seven-play, 41-yard drive stalled on the USC one-yard line as the half ended and USC blocked an Iowa field goal attempt on the final play.

USC controlled the second half by scoring touchdowns on its first three possessions. USC's defense stifled the Hawkeyes. Heisman Trophy winning QB Carson Palmer led USC by completing 21 of 31 passes for 303 yards and one touchdown. He was named the Orange Bowl MVP. Fargas became only the second Hawkeye opponent to eclipse 100 rushing yards as he gained 122 in 20 attempts. His rushing numbers included a 50-yard scoring scamper that marked the longest run against the Iowa defense all season.

QB Brad Banks completed 15-36 passes for 204 yards and one touchdown. Banks threw 103 consecutive passes without an interception before USC's Jason Leach picked one off in the fourth quarter. Banks also rushed eight times for 36 yards. His 423 rushing yards is an Iowa record for quarterbacks in a season.

WR Maurice Brown and TE Dallas Clark led the Iowa receivers. Brown had six receptions for 63 yards and a touchdown, while Clark tallied four receptions for 97 yards. Brown's 18-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter broke the school record for TD receptions in a season. Jones ran back four kickoffs for 169 yards, which is an Orange Bowl record and an Iowa bowl game record for return yards.

Defensive backs Bob Sanders and Derek Pagel led Iowa's defensive unit recording 13 and 10 tackles, respectively. The Iowa defense sacked Palmer four times, which included DE Matt Roth's team-leading 11th sack in the second quarter.

GAME RECAP

After falling behind 7-0 in the first quarter, Iowa scored 27 unanswered points en route to a 37-17 triumph over No. 17 Florida in the 2004 Outback Bowl. The victory was Iowa's first over the Gators and its first January bowl win since the 1959 Rose Bowl. After allowing an early Florida touchdown, Iowa scored on three of its next four possessions to end the half.

WR Maurice Brown caught a three-yard touchdown pass from QB Nathan Chandler to even the game at 7-7 late in the first quarter. PK Nate Kaeding converted a 47-yard field goal to give Iowa the lead, and the Hawkeyes followed with a Chandler five-yard scoring run. A 32-yard Kaeding field goal gave Iowa a 20-7 halftime lead.

Iowa maintained momentum in the second half after holding Florida to a three-and-out on its first possession. Matt Melloy blocked the Florida punt and also recovered it in the end zone for a touchdown. It marked the first time in Iowa bowl history that a Hawkeye player both blocked and recovered a punt for a touchdown.

The Gators added a field goal on their next possession, but two possessions later Iowa RB Fred Russell, who was named Outback Bowl MVP, scampered 34 yards for a touchdown to give Iowa a commanding 34-10 advantage. Kaeding added a 38-yard field goal to end Iowa's scoring.

Russell finished with 204 all-purpose yards. He carried the ball 21 times for 150 yards and one touchdown and returned three kickoffs for 54 yards. Chandler completed 13-25 passes for 170 yards, one passing touchdown, one rushing score and no interceptions. Brown caught six passes for 96 yards and one score.

Defensively, Iowa held the Gators to an Outback Bowl record-low 57 rushing yards, marking the eighth time in 2003 that the Hawkeyes held their opponents to 75 yards or less on the ground. DB Sean Considine collected a game-high nine tackles (three solo, six assists). LB Abdul Hodge registered eight stops (three solo, five assists). DT Tyler Luebke, DE Matt Roth and DE Howard Hodges each recorded one sack.

GAME RECAP

Fifth-year senior Warren Holloway caught an improbable 56-yard game-winning touchdown pass from QB Drew Tate as time expired to lift Iowa to a thrilling 30-25 triumph over 11th-ranked LSU in the 2005 Capital One Bowl. The 56-yard bomb on the final play was arguably the best finish in bowl history. The reception was Holloway's first career touchdown.

Iowa grabbed an early 7-0 lead when Tate connected with WR Clinton Solomon on a 57-yard score on its first possession. The 57-yarder tied Iowa's longest touchdown reception in a bowl game (Dave Moritz from Chuck Long in the 1982 Peach Bowl). LSU cut the Hawkeye lead to 7-6 on a pair of field goals midway through the second quarter. Iowa extended its lead to 14-6 when Miguel Merrick blocked a punt and Sean Considine returned the ball seven yards for a touchdown. The Tigers answered on their next possession with a 74-yard touchdown run but failed to convert the extra point.

PK Kyle Schlicher scored the only points of the third quarter on a 19-yard field goal to stretch Iowa's lead to 17-12. RB Marques Simmons scored on a four-yard run with 12:48 remaining to give the Hawkeyes a 24-12 advantage. LSU rallied with a pair of touchdown passes to WR Skyler Green (22 and three yards) as the Tigers took their first lead of the game, 25-24, with 46 seconds left.

Tate drove Iowa to the 44-yard line before throwing the pass to Holloway as the final seconds clicked off the clock. The victory gave Iowa its 10th win of the year, marking the third straight season the Hawkeyes have collected 10 wins or more.

Tate was named the Capital One Bowl MVP, while DL Jonathan Babineaux was recognized as Iowa's Defensive MVP. Tate completed 20-32 passes for 287 yards and two touchdowns. The scoring passes of 56 and 57 yards marked the first time an Iowa quarterback has tossed two touchdowns over 50 yards in a bowl game.

WR Ed Hinkel caught a career and game-high 10 passes for 93 yards, one reception shy of an Iowa bowl record. Solomon caught four passes for 81 yards and one score, while Holloway caught four passes for 72 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, Iowa recorded 10 tackles for loss, including five sacks. LB Abdul Hodge racked up a game-high 15 tackles (10 solo), including 2.5 sacks. LB Chad Greenway tallied nine tackles (seven solo), including one for loss. Babineaux registered seven tackles (five solo), including 4.5 for loss and 2.5 sacks. Additionally, the Hawkeyes' special teams blocked two punts, including returning one for a touchdown.

Iowa finished the season ranked eighth for the third consecutive year. The Hawkeyes finished in the top 10 three straight seasons for only the second time ever (1956-58).

Florida scored the game's first 17 points and held off a late Iowa surge to defeat the Hawkeyes 31-24 in the 2006 Outback Bowl. The Gators blocked and returned an Iowa punt for a score on Iowa's first possession to take a 7-0 advantage. Florida then added a 21-yard field goal and returned an interception 60 yards to take a 17-0 lead with 1:57 left in the first half.

Iowa scored its first points on a 20-yard touchdown pass from QB Drew Tate to WR Clinton Solomon. However, the Gators answered the Hawkeye score with a touchdown with one second left in the period to take a 24-7 halftime advantage.

Florida added a 38-yard touchdown pass for the only score of the third quarter, but Iowa rallied to score 17 fourth-quarter points to make for an exciting finish. WR Ed Hinkel caught touchdown passes of four and 14 yards from Tate, while PK Kyle Schlicher converted a 45-yard field goal to cut the Florida lead to 34-21 with 1:24 left. Iowa's comeback fell short as the Hawkeyes failed to recover an onside kick. On the previous play, Iowa recovered the onside kick, only to be flagged for an offside penalty.

Tate completed 32-55 passes for 346 yards and three scores; the 32 pass completions and 55 attempts established Iowa bowl records. Hinkel caught a team-high nine passes for 87 yards and tied an Iowa bowl record with two touchdown receptions. Damian Sims tied an Iowa bowl record with five kickoff returns for 107 yards.

Florida QB Chris Leak completed 25-40 passes for 278 yards and two TDs. Leak's two touchdown passes went to Outback Bowl MVP, WR Dallas Baker, who caught 10 passes for 147 yards.

LB Abdul Hodge amassed an Outback Bowl and Iowa bowl record 19 tackles (14 solo) to lead the Hawkeye defense. DB Antwan Allen and DB Marcus Paschal each added 10 tackles, while LB Chad Greenway recorded nine stops. Allen became the first Iowa player to start in four January bowl games.

Texas outscored Iowa 23-10 in the final three periods en route to a 26-24 Alamo Bowl victory over the Hawkeyes in front of a bowl-record 65,875 fans in the Alamodome. Iowa sprinted out of the gates, scoring touchdowns on its first two possessions. RB Albert Young scored on a one-yard run and WR Andy Brodell caught a 63-yard touchdown pass from QB Drew Tate. The 63-yard pass is the longest TD pass in Iowa bowl history.

After a Texas field goal, Iowa looked to stretch its lead to 21-3 on a nine-yard touchdown reception by TE Scott Chandler, but a flag negated the score. Texas intercepted a Tate pass in the end zone on the very next play. The Longhorns took advantage of Iowa's misfortune and turned the turnover in seven points. Iowa took a 14-10 lead into the half.

The Longhorns scored the next 10 points on a 43-yard field goal and a 72-yard touchdown pass to grab a 20-14 advantage midway through the third period. Iowa quickly answered with a four-play, 68-yard drive that culminated with a 23-yard touchdown reception by Brodell.

Texas responded with a touchdown on the following possession to go up 26-21. Iowa added a PK Kyle Schlicher 38-yard field goal late in the fourth quarter to cut the deficit to 26-24. The Longhorns became the first team to win the Alamo Bowl when trailing at the half.

Tate completed 15-25 passes for 274 yards and two touchdowns. Brodell tied an Iowa bowl record with two touchdown receptions and matched a career high with 159 receiving yards on six receptions. Furthermore, the 159 yards is an Alamo Bowl receiving record, besting Michigan's Amani Toomer's 135 yards set in 1995.

Texas QB Colt McCoy was named the Most Outstanding Offensive Player. McCoy completed 26-40 passes for 308 yards and two scores.

Four Hawkeyes recorded seven tackles or more. DB Miguel Merrick had a team-high eight tackles. DB Charles Godfrey and LB Ed Miles each were credited with seven stops.

GAME RECAP

Iowa forced five South Carolina turnovers and scored the game's first 31 points en route to a convincing 31-10 victory at the 2009 Outback Bowl in Raymond James Stadium. This game marked Iowa's third appearance in six years at the Outback Bowl. Iowa finished the season winning six of its last seven games and pushed its all-time bowl record to 12-10-1.

RB Shonn Greene was named the bowl's Most Valuable Player after rushing for 121 yards and three touchdowns on 29 carries. The 29 attempts, three rushing scores and 18 points are new Iowa bowl records. Greene finished his junior campaign with a school single-season record 20 rushing touchdowns and 1,850 rushing yards. Additionally, he rushed for over 100 yards in all 13 games, also an Iowa single-season record.

QB Ricky Stanzi completed 13-19 passes for 147 yards and a touchdown. He completed a six-yard touchdown to WR Trey Stross on Iowa's opening drive. Iowa's tight ends combined for seven receptions and 92 yards – Brandon Myers had four catches for 49 yards, while Tony Moeaki had three for 43 yards.

Iowa led 21-0 at halftime on two Greene one-yard runs and Stross' six-yard touchdown reception. PK Daniel Murray converted an 18-yard field goal and Greene scored his third touchdown from 11 yards out to stretch Iowa's cushion to 31-0. The Gamecocks scored the final 10 points on a 10-yard pass and a 48-yard field goal.

