STORYLINES ABOUND AS KENTUCKY FACES IOWA IN VRBO CITRUS BOWL

Kentucky is returning to the Vrbo Citrus Bowl and this time it will take on Iowa, the alma mater of head coach Mark Stoops, on New Year's Day in Orlando. Game time is 1 p.m. ET and it will air on ABC and the UK Sports Network. The Wildcats defeated Penn State in the 2019 edition of the game following the 2018 season.

The Cats will be looking to extend their non-conference winning streak to 16 games, which is tied with Iowa for the longest active streak in the country. Both programs have won three straight bowl games, tied for the third-longest active streak in FBS.

Offensively, the Wildcats have been guided by quarterback Will Levis, who is completing 66.5 percent of his passes for 2,593 yards and 23 touchdowns. Levis' top target has been Wan'Dale Robinson, who has 94 catches for 1,164 yards and six TDs. The ground game has been paced by Christopher Rodriguez Jr., who has rushed for 1,272 yards and eight scores. The trio is just the second in school history to reach 2,000 yards passing, 1,000 rushing and 1,000 receiving in the same season.

The Kentucky defense has been exceptional at times in 2021, with linebackers Jacquez Jones and DeAndre Square leading the team in tackles, while safety Yusuf Corker and defensive end Josh Paschal are among the SEC leaders in pass breakups and tackles for loss, respectively.

QUICK NOTES

- Kentucky is returning to the Vrbo Citrus Bowl for the second time in the past four seasons, having defeated Penn State, 27-24, on Jan. 1, 2019 to cap a 10-win season.
- UK is ranked No. 20 in the USA Today Coaches Poll and No. 25 in the Associated Press Poll. The Wildcats finished No. 22 in the final CFP rankings.
- Coach Mark Stoops is his ninth season in Lexington. He is 58-53 overall, ranking second in school history in victories behind Paul "Bear" Bryant (60).
- He recently inked a contract extension that will keep him in Lexington through June 2028 with amended financial terms.
- Stoops started his tenure 12-26 but has gone an impressive 46-27 (.630) since that time, moving over .500 for the first time in his term as head coach.
- UK is 11-9 all-time in bowl games. The Cats are appearing in a school-record sixth straight bowl.

- UK has won 15 straight non-conference games, dating back to the 2017 Music City Bowl loss to Northwestern. It is tied for the longest such streak in FBS with Vrbo Citrus Bowl opponent lowa (see page 12).
- UK's 32 victories since the start of the 2018 season rank sixth-most in the SEC.
- Those 32 wins rank 16th among Power Five programs.
- Kentucky is 9-3 for the first time since 2018 and just the third time in the past 44 seasons (1984, 2018, 2021).
- It's the first time since 1949-52 the Cats have had at least eight total victories three times in a four-year span.
- Kentucky finished 5-3 in the SEC for second place in the SEC Eastern Division. It marks the first
 time since the league split into divisions in 1992 that UK ends the season in sole possession of
 second place of the East. UK also has finished in a tie for second in the division on two other
 occasions, 2016 and 2018.
- All three second-place East finishes have been in the last six seasons under Mark Stoops.
- This is the second time since 1977 that UK has posted a winning record in league play, 5-3 this season and also in 2018.
- For just the second time in school history, UK has a 2,000-yard passer (Will Levis), 1,000-yard rusher (Chris Rodriguez Jr.) and 1,000-yard receiver (Wan'Dale Robinson) in a season 2007 was the only other season (Andre' Woodson, Rafael Little, Steve Johnson).
- In the regular season finale, Kentucky routed rival Louisville, 52-21, on the road. The Cats scored 31 unanswered points before the Cardinals scored a pair of touchdowns in the fourth quarter against the reserves ... It was the fourth straight win for UK in the regular season finale, the first time it has done that since 1898-1901.
- The UK offense has scored a touchdown on its opening possession seven times in 12 games.
- Before falling at No. 1 Georgia on Oct. 16, Kentucky had won its previous eight games, marking the fifth-longest win streak in school history.
- Kentucky opened the season 6-0. UK's previous 6-0 starts include 1950 (10-0), 1910 (7-0), 1903 (7-0) and 1898 (7-0).
- Kentucky started 4-0 in the SEC for the fourth time in school history (also 1949, 1950, 1977).
- The win over Florida was Kentucky's first win over a AP top-10 team since a 31-28 win over South Carolina in 2010.
- The Wildcats have the third-most wins among SEC East schools from 2016-21 (46). Only Georgia (64) and Florida (48) have more.
- Kentucky has 11 players in school history who have rushed for at least 1,900 career yards. Four of those have come during Stoops' tenure: Benny Snell Jr. (3,873), Chris Rodriguez Jr. (2,633), Stanley "Boom" Williams (2,511) and A.J. Rose (1,971).
- RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. is second in the SEC and 12th nationally with 106.0 rushing yards per game.
- WR Wan' Dale Robinson is second in the SEC and sixth nationally in receptions per game (7.8) and second in the conference, 15th nationally in receiving yards per game (97.0).
- Guided by defensive coordinator Brad White, UK is 10th in the FBS in fourth down defense (38.7%), 36th in tackles for loss (6.4 per game) and 25th in total defense (336.4).
- Kentucky is 17th nationally in rushing defense (117.2 per game).
- Senior defensive end Josh Paschal ranks second in the SEC and 16th nationally with 1.3 tackles for loss per game. He has 15.5 total TFL this season. His 37.0 tackles for loss in his career, ranks third in UK history. He has charted a TFL in 10 of 12 games, and eight in a row, tied for the second-longest such streak in school history.
- UK has allowed 30 or fewer points in 43 of the past 50 games.
- After entering the lineup in the third game of the season, senior Colin Goodfellow has emerged as one of the nation's best punters, averaging 46.0 yards per kick.
- Jon Sumrall, UK co-defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach, was named head coach at Troy on Dec. 2. Sumrall will rejoin the Wildcats to coach the Vrbo Citrus Bowl.
- During Stoops' tenure, the Wildcats have had nine different starting quarterbacks win a game in Jalen Whitlow, Maxwell Smith, Patrick Towles, Drew Barker, Stephen Johnson, Luke Wright, Lynn Bowden Jr., Terry Wilson and now Will Levis.
- Since 2016, UK is 19-8 (.704) in games decided by seven points or less.
- The Wildcats signed their highest-rated recruiting class in school history in 2022.

MILESTONES TO LOOK FOR...

- Head coach <u>Mark Stoops</u> has 58 career victories at Kentucky, No. 2 on the school's all-time list. Paul "Bear" Bryant is first with 60.
- Coach Stoops now holds the record for most total home wins in school history (41).
- Junior <u>RB Chris Rodriguez Jr.</u> has 2,633 career rushing yards for seventh place on the school's all-time list and is the 10th player in school history to reach 2,000. He needs 15 more yards to tie George Adams (2,648 from 1981-84) at No. 6.
- Rodriguez has 25 career rushing touchdowns and needs one to tie for second in UK history with Moe Williams and Sonny Collins.
- Rodriguez has 14 career 100-yard rushing games, third-most in school history.
- Rodriguez has 1,272 rushing yards this season, seventh-most in school history. He is the 10th Wildcat to reach 1,000 in a season and the 14th time it has been accomplished.
- Junior <u>WR Wan'Dale Robinson</u> has 94 receptions, setting a new school single-season record James Whalen (90, 1999).
- Robinson has 1,164 receiving yards this season, giving him the sixth 1,000-yard receiving season in school history and second-most yards in school history. He needs 147 to tie the record of 1,311 set by Craig Yeast in 1998.
- Robinson (1,164 receiving) and Rodriguez (1,272 rushing) are only the second duo in school
 history to give UK a 1,000-yard rusher and receiver in same season. Steve Johnson (1,041
 receiving) and Rafael Little (1,013 rushing) did it in 2007.
- Senior <u>WR Josh Ali</u> is No. 12 on the all-time receiving yards list with 1,447. He needs 36 more to move up to No. 11 with Tom Hutchinson (1,483 from 1960-62). He also has 131 career receptions, the 18th Wildcat to reach the century mark in catches.
- Junior RB Kavosiey Smoke has 1,306 career rushing yards. He currently sits at No. 30 and needs seven more to move up to No. 29.
- Senior <u>DE Josh Paschal</u> has 37.0 tackles for loss in his career, tied for third with Bud Dupree,
 Vincent Burns and Marlon McCree.
- Senior <u>TE Justin Rigg</u> has played in 62 career games and with an appearance in the bowl game will set a new school record for most career games played.
- All three second-place East finishes have been in the last six seasons under Mark Stoops.
- This is the second time since 1977 that UK has posted a winning record in league play, 5-3 this season and also in 2018.

KENTUCKY IN BOWL GAMES

- The Wildcats own an 11-9 all-time record in bowl games, including a 4-1 record under head coach Mark Stoops.
- UK is appearing in its school-record sixth straight bowl game.
- Kentucky has won three straight bowl games which is tied with lowa for the third-longest active streak in FBS. The Cats defeated Penn State, Virginia Tech and N.C. State.
- This is UK's second appearance in the Citrus Bowl during the six-year bowl run. The Cats ended their 10-win 2018 season in the VRBO Citrus Bowl in Orlando on Jan. 1, 2019, defeating Penn State, 27-24.

KENTUCKY VS. IOWA/BIG TEN

- This marks UK's first meeting in school history against Big Ten member Iowa.
- Kentucky is 29-37-4 all-time against current Big Ten members.
- UK last faced a Big Ten opponent in 2018 in the Citrus Bowl, defeating Penn State, 27-24.

OFFENSE REACHING NEW HEIGHTS

- Kentucky's offensive philosophy under new coordinator Liam Coen has been on full display this season as the Wildcats morphed from a heavy run attack to a more balanced, aggressive style.
- The shift has led to remarkable success in year one with Coen, who came to Lexington after spending time with the NFL's Los Angeles Rams.
- UK is averaging 225.0 passing yards and 206.1 rushing yards per game, which is on pace to be the first season in school history to average at least 200 yards in both facets of the offense.

- UK is one of only 11 teams in the nation (one of only eight among Power 5 teams) that is averaging at least 200 rushing yards and 225 passing yards per game.
- The impressive balance hasn't been smoke and mirrors either, as the unit is averaging 6.57 yards per play (5,173 in 787 plays) for the season. The number would represent the highest yards per play average for a single-season in school history, besting the 6.45 in 1998 with Tim Couch at the helm of Hal Mumme's "Air Raid".
- UK's offense steadily improved throughout the season before exploding in the month of November, averaging 560.8 total yards per game in those four contests. The total was the highest of any Power Five team and second nationally only to Kent State (564.0).
- The offense had the highest 4+ yard rushing percentage of any team in nation, a hat tip to OL coach Eric Wolford's group up front (source: SportSource Analytics). The Wildcats also lead the SEC in rushing yards per attempt with a 5.51 average.
- The 33.3 points per game this season currently ranks fourth in school history for a singleseason.
- 707 total yards vs. New Mexico State is the second-highest total in school history.
- QB Will Levis (2,593 passing yards), RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. (1,272 rushing yards) and WR Wan'Dale Robinson (1,164 receiving yards) became just the second trio in school history to go 2000/1000/1000 in the same season. Andre' Woodson (3,709 passing), Rafael Little (1,013 rushing) and Stevie Johnson (1,041 receiving) was the other in 2007.
- The explosiveness of the passing game has been breathtaking with 35 pass plays of at least 20 yards this season, seven of which are at least 40 yards. The combined totals from the 2019 and 2020 seasons were 36 pass plays of 20+ yards (four of them 40+ yards).
- Other individual records and accomplishments of note on offense include:
 - >> RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. tying the school record with eight 100-yard rushing games.
 - >> WR Wan'Dale Robinson setting the single-season school record with 94 receptions.
 - >> Robinson has the second-most receiving yards in a season and joins Randall Cobb as the only two players in school history with two games in their career of 12 or more catches.
 - >> K Matt Ruffolo setting the single-season school record for PATs with 52.

