






ans can make plans to visit one of the exciting kickoff events to Big Ten Football Championship Game weekend at the Big Ten Fan Fest Presented by Dr Pepper. Based inside the Indiana Convention Center on Friday, Dec. 3 and Saturday, Dec. 4, the Big Ten Fan Fest offers interactive exhibits, games, giveaways, marching band and cheerleader performances and fun activities for the whole family that will help everyone get into the gameday spirit.

The Big Ten Fan Fest will be open from 5-9 p.m. (ET) Friday and 10 a.m.-8 p.m. (ET) Saturday, giving fans the opportunity to begin their championship weekend experience by engaging in numerous activities while also stopping by several food and beverage areas within the Indiana Convention Center. Each Football Championship Game ticket will allow complimentary access for the holder to Fan Fest. Fan Fest tickets may also be purchased on-site at the Georgia Street Ticket Office located outside of Hall J in the Indiana Convention Center beginning at 3:30 p.m. (ET) Friday and 9:30 a.m. (ET) Saturday. Prices are \$8 for adults and \$4 for youth (ages 3-12). Children ages 2 and under are free, while individuals with a military ID will gain complimentary access.

Dr Pepper Field will be the home of many instructional sessions, as USA Football will host several free clinics. The field also will be the site of pregame performances on Saturday with the participating teams' marching bands and cheerleaders (Michigan squads at 5:15 p.m. ET, followed by the Iowa squads at 6 p.m. ET), culminating Big Ten Fan Fest and setting the stage for Saturday night's Big Ten Championship Game.

USA FOOTBALL FUNDAMENTAL YOUTH CLINICS

The Big Ten Conference and Indiana Sports Corp will again host free non-contact USA Football FUNdamental youth clinics for kids ages 5-14 on Saturday, Dec. 4 at the Big Ten Fan Fest presented by Dr Pepper. Parents are welcome to attend the clinics that will take place at 10:30 a.m., 11 a.m., 11:30 a.m., noon, 1:30 p.m., 2 p.m., 2:30 p.m., 3 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. (all times Eastern) at the Indiana Convention Center during Fan Fest. There will be a number of free giveaways throughout the day as well. No pre-registration required (with a paid entrance into Fan Fest) and participants will receive a t-shirt.

YOUTH FOOTBALL OFFICIALS CLINICS

Indiana Sports Corp, in partnership with the Big Ten Conference, is bringing a free opportunity to become a youth football official for those 18 years or older. As part of the program, Indiana Sports Corp will host three different football officials' training sessions, with the first taking place in person during the Big Ten Football Championship Game weekend on Friday, Dec. 3. The second training session will be held virtually in April, and the final session will take place in person in June of 2022. In June, all participants will be officially certified after passing an online test. Pre-registration is required, with further details on the Indiana Sports Corp website.

TAIL GREATER PARTY ON GEORGIA STREET

One of the centerpieces of the Big Ten Football Championship Game experience is the Tail Greater Party on Georgia Street. Free to the public and located just a short walk from Lucas Oil Stadium and the Indiana Convention Center, home of the Big Ten Fan Fest presented by Dr Pepper. The tailgate will take place from 10 a.m.-8 p.m. (ET) on Saturday, Dec. 4, providing the ultimate tailgate atmosphere all the way up to kickoff. Fans will be able to enjoy food trucks, a live band and DJ, college football action on numerous video screens,

photo opportunities and the World Famous St. Elmo's Shrimp Eating Contest, which features both amateur and professional competitive eaters. It's a tailgate event unlike any other and one you'll want to be sure to make a part of your gameday experience!

FOX SPORTS CARES NIGHT AT BIG TEN FAN FEST PRESENTED BY DR PEPPER

In partnership with FOX Sports, the Community Service Committee will work to recruit 120 Indiana Special Olympics athletes to take part in basketball, cheer and football clinics in Fan Fest concluding in a special awards ceremony and cheer performance at the end of the evening. Clinics will be conducted by USA Football, clinicians from the Big Ten Women's Basketball Tournament youth clinic, and Indiana/Purdue Cheer and Dance. The schedule is from 5-7:30 p.m. (ET) on Friday, Dec. 3.