Defensively, Iowa collected three interceptions, which tied an Iowa bowl record, and recovered two fumbles. Four of the five South Carolina miscues came in the first 30 minutes. SS Tyler Sash tied an Outback Bowl and Iowa bowl record with two thefts. He returned the two interceptions 74 total yards, which is an Iowa bowl record. DB Bradley Fletcher recorded the other interception in the end zone and also forced a fumble. LB A. J. Edds recovered both South Carolina fumbles. LB Pat Angerer had six tackles and a sack and LB Jeremiha Hunter was credited with four tackles, including two for loss, and a pass break-up.

Iowa dominated time of possession, controlling the ball for 35:54, compared to only 24:06 for South Carolina.

GAME RECAP

Iowa turned in another dominating defensive performance in defeating ninth-ranked Georgia Tech, 24-14, in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl. The Hawkeyes won their second straight January bowl game and evened their record at 1-1 in BCS games.

The Iowa defense limited Georgia Tech to 155 yards total offense, including just 12 passing yards. The Yellow Jackets entered the game ranked second in the nation in rushing offense. Georgia Tech was held to just 32 net yards on 20 offensive plays in the first half.

Iowa quarterback Ricky Stanzi, after missing the final two games of the regular season due to injury, completed his first eight pass attempts in leading the Hawkeyes to a 14-0 advantage in the first period. Stanzi connected with TE Tony Moeaki for a 54-yard gain to set up the first score of the game, a four-yard completion to WR Marvin McNutt.

Iowa added a second touchdown on its next possession, as Stanzi connected with WR Colin Sandeman on a 21-yard scoring play. Stanzi completed 17-29 passes for 231 yards and the two scores.

Georgia Tech used a pass interception return for its only points of the first half, leaving Iowa with a 14-7 advantage at the break. The Hawkeyes increased the advantage to 17-7 late in the third period on a 33-yard field goal by Daniel Murray.

After Tech narrowed the margin to 17-14 early in the final period, Iowa again turned to its defense. Senior LB A. J. Edds had an interception and the Iowa defense forced another Tech punt with 4:54 remaining. Freshman RB Brandon Wegher sealed the win with a 32-yard scoring run with 1:56 left to play.

Wegher ended the game with 113 rushing yards on 16 carries. Moeaki had 85 yards on four receptions, Sandeman had four receptions for a career-best 53 yards and Derrell Johnson-Koulianos had four receptions for 63 yards before leaving the game in the second quarter due to injury.

DE Adrian Clayborn had nine solo tackles and was named the Most Valuable Player. Senior LB Pat Angerer added 10 tackles and Clayborn had two QB sacks.

GAME RECAP

Iowa used record setting performances on both offense and defense to earn a 27-24 win over 12th-ranked Missouri in the 2010 Insight Bowl. The win was the third straight bowl victory for the Hawkeyes and the fourth of the season (in eight games) against a nationally-ranked opponent.

Freshman RB Marcus Coker was the key player for the Iowa offense, rushing 33 times for 219 yards and two touchdowns. Both the rushing attempts and yards established Iowa bowl records.

Sophomore DB Micah Hyde scored the winning points with 5:32 remaining in the game on a 72-yard interception return for a touchdown. That set an Iowa bowl record and ranks as the eighth longest return in school history.

Following Hyde's touchdown, Missouri drove to the Iowa 46 on its next possession, but a pass attempt on fourth-and-six was incomplete and Iowa's offense maintained possession for the final 2:15. Iowa ended the game at the one-yard line as time expired.

Iowa won the toss and elected to start the game on offense. Coker gave the Hawkeyes an early 7-0 advantage with a one-yard scoring run to complete the opening drive. Missouri responded with a field goal on its first drive, but Coker added a 62-yard scoring run early in the second period to give Iowa a 14-3 advantage.

The Hawkeyes added a 34-yard Mike Meyer field goal later in the period before Missouri scored on a 10-yard run to cut Iowa's halftime advantage to 17-10. Brett Greenwood's interception in the end zone ended Missouri's final drive just before halftime.

Iowa's only offensive points of the second half came midway through the third period when Meyer added a 21-yard field goal for a 20-10 advantage, capping a 93-yard scoring drive. The Tigers cut the lead to 20-17 later in the third quarter and took their first advantage at 24-20 with under a minute left in the period.

Hyde's interception return, the fourth for the Hawkeyes in 13 games, was the only scoring in the final quarter.

Stanzi complemented Coker's rushing effort by completing 11-21 passes for 200 yards. Colin Sandeman (4-44) and Reisner (3-50) led Iowa's receivers.

The Iowa defense was led by Greenwood, who collected 11 tackles to go with his second quarter interception. DB Shaun Prater added nine tackles and LB James Morris had seven. DL Karl Klug and DL Christian Ballard each collected a QB sack.

Iowa rallied in the second half, closing to within a touchdown with 6:56 remaining, but 14th-ranked Oklahoma controlled the ball over the second half of the final period in recording a 31-14 win at the 2011 Insight Bowl.

Oklahoma built a 21-0 advantage before Iowa got its offense going in the second half. Iowa used a 16-play drive that consumed 7:50, scoring on a 5-yard pass from QB James Vandenberg to TE C. J. Fiedorowicz on the second play of the final quarter.

After holding Oklahoma to three plays on consecutive possessions, the Iowa offense drove 78 yards in 12 plays, cutting the deficit to 21-14 on a 9-yard pass from Vandenberg to RB Jordan Canzeri. Oklahoma was able to drive to the Iowa 21 before adding a field goal with 2:33 remaining for a 24-14 advantage. After Iowa failed on a fourth down attempt, the Sooners added a final touchdown in the closing minute of play.

Oklahoma took a 7-0 lead in the first period, covering five yards in two plays following a pass interception. Oklahoma's only extended offensive drive of the second quarter covered 66 yards in 13 plays as the Sooners led 14-0 at halftime.

Iowa's defense held the Sooners to just 89 yards total offense in the first half. Oklahoma, which entered the game ranked fourth in the nation in total offense, was held to 275 yards total offense, its lowest output of the season.

Vandenberg completed 23-44 passes for 216 yards and two scores, with one interception. Canzeri led Iowa's ground attack with 58 yards on 22 carries and he added six pass receptions for 28 yards and a touchdown. WR Marvin McNutt, Jr. recorded four receptions for 46 yards. He tied Iowa's single-season reception record with 82 catches in 13 games.

The Iowa defense was led by senior LB Tyler Nielsen with eight tackles, while LB Christian Kirksey added seven. Senior DT Mike Daniels recorded three tackles for loss and two QB sacks among his five tackles and senior DE Broderick Binns recorded Iowa's only pass interception.

No. 14 LSU scored 14-first-half points and ultimately held on to defeat Iowa, 21-14, at the 2014 Outback Bowl in Tampa.

The Tigers drove 77 yards on the first possession of the game to grab a 7-0 advantage. It marked the first offensive touchdown allowed in the opening period by Iowa since the season opener against Northern Illinois (Aug. 31).

In the second quarter, LSU capitalized on a Kevonte Martin-Manley fumbled punt at the 39-yard line, scoring seven plays later on a 14-yard rush to take a 14-0 halftime lead.

John Lowdermilk provided a spark in the third quarter, intercepting QB Anthony Jennings and returning his first career theft 71 yards to the 1-yard line. The 71-yard interception return is the 12th-longest in school history. Three plays later RB Mark Weisman scored on a 2-yard rush to cut the deficit to 14-7.

Midway through the fourth quarter, Iowa marched inside the LSU red zone, but a fourth down interception at the LSU 8-yard line thwarted a game-tying scoring drive.

LSU scored its third touchdown on a Jeremy Hill 37-yard rush, his second score of the game, with 1:50 left to play.

Iowa's Jordon Cotton returned the ensuing kickoff a career-long 96 yards to the LSU 4-yard line. The 96-yard kickoff return is the eighth-longest return in school history and longest non-touchdown kickoff return in Iowa annals. Two plays later, QB C.J. Beathard connected with Martin-Manley in the end zone for a 4-yard touchdown for the final score. Iowa was unable to recover the ensuing onside kick.

QB Jake Rudock completed 9-of-22 passes for 102 yards before leaving in the third period due to injury. Beathard completed 4-of-7 passes for 55 yards and a score.

Weisman rushed 18 times for 37 yards, while TE C.J. Fiedorowicz caught a game-high four passes for 46 yards.

Cotton's 42.7 kickoff return average on three attempts broke the Outback Bowl record for kickoff return average.

Iowa's defense did a good job containing Jennings and the LSU offense, collecting seven tackles for loss, including four sacks, and an interception. LB James Morris recorded eight tackles and reached 400 career tackles in his career -- becoming only the sixth Hawkeye to accomplish that feat.

Jordan Canzeri led the Hawkeye ground attack, rushing 12 times for 120 yards -- his second career 100-yard game. His game totals pushed him over the 1,000 yards rushing, becoming the 45th Iowa player to accomplish the feat.

LB Josey Jewell led all players with a career-best 14 tackles and was named Iowa's TaxSlayer Bowl MVP. Jewell, a redshirt freshman, made his fourth career start. LB Quinton Alston (11) and CB Desmond King (10) also reached double-digits in tackles. CB Maurice Fleming (five) and LB Ben Niemann (four) recorded career bests in tackles.

CB Desmond King recorded his second career interception in the third quarter (37-yard return). Iowa's defense has had at least one interception in six straight bowl games.

The Hawkeye defense intercepted the Gators on their first two drives, converting the second interception into three points as a result of a Keith Duncan 36-yard field goal.

Florida evened the score at 3-3 later in the first quarter on an Eddy Pineiro 44-yard field goal.

The Gators scored a touchdown late in the second period to take a 10-3 advantage into halftime. Mark Thompson caught his only pass of the game from QB Austin Appleby and took the reception 85 yards for a touchdown.

Florida added two touchdowns and a pair of field goals in the second half.

Iowa quarterback C.J. Beathard completed 7-of-23 passes for 55 yards and three interceptions. RB Akrum Wadley totaled 136 all-purpose yards, rushing for a game-high 115 yards on 22 attempts and catching a team-best four balls for 21 yards. It marked the fourth game this season that the Hawkeye tailback led the squad in receiving.

Defensively, Josey Jewell had a game-high 10 tackles, including one sack. The Hawkeye linebacker finished the season with 100-plus tackles for the second straight year (124).

DB Desmond King appeared in his 53rd career game and made his 51st career start, both program records. King recorded an interception on Florida's second possession. It was King's 14th career interception, tying Damien Robinson for fourth all-time.

Iowa's second defensive theft came from FS Brandon Snyder. Both Snyder and King finished the 2016 season with three interceptions apiece.

Appleby finished the contest completing 14-of-35 passes for 222 yards, two touchdowns, and two interceptions. RB Jordan Scarlett rushed for a team-best 94 yards on 14 carries.

GAME RECAP

Iowa forced three turnovers and RB Akrum Wadley amassed a career-high 283 all-purpose yards in a 27-20 Iowa victory in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium. The win snapped Iowa's five-game bowl losing streak.

Wadley, who was named Pinstripe Bowl MVP, totaled an Iowa bowl record 171 yards on five kickoff returns. He also totaled 88 rushing yards and 24 yards receiving.