KINNARD NAMED CONSENSUS ALL-AMERICAN

- Kentucky senior offensive tackle Darian Kinnard was named a 2021 Consensus All-American, becoming the first offensive lineman to receive the honor since All-American Sam Ball in 1965.
 The Wildcats now have 12 consensus All-Americans in school history a total of 14 times.
- It also marks the third time in the last four years a Wildcat has been named a consensus All-American.
- Kinnard joins Bob Gain (1950), Babe Parilli (1950 and 1951), Lou Michaels (1956 and 1957), Sam Ball (1965), Art Still (1977), Tim Couch (1998), James Whalen (1999), Derek Abney (2002), Josh Allen (2018), Lynn Bowden (2019) and Max Duffy (2019) on the prestigious list.

- Kinnard earned first-team All-America honors from four of the five FWAA, Walter Camp and the AP. He was a second-team All-American by The Sporting News.

WILL LEVIS-TATING AS THE STARTING QB

- Quarterback Will Levis earned the starting spot early in fall camp after transferring from Penn State and he has taken his role and run with it.
- His pass efficiency rating of 149.4 rating points is the highest for a UK starting quarterback since Andre' Woodson in the 2006 season (154.5) and third-highest ever for a single season.
- Ranks seventh in the SEC in passing yards per game (216.1) and sixth in passing TDs (23).
- Ranks seventh in the SEC in total offense (248.3 yards per game).
- He has 23 touchdown passes this season, most since Mike Hartline had 23 in 2010.
- He is the first UK quarterback with three 350-yard passing games in one season since Patrick Towles in 2014.
- He is the first Wildcat to have at least 15 rushing touchdowns and five rushing TDs in one season since Jared Lorenzen in 2003.
- His 66.5 completion percentage is the fourth-highest in a season at UK (min. 100 completions).
- Against LSU, named National Offensive Player of the Week by the Walter Camp Football Foundation after accounting for the first five touchdowns (three passing, two rushing) in the win over the Tigers.
- Against Tennessee, he accounted for 419 yards total offense and five touchdowns. He completed 31 of 49 passes for a career-high 372 yards and three touchdowns and, despite being sacked three times, rushed 15 times for a net 47 yards and two TDs.
- His 419 passing yards vs. New Mexico State marked the 12th-highest single-game total in school history. He is the first 400-yard passer since Andre' Woodson threw for 430 vs. Tennessee in
- Against Louisville, he had four rushing touchdowns, tying the school record and earning national honors from both College Football Performance and Manning Award. He became the ONLY quarterback in the nation to be named The Manning Award Quarterback of the Week twice.
- In his UK debut, he passed for 367 yards and four scores. List of QBs since 2000 to have at least 350 passing yards with at least 4 passing TDs and at least a 65% completion percentage in a victory in his first career start at an SEC school: J.T. Daniels, Georgia vs. Miss. St. (2020) and Will Levis, vs. ULM (2021).



IT'S A WAN'DERFUL LIFE

- The Cats scored big in the offseason when Nebraska transfer Wan'Dale Robinson, a Frankfort, Kentucky native, transferred back to the Commonwealth.
- He has 94 catches this season, setting a new Kentucky single-season record. He surpassed James Whalen's 90 (1999).
- He has 1,164 receiving yards, the second-most in a season in school history.
- He was named First-Team All-SEC by Pro Football Focus and Phil Steele and Second-Team All-SEC by both the coaches and Associated Press.
- Through 12 games, Robinson ranks sixth nationally and second in the SEC with 7.8 rpg.
- He is 17th nationally and second in the SEC in receiving yards per game (97.0), and seventh in the SEC in all-purpose yards per game (107.9). He currently has 11 plays of 30+ yards.
- He has five 100-yard games this season, tied with James Whalen (1999) for second place on the UK single-season list.
- Robinson has two games with at least 12 receptions. He joins Randall Cobb as the only two players in school history to have multiple games in their career with at least 12 receptions.

- Against Tennessee, he set career highs with 13 receptions for 166 yards. The 13 catches ties for second-most in a game in UK history, most since Lynn Bowden Jr. at Missouri in 2018.
- He became the first UK player with at least nine catches in three straight games since Anthony White in 1998.
- Robinson showed he was worth all the hype in the opener vs. ULM, hauling in a pair of touchdown receptions as he roasted the coverage on his way to 125 yards on five catches.
- With an 111-yard performance in week three, he became the first Wildcat to have threestraight 100-yard receiving games since Derek Abney in 2001 and the first ever to have threestraight 100-yard receiving games to begin a season.
- Against New Mexico State he caught eight passes for a career-best 181 yards. The 181 yards is the fourth-highest single-game total in school history and most since Craig Yeast's schoolrecord 269 vs. Vanderbilt in 1998.

- Junior RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. has 1,272 rushing yards this season and is one of the nation's top running backs. The total ranks seventh on UK's single-season rushing list.

- His eight 100-yard rushing games in 2021 are tied for the singleseason school record with Artose Pinner's eight in 2002.
- He currently has rushed for 100 yards or more in four consecutive games, tying for the third-longest streak in school history.
- Named to First-Team All-SEC by the Associated Press and Second-Team Coaches All-SEC.
- He has 2,633 career rushing yards, seventh place in school history and is the 10th player in school history to reach 2,000 career yards.
- Rodriguez rushed for a touchdown in five consecutive games, second-longest streak in school history, before seeing it end vs. Chattanooga.
- He has 25 career rushing touchdowns, tied for fourth-most in school history and just one behind Moe Williams and Sonny Collins (26) for
- He ranks third in yards per carry for his career (min. 200) at 6.63.

SIMPLY STOOPS-ENDOUS

UK head coach Mark Stoops has proven to be an excellent hire, turning around a struggling program and making him the first UK coach to lead the program to a sixth consecutive bowl appearance. He also has erased a number of the long-standing hurdles and streaks in the program's history. The accomplishments include, but aren't limited to:

- First New Year's Day bowl win since 1951 (2018)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First winning SEC record since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First ranking in the final AP Poll since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 season (2018)
- First win at Florida since 1979 (2018)
- Ended 31-game losing streak to Florida (2018) and followed up by ending a 35-year home drought against the Gators on Oct. 2, 2021.
- First win at Tennessee since 1984 (2020)
- Stoops is the first UK coach to defeat Florida and Tennessee both home and away since Fran Curci (1976, 1977).
- Eight-game winning streak (2020-21), fifth-longest in school history and longest in 44 years, since a 10-game streak in the 1977 season.
- Stoops currently holds school records for most games coached (111), most home wins (41), total SEC wins (29).
- Stoops was named one of 16 head coaches named to the Dodd Trophy Midseason Watch List by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation and Peach Bowl, Inc. He also was on the American Heart Association's 2021 Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year Award watch list.
- After two games of the 2016 season, his record was 12-26 but he has gone 46-27 (.630) since. Overall, Stoops is now 58-53 at Kentucky and

- Senior defensive end Josh Paschal's story is well-chronicled, his return from cancer a remarkable testament to his courage and perseverance. But focusing solely on that would do a disservice to his on-field exploits.
- The All-American and Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year finalist has an incredible stat line this season that reads: 53 tackles, a team-high 15.5 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks, a team-high eight quarterback hurries, one forced fumble and a blocked kick.
- He was named Second-Team All-America by CBS Sports and USA Today and First-Team All-SEC by The Associated Press. He also excels in the classroom, earning Academic All-America Second Team by CoSIDA.
- "The most underappreciated defensive player in the SEC" as described by SEC Network analyst Gene Chizik.

- Kinnard earned the SEC's prestigious Jacobs Blocking Trophy, just the second time a UK player has won the top blocking award since its inception in 1935 (also Warren Bryant in 1976.)

HORSEY NAMED TO ALLSTATE AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM

- Junior offensive guard Kenneth Horsey was one of 22 student-athletes, including one of just 11 football players from the FBS, to be named to the 2021 Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team®. The team honors football players for their dedication to community service and the positive impact they have made on the lives of others.
- Horsey, was the 2020 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year, has a remarkable comeback story that has inspired his community service work for heart health.

- In the spring of 2018, before he was to arrive at Kentucky for his freshman season. he was complaining of a pain in his side. His parents rushed him to the emergency room where doctors ultimately found a growth on one of his heart valves. He went through open-heart surgery on April 8, 2018 and was even told by a few doctors that his football career was over. However, Horsey would not be deterred. He came to Kentucky and redshirted the 2018 season with a goal of earning a starting spot on Kentucky's offensive line, affectionately known as the "Big Blue Wall." In 2019, he saw action in four games and continued to train and prepare his body for the rigors of the Southeastern Conference. Since his surgery in 2018, he has lost 50 pounds and because of his hard work and dedication, has earned the starting left guard spot on the "Big Blue Wall." He started in eight games played in 2020, helping the Wildcats rank fifth in the Southeastern Conference in rushing offense (187.4) and is the current starter at left guard on the 2021 squad.
- Because of his heart condition and how supported he felt through his surgery and recovery, he began volunteering with the Lexington chapter of the American Heart Association in 2020. In September, Horsey was even awarded the Finn Collier Service Award by the AHA in recognition of his work to support its lifesaving mission – to be a relentless force for a world of longer, healthier lives.
- Horsey coordinated and planned a handsonly CPR training for the UK Football team and staff in the spring of 2021 and helped plan a Hands-Only CPR media availability on June 14 that promoted Hands-Only CPR awareness to the media for CPR Awareness Month.
- Kentucky has the second-most honorees on the national Good Works Team with 17. Horsey is the fifth player under head coach Mark Stoops to be named to the prestigious team, including the third straight - Landon Young, 2019; Luke Fortner, 2020. He's also the third straight offensive lineman named to the team.

- The six picks are the tied for the fourthmost in school history and the most since 1979 (eight). Five of the six picks were defensive players.
- The six picks are the most for Kentucky since the current seven-round draft era began in 1994.
- It marked the second time in the last three years that Kentucky had five or more draft picks (five in 2019).
- For the second time in the last three years, Kentucky had a first- and second-round pick in Jamin Davis, first round and Kelvin Joseph, second round. Prior to that, you have to go back 42 years to find two UK picks in the first two rounds (Warren Bryant and Randy Burke, first round 1977).







In total, 18 players have been drafted under head coach Mark Stoops, including 12 defensive players in Avery Williamson, Bud Dupree, Za'Darius Smith, Josh Forrest, Josh Allen, Lonnie Johnson, Mike Edwards, Jamin Davis, Kelvin Joseph, Quinton Bohanna, Brandin Echols.

KENTUCKY'S YOUNGSTOWN BOYS

A neighbor of Pittsburgh, a.k.a. Steel City USA, Youngstown, Ohio has a reputation as a blue collar community defined by hard work and relationships forged over generations that are stronger than steel. Kentucky's football program is, in many ways, defined by that bond as it creates a southern alumni club from Youngstown, the hometown of head coach Mark Stoops and several other key members of the program. UK ALUMNUS TIM COUCH INDUCTED INTO NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL HOF/LISTED ON COLLEGE FOOTBALL HOF BALLOT

- Former UK quarterback Tim Couch was one of seven athletes inducted into the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) National High School Hall of Fame on July 1 in Orlando. Couch has also been named to the 2022 ballot for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame. That announcment will be made in early 2022.
- During his football career at Leslie County High School in Hyden. Kentucky in the mid-1990s, Couch set three national career passing records – 872 completions, 12,104 yards and 133 touchdowns. He helped Leslie County to a 13-1 record as a junior while completing an amazing 75 percent of his passes – a national record that stood for 15 years. As a senior, he passed for 42 touchdowns and led his team to an 11-3 mark, and he was named Gatorade and USA Today National Player of the Year while earning Mr. Football honors in Kentucky. ESPN.com selected Couch the sixth-best high school athlete in history. Couch was equally dominant on the basketball court. He scored 3,023 points in his career, leading the state in scoring as a senior at 37 points per game. He was two-time all-state in basketball. Couch's football prowess continued at the University of Kentucky, where he passed for 8,159 yards and 73 touchdowns in his final two seasons. He led Kentucky to the Outback Bowl after his junior season and was fourth in the Heisman Trophy voting. Couch was the No. 1 pick in the 1999 NFL draft by the Cleveland Browns and passed for more than 11,000 yards and 64 touchdowns in his five years with the Browns.