BIG TEN RV NATION

2020 BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

RECAP



OHIO STATE RUNNING BACK TREY SERMON CAPTURED THE 2020 GRANGE-GRIFFIN MOST VALUABLE PLAYER AWARD AFTER SETTING SCHOOL AND BIG TEN FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME RECORDS WITH 331 RUSHING YARDS AND 335 YARDS IN TOTAL OFFENSE, LEADING THE BUCKEYES TO THEIR FOURTH CONSECUTIVE CONFERENCE TITLE WITH A 22-10 WIN OVER NORTHWESTERN.

hio State running back Trey Sermon got the message. He'd heard coach Ryan Day preach about everything the Buckeyes overcame to reach the 2020 Big Ten Football Championship Game. He also heard Day urging players to overcome more obstacles in the second half.

So, Sermon delivered — with a record-breaking performance.

He ran for 331 yards and scored two second-half touchdowns, helping Ohio State rally past Northwestern 22-10 for its school-record fourth straight conference crown and a spot in the College Football Playoff.

Sermon used the combination of vision and speed to average 11.4 yards on 29 carries against one of the nation's top defenses, breaking Eddie George's singlegame school record and the Big Ten Football Championship Game mark. Thus, it was no surprise he was voted the Grange-Griffin Most Valuable Player following the contest.

Quarterback Justin Fields said he couldn't throw the ball late in the game because of a sprained right thumb. Starting running back Master Teague left in the first half with an undisclosed injury, and star receiver Chris Olave was inactive and didn't make the trip.

The Wildcats led from the moment Cam Porter scored on a 9-yard run with 4:03 left in the first quarter until the moment Sermon answered with a 9-yard run to give the Buckeyes a 13-10 lead with 2:41 left in the third.

In between, Northwestern settled for a field goal on one drive and missed another scoring chance when Peyton Ramsey was picked off in the end zone to open the second half.

Ramsey was 24 of 37 with 224 yards and ran effectively, too, but he threw two interceptions and lost a fumble — all in the final two quarters.

Ohio State added a 26-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter, and Sermon, fittingly, sealed the win with a 3-yard scoring run with 4:03 to go.

ustin Fields and J.K. Dobbins spent the first half scratching their heads. Then, Ohio State's dynamic duo - and teammates - reverted to their previously impressive form.

Fields threw three touchdown passes in the second half, Dobbins ran for 172 yards and a score and Ohio State sealed its first College Football Playoff trip in three years by shutting out Wisconsin in the second half in a 34-21 victory in the 2019 Big Ten Football Championship Game at Lucas Oil Stadium in

Fields completed 19 of 31 passes for 299 yards and those three scores with no interceptions and was selected as the Grange-Griffin Most Valuable Player following the game.

With the victory, the Buckeyes claimed their third consecutive conference title and fourth Big Ten Football Championship Game victory in the game's nine-year history.

The Badgers, who lost 38-7 at Ohio State six weeks earlier, scored the first 14 points — Ohio State's largest deficit of the season. Wisconsin led 21-7 at the half.

But just like the first game, the Buckeyes turned it on in the third quarter.

Jeremy Ruckert started the comeback with a spectacular one-handed catch in the back of the end zone on the fifth play of the third quarter. The 16-yard pass cut the deficit to 21-14.

Four plays later, Wisconsin punter Anthony Lotti dropped the ball and was tackled at the Badgers 16. Ohio State converted that miscue into a 27-yard field goal.

And after Wisconsin missed a 48-yard field goal wide left on its next series, Fields hooked up with K.J. Hill for a 16-yard pass and 24-21 lead with 2:23 left in the third quarter.

Fields added a 13-yard TD pass to Hill early in the fourth quarter to give the Buckeyes a 31-21 lead and the Buckeyes closed the scoring with a 24-yard field goal. Wisconsin's Jack Coan ran for two touchdowns in the first half and Jonathan Taylor rushed for 148 yards and one touchdown.







The National Science Foundation ranked Michigan No. 1 in research volume among U.S. public research universities.

EDUCATION


Michigan is consistently ranked one of the best public universities in the nation. The 2022 QS World University Rankings listed the university No. 3. Our 19 schools and colleges offer 275 degree programs. We attract talented students from 82 Michigan counties, all 50 states and 100 countries. About 63 percent of our graduates are staying in Michigan and using their U-M education to contribute to their communities.