The game was played in frigid temperatures, 23 degrees at kickoff with wind chills in the lower teens, and is the coldest Pinstripe Bowl on record. The Hawkeyes totaled 200 yards of offense, its lowest total in a bowl game win in program history.

Jake Gervase intercepted his third pass of the season on the third play from scrimmage, which resulted in a Miguel Recinos 24-yard field goal for the game's first score.

Boston College RB A.J. Dillon, who rushed a game-high 32 times for 157 yards, scored his only touchdown on a 4-yard run with five seconds left in the first period.

Iowa answered on its next possession with a TE Noah Fant 8-yard scoring reception from QB Nate Stanley. The TD pass was the 26th for Stanley, tying Brad Banks (2002) for second most in a single season in program annals. The score was set up by Wadley's 72-yard kickoff return, a career best.

The Eagles closed the half scoring 10 straight points -- a 39-yard pass play and a 30-yard field goal -- to take a 17-10 advantage into halftime.

Wadley scored his 35th career touchdown, which tied Sedrick Shaw for second most in program history, on a 5-yard rush midway through the third quarter to even the score.

Both teams traded field goals in the fourth quarter before the Iowa defense collected two turnovers in the final five minutes. With the game tied (20-20), DE Anthony Nelson sacked QB Darius Wade and forced a fumble that DE Parker Hesse recovered in Boston College territory. Three plays later, FB Drake Kulick scored his first career rushing touchdown on a 1-yard plunge into the end zone for the eventual game-winning score.

All-American CB Josh Jackson helped seal the win by collecting his eighth interception of the season, tying a school single-season record, on Boston College's next possession. DB Amani Hooker led Iowa's defense with 12 tackles, including two touchdown-saving stops. He was named to the Associated Press All-Bowl teams for his efforts.

WR Matt VandeBerg played in his 54th career game, more than any other player in school history. VandeBerg ended his career having at least one reception in 32 consecutive games played.

GAME RECAP

Iowa posted an impressive 27-22 win over No. 18 Mississippi State at the 2019 Outback Bowl at Raymond James Stadium, its second straight bowl victory. The win was Iowa's first over a nationally-ranked opponent this season and first over a ranked bowl opponent since 2010.

Iowa was able to rally from a 6-0 deficit in the first quarter to upend the Bulldogs, due in large part to scoring 17 points off three turnovers and not committing a penalty. The Hawkeyes won despite totaling minus-15 yards rushing on 20 attempts, a low for an Iowa team in 32 bowl appearances.

WR Nick Easley was voted the game's MVP, catching eight passes for a career-high 104 yards and two touchdowns – the first multi-touchdown game of his career. His totals increased his career numbers to 103 receptions for 1,024 yards.

The Bulldogs got on the board first, kicking a pair of first-quarter field goals. Iowa answered with 17 unanswered points in the second quarter. Miguel Recinos kicked the first (44) of his two field goals, followed by touchdown passes from QB Nate Stanley to Easley (75 yards) and WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette (15 yards). The 75-yard play is an Iowa bowl record for longest completion and longest touchdown reception.

The Bulldogs recaptured the lead early in the third quarter, capitalizing on two Hawkeye turnovers. Mississippi State scored two touchdowns in 18 seconds.

Easley's second TD catch (8 yards) later in the third quarter gave the Hawkeyes a 24-19 advantage, a lead they did not relinquish. Mississippi State and Iowa traded field goals in the fourth quarter.

Iowa's defense stood tall on the Bulldogs' final possession, forcing Mississippi State to turn the ball over on downs at Iowa's 32-yard line.

Stanley completed his first eight pass attempts, finishing the contest with 214 yards passing and three TD's on 21-of-31 attempts. Stanley finished his junior season with 26 TD passes, tying for the second highest single-season total in school history.

TE T.J. Hockenson caught three passes for 43 yards. Smith-Marsette matched his career best with four receptions and set an Outback Bowl record with 150 kickoff return yards.

DT Chauncey Golston and FS Jake Gervase collected Iowa's two interceptions, raising its season total to 20, second most in the country. Golston also recovered a fumble in the second quarter, which set the table for Iowa's second score. Golston's interception was the first of his career, while Gervase's theft in the end zone prevented a Mississippi State scoring threat in the fourth quarter.

DB Matt Hankins led all tacklers with nine, while CB Michael Ojemudia matched his career high with eight stops. DE A.J. Epenesa had a forced fumble on a sack, raising his season total a team-best 10.5, the highest single-season total by a Hawkeye since Adrian Clayborn (11.5 sacks in 2009).

- LB Jack Campbell led Iowa with 14 tackles, tied for fourth most in Citrus Bowl history. Campbell had 143 tackles this season, the fifth-best single-season total in school history. The 143 tackles are the most by a Hawkeye since Pat Angerer had 145 in 2009. Campbell had five double-digit tackle performances (11, 18, 17, 16, 14) this season.
- RB Gavin Williams set career highs with 98 yards rushing on a career-best 16 carries. Williams was Iowa's leading rusher for the second straight game. Williams made his first career start. He is the first Iowa running back to have his first career start come in a bowl game since Jordan Canzeri made his first career start at the 2011 Insight Bowl against Oklahoma.
- TE Sam LaPorta had a career-high 122 receiving yards and matched his career high with seven receptions. He is the first Iowa tight end to have 100 yards receiving since T.J. Hockenson in 2018 (107 vs. Indiana). LaPorta led Iowa this season in receptions (53) and receiving yards (670). He is the first TE to lead Iowa in receptions and receiving yards since T.J. Hockenson in 2018 (49-760).
- K Caleb Shudak connected on his only field goal attempt (28 yards) and connected on both PATs Saturday. Shudak scored five points today, raising his season total to 108 points, the fifth highest single-season total in school history. This season, Shudak was 24-28 on field goal attempts and connected on all 36 PAT attempts. He finished his career 24-29 on field goal attempts, an 82.8 career percentage that ranks No. 1 in school history (minimum 25 attempts). His 85.7 field goal percentage in 2021 is the fourth best single-season percentage in school history (minimum 15 attempts).
- WR Arland Bruce's 20-yard touchdown rush in the third quarter is the longest rush of his career, and his third rushing touchdown this season.
- RB Leshon Williams set career highs with 10 rushes and 42 yards.
- Iowa had a season-high six sacks, including two by DL Zach VanValkenburg, who finished with eight tackles and 2.5 tackles-for-loss.
- DB Jermari Harris had a fourth-quarter interception, his fourth interception of the season. Iowa had one interception to raise its season total to a school-record 25. The Hawkeyes have 89 interception since 2017, more than any team in the country. Eleven different Hawkeyes had at least one interception this season. Four Hawkeyes have at least three interceptions this season (Belton 5, Moss 4, Harris 4, Hankins 3). The last time Iowa had four players with at least three interceptions in a single season was 2018 (Gervase 4, Hooker 4, Stone 4, Ojemudia 3).

- Ferentz is the 19th coach to win 10 or more bowl games in his career.
- DB Cooper DeJean was named the TransPerfect Music City Bowl MVP after tallying seven tackles, one TFL, one pass breakup and returning a 14-yard interception for a pick six. He also made numerous plays on special teams. DeJean's 14-yard pick six in the second quarter gave Iowa a 21-0 lead. It was his third pick six this season. - LB Jack Campbell finished with a game high 10 tackles, including one sack and two TFL. It is Campbell's eighth game with 10 or more stops of the year. He finished the season with 128 tackles, the 23rd-most in a single season in program history. He closes out his career with 305 tackles to rank 19th all-time in the record books.
- P Tory Taylor tied an Iowa bowl record with eight punts for 386 yards (48.3 avg.). Four of his punts pinned the Wildcats inside the 10 and two at the 15.
- QB Joe Labas made his first career start and saw his first collegiate action. He finished the game 14-of-24 for 139 yards and one touchdown – the first of his career. He also rushed four times for 11 yards.
- TE Luke Lachey had a 15-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter to give Iowa a 7-0 lead. It is his fourth touchdown reception of the season (and his career).
- TE Sam LaPorta had a team-best five receptions for 56 yards. He finishes his career with 153 receptions for 1,786 yards, ranking first in school history in career receptions amongst tight ends and second in career receiving yards.
- Iowa posted the first shutout in TransPerfect Music City Bowl history. Iowa is the first Big Ten team to shutout an SEC opponent in a bowl game. It is the team's second shutout of the season (Nevada) – the most by the program since 2019. It is the program's second shutout all-time in a bowl game (1996 Alamo Bowl vs. Texas Tech – 26-0).

The Heisman Trophy, honoring the most outstanding college football player in the United States, is presented by the Downtown Athletic Club of New York each year. Iowa's Nile Kinnick earned the Heisman Trophy in 1939.

Iowa's Nile Kinnick (1939) and Navy's Roger Staubach (1963) are the only veterans to win the Heisman Trophy. As part of its 2008 Memorial Day tribute to veterans, ESPN named Kinnick as one of its top 10 college athletes to serve in the armed forces.

Along with Kinnick earning the award in 1939, Iowa has had a player finish in the Top 10 in the voting on nine other occasions. Most recently, quarterback Brad Banks placed second in the balloting in 2002. Banks became the fourth Iowa player to place second in the voting, joining Alex Karras in 1957, Randy Duncan in 1958 and Chuck Long in 1985.

In 2008, RB Shonn Greene placed sixth in the voting and was the top vote getter among all running backs. Greene's sixth place finish is the highest for an Iowa running back. He was a consensus All-American and received the Doak Walker Award as the top running back in the nation.

"Thank you very, very, kindly, Mr. Holcombe. It seems to me that everyone is letting their superlatives run away with them this evening, but none the less, I want you to know that I'm mighty, mighty, happy to accept this trophy this evening.

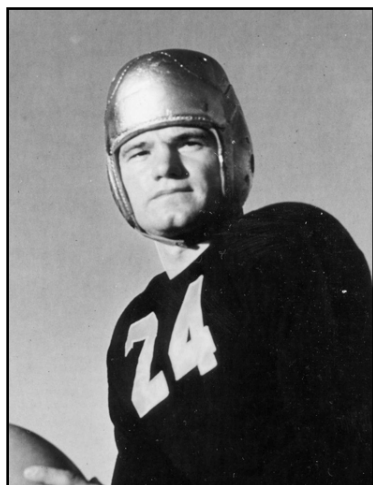
Every football player in these United States dreams about winning that trophy, and of this fine trip to New York. Every player considers that trophy the acme in recognition of this kind. And the fact that I am actually receiving this trophy tonight almost overwhelms me, and I know that all of those boys who have gone before me must have felt somewhat the same way.

From my own personal viewpoint, I consider my winning this award as indirectly, a great tribute to the new coaching staff at the University of Iowa, headed by Dr. Eddie Anderson, and to my teammates sitting back in Iowa City. A finer man and a better coach never hit these United States, and a more courageous bunch of boys, never graced the gridirons of the Midwest, than that Iowa team in 1939. I wish that they might all be with me tonight to receive this trophy. They certainly deserve it.

I want to take this grand opportunity to thank collectively, all the sportswriters and all the sportscasters, and all those who have seen fit, have seen their way clear to cast a ballot in my favor for this trophy. And I also want to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Prince and his committee, the Heisman award committee, and all those connected with the Downtown Athletic Club for this trophy, and for the fine time that they're showing me. And not only for that, but for making this fine and worthy trophy available to the football players of this country.