OFFENSIVE QUICK HITTERS

• Excitement is in the air as the Cats' new offense scheme, directed by offensive coordinator Liam Coen, has taken shape this season. The former quarterbacks coach for the Los Angeles Rams brings a prostyle offense to the Bluegrass and it's a welcomed change. UK threw just 243 passes for 1,336 yards last season, ranking 14th in the SEC in passing offense.

- UK's offense is built around a solid group of six offensive starters which includes "super seniors" wide receiver Josh Ali, offensive guard Luke Fortner and tight end Justin Rigg. Also returning is wide receiver DeMarcus Harris, offensive guard Kenneth Horsey and preseason All-America tackle Darian Kinnard.
- Leading returning rusher Chris Rodriguez Jr. is UK's most productive offensive threat from a year ago. He finished fifth in the SEC in rushing in 2020 with 119 rushes for 785 yards (87.2 ypg) in just nine games. He's currently the SEC's second-leading rusher with 106.0 yards per game.
- The "Big Blue Wall" returns three starters from 2020 in Darian Kinnard, Kenneth Horsey and Luke Fortner. Through 12 games this season the entirety of the line has 119 combined career starts and recently was named a semifinalist for the Joe Moore Award for the third straight season.
- Kentucky scored 42 points against LSU and Tennessee, the first time in UK history that the Wildcats scored at least 42 points against two Southeastern Conference opponents in the same season.

QUARTERBACKS

- · During Stoops' tenure, the Wildcats have had nine different starting quarterbacks win a game in Jalen Whitlow, Maxwell Smith, Patrick Towles, Drew Barker, Stephen Johnson, Luke Wright, Lynn Bowden Jr., Terry Wilson and now Will Levis.
- Levis earned the starting spot early in fall camp and was sensational in his UK debut, passing for 367 yards and four scores. It was the most passing yards for a Wildcat in his debut and the most for any UK quarterback since Drew Barker in 2016.
- For more on Levis, see p. 8 of these notes.
- With starting lineups available since 1993, he is the first UK quarterback since that time to win his first six starts.
- Sophomore **Beau Allen** is the backup. He has played in three games this season, completing 8 of 12 passes for 92 yards while also running for a three-yard TD vs. NMSU.

WIDE RECEIVERS

• Kentucky has 19 total wide receivers this fall, and it includes a mix of experience and young talent. Twelve of the 19 are returners,

- while seven are newcomers to the program.
- Three players had a 50+ yard reception vs. ULM in Josh Ali, Isaiah Epps and Wan'Dale Robinson). The last time UK had three different players with a 50+ yard reception in the same game was October 25, 2014 vs. Mississippi State (Javess Blue, Demarco Robinson and Rvan Timmons).
- UK had two 100-yard receivers against ULM, the first time that's happened since 2011 vs. Ole Miss (La'Rod King and Matt Roark). It happened again vs. New Mexico State.
- The top returning pass catcher from last season is Josh Ali. He currently has 131 career receptions for 1,447 yards and eight scores.
- He was a blur in the opener, going over 100 yards for the first time in his career while hauling in five balls for 136 yards and a score.
- In his final home game vs. New Mexico State, he caught seven balls for a career-high 164 yards and a career-best two touchdowns. He averaged 23.4 yards per catch in that game, second-highest in school history for a player with at least seven receptions. Dee Smith averaged 24.3 yards per catch (7 for 170) vs. Tennessee in 1987.
- Wan'Dale Robinson has proven to be every bit the home run threat the Cats thought they were getting when he transferred back home from Nebraska (see page 9 of this release). He ranks as one of the nation's most explosive playmakers.
- Wan'Dale Robinson went over 100 receiving yards in each of the first three games and has 111 yards on seven rushes. He had career bests with 13 catches for 166 yards vs. Tennessee, then bested the yardage total with 181 vs. New Mexico State.
- Robinson has six 100-yard games this season, one shy of the UK single-season record.
- His 94 receptions is a school record for a season and ranks fourth nationally in 2021.

TIGHT ENDS

- The tight ends have played a role in the growth of the passing game this season. They have 43 catches for 378 yards and eight scores this season. Four tight ends have caught a pass.
- The tight ends were key blockers for UK's explosive running game last season, which averaged nearly 200 yards per game and ranked third in the SEC.
- Senior Justin Rigg is back after taking advantage of the NCAA's blanket eligibility waiver for all 2020 fall student-athletes due

to COVID-19. Rigg has 48 career receptions for 536 yards and five scores, two of which came against New Mexico State on Senior Day 2021.

- UK received a huge blow when it was announced that junior Keaton Upshaw would miss the season due to injury. Upshaw had 16 catches for 198 yards and three TDs in 2020, both leading the tight end corps and ranking second on the team overall.
- In spring practice and preseason camp, coaches spoke very highly about junior Brenden Bates and he made them look prophetic as he caught his first UK touchdown with a four-yard score vs. ULM.
- Another addition to the room is sophomore Izayah Cummings who moved from wide receiver to tight end during fall camp and made an immediate impression at his new position, catching his first touchdown pass in the win over Chattanooga (31 yards). He also caught a TD in back-to-back games against Tennessee and Vanderbilt.

RUNNING BACKS/FULLBACKS

• Veteran running backs coach John Settle was hired in March of 2021 after spending









the last six seasons and 11 years total at Wisconsin.

- The running back room features juniors Chris Rodriguez Jr. and Kavosiey Smoke most heavily but also can utilize youngsters JuTahn McClain, La'Vell Wright and Mike Drennen.
- Rodriguez got off to a great start with 125 vards and a touchdown in the season opener vs. ULM, his seventh career 100-yard game.
- He was even better in the SEC opener vs. Missouri, setting new career highs with 207 yards on 27 attempts and two touchdowns.
- Rodriguez now ranks seventh in school history with 2,633 rushing yards.
- Rodriguez has proven nearly impossible to bring down behind the line of scrimmage, having lost yardage on just 12 of his 397 career rushing attempts. In 2020, he lost vards on his first attempt of the season before starting a streak of 105 consecutive carries of positive yards.
- Rodriguez has scored a touchdown once every 15.9 rush attempts in his career (25 in 397 attempts). By comparison, UK all-time leading rusher and scorer Benny Snell Jr. hit paydirt once every 15.4 rush attempts.
- For more on Rodriguez, see page 9 of these
- Smoke has played in 34 career games and has 1,306 yards. He currently averages 5.51 per carry. He had a career-high 104 yards in the win over LSU.

OFFENSIVE LINE

- John Schlarman was Kentucky's offensive line coach for eight seasons before passing away on Nov. 12, 2020 after a two-year battle with cancer.
- Eric Wolford was hired to replace Schlarman in December of 2020 after four seasons at South Carolina.
- The O-line, known as the "Big Blue Wall" returns three of five starters from 2020 in Darian Kinnard, Kenneth Horsey and Luke Fortner.
- The addition of LSU transfer Za'Darius "Dare" Rosenthal in July was a huge boost for the "Big Blue Wall." The 6-foot-7, 327-pound offensive tackle played in 13 career games with eight career starts for the Tigers. He has started every game this season for UK at left tackle.
- Two big losses that needed replacing in 2021 are All-SEC center Drake Jackson and All-SEC left tackle Landon Young. Jackson started in

- 44 consecutive games at center, while Young was a starter at left tackle for 24 straight games.
- Kinnard (45 career games, 38 career starts) held down the right tackle position since he entered the starting lineup at the end of the 2018 season. He has been excellent in 2021, earning consensus All-America honors and being named one of six semifinalists for the coveted Outland Trophy.
- Fortner (54 career games, 35 career starts) is another "super senior" who provided the coaching staff with a late Christmas present when he announced he'd return for the 2021 season. He started in 10 games at right guard in 2020 and graded at 82.9 percent with 26 knockdowns and 146 blocks at the point of attack.
- Fortner moved to center for 2021 and is starting at that position. He already has been named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week twice this season, following wins vs. ULM and at South Carolina. He earned firstteam All-SEC honors by SEC Coaches.

- Horsey (24 career games, 20 career starts) manned the left guard spot last season, starting in eight games. An interesting note about Horsey - he had open-heart surgery in April of 2018 and was named winner of the 2020 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year. He graded at 82.6 percent, had 17 knockdowns and 93 blocks at the point of attack.
- Sophomore Eli Cox has emerged at right guard, earning Associated Press and ESPN Midseason All-America honors. He has been described as, pound-for-pound, perhaps the strongest player on the team. He made first collegiate start in the opener vs. ULM. Against Missouri, he scored the game-winning touchdown by recovering a fumble in the end zone. Unfortunately, Cox sustained an injury against Tennessee and will miss the final three games of the season, plus the bowl game.
- The "Big Blue Wall," along with UK tight ends, have helped Kentucky post six consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more







2021 TEAM CAPTAINS

Eight Wildcats – including six seniors – were voted as team captains for the 2021 football campaign. Senior defensive end Josh Paschal becomes the first player in school history to be elected team captain three straight seasons. Along with Paschal, the team's permanent season captains include returning captains Josh Ali, Yusuf Corker, DeAndre Square, and first-time captains Luke Fortner, Marquan McCall, Will Levis and Chris Rodriguez Jr. Game captains will be decided on a week-by-week basis. DEFENSIVE QUICK HITTERS

- Defensive coordinator Brad White is in his third season as the defensive coordinator, his fourth as the outside linebackers coach at UK. Also helping with the coordinator duties is former Wildcat and inside linebackers coach Jon Sumrall. He added co-defensive coordinator title to his resume in 2020.
- Guided by defensive coordinator Brad White, UK is 10th in the FBS in fourth down defense (38.7%), 36th in tackles for loss (6.4 per game) and 25th in total defense (336.4).
- Kentucky is 17th nationally in rushing defense (117.2 per game).
- The depth and experience was on display in the opener as:
- The Kentucky defense limited ULM to 87 total yards. That's the fewest in a game in 33 years, since holding Central Michigan to 78 total yards in the 1988 season opener.
- UK held ULM to 17 net rushing yards, fewest since Eastern Michigan had 13 rushing yards in 2017.
- Ten seniors started on defense against ULM.
 With starting lineups available since 1993, it is the most seniors starting on offense or defense in a season opener since that time.
- The Wildcats turned in a sterling defensive performance in the win at South Carolina

as well ... UK limited the Gamecocks to 10 points, 51 total plays, 58 net rushing yards (2.2 per attempt), 216 total yards, 3 of 12 on third-down conversions and 0 of 3 on fourth down ... UK turned it over three times against the Gamecocks but Wildcats held on all three of the ensuing possessions.

DEFENSIVE LINE

- Former Wildcat Anwar Stewart is in his second season coaching the defensive line. His unit is a position of strength for UK despite losing two key starters in All-SEC nose guard Quinton Bohanna (Dallas Cowboys) and defensive tackle Phil Hoskins (Carolina Panthers).
- Returning senior Josh Paschal moved from outside linebacker to defensive end in 2020 and was a shining star in his new role.
- Paschal has 37 career TFL and 13.5 sacks, along with three blocked kicks. He ranks tied for third on the school's all-time TFL list.
- This season, Paschal leads the team in tackles for loss (15.5) and quarterback hurries (8).
- He has earned second-team All-America and first-team All-SEC honors this season.
- Another senior who is playing a major role
 on the defensive line this season is Marquan
 "Bully" McCall. His mountainous force in
 the middle wreaks havoc on opponents. He
 currently has seven tackles, 3.5 for loss and
 two QBH this season. He missed three games
 because of an ankle injury. before returning
 at Vanderbilt.
- Josaih Hayes and Justin Rogers shared the noseguard position in McCall's absence and each have shown flashes of their potential.
- Octavious Oxendine (2.0 sacks vs. LSU) emerged as the starting defensive tackle

but has been lost for the season because of injury. Senior **Abule Abadi-Fitzgerald** (2.0 sacks vs. Tennessee) has been starting in place of Oxendine.