AFFORDABILITY

U-M's "Go Blue Guarantee" program provides qualified in-state students with annual family incomes of \$65,000 or less with up to four years of free tuition on all three of our campuses. Our well-established, need-based financial aid program also provides generous support for many other qualifying Michigan families earning more.

HEALTH CARE

Michigan Medicine was named both the No. 1 hospital and children's hospital in Michigan in the 2021 U.S. News & World Report. It is comprised of three hospitals and more than 125 health clinics and centers providing top-ranked care throughout the state. Last year, we served more than 2.4 million patients.

JIM HARBAUGH

HEAD COACH (SEVENTH SEASON)



im Harbaugh has guided the Wolverines to a 49-22 overall record and 34-16 Big Ten record through six seasons leading Michigan football. He has led U-M to three 10-win seasons and has guided teams to five bowl games, including two New Year's Six bowls and three New Year's Day bowl games.

Eight Wolverines have secured 12 All-America honors under Harbaugh, including consensus honorees Devin Bush, Jake Butt, Maurice Hurst, Jourdan Lewis and Jabrill Peppers.

A total of 24 players have earned All-Big Ten first team recognition, including four in 2015, six in 2016, three in 2017, eight in 2018 and three in 2019. In the classroom, Wolverines have totaled 224 Academic All-Big Ten honors during his tenure, including a program-record 50 in 2020.

Harbaugh's teams at Michigan have finished the season ranked in the national polls on four occasions, including a No. 10 final ranking in 2016, and as a top-15 team three times.

Under Harbaugh, Michigan has produced two of the five most-productive offensive seasons in school history. On the other side of the ball, U-M has had a top-12 national defense in five of his six seasons and a top-three unit on three occasions.

Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in Michigan football history on Dec. 30, 2014. He became the sixth Michigan football player selected to lead college football's winningest program.

In four years in the NFL, Harbaugh led the San Francisco 49ers to the NFC Championship three times, winning the NFC title in 2012. He tallied a 49-22-1 overall record, including 5-3 in the postseason.

At the collegiate level, Harbaugh spent three years at the University of San Diego (2004-06) and four years at Stanford (2007-10).

Harbaugh began preparing for a coaching career during his professional playing days, spending eight years as an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001).

As a Wolverine, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished runner-up the following year. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for more than 12 years.

In 1986, Harbaugh won the Chicago Tribune Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, was a first-team All-American and finished third in Heisman Trophy voting.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and two sons, Jack and John. He also has three adult children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.







oon Family Head Football Coach Kirk Ferentz is in his 23rd year as head football coach at the University of Iowa and 32nd season overall at the University.

With Iowa's 33-7 win over Northern Illinois in the opening game of the 2018 season, Ferentz recorded win No. 144 as Iowa's head coach, surpassing the late Hayden Fry as the winningest football coach in program history.

Ferentz is the longest tenured head football coach in the nation. Ferentz and Fry are the only head coaches to lead a Division I football program for 20 years, consecutively. With a 63-0 win at Illinois in 2018, Ferentz became just the fifth coach in Big Ten Conference history to win 150 games as a Big Ten head coach. Ferentz ranks fourth in career wins within league play.

Ferentz holds a 178-108 record at Iowa, including 110-79 in conference games. The 178 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten rank fourth all-time in league history. His 25-year record as a college head coach is 190-129.

Under Ferentz' leadership the Iowa football program has earned 18 bowl game invitations since 2001.

The Hawkeyes won 47 games from 2015-19, the best five-year win total in school history. Just eight programs in the nation won more games during that time frame. Iowa has won 10 games in a season on nine occasions, six times under Ferentz and three under Fry.

Ferentz guided the Hawkeyes to eight wins or more in five consecutive seasons (2015-19) and 12 seasons overall since 2003. Iowa has appeared in 11 January bowl games under Ferentz.

The Iowa football program enjoyed a historic season in 2015, posting a final 12-2 record. Ferentz led the 2015 Hawkeyes to a perfect regular season, setting a school record with 12 wins. The Hawkeyes won the Big Ten Conference West Division (8-0) before falling to Michigan State, 16-13, in a close championship game that was decided in the final minute of play. The Hawkeyes earned their sixth invitation to the Rose Bowl, which was Iowa's first appearance in Pasadena in 25 years.

Ferentz was recognized with both the Hayes-Schembechler and Dave McClain Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year awards in 2015. He was named Eddie Robinson (FWAA) and Woody Hayes national Coach of the Year (Columbus Touchdown Club), and received the Dodd Trophy, presented by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation.