Finally, if you will permit me, I'd like to make a comment which in my mind, is indicative, perhaps, of the greater significance of football, and sports emphasis in general in this country, and that is, I thank God I was warring on the gridirons of the Midwest, and not on the battlefields of Europe. I can speak confidently and positively that the players of this country, would much more, much rather struggle and fight to win the Heisman award, than the Croix de Guerre.

No single player or team captured the imagination of Hawkeye fans more than Nile Kinnick and his legendary Ironmen team

of 1939. Kinnick, a stalwart on the playing field and in the classroom, was THE model Iowa football player.

As a student, Kinnick was senior class president. He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the national scholastic honor society.

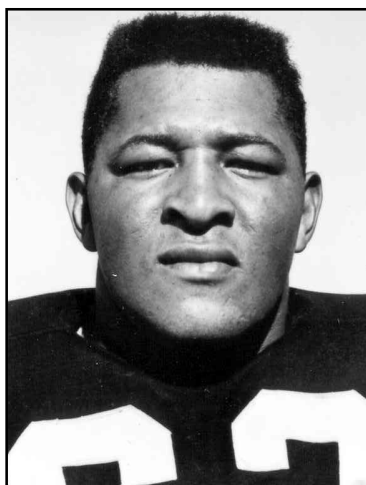
Maintaining a 3.4 GPA while participating in two sports, Kinnick earned a degree from the College of Commerce in 1940. He enrolled in the Iowa Law College.

As a player, his achievements are unmatched in Hawkeye history. He culminated a brilliant career in 1939 by winning the Heisman, Walter Camp and Maxwell Trophies as the nation's top player.

He made virtually every All-America team and was the Big Ten MVP. Nile is a member of Iowa's all time football team and was named its Most Outstanding Player.

Kinnick was the spirit of Coach Eddie Anderson's Ironmen unit of '39. The Hawkeyes' 6 1 1 mark included a 7 6 upset of Notre Dame when Kinnick scored every point. He also punted 16 times for 731 yards, both Iowa records, versus the Fighting Irish.

Kinnick died in the Caribbean sea in a crash of his fighter plane while on a training flight June 2, 1943, as an ensign in the United States Navy.

Jersey No. 62 was never worn more proudly than the three seasons Cal Jones donned it at Iowa.

One of the most intimidating linemen to wear the old gold and black, Jones was a three-time first team All-Big Ten guard. He made 22 All-America teams during his career, including a record 15 in 1954.

As team captain in 1955, Jones earned the prestigious Outland Trophy, given to the nation's top interior lineman. He was a consensus All American twice, one of only two at Iowa. Cal is an elected member of the National Football Foundation and Helms Athletic Foundation Halls of Fame.

Jones was inducted into the inaugural class of Iowa Varsity Club Hall of Fame. He was also chosen to the Iowa all time football team in 1989.

A physical education major at Iowa, Jones earned a 3.0 grade point average. He earned praise from Coach Forest Evashevski, who called him "the greatest lineman I ever coached."

The two-way guard was part of the "Steubenville Trio" (along with Frank Gilliam and Eddie Vincent) to come to Iowa from Steubenville, Ohio in the mid 1950s.

Jones died as a result of a plane crash in Canada on Dec. 9, 1956.

Throughout the years, a number of Iowa football players have been honored by winning national awards for their outstanding play on the football field.

Under Kirk Ferentz, 11 Hawkeyes have combined to win 13 individual national awards, recognizing those players as the best at their position. In addition, Iowa's offensive line was recognized with the 2016 Joe Moore Award, an annual award presented to the best offensive line in college football.

In 2022, senior linebacker Jack Campbell became the first Hawkeye to earn the Butkus Award, presented annually to the best linebacker in the nation. Campbell earned unanimous consensus All-America honors, along with being named the Nagurski-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and the Butkus-Fitzgerald Big Ten Linebacker of the Year.

Along with the Butkus Award, Campbell was recognized by the National Football Foundation with the William V. Campbell Trophy, which is considered the academic Heisman Trophy. Campbell was named a National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athlete, earning a \$25,000 post-graduate scholarship as Iowa's first recipient of the Campbell Trophy.

Senior tight end Sam LaPorta was named the Kwalick-Clark Tight End of the Year in the Big Ten and was one of three finalists for the John Mackey Award.

In 2021, junior center Tyler Linderbaum became the first Hawkeye to earn the Rimington Trophy, presented annually to the best center in the nation. Linderbaum earned unanimous consensus All-America honors and was the Rimington-Pace Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year. Linderbaum was also one of three finalists for the Outland Trophy and one of four finalists for the Rotary Lombardi Award.

Junior defensive tackle Daviyon Nixon earned unanimous consensus All-America honors in 2020. He was a finalist for the Outland Trophy and Bronko Nagurski Award. He was also a semifinalist for the Chuck Bednarik Award. In addition, Linderbaum was one of three finalists for the Rimington Trophy. Nixon was named defensive lineman and overall defensive Player of the Year in the Big Ten Conference, while Taylor was the Big Ten Punter of the Year.

Junior kicker Keith Duncan was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award in 2019. Duncan earned consensus first-team All-America honors after leading the nation with 29 field goals. Duncan was also named the Bakken-Andersen Kicker of the Year in the Big Ten Conference, while junior offensive lineman Tristan Wirfs was named the Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year.

Tight end T.J. Hockenson earned the John Mackey Awards in 2018, named in honor of John Mackey and symbolic of the best tight end in the nation. He was also awarded the Ozzie Newsome Award, presented by the Touchdown Club of Columbus, and was named Kwalick-Clark Big Ten Tight End of the Year.

Linebacker Josey Jewell earned the Lott IMPACT Trophy in 2017, named in honor of Ronnie Lott. Desmond King earned the Jim Thorpe Award in 2015 as the best defensive back in the nation, while Josh Jackson was one of three finalists for the Thorpe Award in 2017.

Both Jewell and Jackson earned unanimous consensus All-America honors in 2017. Jackson tied Iowa's single-season record with eight interceptions, while Jewell ranks fourth in career tackles (436). Jewell was named Nagurski-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and the Butkus-Fitzgerald Linebacker of the Year, while Jackson earned the Big Ten's Tatum-Woodson Defensive Back of the Year award.

King earned unanimous consensus All-America honors as a junior and was named the Tatum-Woodson Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year in addition to winning the Thorpe Award. King also won the Jack Tatum Award, presented by the Touchdown Club of Columbus. King repeated as a first team All-American in 2016 and was a semifinalist for the Thorpe Award, the Bednarik Award and the Lott IMPACT Trophy.

In 2014, senior offensive left tackle Brandon Scherff was the recipient of the Outland Trophy, emblematic of the best offensive lineman in the nation. Scherff is the fourth Iowa football player to earn the award, and the second under coach Kirk Ferentz. The native of Denison, Iowa, also earned unanimous consensus All-America recognition and was named the Rimington-Pace Offensive Lineman of the Year in the Big Ten Conference.

Jewell was one of five finalists for the Butkus Award in 2016 as a junior, after leading the team in tackles for the second straight season. Senior center Austin Blythe was one of three finalists for the 2015 Rimington Award, presented annually to the top center in the nation.

In 2013, senior Linebacker James Morris gathered several honors for his play on the field and his performance in the classroom. On the field, Morris was second team All-Big Ten and fourth team All-America (Phil Steele). He was a finalist for the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Wuerffel Trophy.

In the classroom, Morris was a Capital One first-team Academic All-American. He was named a National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athlete, earning an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship. Morris also earned an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship and earned the Big Ten Conference Sportsmanship Award.

Following the 2010 season, several Hawkeyes were candidates for national awards. DE Adrian Clayborn, who earned consensus All-America recognition, was a finalist for the Rotary Lombardi Award and the Ted Hendricks Award. QB Ricky Stanzi was a finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award and the Premier Player of College Football Award, while punter Ryan Donahue was one of three finalists for the Ray Guy Award.

While posting an 11-2 overall record in 2009 and earning a victory in the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Hawkeyes gathered several postseason awards and honors. Bryan Bulaga was named the Offensive Lineman of the Year in the Big Ten and Clayborn was named national Defensive Performer of the Year by the College Football Performance Awards. Bulaga and Clayborn joined five teammates in earning first-team All-Big Ten honors.

In 2008, running back Shonn Greene earned consensus All-America honors and was named the recipient of the Doak Walker Award, which goes annually to the top running back in the nation. Greene established an Iowa single season rushing record and was the only running back in the nation to gain over 100 yards in every game. Greene was also named the Offensive Player of the Year in the Big Ten Conference. He placed sixth in the voting for the Heisman Trophy.

While Greene led the Iowa offense in 2008, tackle Mitch King was the leader of another standout Hawkeye defensive unit. King was named as the 2008 Big Ten Conference Defensive Lineman of the Year.

Offensive tackle Robert Gallery in 2003 was the recipient of the Outland Trophy. Gallery was named the Big Ten Lineman of the Year and was named a consensus All-American. He was Iowa's third Outland Trophy recipient and was the second player selected in the 2004 NFL Draft.

PK Nate Kaeding earned the Lou Groza Award as the top kicker in the nation in 2002. He also earned consensus All-America honors as a senior in 2003 and was one of three finalists for the Groza Award. Kaeding earned all-Pro recognition during his professional career and enjoyed a nine-year NFL career.

Also in 2002, Dallas Clark earned the John Mackey Award as the top tight end in the nation and QB Brad Banks was recognized with the Davey O'Brien Award as the top signal caller in the nation. Clark was named to the NFL's all-Pro team in 2009 as well.

Following the 2007 season, linebacker Mike Klinkenborg was named a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete, earning an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship. A two-time first team academic all-American, Klinkenborg was also a finalist for the Draddy Award.

Along with having three players earn Player of the Year awards for their positions (QB Brad Banks, TE Dallas Clark and PK Nate Kaeding)

in 2002, Iowa had a total of 11 players earn first-team All-Big Ten honors. In addition to earning the Davey O'Brien Award as the top quarterback, Banks was named Associated Press National Player of the Year, placed second in the Heisman Trophy voting and was named the Most Valuable Player and Offensive Player of the Year in the Big Ten Conference. Banks was also a finalist for the Maxwell Award and the Walter Camp Football Foundation Player of the Year.

Center Bruce Nelson in 2002 was a finalist for the Rimington Award, which goes to the top center in the nation, while Clark and OL Eric Steinbach earned consensus All-America honors. The 2002 and 2003 seasons marked just the third and fourth seasons in which Iowa has had more than one consensus selection. Steinbach, in 2002, preceded Gallery as the Big Ten Lineman of the Year.

In addition to the player honors, Ferentz has earned national recognition as well. In 2015, Ferentz was named the Eddie Robinson and Woody Hayes national Coach of the Year, while also earning the Bobby Dodd Trophy. Ferentz was both the Dave McClain and Hayes-Schembechler Big Ten Coach of the Year. The conference honor is the fourth for Ferentz in his career (2002, 2004, 2009).