SECONDARY

- The secondary unit is in the hands of two of the most energetic and talented young coaches in Chris Collins and Frank Buffano.
- UK has ranked in the top four of the SEC in pass defense, including leading the league in both 2019 and 2020, for three straight seasons.
- UK also led the SEC and ranked third nationally in total interceptions (16) in 2020, eight coming from the secondary.
- Returning cornerbacks Cedrick Dort, Jr.
 (43 career games, 25 career starts), and
 Carrington Valentine have starting experience
 under their belts.
- Another "super senior" looking to take his game to the next level is corner Quandre Mosely (35 career games, three career starts). He had a pick-six on Senior Day.
- At safety, "super senior" Yusuf Corker (48 career games, 35 career starts) is one of the SEC's most underrated players. For the season, he is tied for fourth in the SEC in pass breakups with eight.
- Safety Tyrell Ajian (47 career games, 22 career starts) led UK in the win over Missouri with a career-high eight tackles and sealed the Chattanooga win with a 95-yard interception return for a score in the fourth quarter.
- Safety Davonte Robinson (48 career games, 17 career starts), another "super senior," is back from a quadriceps injury that robbed him of the 2019 season.
- Safety Jalen Geiger made his first career start on Nov. 13, 2021 at Vanderbilt and made it memorable with a 31-yard interception return for a touchdown.

LINEBACKERS

- Only three letterwinners in sophomores
 K.D. McDaniel and J.J. Weaver and senior
 Jordan Wright returned for White's outside linebackers group.
- Wright and Weaver both got off to good starts this season -- Wright with six tackles, two TFL, a sack and a pass breakup while Weaver had 1.5 sacks in the opener. Weaver had a huge defensive play vs. Missouri with an eight-yard sack on the Tigers' final



- possession. He leads the team in sacks with 6.0. Wright had a crucial interception against Florida to set up a touchdown.
- The inside linebackers are led by lone returning starter **DeAndre Square** (48 career games, 34 career starts). He was UK's secondleading tackler in 2019 (69) and in 2020 he ranked third on the team (60).
- Square is second on the team in tackles with 74 and tackles for loss with nine. He also has three quarterback hurries.
- Transfer Jacquez Jones was a three-year letterwinner who played in 33 games with 19 starts, totaling 182 tackles in his Ole Miss career. In 2020, he led the Rebels with 75 tackles, while adding 2.5 tackles for loss and three quarterback hurries.
- Jones has started every game and has 86 tackles, ranking 13th in the SEC in total tackles. He has made three huge plays in pass defense -- an interception vs. Missouri, a touchdown-saving pass breakup vs.
 Chattanooga and game-saving tipped pass to seal the Florida win.
- He had a career-high 18 tackles at Mississippi State.
- Highly-regarded freshmen Martez Thrower (Rochella, Ga.) and Trevin Wallace (Jesup, Ga.) have showcased why they were two of Georgia's top prep defensive players.
- Wallace helped turn the Florida game when he caught a blocked field goal in midair and raced untouched 76 yards for the go-ahead touchdown. Making his first collegiate start at Mississippi State, he notched 12 tackles and was named SEC Freshman of the Week. For the season, he has 32 tackles and was named to the Freshman All-SEC team.

- Returning are placekicker Matt Ruffolo, kickoff specialist Chance Poore, long snapper Cade Degraw, punt returner Josh Ali and kick returner Zach Johnson.
- Ali notched his first career punt return for a touchdown when he scampered 74 yards vs.
 Mississippi State on Oct. 30.
- Senior Colin Goodfellow was on the watch list for the Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's top punter. He is third in the SEC by averaging 46.0 yards per punt this season, with 11 ending inside the opponent 20-yard line.
- Against Georgia, Goodfellow had a careerlong 70-yard punt and an additional



- 63-yarder. It is the only time in school history a punter has had two punts of 63 yards or longer with one being at least 70 yards.
- He followed that performance by booming another 70-yard punt vs. Mississippi State, making him the first player in school history to have two punts of 70 or more yards in his career.
- Ruffolo, a "super senior" who took advantage of the NCAA's blanket waiver due to the COVID-19 pandemic, was UK's starting placekicker last season. This season, he has made 8-of-11 field goals, with two misses coming on blocked kicks caused by a breakdown in protection.
- For his career, Ruffolo has made 24-of-30 FG and 92-of-98 PAT. Making 80 percent of his field goals places him third on the UK career list.
- Ruffolo's 52 PATs this season is a new UK single-season record.
- Poore handles kickoffs for the Wildcats. He also has placekicking experience.

2021 GAME REVIEWS

KENTUCKY 45, ULM 10

SEPT. 4, 2021 • LEXINGTON, KY. KROGER FIELD (47.693)



Will Levis passed for 367 yards and four touchdowns as Kentucky opened its 2021 season with a 45-10 win over Louisiana-Monroe at Kroger Field.

Two Wildcats had more than 100 yards receiving in the game. Senior Josh Ali had five receptions for 136 yards and a touchdown while junior Wan'Dale Robinson had five catches for 125 yards and two scores. Isaiah Epps nearly made it a trio, catching three passes for 83 yards.

On the ground, Chris Rodriguez Jr. went over 100 yards for the seventh time in his career. The junior rushed

19 times for 125 yards and a touchdown.

Kentucky (1-0) had 564 yards of total offense in the first game under new offensive coordinator Liam Coen. UK finished with 419 yards passing and 145 yards on the ground.

Levis became the first UK passer to throw for over 300 yards since Stephen Johnson had 338 against Louisville in 2016.

Meanwhile, the Kentucky defense more than did its job against ULM. The Cats held the Warhawks to 87 total yards (70 passing, 17 rushing) in the game. ULM had 43 yards on its first drive of the game, then 44 yards the rest of the game.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed 27 times for 207 yards and three touchdowns as Kentucky won its Southeastern Conference opener over Missouri 35-28 at Kroger Field.

For Rodriguez, both the number of carries and the yards rushing were career highs. The junior from McDonough, Georgia, also caught a pass for a touchdown. His four touchdowns tied a school record.

Will Levis connected on 10 of 18 passing for 179 yards with a touchdown and an interception in the game. Levis' main target was Wan'Dale Robinson, who had a big game

in his own right. The Frankfort native led the Cats with 101 yards receiving on five catches. He also had three carries for 73 yards in the game.

Kentucky (2-0, 1-0 SEC) turned to the ground game in this one, rushing for 341 yards while passing for 179. The Cats ended the game with 520 yards of total offense, compared to just 398 for Missouri.

On defense, safety Tyrell Ajian led the Cats with eight tackles, while J.J. Weaver had another big game with a sack and two tackles for loss.

KENTUCKY 28, CHATTANOOGA 23

SEPT. 18. 2021 • LEXINGTON. KY. KROGER FIELD (55.214)



Will Levis connected on 23 of 35 passing for 246 yards and two touchdowns as Kentucky overcame a sluggish effort to beat Chattanooga 28-23.

With the Cats clinging to a 21-16 lead in the fourth quarter, Tyrell Ajian made the play that saved the game. Ajian intercepted a Chattanooga pass at the UK five and returned it 95 yards for what turned out to be the game-cliniching touchdown.

Wan'Dale Robinson was Levis' favorite target on Saturday, catching eight passes for 111 yards. He became

the first UK player since Derek Abney in 2001 to have three straight 100-yard receiving games.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. led UK with 46 rushing yards, although the Kentucky run game was not as effective as it was last week against Missouri. The Cats had 102 yards rushing on 27 carries in the game.

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and methodically marched down the field, using a combination of running and passing. The nine-play drive consisted of five plays and four rushes and ended with an 11-yard touchdown rush by Josh Ali, the first rushing touchdown of his career. Matt Ruffolo added the extra point and the Cats grabbed a 7-0 lead with 10:43 to play in the first quarter.

But the rest of the game was not that easy. The game was tight throughout until Ajian's interception sealed the deal. Still, Chattanooga rallied to cut the UK lead to 28-23, but their onside kick attempt failed and Kentucky hung on to win.

Kentucky returned to action the following week, hitting the road for the first time this season. The Cats visited Williams-Brice Stadium to face South Carolina.

Rodriguez led the charge on the ground as the Cats rushed 44 times for 230 yards in the game. Kavosiey Smoke had 50 yards and a touchdown on nine carries and quarterback Will Levis carried five times for 30 yards.

Levis connected on 15 of 22 through the air for 102 yards in the game. Wan'Dale Robinson was his favorite

target on this night, catching seven passes for 65 yards.

Kentucky (4-0, 2-0 SEC) got a big defensive effort in the game. The Cats held the Gamecocks to 216 total yards and just 58 yards on the ground. UK had five tackles for loss, including a pair of sacks, in the contest. DeAndre Square led the defensive charge with eight tackles, while Carrington Valentine had four tackles, including a sack. Josh Paschal blocked a field goal that Trevin Wallace returned 76 yards for a touchdown as No. 23 Kentucky upset ninth-ranked Florida 20-13 at Kroger Field.

With Florida holding a 10-7 advantage in the third quarter, Paschal used all of his 6-3 frame to successfully block the 48-yard Jace Christmann attempt. Trevin Wallace then snatched the ball at the Kentucky 24 and rapidly sped down the sideline 76 yards until reaching the end zone, giving UK a lead that it would never surrender.

It was the UK defense and special teams that carried

the team all evening, as Kentucky beat Florida in Lexington for the first time since 1986 and for just the second time in the last 35 meetings.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. carried the offensive load for the Cats with 99 yards and a touchdown in the game. Quarterback Will Levis was six of 15 through the air for 74 yards and a score.

DeAndre Square led the defensive attack with 13 tackles, while Jacquez Jones had nine tackles, one tackle for loss and a pass breakup on Florida's final offensive play of the game. Paschal has seven tackles, including two and a half for loss, in addition to the blocked kick, the third of his UK career.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed for 147 yards and quarterback Will Levis accounted for five touchdowns as No. 16/14 Kentucky topped LSU 42-21 at Kroger Field.

With the win, Kentucky moved to 6-0 on the season and 4-0 in the SEC. It's the first time Kentucky has been 6-0 since 1950 and just the fifth time in school history.

Kavosey Smoke also had a big night on the ground for the Cats, amassing 104 yards rushing. UK quarterback Will Levis had 75 yards and two touchdowns on the ground as Kentucky rushed for 330 yards as a team.

Levis hit on 14 of 17 passing for 145 yards and three touchdowns. Wan'Dale Robinson was the favorite target for Levis on this evening, catching eight passes for 60 yards and a score.

LSU (3-3, 1-3) took the opening possession and made a pair of first downs before the UK defense made yet another big play. DeAndre Square sacked LSU quarterback Max Johnson and forced a fumble that was recovered by Josaih Hayes at the LSU 44 yard line.

Kentucky would convert the turnover into points. The Cats drove into the LSU red zone and, on fourth-and-goal from the three, Levis connected with Rodriguez on a touchdown pass in the right side of the end zone. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and UK grabbed a 7-0 lead with 6:17 to play in the first quarter.

From there, the Cats would never look back, building the lead as large as 35-7 before settling for the 21-point victory.

Will Levis passed for 198 yards and two scores but it was not enough as No. 11 Kentucky fell at top-ranked Georgia, 30-13.

Levis connected on 32 of his 42 passes, including one-yard touchdown strikes to Justin Rigg and Wan'Dale Robinson in the game. The Cats struggled to run the ball, amassing just 51 yards on the ground against the nation's number one defense.

Kentucky's defense was led by Josh Paschal, who had six tackles, including one for a loss, and Georgia native

Yusuf Corker, who had five tackles, one for a loss and a pass breakup.

The teams were scoreless after one period of play. But early in the second quarter, Georgia took a 7-0 lead. After a Kentucky punt, Georgia would score again, and the Bulldogs led 14-0 in the second quarter.

Kentucky had its best drive of the first half on its next possession. The Cats used a nice mix of running and passing plays, including a hook-and-ladder, to get into the Georgia red zone. Levis connected with Chris Rodriguez Jr. on a swing pass to get the Cats to the UGA one. From there, Levis connected with tight end Justin Rigg for a one-yard touchdown pass. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and Georgia led 14-7 after a 15-play, 75-yard drive.