Since its inception in 1896, the pursuit and attainment of academic excellence has been a priority for every Big Ten member institution. But maintaining the conference's standard of competing at the highest level in athletics also endures as an important component of the Big Ten experience. Striking that balance between academics and athletics is integral to the Big Ten's identity. Recognized as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten strives for success from its students not only on the field and in the classroom, but around the world as well.

PREMIER ACADEMIC INSTITUTIONS

The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all 14 Big Ten universities, which is widely considered to be the model for effective and voluntary collaboration among top research universities.

Every Big Ten Academic Alliance institution ranks among the top 70 universities in the nation according to the 2021 Academic Ranking of World Universities, including six in the top 30.

The Big Ten leads all conferences with more than 1,800 Academic All-Americans, including a Big Ten-record 56 honorees during the 2020-21 academic year.

Big Ten Academic Alliance schools annually conduct \$10 billion in funded research, \$5 billion more than any other conference.

A HISTORY OF ATHLETIC SUCCESS

Big Ten schools have won at least five national championships in 23 of the last 27 years, averaging nearly seven per year during that span.

Since the 2008-09 academic year, current Big Ten institutions have claimed 80 team national championships in 22 different sports.

BROAD-BASED PROGRAMMING

The Big Ten will administer more than \$240 million in direct financial support to more than 9,800 students competing in intercollegiate athletics for more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams in 42 different sports.

The Big Ten sponsors 28 official conference sports, 14 for men and 14 for women, including the addition of men's ice hockey and men's and women's lacrosse in this decade.

The Big Ten leads the nation in total students competing in intercollegiate athletics and participation opportunities, and sponsors more official sports than all conferences except the Ivy League.

More than 1,500 Big Ten competitors have participated in the Olympics, winning more than 500 medals, including more than 200 gold. The Big Ten Conference enjoyed its finest performance at a single Olympic Games during the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo, Japan, as athletes with Big Ten ties set conference records by earning 51 total medals and 22 gold medals during the 17-day competition. All 14 Big Ten member schools had an athlete win at least one medal in Tokyo, also a first in conference history.

PASSIONATE FOLLOWING

The Big Ten leads all conferences with 6.4 million alumni and nearly 580,000 students.

Each year more than 11 million patrons attend Big Ten home contests, as the conference has led the nation in attendance for men's basketball, ice hockey, volleyball and wrestling.

LEADERS IN INNOVATION

Took part in the nation's first bowl game, winning the 1902 Rose Bowl Game, and signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl with permanent conference affiliations.

Awarded the first Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915, honoring outstanding seniors who demonstrated excellence in academics and athletics.

Formed the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, enlisting former students that competed in conference athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

Became the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

Implemented the first collegiate football system of instant replay in 2004, which the NCAA approved for use among all conferences in 2006.

Launched the Big Ten Network (BTN) in 2007, the first national conference-owned television network.

Began partnering with the Ivy League to study the effects of head injuries in sports in 2012.

Accepted Johns Hopkins University as the conference's first sport affiliate members in men's and women's lacrosse in 2013 and 2015, respectively, and added Notre Dame as a sport affiliate member in men's ice hockey in 2017.

EXTENSIVE TELEVISION EXPOSURE

Through the Big Ten's current media agreements with BTN, ABC/ ESPN, CBS and FOX, more than 2,000 Big Ten events are produced and distributed nationally and globally on an annual basis.

BTN is in almost 60 million homes across the United States and Canada, and is also available via the Fox Sports App, delivering live and ondemand programming to computers, smartphones and tablets. B1G+ streams hundreds of additional events each season.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

For more than 30 years, through the Big Ten's SCORE (Success Comes Out of Reading Everyday) program, the conference has partnered with Chicago elementary schools to improve reading performance.

Surrounding the Big Ten Football Championship Game and Basketball Tournaments, the conference has held numerous community initiatives, partnered with the College Football Playoff Foundation and other events such as the Big Ten Career Expo, SaturDAY of Service and Youth Football Clinics. In addition, the Big Ten has hosted a downtown 5K, collaborated with a local breast cancer awareness group and provided unique event experiences for military veterans.