Ferentz was also named national Coach of The Year by the Walter Camp Football Foundation and the Associated Press in 2002. The American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) selected Ron Aiken as the 2002 national Assistant Coach of the Year. Norm Parker, Iowa's defensive coordinator, was a finalist for the Broyles Award, which recognizes the nation's top Division I assistant coach, in both 2004 and 2005.

Earned unanimous consensus All-America honors, being named on all five All-America teams to become the 13th unanimous consensus All-American in school history . . . third Iowa linebacker to earn consensus honors . . . Iowa's eighth consensus All-American in last nine years . . . first Hawkeye to earn the Butkus Award, presented annually to the best linebacker in the nation . . . also first Hawkeye to earn the National Football Foundation William V. Campbell Trophy, considered the academic Heisman Trophy . . . named the Nagurski-Woodson and Associated Press Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year . . . named the Butkus-Fitzgerald Big Ten Line-backer of the Year . . . three-time Academic All-Big Ten . . . ranked 19th in career tackles with 305 . . . Permanent Team Captain and Most Valuable Player for defense.



Linebacker Jack Campbell was named the 2022 Butkus Award winner. He became the first Hawkeye to win the award, which is presented to the top linebacker in the nation.

Iowa football is well represented in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, with five former Hawkeyes being inducted into the Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.



Alex Karras

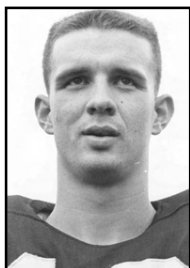
*Detroit Lions, 1958-62, 1964-70.
Inducted, Centennial Class, 2020*

Alex Karras (6-2, 248-pounds) was a defensive tackle from Gary, Indiana. He was drafted in the first round (10th selection overall) of the 1958 draft by the Detroit Lions. He was voted college football's outstanding lineman in 1957 and placed second in the voting for the Heisman Trophy. He was also a collegiate heavyweight wrestling champion.

A true team leader for the Lions, Karras led a Detroit defense that finished second in points allowed in the NFL three times. His career was capped with his lone playoff appearance in 1970. His durability was evidenced by his starting string of 153 consecutive games, missing just one game during his 12-year career.

A member of the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1960's, Karras was selected first-team All-Pro four times (1960-62, 1965), second-team All-Pro eight times, and voted to four Pro Bowls. Karras played in 161 games during his 12-season career (1958-1962, 1964-70). His career totals include four interceptions, 17 fumble recoveries and one safety.

Karras was born July 15, 1935 in Gary, Indiana. He passed away on Oct. 10, 2012, at the age of 77.



Paul Krause

*Washington Redskins & Minnesota Vikings, 1964-79.
Inducted, 1998*

Paul Krause, a 6-3, 200-pound free safety, became the leading pass interceptor of all time with 81 steals during a 16-season career with the Washington Redskins and Minnesota Vikings from 1964 to 1979.

A two-way star at Iowa, he was the second-round draft pick of the Redskins in 1964. He was traded to Minnesota after four seasons and went on to excel with the Vikings for 12 more seasons before retiring

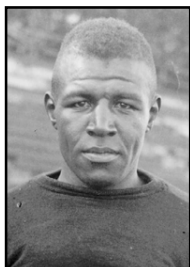
after the 1979 campaign.

Krause led the NFL in interceptions in 1964 with 12 and was named to the All-NFL first team. He was named to his first of eight Pro Bowls and was second in voting for NFL Rookie of the Year. Named All-NFL four different times, Krause was also selected All-Eastern Conference twice, and All-NFC five times.

Krause was the starting free safety in Super Bowls IV, VIII, IX, and XI, in the 1969 NFL championship game and NFC title games in 1973, 1974, 1976 and 1977. He intercepted one pass in Super Bowl IV and recovered a fumble in Super Bowl IX.

Krause recorded three interceptions in his final campaign in 1979 to surpass former Hawkeye Emlen Tunnell, who had 79 steals, for the all-time record. The durable Krause missed only two games in 16 seasons because of injuries.

Krause was born February 19, 1942, in Flint, Michigan.



Fred "Duke" Slater

*Milwaukee Badgers, Rock Island Independents,
Chicago Cardinals, 1922-31.
Inducted, Centennial Class, 2020*

Duke Slater (6-1, 215-pounds) was a three-time All-Big Ten selection who earned All-American honors. Slater helped Iowa to a perfect 7-0 record in 1921, including a 10-7 victory over Knute Rockne's Notre Dame team, ending a 20-game Irish winning streak. Slater turned pro in 1922, joining the Milwaukee Badgers. After just two games, he signed with the

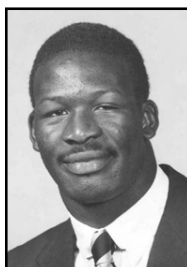
Rock Island Independents, where he played from 1922-25. Slater completed his career with the Chicago Cardinals (1926-31).

Slater starred as a two-way tackle for 10 seasons and was the longest tenured African American player during that era. Slater played the full 60 minutes during the historic Thanksgiving Day game in 1929 when Ernie Nevers scored a single-game record 40 points, an NFL record that still stands.

Racial bias presumably kept Slater from being named to the official NFL All-Decade Team of the 1920's. However, he was recognized as an All-Decade player of the 1920's in the book "The Pro Football Chronicle." In total, Slater was named All-BNFL four times (1923, 1925, 1926, 1929), and second-team, All-NFL by various outlets in seven of his 10 pro seasons (1923-27, 1929-30).

Slater graduated from law school and passed the bar in 1928 while still playing in the NFL. He started a practice in Chicago and became an assistant district attorney and assistant Illinois commerce commissioner. Slater was elected Chicago's second black judge in 1948, and in 1960 became the first black judge to serve on the Superior Court of Chicago.

Slater was born December 8, 1898, in Normal, Illinois, and died August 14, 1966 at the age of 67.



Andre Tippett

New England Patriots, 1982-93. Inducted, 2008

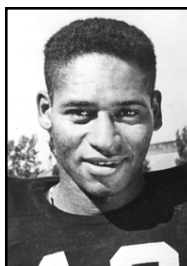
Andre Tippett (6-3, 240-pounds) was selected in the second round of the 1982 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots. Following the strike shortened 1982 season, Tippett led the Patriots with 8.5 sacks in 1983. He set a team record for sacks with 18.5 the following season, earning the first of five consecutive invitations to the Pro Bowl (1985-89).

Tippett led the ACF in sacks (16.5) to rank second in the NFL in 1985, recorded three forced fumbles, and three recovered fumbles, one of which he returned 25 yards for a touchdown. In four postseason games he recorded 21 tackles and one sack. His play earned him All-Pro, Pro-Bowl and AFC Defensive Player of the Year honors.

Tippett was off to another great start in 1986 before a knee injury in the ninth game of the season required surgery. He returned to the line-up for the final two regular season games and the team's one playoff appearance. Despite missing five games, Tippett earned All-AFC and All-Pro second-team honors, while being named to a third consecutive Pro Bowl.

Tippett registered 12.5 sacks in 1987 to again lead the AFC and rank second in the NFL. He remained a dominant player for the Patriots through his final season in 1993. At the time of his retirement Tippett held Patriot team records for season sacks (18.5) career sacks (100) and career fumble recoveries (17). A five-time All-AFC selection, Tippett was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980's.

Tippett was born December 27, 1959, in Birmingham, Alabama.



Emlen Tunnell

*New York Giants and Green Bay Packers, 1948-61.
Inducted, 1967*

Emlen Tunnell (6-1, 187-pounds) entered pro football as a free agent with the New York Giants in 1948, after a college career at Toledo and the University of Iowa (1946-47), and spending time in the Coast Guard. Tunnell was a standout safety and excelled on punt and kickoff returns.

Tunnell was the first African American to play for the Giants, and was the first African American to be elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Tunnell began his college career at Toledo, where he suffered a broken neck which was severe enough that both the Army and Navy rejected his enlistment efforts during World War II. The Coast Guard finally accepted Tunnell for duty. Following his Coast Guard service, he returned to college football at Iowa for two seasons. Tunnell left Iowa prior to his final season, and thus was not drafted in 1948.

Tunnell intercepted a then-record 79 passes in his 14 seasons with the Giants (11 seasons) and Green Bay Packers (three seasons). He totaled 1,282 yards and four touchdowns on interception returns, 2,217 yards and five touchdowns on punt returns, and 1,215 yards and one touchdown on kickoff returns. He was named All-NFL in six seasons and played in nine Pro Bowls, while being named the NFL's all-time safety in 1969.

Tunnell was born March 29, 1925, in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania. He passed away July 22, 1975, at the age of 50.

NATIONAL FOOTBALL FOUNDATION COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

Iowa football is well represented in college football Halls of Fame, including the National Football Foundation, the Helms Athletic Foundation and the College Football Hall of Fame.

Seven men have been named to the Halls of both foundations: Howard Jones, coach; Nile Kinnick, player; Gordon Locke, player; Fred (Duke) Slater, player; Dr. Edward Anderson, coach; Edward (Slip) Madigan, coach; Calvin Jones, player.

Four men have been named to the Hall of the Helms Foundation: Calvin Jones, player; Ossie Solem, coach; Emlen Tunnell, professional player; Eric Wilson, publicist.

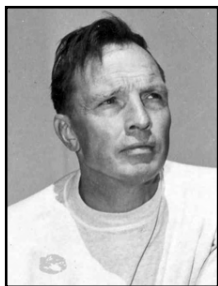
Aubrey Devine, Randy Duncan, Robert Gallery, Alex Karras, Chuck Long, Larry Station and Andre Tippett have been named to the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame as players.

Gallery, a unanimous consensus All-America selection in 2003, is the latest to join the Hall of Fame as a member of the class of 2023. He was the Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year as a senior and the recipient of the 2003 Outland Trophy. He was the second players selected in the NFL Draft and played in the NFL for eight seasons.

Earl Banks was inducted on the merits of his long-time coaching tenure at Morgan State and Bob Stoops for his career as the head coach at Oklahoma.

Former Iowa Coach Forest Evashevski was honored into the Hall of Fame in December of 2000 in New York City. Hayden Fry (2003) is the latest Iowa coach to be inducted. Evashevski coached Iowa from 1952-60, compiling a 42-27-4 record. The Hawkeyes finished in the top five nationally in 1956, 1957, 1958 and 1960 under Evashevski, who later served as Iowa's Director of Athletics.

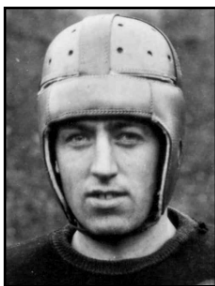
Fry was inducted as a member of the 2003 Hall of Fame class at the 46th annual awards dinner on Dec. 9, 2003, at the Waldorf Astoria in New York City. Fry was officially enshrined at the Hall in South Bend, Indiana, in August, 2004. The College Football Hall of Fame is now located in Atlanta, Georgia. Fry was Iowa's winningest head coach at the time of his retirement (143 wins). He led the Hawkeyes to three Big Ten titles and Rose Bowl appearances and coached the Hawkeyes in 14 bowl games.