But the Cats could get no closer.

Kentucky (6-2, 4-2 SEC) had just 66 yards rushing on Saturday, well below the Cats' season average. Chris Rodriguez Jr. led UK with eight carries for 34 yards.

Wan'Dale Robinson caught nine passes for 79 yards to

lead the Cats in that department. No other Wildcat had more than two catches.

The UK defense spent a lot of time on the field in the game and the tackling numbers reflected that. UK had four players with double-figure tackles on Saturday. Unfortunately, the Cats would fall behind and eventually drop their second straight contest.

Quarterback Will Levis connected on 31 of 49 through the air for 372 yards and three touchdowns with an interception. Levis also rushed 15 times for 47 yards and two touchdowns.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. led the Cats' ground attack with 109 yards on 22 carries. Wide receiver Wan'Dale Robinson caught 13 passes for 166 yards and a score.

The teams would go back and forth all night but in the end, the Vols held on for the tight win.

Quarterback Will Levis connected on 14 of his 22 passes for 177 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Chris Rodriguez Jr. had 114 yards rushing and a touchdown, while JuTahn McClain had a career high 69 yards on 10 carries.

Wan'Dale Robinson caught six passes for 75 yards and a score, while Josh Ali caught four balls for 58 yards.

Kentucky (7-3, 5-3 SEC) had 413 yards of total offense in the game, with 236 yards rushing and 177 of it coming

Quarterback Will Levis passed for a career high 412 yards and four touchdowns as Kentucky beat New Mexico State 56-16 on Senior Day at Kroger Field.

Kentucky (8-3) amassed 707 yards of total offense in the game, the second-highest total in school history. Kentucky's only greater output came when the Cats piled up 801 yards against Louisville on Sept. 5, 1998.

Levis connected on 21 of 31 through the air on his way to the most passing yards by a UK quarterback in 14 years (Andre Woodson had 430 against Tennessee in 2007).

Wan'Dale Robinson was on the receiving end of eight of those passes, covering 181 yards. Senior Josh Ali caught seven passes for a career high 164 yards and two touchdowns.

On the ground, Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed 16 times for 119 yards and a score, while freshman La'Vell Wright had 75 yards on just six carries.

After falling behind 7-0, Kentucky scored 21 points in a row to take command of the game. The Cats would shut out the Aggies in the second half on their way to the big win.

Kentucky quarterback Will Levis rushed 14 times for 113 yards and four touchdowns as Kentucky thumped archrival Louisville 52-21 at Cardinal Stadium.

Levis was also 14 of 18 through the air for 149 yards in

Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed 16 times for 121 yards and a score, leading a rushing attack that racked up 362 yards on 49 carries in the game. Altogether, Kentucky had 511 yards of offense in the game.

Wan'Dale Robinson caught nine passes for 97 yards, setting the UK single-season mark for receptions in a season along the way.

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and went immediately into attack mode. Levis connected with Robinson for 29 yards on the first play to get into Louisville territory. The Cats would make another first down before facing a third and three from the U of L 29. From there, Levis took off on a designed quarterback run and went virtually untouched into the end zone for the touchdown. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT at the Cats led 7-0 with 12:22 left in the first quarter.

Louisville would tie the game at 7-7 but the Cats would answer with another scoring drive before the end of the quarter. The Cats would march 75 yards in 12 plays, using seven rushes and five passes. At the end of the drive, it was Levis rushing for the score again, this time from seven yards out, giving UK the lead again. Ruffolo added the PAT to make it 14-7 with 1:18 left in the first quarter. That would be the score after 15 minutes of play.

From there, Kentucky would stretch the lead as large as 38 points (45-7 and 52-14) before settling for a 31-point victory.

With the win, the Cats finished the regular season at 9-3.

HEAD COACH MARK STOOPS / NINTH SEASON / IOWA, 1989



The 2021 season has marked yet another year of achievement for Coach Mark Stoops and the Kentucky football program.

When the Wildcats take the field for the Vrbo Citrus Bowl, it will make official a school-record six consecutive bowl games – all under Stoops – surpassing the mark of five straight bowls from 2006-10.

Kentucky reached the postseason by posting a 9-3 record, only the third time in the last 44 seasons (twice under Stoops) that the Wildcats have reached nine victories. UK began the season with a 6-0 start for the first time since 1950, when the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant patrolled the sidelines in Lexington.

The current campaign featured a 5-3 tally in the Southeastern Conference. UK finished in sole possession of second place in the SEC Eastern Division, the first time the Wildcats had done so since the league split into divisions in 1992.

Now in his ninth season at Kentucky, tying for the longest-termed head coach in school history, Stoops has totaled 58 victories – second only to Bryant's 60 wins at UK. However, Stoops' success hasn't come easily.

Inheriting a program that was 2-10 the year before he arrived, Stoops' rebuilding efforts took time. Two games into the 2016 season his record was 12-26, but the program took off from there and the coach has engineered a 46-27 (.630) mark since.

In addition to this season's achievements, a partial accounting of Stoops' exploits also features:

- Three straight bowl wins the 2020 Gator Bowl, the 2019 Belk Bowl and the Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019 – first time in school history that UK won bowls in three consecutive seasons;
- First win at Tennessee since 1984 (2019)
- First New Year's Day Bowl win since 1951 (2018 season)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First final poll ranking since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 (2018)
- First win vs. Florida since 1986 (2018)
- First bowl appearance since 2010 (2016)
 In addition to the team accomplishments, several of Stoops' players have won All-America accolades, along with honors such as the Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck

Bednarik Award, Paul Hornung Award,







STOOPS AND CO. MAKING A HIT IN RECRUITING

In nine seasons at the helm of the Kentucky football program, head coach Mark Stoops and his staff have been making noise on the recruiting trail. Kentucky's 10 classes under Stoops have ranked in the top 50 by all four major recruiting services. Below is a look at UK's recruiting success under Stoops and Co.

Kentucky's Signing Day class for 2022, at the time of this writing, is UK's highest-rated class in the available history of recruiting rankings. (Note: these rankings are based on UK's 20 signees, 19 high school and one junior college, and do not include four-year college transfers Tashawn Manning and Tayvion Robinson.) The 2022 rankings will fluctuate as players continue to sign during the current and February signing period.

Ronnie Lott Trophy, Ray Guy Award, Danny Wuerffel Trophy, Pop Warner Award, Academic All-America and National Good Works Team.

The bountiful crop of victories and honors are the fruit of the last six seasons, but the harvest didn't come easily. Arriving in 2013, inheriting a team that had gone 2-10 the season before, it took three years of plowing, planting and growing before the results came.

Stoops earned his first bowl game as head coach in 2016, when the Wildcats overcame an 0-2 start to go 7-3 down the stretch and advance to the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl. UK duplicated seven wins in 2017, playing in the Franklin-American Mortgage Music City Bowl.

Led by linebacker Josh Allen, the National Defensive Player of the Year, and Benny Snell Jr., the school's all-time leading rusher, the 2018 squad went 10-3. It was UK's best season in 41 years, topped by a win over Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl. It was only the third 10-win season in school history.

In addition, the 2018 campaign featured a win at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America. The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

UK was No. 11 in the final USA Today coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984. The 2018 season also continued a remarkable trend -- since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK was the only school in the nation that tied or improved its win total in six straight seasons.

CollegeFootballNews.com listed Stoops as the best coaching performance of the season

and he was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year by The Associated Press, Athlon Sports and the league coaches.

The 2019 season was one of the most unusual in school history. A succession of injuries decimated the quarterbacks and Stoops turned to wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr. to man the QB position. Running the ball almost exclusively, UK went 6-2 down the stretch and closed the season with four straight wins, topped by a dramatic come-from-behind Belk Bowl win over Virginia Tech when Bowden threw the game-winning touchdown pass with only 15 seconds remaining.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as

the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game) and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday

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Bowl during the last two years. Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who spent 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach and has been elected to the College Football Hall of Fame. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is retired after coaching at Youngstown State.

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Prior to Arizona, Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft - seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning

seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats

VInce Marrow, aka the "Big Dawg", enters his ninth season as associate head coach/tight ends coach/recruiting coordinator/NFL liasison.

Marrow's tight ends have been a big factor in UK producing five consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards with at least one 1,000-yard rusher in four of those (Stanley "Boom" Williams -2016; Benny Snell Jr., - 2017, 2018; Lynn Bowden - 2019). Marrow also has been instrumental in UK signing eight straight top-50 recruiting classes.

Marrow had a professional playing career as a member of NFL rosters on five teams, including Buffalo, Carolina, New York Jets, Chicago and San Francisco. After his NFL days ended, Marrow played for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe in 1998, earning all-league honors with 32 receptions for 345 yards. After college, Wolford signed a free-agent contract with the Arizona Cardinals before returning to Manhattan to embark on his coaching career.



Grab the syrup, because Kentucky football lineman Darian Kinnard is all about his pancakes

There's nothing dainty about Darian Kinnard. Kentucky's senior left tackle is part blocker, part bulldozer, 345 pounds of relentless, unrepentant power.

He's not trying to trick anyone. He is out to grind opponents into the ground. He said as much Friday during Kentucky's football media day.

"Personally," he said, "I feel like just run the ball down the other team's throats."

Ranked as the nation's top run-blocking tackle by Pro Football Focus, Kinnard claims to have performed 42 "pancake" blocks last season — almost four per game -- and he is aiming for 50 this fall. A pancake is to an offensive lineman what a quarterback sack is to a pass rusher, an instance of domination that ends with the flattening of one's foe.

"He be pancaking people like he's about to eat breakfast," UK running back Chris Rodriguez said. "That dude is a great athlete. He is going to get his every game. It doesn't matter: You can be the No. 1 player in the nation, but you better be ready every play. He's not going to take a play off."

If the Wildcats' offense was dangerously one-dimensional last season, blame it on their ability to push 'em back, push 'em back, waaaay back. When your team averages five yards per rushing attempt, and your coaches see ball control as an equalizer against more explosive opponents, the temptation to run the ball down the other team's throats can be overwhelming. When your lead blocker creates as much daylight as does Darian Kinnard, strategy and savagery can be synonymous.

"Everything I've seen so far, he's a

great football player," said Eric Wolford, UK's new offensive line coach. "He has some things he's going to want to improve, but he has the kind of mentality that says, 'I'm just going to get better every day at one or two things.'

"He's obviously very, very strong. But he's a gifted athlete, too. When you're 340-plus pounds and able to move and change direction like that — are very rarely on the ground -- that's the sign of an athlete."

A standout shot putter and discus thrower between football seasons at Cleveland's St. Ignatius High School, Kinnard's brute force is something to behold. He remembers being startled to find himself in the end zone last season while blocking downfield on a long touchdown run. Yet he would prefer to be known for his precision and his preparation; for the subtle clues he picks up while studying video of his opponents and his ability to take advantage of a defender telegraphing a favorite move.

"They usually have tells with the weight of their hand, which hand is down," he said. "Sometimes, depending on what move they like the most, they'll shift their weight to a certain degree. And you can kind of pick up on that if you're watching film."

It helps, of course, to be big, strong and nimble enough to flatten or detour quicker defenders, but Kinnard is wary of being typecast. Much as he relishes shoving the ball down throats, he is quick to add, "I've always been a guy who focused more on technique than power to win my battles."

A scouting report published last month on Profootballnetwork.com said Kinnard "has the reach to swallow up opposing defenders in pass protection," "surprising mobility," and the strength to "drive defenders out of plays with relative ease."

"He has some definite mauler moments where he puts players in the dirt," Ian Cummings wrote. That he returned to Kentucky for his senior year rather than enter the NFL Draft speaks to shortcomings in need of shoring up, specifically his hand placement and a tendency to play too upright.

"There's a lot of things you can work on when you're an offensive lineman," Wolford said. "There's no such thing as, 'I got it.'"

Pancakes notwithstanding, Darian Kinnard's steady diet is heavy on humble pie.

"Ego," he said, "is for people who want (stuff) to go wrong."

Other schools wanted 'super senior' Josh Ali. He believes in Kentucky.