ROSE BOWL GAME

he Tournament of Roses experience on New Year's

Day remains a time-honored tradition, from the
imagination and spectacle of the Rose Parade seen by
viewers across the world to the picturesque second-half sunset
on the San Gabriel Mountains during the Rose Bowl Game.

The 2022 Rose Bowl Game presented by Capital One Venture X will be held on Jan. 1 in Pasadena, California, with ESPN televising the game at its traditional 5:10 p.m. ET time slot.


After hosting College Football Playoff (CFP) semifinals in 2018 and again last season, the 2022 Rose Bowl Game will once more be guaranteed to feature its longstanding matchup between representatives of the Big Ten and Pac-12 conferences.

In 2012, the Tournament of Roses, Big Ten and Pac-12 announced a 12-year extension through 2026. When the Rose Bowl Game hosts a College Football Playoff Semifinal, a Big Ten and/or Pac-12 program could play in Pasadena if ranked No. 1, 2, 3 or 4 in the final College Football Playoff rankings. In years that Pasadena does not serve as the host for a College Football Playoff Semifinal, the Rose Bowl Game will feature its traditional matchup, hosting the champions of the Big Ten and Pac-12 conferences. If either conference champion finishes the season in the top four of the final CFP rankings, the Rose Bowl Game will select another top team from the conference.

The Rose Bowl Game was the nation's first bowl game, with Michigan earning a victory in the inaugural event in 1902 and has been a pioneer in college football history. The game became the first sporting event to feature a coast-to-coast radio broadcast in 1927. The Pacific Coast (now the Pac-12) and Western (Big Ten) Conferences, along with the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Association, agreed on November 19, 1946, to an exclusive Rose Bowl Game contract, becoming the first bowl with permanent conference affiliations.

The Rose Bowl Game was the first college football game to be broadcast nationally in 1952 and the first to be broadcast in color in 1962. It was also the first game to be broadcast by satellite to Europe in 1968 and to the Far East in 1978. The union of the Big Ten and Pac-12 also led to soaring attendance. Prior to 1947, the Rose Bowl Game drew a small number of sellout crowds. Every game since has been a sellout, and in 1950 became the first postseason contest to surpass 100,000 fans in attendance. Since the pact was initiated in 1946, the Pac-12 holds a narrow 35-31 advantage.

The Rose Bowl Game and the Tournament of Roses have long provided a platform for countless memorable moments for student-athletes, coaches and fans alike, and have been enduring models of passion, strength, tradition and honor. Through more than 100 games, the Rose Bowl Game has sustained its standard of excellence, living up to its nickname as "The Granddaddy of Them All."



BIG TEN BOWL DESTINATIONS

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF & BIG TEN PARTNERS



OVERVIEW

The College Football Playoff is a postseason event to determine college football's national champion on the field, while emphasizing the significance of college football's unique regular season where every game counts.

RANKINGS

The selection committee ranks the teams based on the members' evaluation of the teams' performance on the field, using conference championships won, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, and comparison of results against common opponents to decide among teams that are comparable.

TRADITION

The New Year's holiday period belongs to college football, with two Playoff Semifinal games rotating annually among the Cotton Bowl, Fiesta Bowl, Orange Bowl, Peach Bowl, Rose Bowl Game and Sugar Bowl.

CHAMPIONSHIP MONDAY

The two teams that win the Playoff Semifinals compete for the College Football Playoff National Championship. The national championship game is in a different city each year, always on a Monday night.

UNIVERSAL ACCESS

Every Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) school has equal access to the College Football Playoff based on its performance. No team automatically qualifies.

GOVERNANCE

University presidents and chancellors from all 10 FBS conferences and Notre Dame serve as the board of managers and govern the administrative operations, with commissioners and Notre Dame athletics director (the Management Committee) managing the event. A small staff in the CFP office in Irving, Texas, carries out the day-to-day responsibilities.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

A talented group of 13 high-integrity individuals with experience as coaches, student-athletes, college administrators and journalists, along with sitting athletics directors, comprise the selection committee. Members of the 2021 College Football Playoff Selection Committee are: Mitch Barnhart, Gary Barta (chair), Paola Boivin, Tom Burman, Charlie Cobb, Boo Corrigan, Rick George, Will Shields, Gene Taylor, Joe Taylor, John Urschel, Rod West and Tyrone Willingham.