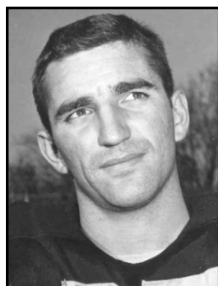

School Colors

For 40 years Iowa was without school colors, but in 1887 a group of 50 seniors met on the steps of the Old Capitol to decide, what are now, the official school colors. They chose Old Gold, the color of Iowa's vast corn fields and Black, the color of the rich soil.

School Fight Song

The Iowa Fight Song was written in 1950 by Mason City, Iowa, native Meredith Willson. Best known as the creator of Broadway's "The Music Man," Willson was awarded a 1963 University of Iowa Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award for "setting the spirit of Iowa to music." The lively cheer is sung hundreds of times during Iowa athletic events during the year.

The Tigerhawk Emblem

When Hayden Fry was named University of Iowa Head Football Coach in 1979, he wanted to change the Hawkeyes' image from a team that posted 17-straight losing seasons to that of a winner. One part of that makeover was creating and introducing a new logo. Fry and the athletics marketing department held a campus-wide contest asking fans to submit their logo ideas. The winner - the Tigerhawk designed by Cedar Rapids native Bill Colbert - has become synonymous with University of Iowa Athletics.



The Swarm

Coach Fry wanted to create a sense of unity and togetherness on game days amongst his new team in 1979. Before each game, he instructed his team to take and leave the field as a tight group with everyone holding hands and moving at a slow trot. Fry coined the entrance "The Swarm".

"I wasn't sure what we'd look like as a team after the first snap," explained Fry, "so I wanted to make sure that we looked like winners coming on and off the field. I told my first team that the Swarm was to get the attention of the other team," he laughed. "But it was just as much for us to relax and not be scared."

The Wave

The University of Iowa football program was chosen to receive the prestigious 2017 Disney Sports Spirit Award after launching a heart-warming tradition at its home games that touched the lives of scores of young patients at the university's Stead Family Children's Hospital.

In a tradition that started at the 2017 season opener, fans inside Kinnick Stadium and patients and families inside the UI Stead Family Children's Hospital exchanged waves at the end of the first quarter of each home game.

The UI Stead Family Children's Hospital opened in 2017. It is connected to the south end of the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics and overlooks Kinnick Stadium from the southeast grandstands. During Iowa football home games, patients and their families can watch the game from the top floor (Level 12), one of the highest vantage points in Iowa City.

Floyd of Rosedale
Iowa vs. Minnesota

To the winner of the Iowa-Minnesota football game goes possession of a statue of a pig named "Floyd of Rosedale."

A bet in 1935 between Minnesota Governor Floyd B. Olson and Iowa Governor Clyde Herring gave birth to Floyd of Rosedale. Tensions between the two state universities had been running high and a wager was made in an effort to relieve the situation.

After Iowa lost the 1935 game, Herring presented Olson with Floyd of Rosedale, a full-blooded champion pig and a brother of BlueBoy from Will Rogers' movie State Fair. Olson gave the pig to the University of Minnesota and commissioned St. Paul sculptor Charles Brioscho to capture Floyd's image.

The result is a bronze pig 21 inches long and 15 inches high and weighs in at 98.3 pounds. Floyd currently resides in Iowa City as a result of Iowa's 17-10 victory last season in Kinnick Stadium. Minnesota holds a 42-39-2 advantage in the series with Floyd of Rosedale on the line. The winning university is entitled to keep the trophy until it loses the annual battle.

**Heartland Trophy**
Iowa vs. Wisconsin

The Heartland Trophy was inaugurated in 2004 and goes each year to the winner of the football battle between Iowa and Wisconsin.

The trophy was designed and crafted by artist and former Iowa football player Frank Strub. The trophy, which is a bull mounted on a walnut base (native to both Wisconsin and Iowa), has been inscribed with the scores of all games in the long-time series. The teams have met 91 times, with Wisconsin holding a 46-43-2.

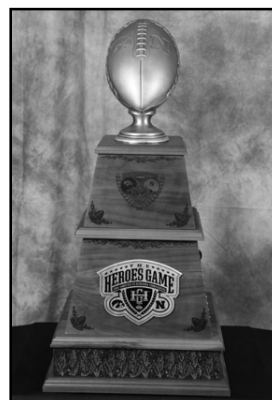
Wisconsin leads the series, 7-5, since the inception of the Heartland Trophy in 2004. The trophy resides in Madison following Wisconsin's 38-14 win in Madison last season. The winning university is entitled to keep the trophy until it loses the annual battle.

**The Heroes Game**
Iowa vs. Nebraska

The Heroes Game was created to highlight the border rivalry between Iowa and Nebraska. The institutions annually honor one citizen from each of their respective states who are admired for their brave deeds and noble qualities.

These heroes are nominated by friends, neighbors or co-workers and are guests of the two teams at the game, where they will be honored on-field. Each will also have their name and hometown etched on the Heroes Trophy.

Nebraska holds a 29-16-3 advantage in the all-time series. The trophy resides in Iowa City after Iowa's 56-14 victory in Lincoln last season.

When The University of Iowa resumed its football series with Iowa State in 1977, the Des Moines Athletic Club donated a trophy to be awarded to the winner of the annual in-state battle.

The original Cy-Hawk Trophy featured a football player in the classic running back pose and a likeness of both Herky the Hawkeye and Cy the Cardinal. A new Cy-Hawk Trophy, selected through a fan vote, was introduced for the 2012 contest, which is a part of the Iowa Corn Cy-Hawk Series.

The Hawkeyes hold a 43-22 advantage in the series that began in 1894, including a 27-13 margin since 1977 when the Cy-Hawk Trophy was first awarded. Iowa retained possession of the trophy with a 44-41 overtime victory last season in Ames. The winning university is entitled to keep the trophy until it loses the annual battle.

**The Hawkeye Nickname**

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawkeye from the hero in the fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them. In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison. Edwards, editor of the Fort Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the Burlington Hawkeye. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.

Herky The Hawkeye

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa. The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky. Since his birth, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron. During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletics events.



Iowa football has been a popular choice for football fans, as Iowa's attendance figures would indicate. But the Hawkeyes have also been a favorite for television viewers as well. Every Iowa game over the past 21 seasons has been televised. All 12 of Iowa's regular season games during the 2023 season will again be televised. The Hawkeyes have a 269-167-5 overall television record, and during one stretch (1955 to 1959) went 10 games without a defeat.

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Kinnick Stadium, home of the Iowa football team, served its 93rd season of hosting Hawkeye football games in 2022. Currently the 28th largest college owned stadium in the nation (69,250), Kinnick Stadium ranks as one of college football's finest facilities and is routinely filled on Saturdays each fall.

Originally named Iowa Stadium, the name was changed to Kinnick Stadium in 1972, in honor of Iowa's 1939 Heisman Trophy winner, Nile Kinnick. His No. 24 jersey was retired by the school due to his success as a scholar-athlete at the University.

Prior to the 2021 season, Iowa Athletics announced the naming of Duke Slater Field at Kinnick Stadium, naming the playing field for the first time in the stadium's history. Slater was the first African-American student-athlete in school history to earn All-America honors. A three-time first-team All-Big Ten selection, Slater competed in football and track and field for the Hawkeyes. Iowa had a 7-0 Big Ten record in 1921 to claim the conference title and was named by more than one media outlet as national champion.

Slater was the first Black player inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 1951 as a member of the inaugural class. He is also a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, being elected as a member of the Centennial Class in 2020. Slater was elected to the National Iowa Varsity Club Hall of Fame in the 1989 inaugural class and in 1951 was one of five members named to the inaugural class of the Iowa Sports Hall of Fame. As part of the 100-year celebration of Iowa football in 1989, he was named a member of Iowa's all-time football team.

Kinnick Stadium has undergone several renovations throughout the years. The \$89 million Kinnick Edge project, which was completed prior to the 2019 season, provided enhancements to the north end zone of Kinnick Stadium. The latest upgrade included over 1,600 indoor and outdoor club seats as part of an entirely new north end zone.

The Kinnick Edge project included new restrooms, concourse areas, upgraded concession locations and food options, and new videoboards in the north end zone. A new playing surface was also installed prior to the 2019 season.

A two-year, \$90 million restoration and renovation project for the stadium was completed prior to the start of the 2006 season. The project, which was the largest such undertaking ever for Iowa athletics, included an entirely new south end zone and a new press and hospitality facility. The south end zone project, which included new

locker rooms, training room and media facilities for the Hawkeye football team on game days, was completed prior to the 2005 season.

The Paul J. Brechler Press Box, a completely new four-level press and hospitality facility, opened prior to the 2006 season. The facility extends the full length of the west side of the stadium. It includes 47 private viewing suites and over 1,000 club seats.

The south end zone renovation also provided a new entry plaza (Krause Family Plaza) to the south entrance, wider seats throughout most of the stadium, new and upgraded restroom facilities and concession areas, and an upgraded sound system.

Iowa draws sellout crowds for a majority of all home games, including 84 of the last 127 games over the last 19 seasons (not including 2020 due to the pandemic). Iowa had a sellout streak of 36 straight games snapped in its 2008 home finale and sold out all seven home games in 2022.

Iowa ranked 18th in home attendance in 2022 with its average of 69,250, and annually ranks among the top 25 programs in the nation in home attendance. Big Ten Conference football games in 2022 drew over 6.5 million fans, surpassing six million fans for the ninth straight year and 10th time in 11 years. The Big Ten annually ranks first or second nationally in home attendance. General public were not allowed to attend Big Ten games in 2020.

Construction on the original 53,000-seat stadium was completed Oct. 5, 1929, at a cost of \$497,151.42. Original construction took six months, but the stadium has undergone several facelifts since. Seats were added to the south end zone in 1956, raising the capacity to 60,000. The north end zone was enclosed and capacity increased to 66,000 prior to the 1983 season. With three expansion projects completed since that time, the seating capacity at Kinnick Stadium reached 70,585. Kinnick Stadium has 20 miles of bleacher seats and is 79 rows high on each side. The seating upgrades that were part of the Kinnick Edge project reduced the current capacity to 69,250.

Beside the expansions, an artificial surface was first installed in 1972. That carpet was replaced in 1981. Prior to the 1989 season a natural grass playing field, Prescription Athletic Turf, was installed. The playing surface was replaced with new sod prior to 1997 and 2005.

The playing surface was replaced prior to the 2009 season, this time with state-of-the-art Field Turf, and replaced again prior to the 2017 and 2019 seasons. Permanent practice lights were installed prior to the 2012 season and upgraded to provide broadcast-quality lighting

prior to the 2015 season.

The playing surface in Kinnick Stadium in 2017 featured an Iowa logo for the first time since the conclusion of the 1980 football season, as the Tigerhawk was installed at midfield. The stadium playing surface was without a University logo since a block "I" adorned the center of the field from 1972 through 1980. Artificial turf was first installed prior to the 1972 season and the block "I" appeared at midfield until a new surface was installed prior to the 1981 season, without a logo at midfield.

The original five floor press box was constructed in 1958 at a cost of \$490,628.62 and was located between the 25 yard lines on the west side of the stadium. Between 1995 and 1999, the Kinnick Stadium press box underwent a \$3 million improvement and renovation project, which included the addition of 18 private viewing suites and the remodeling of all five levels. The original press box was demolished in December, 2005.