The first University of Kentucky football player to publicly announce an endorsement deal wasn't All-America offensive tackle Darian Kinnard, hometown hero Wan'Dale Robinson or master public speaker Josh Paschal.

That distinction went to Josh Ali, the Wildcat who led UK in pass targets last year and the only receiver on UK's roster who has caught more than a single touchdown as a Wildcat (he has four to date, good for 25 percent of the total receiving touchdowns Kentucky has scored over the last two seasons).

Ali is the official "face" of Keen Water, an Atlanta-based hydration business co-founded by Faheem Ali, Josh's father. If things go as planned under new offensive coordinator Liam Coen, he'll also be one of the faces for a revamped attack that should boost the Wildcats' standing in the Southeastern Conference passing rankings.

Any level of progress would be an improvement from where UK has been in that department — the program ranked last in passing each of the last three seasons — but no

individual on Kentucky's roster stands to gain more from the December staff shake-up than Ali, a "super senior" who chose to return for an extra year of eligibility under the NCAA's COVID-19 waiver instead of pursuing a professional career, in football or elsewhere.

That he's even playing another year for the Wildcats is a testament to Mark Stoops' belief in Ali as a talent, and his own belief in what they can achieve this season. A number of receivers left the team this offseason, including Ali's former high school teammate Akeem Hayes, who departed about a year after another Chaminade-Madonna (Fla.) product, B.J. Alexander, transferred. Outside of Robinson — a prolific addition from Nebraska via the transfer portal — Ali is the only pass-catcher on UK's roster deserving of the "proven commodity" label.

Ali is eager to deliver.

"I have goals and dreams," he told the Herald-Leader in a recent sitdown, "and I'm not going to let anybody stop that."

FAMILY

Faheem Ali was fresh off his latest tour in the Arena Football League and working in Houston, Texas, when Josh's mother, Katrina Gray, reached out for help raising Josh when he was 5 years old. Faheem submitted his two-week notice and moved to Miami, where most of the Alis still reside.

"I just did what I'm supposed to do as a dad," Faheem said in a phone interview. "He's my son."

Having his father in the picture was transformative for Josh, who still spent weekends with his mom and remains close with her to this day, but was perhaps even more so for Faheem. The former Louisiana Tech receiver grew up alongside his oldest son as the more hands-on version of fatherhood tested him more than any

defensive back ever could.

Faheem introduced Josh to football. He was a natural, his father says, which is believable; you don't earn offers to play wide receiver in college without having a knack for catching the football.

UK was the only Southeastern Conference school to offer Josh, who coming out of his junior year had few notable offers of which to speak. He transferred to Chaminade-Madonna Prep, along with his teammate Henry Colombi (who started games at quarterback for Texas Tech last season) for his final season, and suddenly offers started rolling in. At the end of his recruitment, he signed with Kentucky over Central Florida and Utah, two schools that during Ali's college tenure have considerably outclassed UK as far as passing the ball is concerned.

Multiple schools were ready to welcome Josh with open arms had he opted to transfer after UK's Gator Bowl win over North Carolina State in December, his father said, including at least one Power Five program. Faheem over the last couple of years wondered aloud if his son should seek greener pastures, and would have endorsed a move had he wanted to make one.

"Josh has really been loyal to Kentucky," Faheem said. "It was different with me. I went to three different schools, you know? I commend him on that. He stood firm and his belief was in the BBN and the University of Kentucky. ... It was a good feeling for me, because it's like, he's really grown up and making his own decisions. I can't play for him. It's something that he has to live with, and I respect it."

GROWTH

Mark Stoops' decision to fire Eddie Gran and Darin Hinshaw, who together helped lead UK to five straight bowl games, didn't only readjust the outlook for UK's offense. It assured UK's returning players and incoming recruits that the man for whom they signed up to play was willing to do whatever is necessary to keep the Wildcats on the come-up.

It sure opened Josh Ali's eyes.

"It made me realize he's really serious about this season and the guys that we have now," Ali said. "He really wants to win. The changes that he's made? Those were his friends. Coach Gran and Coach Hinshaw, they are close friends. That takes a lot, to let your friends go their separate ways. That shows as a coach, 'This is something that isn't working and I gotta change it because I want to win.' I feel like now he wants to win more than ever."

As the only returning receiver with any meaningful production under his belt, the expectation is for Ali to be a leader on and off the field. The addition of Robinson via the transfer portal has eased the load of those responsibilities, particularly on the field, where the speedster's presence opens things along the sidelines more for the most experienced Wildcats pass-catcher.

Some No. 1 receivers would scoff at a player of Robinson's caliber butting into their picture. Ali understands that if he's ever going to play in the NFL, he has to be ready to compete with teammates as much as opponents. He's embraced the ex-Husker.

"We're gonna open it up for each other," Ali said. "Wan'Dale's a great player, man. He can stretch the field, he's great with the ball in his hands. I feel like me and him on the field at the same time is scary. People gotta see the first game. Nobody knows what we have right now. After the first game, I think people will realize the power we have on offense."

Ali since the season ended has graduated (with a degree in community and leadership development), and is now working on a second bachelor's degree in communication. He's lifted the burden of becoming a college graduate and can focus a little

bit more on improving his body and technique.

When his football career comes to an end, Ali wants to help his grand-mother Hanan, who owns and operates an early childhood and K-8 school in Ocala, Fla. He wants to follow in her footsteps and those of his mother, who herself graduated from college a few months before Josh and is now a social worker.

"She loves helping people," he said.
"That's something I really value, too. If it was up to her, she would — and this is something I want to do, too — have her own group home for old people. She wants to take care of old people. She loves it."

Both Faheem and Josh referred to each other as their "best friend." In spite of his frustrations with UK's offense in the past, Faheem has had the privilege of watching his son play college football and graduate, things his own father wasn't alive to see. He admires the commitments Josh has made, and kept, to his teammates and himself.

UK's leading receiver says his dad doesn't say it out loud, but he knows he's made him proud. Unprompted, he went on the record.

"He's seen a lot through me, the growth, and I've seen the growth in him as well," Faheem said. "I think both of us, we're proud of each other."

Eric Wolford's task: Keeping the 'Big Blue Wall' strong without John Schlarman

Eric Wolford and Mark Stoops are not strangers to sharing a big challenge.

In the 1990s, Stoops worked as South Florida defensive backs coach and Wolford as the Bulls offensive line coach while then-USF head man Jim Leavitt started the school's football program from scratch. "We weren't making any money, I can tell you that right now. We were living in the dorm," Wolford recalled Friday at Kentucky Wildcats football Media Day. "I think our first-year salary was \$12,000 a year."

That did not go a long way in Tampa. To make ends meet, Stoops and Wolford would hire themselves out at night to remodel and paint apartments.

"We were sub-contracted out by a guy named 'Tex' — he was from Texas," Wolford says. "That's what we did for extra spending money."

This fall, Wolford and Stoops will be reunited in taking on a far more visible "remodeling" job.

After the death of beloved Kentucky offensive line coach John Schlarman last November at age 45 from cancer, Stoops called on his former painting partner to assume the delicate task of following him.

If that weren't daunting enough, Wolford, 50, is inheriting responsibility for Kentucky's offensive front in the first season in which the installation of a new offensive system is going to require the UK line to fundamentally alter the way it plays.

During UK's current five-year bowl streak, the four primary foundation pieces that allowed the Kentucky program to ascend have been Benny Snell, Josh Allen, Lynn Bowden — and The Big Blue Wall.

Wolford says he would rather come into a program with a recent track record of offensive line success than inherit a front that needs to be built from the ground up.

"It gives me a lot of confidence," Wolford says. "Coach Schlarman set a very high standard here. He did a wonderful job. ... We're going to embrace everything (Schlarman) did here with these players, this university and this community. We are going to keep a high standard."

Returning Kentucky offensive linemen say Wolford has so far deftly handled the emotionally fraught task of succeeding Schlarman.

The coaching transition "wasn't as bad as I thought it would be. It wasn't as rough," says UK senior left tackle Darian Kinnard. "Coach Wolf came in and understood he wasn't going to be a replacement (for Schlarman). He just told us, 'I'm not here to replace John. I just want to come in and help you guys get better.' And he's kept his word."

Says sixth-year senior center Luke Fortner: "We all miss John Schlarman. We think about him every day. (Wolford's) got big shoes to fill. And, so far, he has filled them."

With Eddie Gran and Darin Hinshaw running the Kentucky offense the past five years, UK primarily employed an inside-zone rushing scheme.

To over-simplify, that required the offensive linemen to primarily block straight ahead and the backs to run between the tackles.

Now that former Los Angeles Rams assistant Liam Coen has been brought in to diversify the ground-hugging Kentucky attack, the Wildcats are installing an outside-zone rushing attack.

Again to over-simplify, in the wide zone, the back probes the perimeter looking for a lane while the offensive linemen are required to move side-to-side and make more blocks in space.

"It's definitely a big adjustment. It takes a different skill set," Fortner says. "The angles you take, the 'get offs' you have and just the way you are working together is a lot different."

Wolford says he expects a veteran Kentucky offensive line used to a different style of play to need adjustment time.

"When you run the wide zone, that is your primary bread-and-butter play," Wolford said. "It takes a lot of work (to master). It's something you've got to learn. It's not something you just instill and learn it overnight."

Besides South Florida, Stoops and Wolford also coached together for one

season (2000) at Houston and three seasons (2004-06) at Arizona.

Wolford has also been offensive line coach at North Texas, Illinois and in two separate stints (2009 and 2017-20) at South Carolina, as well as assistant offensive line coach with the San Francisco 49ers.

From 2010-14, Wolford was head coach at Youngstown State, producing four winning seasons and going 31-26 overall.

Though both are Youngstown, Ohio, natives, Wolford says he got to know Stoops, who is four years older, at Kansas State University in 1995.

At the time, Wolford was serving as a graduate assistant on the same KSU staff where Bob Stoops was the defensive coordinator. When Mark Stoops, then working as a high school athletics director in Ohio, came to Manhattan, Kan., to visit his older brother, Bob introduced him to Wolford.

"I took (Mark Stoops) out and we kind of connected," Wolford says.

That relationship eventually led to the Stoops/Wolford apartment painting and remodeling service as two young college football assistants tried to keep the bills paid in Tampa.

Says Wolford: "Those kind of experiences make you appreciate working hard, doing things right and not being afraid to roll your sleeves up and get things done."

That sounds like the ethos that will be required to keep the Big Blue Wall standing strong.

Rahsaan Lewis, son of Ray Lewis, hoping to jump into playing time with Kentucky football

There's a crowd of fresh faces vying for playing time at wide receiver for Kentucky football, and Rahsaan Lewis — the son of NFL Hall of Famer Ray Lewis — jumped into the conversation with a couple of terrific catches during an open

practice in front of fans Saturday.

He leapt and twisted his body midair for two long catches in 11-on-11 drills during UK Fan Day, which generated buzz among fans about the junior walk-on. His father, who was named to 13 Pro Bowls and won two Super Bowls during his 17 seasons with the Baltimore Ravens, also took notice of the videos, the younger Lewis said.

"Competition is how I've always grown up, it's how my dad's raised me, that mentality he has. So I love it. We're all fighting for the same position, and whoever has it, has it," Lewis said.

Fifth-year senior Josh Ali and star transfer Wan-Dale Robinson, who was named Mr. Football at Western Hills and earned honorable mention all-Big Ten last year at Nebraska, figure to be the team's top receiving targets, but a slew of others are seeking the remainder of the snaps at receiver.

"He's showing up quite a bit, which is really good," coach Mark Stoops said of Lewis. "That's a position that we need somebody to show up and make plays, he's doing that, he's been consistent."

The 5-foot-11 receiver played just one season of football in high school and was primarily a basketball player, averaging 18 points, five assists, four steals and six rebounds per game as a senior point guard. He was so dominant for Windermere Prep (FL) on the hardwood that a regional opponent played a diamond-and-one defense in an effort to slow him down.

Lewis said his vertical leap as a high school junior was an impressive 45 inches — for reference, only two players have ever jumped that high in NBA Draft combine history.