SELECTION COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

- Rank the top 25 teams and assign the top four to Playoff Semifinal sites.
- Assign teams to selected New Year's bowls.
 - Create competitive matchups.
 - Attempt to avoid rematches of regular-season games and repeat appearances in specific bowls.
 - o Consider geography.

PARTICIPANTS IN THE NEW YEAR'S SIX BOWLS

Both participants in the Orange, Rose and Sugar bowls are contracted outside the playoff arrangement (Big Ten and Pac-12 to Rose Bowl Game; SEC and Big 12 to Sugar Bowl; ACC to Orange Bowl against the highest-ranked available team from the Big Ten, SEC and Notre Dame). If a conference champion qualifies for the playoff, then the bowl will choose a replacement from that conference. When those bowls host the Playoff Semifinals and their contracted conference champions do not qualify, then the displaced champion(s) will play in one of the other New Year's bowls.

When not hosting Playoff Semifinals, the Cotton, Fiesta and Peach bowls will welcome displaced conference champions and the top-ranked champion from a non-contract conference. The highest-ranked available teams will fill any other berths. The selection committee will make the pairings.

AMOS ALONZO STAGG CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHY



OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

Trey Sermon ran for an Ohio State and Big Ten Football Championship Game-record 331 yards, helping the Buckeyes rally for a 22-10 victory over Northwestern and earn a fourth consecutive Big Ten championship on Dec. 19, 2020, at Lucas Oil Stadium in

Indianapolis.

It's the first time Ohio State has won four consecutive outright conference crowns, while Northwestern came away with its second runner-up finish to the Buckeyes in three years.

The 2020 victory was a struggle for Ohio State. After the Buckeyes settled for a field goal on the game's first possession, Northwestern running back Cam Porter answered with a 9-yard TD run late in the first quarter. Ohio State, which had trailed for all of 5 minutes, 5 seconds to that point in the season, fell behind for nearly 32 minutes against Northwestern.

The Buckeyes were behind from that moment until Sermon's 9-yard run with 2:41 left in the third period. Ohio State added a 26-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter, and Sermon, who had 29 carries, sealed the win with a 3-yard scoring run with 4:03 to go.

Ohio State quarterback Justin Fields went 12 of 27 for 114 yards and ran 12 times for 35 yards.

Porter finished with 16 carries and 61 yards. Northwestern quarterback Peyton Ramsey was 24 of 37 for 224 yards but was picked off twice and lost a fumble — all in the second half.



GRANGE-GRIFFIN CHAMPIONSHIP GAME MVP



TREY SERMON RUNNING BACK

Ohio State running back Trey Sermon was named the Grange-Griffin Most Valuable Player of the

2020 Big Ten Football Championship Game after he ran for a school- and game-record 331 yards and two second-half touchdowns, helping the Buckeyes rally for a 22-10 victory over Northwestern.

Sermon carried 29 times in his record-setting performance, but it was his 3-yard scoring run with 4:03 to go that finally sealed the victory against a feisty

Wildcats squad that was seeking its first conference title since 2000.

Sermon's 331 yards eclipsed the previous Big Ten Championship Game record of 220 yards set by another Buckeye, Ezekiel Elliott, in the 2014 contest. Sermon also finished with another game record of 335 all-purpose yards, surpassing Elliott's all-purpose total (220 yards) in 2014.

2020 WINNER

Sermon was the third running back to earn the Grange-Griffin Most Valuable Player award and the second in four years, following Ohio State's J.K. Dobbins in 2017 (the other tailback to receive the honor was Wisconsin's Montee Ball in 2012).

AMOS ALONZO STAGG, CHICAGO (1892-1932) COACH

A coaching pioneer in several sports, Amos Alonzo Stagg coached football at the University of Chicago from 1892-1932, leading the Maroons to national championships in 1905



and 1913. He also coached basketball at the school for one season and was the head baseball coach for 19 seasons. At Chicago, Stagg compiled a 199-94-22 record while the school was a member of the Big Ten, and that wins total ranks second among all Big Ten coaches. His 115 wins in Big Ten games ranks third, and his seven conference titles ties him for fifth. Stagg has been inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. On the basketball court, Stagg developed the game as a five-player sport and was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in 1959 as a member of the Hall's first class. Stagg's name graces two high schools in the United States, and the NCAA Division III Football Championship Game, the Stagg Bowl, is named in his honor.