Spectators attending home games of the Iowa Hawkeyes enjoy all the benefits of watching a game on television, thanks to the installation of all new and expanded video boards and scoreboards prior to the 2013 season. The \$9 million upgrade included large scale, HD video display units, which offer spectators live game action, instant replays and other features. In addition to the expanded main board in the south end zone, two additional video boards and a video ribbon were added to the south end zone. Upgraded scoreboards were put in place prior to the 2019 season, with a large jumbotron on the north end matching the south end.

Kinnick Stadium has a rich history, beginning with a 46-0 Hawkeye win over Monmouth in the facility's first game. The Hawkeyes tied Illinois 7-7 in the dedication game Oct. 19, 1929.

Iowa's all time record in Kinnick Stadium is 308-192-15. Iowa's longest home winning streak of 22 games spanned the 2002 to 2005 seasons. The Hawkeyes have had 12 undefeated home seasons, including 2003, 2004 and 2015. Iowa posted a 6-1 home record in 2002, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2019, and 2021, and a 3-1 mark in the shortened 2020 season.

The school's all-time home total attendance record was set in 2006 (494,095 fans) and matched in both 2010 and 2011. The average per game record (70,585) was established in 2005 and matched in 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2011. Iowa's record season attendance mark for all games is 905,840 set in 1990, a 75,487 per game average.

The University of Iowa Department of Athletics established the "Kinnick Stadium Wall of Honor" prior to the 2013 season.

Eleven Hawkeyes have their name and jersey number displayed on the lowest ribbon adjacent the letters of the Paul W. Brechler Press Box. The numbers coincide with the jersey number each player wore their senior season. The inaugural members of the Kinnick Stadium Wall of Honor included Aubrey Devine (1), Randy Duncan (25), Calvin Jones (62), Alex Karras (77), Nile Kinnick (24), Gordon Locke (1), Chuck Long (16), Duke Slater (15), and Larry Station (36). Andre Tippett (99) was added after being elected to the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame in 2021. The latest addition to the Wall of Honor is Robert Gallery (78), a Hawkeye letterman from 2000-03 who was elected to the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame in 2023.

To be considered for inclusion on the Kinnick Stadium Wall of Honor, former UI football players must be a member of the UI Varsity Club Hall of Fame, and meet one of the following three criteria: (1) Member of both the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame and the Helms Athletic Foundation Hall of Fame*; (2) Member of one of the two above mentioned nationally recognized Halls of Fame, and a consensus All-American; (3) Two-time Consensus All-American.

**The Helms Athletic Foundation is no longer active, rendering it invalid for future consideration.*

#1 – Aubrey Devine (1919-21)

Devine won the Big Ten Conference Medal for Excellence in athletics and academics, and was quarterback and captain of Iowa's 1921 Big Ten championship team. He led the Hawkeyes in rushing, passing, and scoring in 1919 and 1920. He drop-kicked a field goal to beat Notre Dame, 10-7, in 1921, as Iowa earned a share of its first mythical national championship. He was a three-time first-team All-Big Ten honoree and is a member of Iowa's all-time football team.

#25 – Randy Duncan (1956-58)

Duncan won Big Ten and Iowa MVP honors when he led the Hawkeyes to a Rose Bowl title in 1959. He finished second in the 1958 Heisman Trophy balloting. Duncan was a two-time all-conference pick, earned Walter Camp and Player of the Year honors from three organizations, and was the No. 1 pick in the 1958 NFL draft. Iowa shared the mythical national title in both 1956 and 1958, while also earning the Grantland Rice Award in 1958, symbolic of the national football championship.

#62 – Calvin Jones (1953-55)

Jones was named to 22 All-America teams in his career and in 1955 was named winner of the Outland Trophy, awarded to the nation's top interior lineman. He was Iowa's first two-time consensus All-American, and his No. 62 jersey is one of only two numbers retired by the Hawkeyes. Jones was a three-time first team All-Big Ten performer and is a member of Iowa's all-time team.

#77 – Alex Karras (1956-57)

Karras was a Rose Bowl champion and a consensus All-American in 1957. He was the first two-time AP All-American in Iowa history and a winner of the Outland Trophy, awarded to the nation's top interior lineman. Karras was Heisman Trophy runner-up in 1957, and a member of the inaugural class of the Iowa Lettermen's Club Hall of Fame. He is on Iowa's all-time football team and a former NFL All-Pro performer with the Detroit Lions. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2020.

#24 – Nile Kinnick (1937-39)

Kinnick won the only Heisman Trophy in school history when he swept the Heisman, Maxwell and Walter Camp awards in 1939. He was the Big Ten MVP for Iowa's legendary 1939 Ironmen team. He was a Phi Beta Kappa scholar and senior class president, his No. 24 jersey is one of two retired numbers at Iowa, and in 1972 Iowa's stadium was named in his honor.

#1 – Gordon Locke (1920-22)

Locke primarily played fullback during his Hawkeye career, but in 1922 he was a Walter Camp first-team All-America quarterback, and he's listed as a defensive back on Iowa's all-time football team. He scored 72 points as a senior to set a then-Big Ten record, and he was awarded the Big Ten Medal of Honor (1923).

#16 – Chuck Long (1982-85)

Long quarterbacked the Hawkeyes to the 1986 Rose Bowl, the same year he became the first player in NCAA history to pass for more than 10,000 career yards. He finished runner-up in the closest Heisman Trophy contest in the award's history in 1985, and previously held the NCAA record for consecutive completions with 22 at Indiana (1984). Long was named a first-team All-Big Ten performer three times, including 1985 when he was named conference MVP. He threw a bowl-record six touchdown passes against Texas in the 1984 Freedom Bowl, and was a first round NFL Draft choice of the Detroit Lions.

#15 – Duke Slater (1918-21)

Fred "Duke" Slater was a seven-time letterman at the University of Iowa, competing in football and track from 1918-21. He was an All-Big Ten tackle for the Hawkeyes from 1919-21, and an All-America track and field athlete from 1920-21. He is a member of Iowa's all-time team. In 1928, Slater earned his law degree from the University of Iowa, and in 1951 he became the first black player inducted into the inaugural College Football Hall of Fame. He is also a member of the Helms Athletic Foundation Football Hall of Fame and was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2020.

#36 – Larry Station (1982-85)

Station was named a consensus All-American in 1984 and 1985, becoming just the second Hawkeye in program history to earn multiple honors. He is the only player in school history to lead the team in tackles four times, and in 1985 finished his career with the all-time tackles record (492). Station started the final 42 games of his career, earned All-America mention in each of his four seasons, and is a linebacker on Iowa's all-time football team. He was a finalist for the Lombardi and Butkus awards in 1985, and was a three-time first team All-Big Ten honoree.

#99 – Andre Tippett (1979-81)

Tippett was the first consensus All-American for Coach Hayden Fry as a defensive end. He was a two time first team All-Big Ten selection, serving as a team captain in 1981 on Iowa's 1981 Rose Bowl team. Tippett holds Iowa's record for tackles for lost yardage in a season (20 tackles for 153 yards in 1980), leading the Big Ten in tackles for loss (20) as a junior. Tippett enjoyed a lengthy NFL career in New England, where he was a five-time All-Pro selection during his 11-year career. Tippett was named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2008 and named to the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame in 2021.

#78 – Robert Gallery (2000-03)

Robert Gallery was elected to the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame as a member of the 2023 class. Gallery earned unanimous consensus All-America honors as a senior, earning the Outland Trophy as the top offensive lineman in the nation. He was the Big Ten Conference Offensive Lineman of the Year as a senior and was first-team All-Big Ten in each of his final three seasons. Gallery played a key role as Iowa posted a perfect 8-0 Big Ten record in 2002, sharing the Big Ten title. Gallery was the second player selected in the 2004 NFL Draft (Oakland) and played eight seasons in the NFL.

The Iowa Hawkeyes play their home football games in Kinnick Stadium (capacity 69,250), located on the west campus in the heart of the University's athletic complex. It is a few minutes drive from Interstate 80 and 380 and is less than 30 minutes from the Eastern Iowa Airport in Cedar Rapids.

The Paul J. Brechler Press Box is on the west side and accessible by elevator or stairs. The facility is named in honor of the former UI athletic director (1947-60). It was completed prior to the 2006 season as part of the two-year, \$90 million renovation of Kinnick Stadium.

The four-level facility extends from goal line to goal line. The media section, including the press section, radio and television booths and game management operations, are located on the fourth level. Level one includes private suites and indoor club seating, level two includes outdoor club seating and level three is private suites.

Refreshments and snacks are available throughout each game. A pregame meal is served for the media, as well as sandwiches postgame.

Ferentz Conferences/Interview Requests

Coach Kirk Ferentz holds a media conference each Tuesday during the season in the All-America Room of the Stew and LeNore Hansen Football Performance Center. Players are also available, upon request, each Tuesday.

Player requests must be made following each game, either after a Saturday game or by 9 a.m. (CT) Sunday morning, for the following week. Out of town media should contact the UI Strategic Communications office on Mondays to arrange telephone interviews.

Credentials

Season and single-game credential requests for Iowa football may be submitted at hawkeyesports.com/media. If you have questions regarding credentials, the Strategic Communications number is 319-335-9411. Season requests must be received by Aug. 12, to assure a season seat in the press box.

Once a credential request is submitted, you will receive an email reply that your request has been received and either approved or denied. Credentials may be picked up in the Strategic Communications office before Noon on the Friday prior to game day or left at the Media Will Call Window inside Gate I at Kinnick Stadium on game day. All parking credentials will be digital.

Media members may not use a credential to cover the game for another newspaper, television station, radio station or internet site. Failure to comply will result in both agencies credentials be-

ing revoked for the entire season.

Credential language, which appears on all credentials issued for Iowa football, is printed on the following page of this guide. All rules and regulations listed are enforced by the University of Iowa Athletics Department and the Big Ten Conference.

Parking

Requests for parking should be made when requesting credentials. Media parking is located in Ramp 3 at the northeast corner of Kinnick Stadium (corner of Hawkins Drive and Evashevski Drive), or Ramp 4, east of the southeast corner of the stadium (South Grand Avenue).

To access Ramp 3 (address is 800 Evashevski Drive, Iowa City), you must approach Ramp 3 from the north on Hawkins Drive, as Hawkins Drive is closed to traffic between Evashevski Drive and Melrose Avenue 2.5 hours prior to kickoff.

For best access to Ramp 4 (address is 39 South Hospital Drive), use Melrose Avenue from the west, turn left on South Grand Avenue, and turn left into Ramp 4. From the east, use Grand Avenue from Riverside Drive and turn right into Ramp 4 from South Grand Avenue.

Television stations needing satellite truck parking must contact Traci Wagner (319-335-9411) early in the week prior to that Saturday's game to make arrangements. Truck parking is located outside the southeast corner of Kinnick Stadium (near Gate M) adjacent to Hawkins Drive.

Media Entrances

All media must enter Kinnick Stadium through Gate B on the west side of the stadium. Credentials will be required to enter the stadium through Gate B. All bags will be inspected and tagged upon entry. Media with seats in the press box will access the media area using the elevator inside Gate F from the concourse. Media with photo/video credentials can access the photo room located in the northeast corner of the field by either the west tunnel (access near section 128 on concourse) or the northeast staircase from the concourse to the field.