He hasn't recently tested his vertical, so he added a caveat on the eve of his 21st birthday this week: "I've gained some weight, I've got a little older, (my) body's not as fresh as it used to be."

Regardless, his leaping ability has still been noticeable.

"Rahsaan's a savvy football player who has unbelievable ball skills," offensive coordinator Liam Cohen said. "And he has like a 40-inch vertical. He can jump through the roof."

Lewis was also a two-way football standout during his senior year of high school and began his college career at Central Florida, playing defensive back for a season before transferring to Florida Atlantic. After coach Lane Kiffin left for Ole Miss, Lewis again transferred, this time to UK to join his older brother Rayshad, who had previously played at Utah State under Jovon Bouknight, now the Wildcats' wide receivers coach.

"It's been a rough college career for me, transferring a couple of times, all the injuries and everything," Rahsaan Lewis said, "so (my goals are) mainly just doing my part, no matter what it is: catching the ball, making a block, making a play."

Lewis was slowed by injuries in 2020, but if Saturday's performance is any indication, he could very well see the field this season, once again wowing fans; among them may even be his father, the NFL's all-time leading tackler, who Lewis said will attend some games this season.

"I feel that I'm just a playmaker," Lewis said. "Whether it's a deep ball, I'm gonna go make a play. Whether you give me the ball on a screen or something short, I'm always trying to make a play."

Dad was a UK basketball standout. Son is trying to make a name with the football Cats.

His dad was a clutch-shooting stalwart for "The Comeback Cats," Kentucky's 1998 men's NCAA basketball champions.

His mom left a notable UK athletics legacy of her own.

Reed Sheppard? Sure.

But the North Laurel High School junior-to-be boys' basketball star — the son of ex-Wildcats basketball luminaries Jeff Sheppard and Stacey Reed — is not the only rising athlete with University of Kentucky ties for whom the above biography fits.

Lucas Padgett was born to be a Wildcat.

A true freshman offensive lineman on the 2021 UK football roster, the preferred walk-on is the middle of three children of ex-Wildcats power forward Scott Padgett and his wife, former Kentucky volleyball outside hitter Cynthia Dozier.

In the summer of 1994, Lucas Padgett's parents first met as incoming UK freshmen when each turned up in the Memorial Coliseum training room seeking aid for an injured shoulder.

Scott Padgett and Dozier would soon become a couple. They have been one ever since.

From that starting point, Lucas Padgett thinks he was destined to one day wear Kentucky blue and white. "It definitely feels like that," the 6-foot-4, 328-pound offensive lineman said last week at UK football Media Day. "It's been a dream my whole life to be here."

Yet if the college destination of Lucas Padgett feels preordained, the path he took to Lexington — disrupted by a cross-country move and the coronavirus pandemic — was unconventional.

While his dad was working as head men's hoops coach at Samford University (2014-2020) in Birmingham, Ala., Lucas was developing on the gridiron.

By the end of his junior year at Homewood High School, Lucas Padgett had shown enough promise competing in Class 6A Alabama football to attract recruiting interest from Conference-USA programs. He had also demonstrated enough prowess in the classroom that Ivy League schools

were interested.

Padgett's football future was thrown into confusion, however, when his family moved some 1,265 miles west from Birmingham to Albuquerque, N.M. Cut loose as Samford head man, Scott Padgett had taken an assistant coaching job for 2020-21 at New Mexico.

If moving cross country before one's senior year weren't challenging enough, Lucas Padgett made that move amid a global pandemic. His new home, New Mexico, then adopted some of the more stringent COVID-19 containment policies of any state.

In The Land of Enchantment, high school football was shut down last fall.

As it turned out, Padgett earned his degree from La Cueva High School without ever stepping foot in a classroom. "I went the full (school) year online," he says. "The school I graduated from, I never went to in person."

Meanwhile, in the state he'd left behind, "Alabama, basically, got to play a full (high school football) season," Lucas Padgett says. "(College) recruiting was a little more normal there than it would have been in New Mexico."

As first the December and then the February college football signing periods came and went, Padgett was caught across the country from where he had built recruiting credibility — and with no senior-year video highlights to show colleges.

(This past April, New Mexico played an abbreviated high school football schedule).

That combined to leave Lucas Padgett in a bind as far as determining his football future.

In response to the uncertainty, a family conference was called.

"Cynthia and I, we sat down with Lucas and were like, 'If you could go anywhere, where would you go?'" Scott Padgett recalls. "He didn't even think; he said 'Kentucky.'" So the elder Padgett placed a phone call to UK Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart.

"I just said, 'Hey, listen, my son is a really good football player,'" Scott Padgett recalls. "If it weren't for (moving because of) my situation and COVID, I think he was, at a minimum, a Conference-USA scholarship player, if not more."

Barnhart put the Padgetts in contact with the UK football recruiting apparatus.

Eventually, Kentucky offered Lucas
Padgett a preferred walk-on opportunity.

"As soon as they said it, Lucas wanted to do it," Scott Padgett says. "He said, 'I'd love to bet on myself."
Thanks to Lucas Padgett's strong resume in the classroom, he qualified for academic scholarship money at UK. "His being smart is helping my pocket," says Scott Padgett.

Obviously, it's difficult for a walkon to make a competitive impact on a Southeastern Conference football program.

At Kentucky, the offensive line has become the program's signature position group in recent years. If the recruiting geeks are correct about the potential of the o-linemen Mark Stoops, Eric Wolford and crew are bringing in, "The Big Blue Wall" should continue to stand strong in coming years.

Against those odds, Lucas Padgett brings impeccable Big Blue bloodlines and an overflowing desire to be a relevant Kentucky Wildcats athlete to the task of carving out a meaningful role at UK during his career,

"I know this isn't going to be easy. It's a great offensive line," Lucas Padgett says. "But I've ended up at the school I've dreamed of my whole life. Now, the goal is to come in, work my butt off and be able to crack (the playing rotation)."

Kentucky's Davonte Robinson has a message for everyone: 'I'm still here'

Two years removed from a torn quad that sidelined him in 2019, Davonte Robinson feels more like himself going into the 2021 season.

The former Henry Clay High School standout was able to play in every game last year for the University of Kentucky, and he started five of them, but he at times seemed a step slower than he should have been and never left the kind of in-game impression expected of a senior who, prior to his injury, looked on track for stardom. The most electrifying play of his career — a 30-yard fumble recovery in the waning seconds of UK's streak-busting victory at Florida in 2018 — seems like a distant memory.

Robinson's now a "super senior" — parlance for an individual opting into the extra year of eligibility granted by the NCAA under its COVID-19 waiver — and eager to show how much more he has left to give the Cats after two full years of recovery.

"Being hurt, a lot of people forgot about me," Robinson said. "Just know: I'm still here and I still have a lot to prove. I'm just ready to be out there with my brothers."

Kentucky's secondary has become one of its most reliable units in terms of year-over-year performance. Fears stemming from the exodus of NFL types like Mike Edwards and Lonnie Johnson were misplaced, it turns out, since the younger guys under them were emulating their work habits and taking to heart the things their seniors

preached on and away from the field.

Their advice and encouragement has extended beyond their time on campus. Darius West, who suffered a similar injury to Robinson's in 2016, reached out to his former teammate soon after he tore his quad and has helped him stay level-headed through his rehab.

"Taking all that time off and not really ever playing football, getting back into it, I was nervous, I was scared," Robinson said. "It was more mental than anything."

Robinson's now in the unique spot of being a seasoned vet in the DB room — its grayest member, in fact, as a member of the 2016 signing class — who feels a pressure to perform similar to what a newcomer trying to earn their stripes would experience. Defensive coordinator Brad White can recognize Robinson's improvement from last year to this year, and he expects him to deliver accordingly in 2021.

"He looks so much better, and you can tell with the confidence level he's playing with right now," White said. "That's encouraging to see. He's making plays, and with every play that he makes it's adding to that confidence level."

Robinson was recruited to UK as a cornerback but has most often appeared as the extra DB in UK's nickel coverage schemes. Kentucky hasn't shied away from making frequent use of its nickel packages, and could deploy it even more this fall depending on how the health and depth of its outside linebacking group progresses through camp and the early part of the season.

That would give Robinson ample opportunity to show just how far he has come.

"So much about that position is just building the confidence back," White said. "He's going to have to be a big contributor for us, there's no doubt about that."

Chris Collins, in his first year coach-

ing Kentucky's defensive backs following the departure of Steve Clinkscale for Michigan, said he "can't say for sure" if Robinson is where he wants to be two weeks into fall camp, but he's displaying progress during a time of year that can be monotonous, especially for a guy who has been through his fair share of fall conditioning.

Robinson has enjoyed going up against a revamped offense that has kept UK's secondary more on its toes. They're having to stay more active in 11-on-11 drills than in recent years, and they are getting a truer feel for where they're at in terms of their reaction timing and speed as a defense.

Safety Yusuf Corker, a threat for all-Southeastern Conference recognition this year, said Robinson can go toe-for-toe with anyone on the team in a foot race. That's as good an endorsement a guy can get after having one of the largest muscle groups in his body compromised, and it's a testament to UK's strength-and-conditioning and nutrition staff, who've helped Robinson shed pandemic weight that he packed on prior to last season.

The old man in the room is as spry as he has been in a while and eager to make people remember: "I'm still here."

"It's been a long road," Robinson said. "I'm just really excited to get back out there and put that blue and white on for one last season."

'He won the job.' Will Levis' presence, big arm made him UK's clear choice at QB.

He has only been in Lexington a few months, but Will Levis is officially the big man on campus.

University of Kentucky football head coach Mark Stoops officially announced Levis as the starting quarterback during an impromptu Sunday news conference, announced minutes

after reports surfaced that he had addressed the team to inform them of the decision.

Levis' efficiency in running UK's offense through two weeks of camp, including the team's first scrimmage on Saturday, was a difference-maker. Stoops said he's completed 74 percent of his passes on what he called "gradable snaps" and that he threw a 65-yard touchdown pass on his first live play in Saturday's scrimmage.

"He has a lot of talent," Stoops said. "He's been doing some things really good. He's been very efficient. He's got unbelievable arm strength. He's a big, strong guy. He won the job."

Levis' performance in Saturday's scrimmage left quite an impression on Stoops, who said all three quarterbacks vying for the starting job — Levis, junior Joey Gatewood and sophomore Beau Allen — had done well in camp. It was "clear," though, following the Cats' first scrimmage, who should get the ball when UK hosts Louisiana Monroe on Sept. 4.

Stoops lauded Levis' presence in the locker room, which was thought by some to be a potential road block to him being named the starter since he'd only been around since May.

"I feel very clear on this decision," Stoops said.

Stoops up until Sunday had been coy about sharing details with media about the quarterback battle — he joked around Saturday afternoon about keeping assistant coach Vince Marrow away from the mics after glowing comments he made about Levis earlier in the week — but says he treats the decision more seriously than he often comes across.

"I want to be very clear on that," Stoops said. "When you're dealing with these young people's lives, I take that very serious. These guys work their entire life to have an opportunity to be a starting quarterback at a Power Five program, and they all are very vested in what they do."

Stoops also shared that Gatewood

intended to enter his name into the NCAA's transfer portal, which he did do on Monday. Giving a player like Gatewood a window in which to transfer before officially enrolling in fall classes was part of the decision to name a starter now.

It also affords Levis more time to develop rapport with receivers and running backs within the offense. Stoops wants to see the operation of the offense improve in the coming weeks, and naming a starter should make that go more smoothly.

He mentioned during his Saturday news conference that were a few instances in the scrimmage that, if it'd been a live game, he would have had to call for a timeout to avoid a presnap penalty.

"We huddle, and that's very different in college football right now," Stoops said. "But we still have a great sense of urgency. We still operate fast. I love the approach that (offensive coordinator) Liam (Coen) has and the different tempos that we can go with. But that takes some time, just terminology alone. ... I want to feel 100 percent confidence when we walk off the field next Saturday after the next scrimmage that we're game-ready."

With Allen as the presumptive No. 2 quarterback, pending Gatewood's transfer, that leaves true freshman Kaiya Sheron and sophomore Nik Scalzo competing for the No. 3 spot on UK's depth chart. Stoops was complimentary of both on Sunday.