ARCHIE GRIFFIN, OHIO STATE

(1972-75) RUNNING BACK

Archie Griffin is the only player to win back-to-back Heisman Trophies and is a member of the College Football, Rose Bowl and Ohio State Halls of Fame. He guided



the Buckeyes to four consecutive Big Ten titles.

RED GRANGE, ILLINOIS

(1923-25) HALFBACK

Harold Edward "Red"
Grange was a three-time
consensus All-American,
won the inaugural Silver
Football Award in 1924, and
was inducted into College



Football's inaugural Hall of Fame class in 1951.






Big Brothers Big Sisters, the Boys and Girls Club, and Prison Crusade Ministry.

Independence Bowl. Following his death in April 1986, McClain's name was immortalized on the Wisconsin campus when the Dave McClain Athletic Facility was built in his memory. He was inducted into the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in 2011.

Indianapolis continues to be the Big Ten Conference's home away from home. The Circle City is proud to host the Big Ten Football Championship Game annually for the past 11 years. In March 2022, the Big Ten Women's Basketball Tournament will again take over Gainbridge Fieldhouse, marking the 25th occasion the tournament has been hosted in Indianapolis. The men's basketball tournament returns as well in 2022 for the 13th time.

Indianapolis is deliberately designed for events and is a city that offers unmatched convenience. Downtown hotels, restaurants and pubs, cultural attractions and museums, shopping (including Circle Centre Mall), night life, Lucas Oil Stadium and Bankers Life Fieldhouse, and the expanded Indiana Convention Center are all located within a few blocks of one another. Once in Downtown Indy, you can park the car and get everywhere on foot. There are more than 7,200 hotel rooms within a 10-minute walk of our two state-of-the-art sports venues, and 73,000 parking spaces within the same radius.

In 2018, Forbes called Indy out as "America's Most Underrated City" while Conde Nast Traveler flagged Indy as one of the "Top Big Cities in the U.S.". The 250-acre White River State Park includes the Indiana State Museum, Indianapolis Zoo, a 450-seat IMAX Theater, the Eiteljorg Museum of Western and Indian Art, and the River Promenade. The park also includes the NCAA headquarters and its Hall of Champions. Just a short drive from downtown is the world-famous Indianapolis Motor Speedway and its Museum as well as the Children's Museum of Indianapolis (the largest children's museum in the world). Don't miss the stunning grounds of Newfields, including the famous Robert Indiana LOVE sculpture.

Indianapolis is a safe, clean, vibrant and downright fun place to be, especially when Big Ten excitement takes over the city. It's a big city that has small-town appeal. It's a place where visitors — and the Big Ten family — can feel right at home.

LUCAS OIL STADIUM

Home of the NFL's Indianapolis Colts, Lucas Oil Stadium is a state-of-the-art retractable roof multi-purpose venue which features spectacular views of the downtown Indianapolis skyline. Opened in 2008, the stadium seats more than 67,000 for football games and even more for other events. It boasts seven locker rooms, an operable north window, dual two-level club lounges, 139 suites (including eight at field level), retractable sideline seating, large video boards, ribbon boards, spacious concourses, exhibit halls and meeting rooms. Lucas Oil Stadium has garnered numerous honors in its history, including being named 2009 Sports Facility of the Year by Street and Smith's Sports Business Journal and having their Fieldturf surface ranked as the NFL's best artificial surface in both 2009 and 2010.

The city of Indianapolis and Lucas Oil Stadium play host to an abundance of high-profile sporting and convention events, including the annual Big Ten Football Championship Game, NCAA Men's Basketball Regionals, NCAA Men's Final Four (2010, 2015, 2021, 2026), the annual NFL Scouting Combine, motorsport events, college and high school football, marching band events, concerts, conventions and trade shows. Receiving rave reviews after hosting Super Bowl XLVI, Lucas Oil Stadium proves that it can host events of all sizes, from small gatherings, weddings, and corporate events, all the way to the pinnacle of sports and meetings today.

Covering approximately 1.8 million square feet and welcoming more than one million visitors each year, Lucas Oil Stadium is the place to be. Its ability to connect you to the Indiana Convention Center, Circle Centre Mall and 12 premium hotels without ever having to take a step outside make it the culmination of convenience. In addition, more than 200 restaurants, clubs, museums and a 10-block state park are just a few steps away.