Photo/TV Credentials

Photo credentials must be requested following the same guidelines as mentioned above. A photo/video room is located at the northeast corner of Duke Slater Field. Photo credentials must be presented in order to receive a vest for sideline photography. Entrance to the photo room from the playing field is at the northeast corner of the field. From the concourse, use the stairs in the north end of the east stands (near Gate I).

Photo vests must be checked out from the photo room and worn to allow access to the playing field. Vests must be returned to the photo room 10-15 minutes following the conclusion of each game.

For television crews, one credential issued to each outlet will have access to the fourth level of the press box, although television stations are not allowed to video tape from the press box. TV camera personnel on the sidelines must adhere to all sideline policies. While each television crew is provided one credential granting access to the fourth level of the press box, a press box seat is not assigned.



In Memory - Steve Batterson

Steve Batterson, a 38-year veteran on the Quad-City Times staff, passed away June 27, 2023.

Batterson, 61, was a native of Washington, Iowa, and a graduate of the University of Iowa. He served as the Daily Iowan sports editor while at Iowa, and still served on the publication's advisory board. He joined the Quad-City Times staff in March 1985. During his tenure, Batterson was widely respected for his coverage of professional, collegiate, and high school athletics.

The Times' sports section won dozens of state and national awards during his 38 years on the staff and Batterson was named Iowa's sports writer of the year by the National Sports Media Association in 2001, 2002 and 2013. He voted in the AP College Football Poll and for the Heisman Trophy Candidate for many years.

Batterson is survived by his mother, Frances, brother, Jeff, and his beloved niece Samantha.

Services

Complete play-by-play, halftime statistics, final team and individual stats, complete defensive stats, drive charts, participation charts and quotes from both head coaches will be emailed following each home game. Stat Broadcast is available for each home game via statbroadcast.com.

The Kinnick Stadium press facility closes four hours following the conclusion of postgame news conferences.

Telephones

Media requiring their own phone lines should call 319-335-2945 and ask for a work order clerk.

High Speed Internet Access

Hard wire high speed internet access is available at every media seat in the Kinnick Stadium press box and in the field level photo/video room. Wireless internet access is available (password required), both in the press box and in the postgame interview rooms. Please ask for IT assistance in the press box should you need wireless access on game day.

Postgame Information via E-Mail

All game statistics, notes, and quotes are e-mailed from Kinnick Stadium following Iowa home games to all credentialed media. This information is filed in PDF format and is sent within 30-45 minutes following home games. This information is also posted on the Iowa website, hawkeyesports.com, following each home game.

News Conference Transcripts

Transcripts of Tuesday news conferences and home game postgame news conferences with Coach Kirk Ferentz, are provided by ASAP Transcripts. Transcripts of Ferentz news conferences are available for download via hawkeyesports.com and e-mail.

Postgame Interviews

Members of the media should contact Matt Weitzel with player requests prior to leaving the press box. UI Strategic Communications staff will be departing the press box with approximately five minutes remaining in the game.

Both team locker room facilities are located beneath the south end zone stands. All player and coaches interviews will take place in the designated media rooms. You may follow a member of the UI Strategic Communications staff from the press box or ask for directions on getting to the postgame media rooms.

Both head coaches are available (in different interview rooms) following the cooling off period, with player interviews to follow. Coach Ferentz' postgame comments are televised on the monitors in the media section of the Brechler press box and the photo room. Quotes from both head coaches are distributed following the interview sessions.

The Iowa locker room is closed to the media. Selected Iowa players will speak first at the podium prior to Coach Ferentz.

Field Access

Credentialed members of the media are allowed field access up to 60 minutes prior to kickoff. Members of the media are not allowed field access during the game until five minutes or less remain in the contest. Members of the media will be held at the northwest corner of the playing field, north of the team bench areas, until the conclusion of the game, and will then be allowed to proceed immediately to the south end zone for postgame interviews.

Recruit Interviews

The University of Iowa is committed to full compliance with NCAA Division I rules, and per NCAA Rule 13.10.1, members of the media are not allowed to have any type of in-person, face-to-face contact with a prospective student-athlete and/or interview a prospective student-athlete (either by telephone or any other communication medium) while that prospective student-athlete is visiting the University of Iowa in conjunction with our athletics programs (i.e., official or unofficial visits).

Any violation of this rule falls solely on the University of Iowa. Therefore, if a member of the media is unable to adhere to this rule and becomes a liability, the University of Iowa will retain the right to revoke media credentials.

The Hawkeye Radio Network

Fans of the University of Iowa following the Hawkeyes on radio can tune in on their favorite station throughout the state of Iowa and the Midwest.

The radio voice of the Hawkeyes is Gary Dolphin, a Cascade, Iowa native who handles all play-by-play action of both Iowa football and men's basketball. In addition, Dolphin also serves as the host of the weekly coach's shows during the season with football Coach Kirk Ferentz and men's basketball Coach Fran McCaffery. Dolphin is a three-time Iowa Sportscenter of the Year. He is in his 27th year of broadcasting Iowa football and basketball on the Hawkeye Radio Network. Dolphin, overall, is in his 51st year of play-by-play broadcasting, which includes seven years of broadcasting basketball games for Northwestern University. He served as the Network Television Coordinator for the Chicago Bears from 1989-99.

Dolphin is joined on all University of Iowa football broadcasts by former Hawkeye and NFL great Ed Podolak. A native of Atlantic, Iowa, Podolak was a three-year letterman for the Hawkeyes (1966-68) as a quarterback and running back. He enjoyed a lengthy professional career with the Kansas City Chiefs. He is a member of the Chiefs Hall of Fame and the Iowa Letterwinners Club Hall of Fame. He has been a part of Iowa football broadcasts for 41 years and over 480 games. Iowa's sideline reporter is Rob Brooks, son of Hall of Fame broadcaster, Bob Brooks.



In Memory - Don Lund

Don Lund of the Solon Economist Newspaper passed away April 11, 2023.

Lund moved to North Liberty, Iowa, in 1980 where he began taking classes at the University of Iowa and landed a part-time job with football team. After graduating from the UI with a degree in Communications and Arts, he was an avid sportswriter covering his alma mater. Lund became well known by the players, coaches and other reporters. The last story he filed was the week before his passing.

Lund, who was born without hands or feet, had a love for sports at a young age. He refused to let his disability define him and became an inspiration to many. Lund was involved in organized sports, including baseball, football, and wrestling, where he competed among other athletes.

He is survived by his two brothers, Robert and Arne Lund, and his nieces, nephews and grand-nieces.

The Hawkeye Radio Network, a production of Learfield Communications, Inc. of Jefferson City, Missouri, blankets the state of Iowa and bordering states with more than 50 stations providing live coverage. The Hawkeyes can also be heard on the World Wide Web (hawkeyesports.com) via Hawkeye All-Access, and on Sirius and XM satellite radio.

Nothing in these terms and conditions allows, authorizes, or grants the bearer of these credentials any right in or to the trademarks, copyright or any other proprietary rights of The Big Ten Conference, Inc. and its member institutions, each of which are expressly reserved. A maximum of two minutes (2:00) of game video footage (without audio) may be utilized during the seven (7) days following the conclusion of the game solely within regularly scheduled bona fide news programming distributed via television, and may not be distributed via the internet, wireless or other forms of media. Additionally, live streaming of postgame news conferences is not permitted, while video clips of postgame news conferences are limited to 2:00 or less (multiple clips are allowed).

Photographing this credential is strictly prohibited.

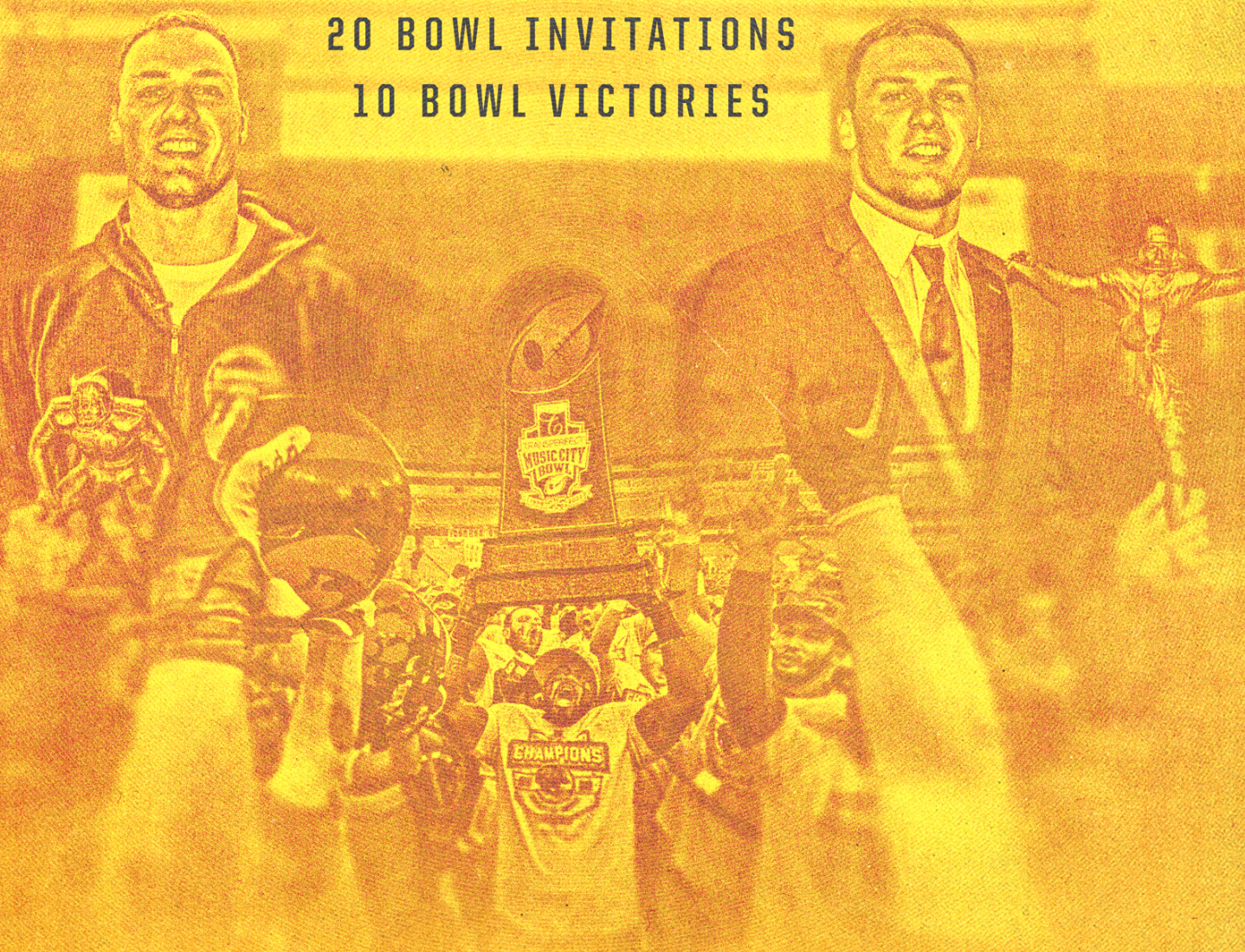