Will Levis has the arm, but can he lead? Kentucky's new quarterback is working on it.

There's more to playing quarterback than a strong arm.

Will Levis can spin it. No doubt about that. Kentucky's new starting quarterback has the arm talent college coaches crave. He has been working on his mechanics, fine-tuning the touch on his intermediate and short throws, and putting in the time in front of the video screen.

But when Levis was asked Tuesday about what he needs to work on, now that he has been officially named the Wildcats' No. 1 quarterback, the Penn State transfer pointed to a facet of the job description that has little to do with out routes.

"Being a leader for this team," Levis said. "And learning how to connect with all the guys the best way possible. Everybody is going to be led effectively differently. Obviously, since I'm new here, I've spent these last few months getting to know these guys. It's going to take a lot of effort to really get their trust and show that I can lead them effectively in whatever situation we find ourselves in."

Like it or not, the quarterback is the face of the program. And QB1 should be player No. 1 when it comes to leadership. He should have command of not just the playbook, but the locker room, and in a way that translates for public consumption.

As Mark Stoops has often said, there are position battles all over the roster during a team's training camp, but the quarterback battle always draws the most interest. "It is what it is," Stoops said Sunday. "We understand that."

That's especially true when a team is making a scheme change on offense. And Kentucky is making just such a change this fall. The Cats ran the football 64.2 percent of the time last season, by far the most of any team in the SEC. (Arkansas was second at 58.2 percent.) The growth strategy is to be more balanced under new offensive coordinator Liam Coen. The run game will still be the foundation piece, but the pass game will occupy a higher spot on the call sheet.

There have been social media posts of Levis playing golf with his teammates, flexing with them in the weight room, just hanging out.

"Coming in here to play football, everyone is here for business," Levis said. "It's really where you get to know someone is off the field, and who they really are as a person."

He is also answering the questions inquiring minds want to know.

"I wasn't really a person to throw my whole life out there on social media, but now it's kind of turned into a necessity," he said. "Build your brand. Get content out there and give people insight into your lifestyle, your sense of humor and your friends. I've been blessed to be able to do that this summer."

Prime example: There's a viral video of Levis eating a very, very brown banana. Banana peel and all. Post caption: "I don't fear the brown spots on bananas. They fear me. #menacetosociety."

"If anyone is asking, 'Do you eat a banana like that every time?' I do. That's how I eat bananas," said Levis on Tuesday with a straight face before adding, "No, I'm kidding."

The backstory?

"That just kind of came to me," Levis said. "I saw someone else do it on social media and people were over-reacting to it. And I thought that probably wouldn't be too bad. One day, I was at my girlfriend's place and there were some bananas they were about to throw out. I said, 'Hold on, let me get some content out there."

How was it?

"It tasted like banana bread," he said. "It was pretty good."

The Cats hope Levis is better than "pretty good." On the field. And off.

One of Kentucky football's most hyped recruits making an early impact in preseason camp

Trevin Wallace can start his collegiate career with even a fraction of the success he had in his final high school game, the Kentucky freshman might end up as one of the best linebackers in program history.

Playing against Jones County in the Georgia 5A playoffs, Wallace played every defensive snap of the game for Wayne County, but his biggest contributions came with in the ball in his hands. Wallace gained 382 yards and three touchdowns on 28 carries, falling just short of a game-winning touchdown with officials ruled he lost a fumble just outside the end zone.

"Best single performance of a high school player in my career, 34 years," Wayne County coach Ken Cribb told the Courier Journal. "It was flat-out amazing. He played linebacker, he played quarterback. ... Really won the game, even though it said he lost it at the 1-inch line, whatever."

A consensus four-star prospect, Wallace is the second-highest-rated defensive recruit to sign with Kentucky in the Mark Stoops era.

After injuries and NFL draft decisions decimated Kentucky's depth at middle linebacker, at one point early in the spring Wallace looked like he might immediately compete for a starting spot in the heart of the Wildcats' defense. The June addition of Ole Miss transfer Jacquez Jones at middle linebacker lessened the pressure for Wallace to make an immediate impact.

Early returns from Kentucky's preseason practice suggest he might make one anyway.

"There's a difference between understanding it in the classroom and applying it to the field, but in the classroom, extremely impressive," UK inside linebackers coach Jon Sumrall said. "He's a very sharp kid. He's busted his butt to get ready. He's been around the facility doing stuff on his own all the time. He'll walk by my office, and I'm like, 'Hey man, what are you doing here?' He is just working his tail off."

Wallace is splitting his early practice time between the two inside linebacker positions in Kentucky's 3-4 base defense.

Perhaps most important for his development is the presence of Jones, the projected starter at middle line-backer, and senior DeAndre Square, a team captain and the returning starter at weakside linebacker.

"They teach me everything, and I'm just all ears to learn," Wallace said at UK's preseason media day. "They've both been in the game longer than me."

Wallace's willingness to learn from his peers has impressed Kentucky coaches and teammates.

Along with fellow freshman line-backer Martez Thrower, Wallace is competing with former Trinity and Ballard star Jared Casey and Michigan State transfer Luke Fulton for the primary backup spots behind Jones and Square.

During his first week of preseason practices there has been a predictable learning curve as Wallace works to master Kentucky's defensive calls, but his ability to tackle in open space has already been evident, Stoops said. Sumrall generally prefers to let his linebackers master one of the two inside positions before worrying about cross-training at both spots, but Wallace's willingness to learn has allowed him to already accelerate that process.

None of that praise comes as a surprise to Cribb.

"He has a good football IQ, so the football part of it, making the transition is going to go better than most," Cribb said. "He understands the game and he's got great vision. Very coachable. Like a sponge, so he's going to take in everything his coaches tell him. He's going to learn it pretty quick."

Jones and Square provide Kentucky a veteran presence at the heart of the defense with a combine 69 games played, 41 starts and 346 tackles. Sumrall reported significant progress from Casey, who can play both inside linebacker positions, after his first year in the program.

The presence of that trio may have

decreased the pressure on Wallace and Thrower to play early this season, but any list of freshmen who could play important roles for the Wildcats this fall has to include Wallace.

"He's going to be a player," Square said of Wallace. "I like everything about him. I like his size, his confidence. He listens to everything. He's not a guy that thinks he knows it all at a young age. He listens to everything. He wants to improve. I think he'll be an important part of this defense this year and years on because he's a hard worker."

How his father's death spurred former Moore star J.J. Weaver in return from torn ACL

The countdown is on for Kentucky outside linebacker J.J. Weaver to make his return from a torn ACL.

But the Moore High School graduate's path back from the injury that ended his 2020 season after the two best performances of his young career is only the start of the story.

A major injury is a difficult hurdle for any player to overcome. For Weaver, it was an especially devastating blow because it came five months after his father, Terrance Weaver, was killed in a shooting in Albany, Georgia.

"Last season before I got hurt, I was playing for him," Weaver told the Courier Journal. "Then I got hurt, that really hurt me. Losing my dad, I don't know how to explain it. That's just a heartbreaking moment for my family and everybody. Me, still playing football, he's in me. I feel like he's playing football now."

Terrance Weaver was killed in the early hours of June 17, 2020, according to media reports. Four teenagers were later arrested in connection with the crime. One was charged with murder. Albany police told reporters they believed robbery was the motive

for the shooting.

At the time of his father's death, J.J., who lives in Louisville with his mother, was preparing for his second season at Kentucky. The former four-star recruit had signed with the program as one of the crown jewels in Mark Stoops' 2019 recruiting class but played in just three games as a freshman.

Weaver's 2020 season started slowly with just two tackles in the first two games, but his production began to pickup with four tackles and one pass breakup in week three against Mississippi State. In the second half of the 10-game, SEC-only season, Weaver began to force his way into a larger role.

While Kentucky was embarrassed as a team against No. 1 Alabama on Nov. 21, Weaver acquitted himself well with three tackles and one tackle for loss. A week later, he made his first career start and tied a career high with six tackles against Florida before tearing the ACL in his right knee in the second half.

"When he got hurt, he was a dominant force on that football field," Kentucky defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach Brad White said. "Nobody looks at the score, but if you just look at the film, when J.J. played in that Alabama game and when J.J. played in that Florida game, he was as dominant a football player as anybody on that football field."

Weaver missed just two games after the injury, including the Gator Bowl win over NC State, but questions immediately rose about whether he would be ready for the start of the 2021 season. The normal rehabilitation process for a torn ACL can take up to a full calendar year.

Suddenly Weaver's projected ascension to the starting outside line-backer spot vacated by senior Jamar "Boogie" Watson was in jeopardy. Unsurprisingly, the 6-foot-5, 231-pound Weaver took the injury news hard.

"No parent wants to see their child,

not only physically but emotionally, mentally hurt," Weaver's mother, Stacey Sherrell, told the Courier Journal. "But I have faith. I come from a spiritual background. It's just a bump in a road. I had to continue to mentor him and let him know it's OK. This is just God's way of kind of settling you down, making you humble because once you do reach your destination, you appreciate it.

"Those type of talks I had to have. Then, once I closed my door, I'm boohoo crying like a little girl. It was hard, but we got through it."

His rehab is 'elite level'

The days immediately following his surgery were the most difficult for Weaver as he spent a couple of weeks at home for the initial steps of his rehabilitation. Once Weaver returned to UK, able to finally sleep through the night without waking up in pain, Sherrell began to see the light come back on for her son.

It should come as no surprise that being around his teammates again helped Weaver boost his spirits. It's the same factor he credits in working through his initial grief after his father's death.

"My father got killed, so I couldn't really sleep or nothing," Weaver said. "I had memories playing back and forth. Just coming back out here, playing football, working out, that helped me. ... I don't want to say take off. It's nothing you move past from, but it most definitely matured me, made me grow up faster, made me be a man now."

Weaver is the second-oldest of his father's 13 children. Since his father's death, he has felt a growing responsibility to help take care of his younger brothers and sisters.

That drive has helped Weaver stay focused throughout his rehabilitation.

UK coaches report Weaver is ahead of schedule on his path back to the field. He has participated in non-contact portions of preseason practice.

On Saturday, UK coach Mark Stoops

said he expects Weaver to see the field in the Wildcats' Sept. 4 opener against Louisiana Monroe and be back to full strength at some point in the first month of the season.

"What he does, the time that he puts in, the commitment in his rehab is elite level," White said. "When the time comes for him to come back from that, he is going to come back as good and better long-term than he was last year."

For a Kentucky defense that ranked 113th nationally in sacks per game last season, Weaver's return could be a key factor in its ability to establish a more consistent pass rush.

Weaver was recruited to Kentucky with the hope he could follow in the footsteps of 2018 National Defensive Player of the Year Josh Allen. This season marks Weaver's third year on campus, the same year Allen began to first gain national attention for his status as an NFL draft prospect.

It will be impossible to predict Weaver's future until seeing how he returns from the injury, but Kentucky coaches remain high on his long-term potential.

The biggest challenge may be resisting the temptation to risk that future for an immediate return.

"Now that he's back and he's healthy, he thinks he's 100%, he wants to go full throttle," Sherrell said. "It's like, 'J.J., calm down. It's OK. You're going to get there. It's all right. This is you. You've got it.' But yeah, it's every day I have to talk him off that ledge."

Sherrell credits Terrance and J.J.'s grandfather for helping J.J. first find his love for football. During the months of Weaver's rehab, he has remembered the message delivered to him by his father: Be great.

Weaver looked well on his way to accomplishing that goal before the injury. No one in Kentucky's program is betting against him still reaching it once he returns to the field.

For Weaver, the stakes of his return are higher than winning games.

Football helped him deal with the loss of his father. Now, he hopes the sport can help him fill the hole left by Terrance for his younger siblings.

"I call him my gentle giant because he thinks he can save the world," Sherrell said. "He always had the love for people. He's so compassionate. He has a big heart. He'll do anything and everything anyone asks him to do. ... His duty is to take care.

"I tell him all the time: 'Son, we're not broke. We're not rich, but we're not broke. Don't worry about us.' I want J.J. to be happy. Taking care of his family is what makes him happy."

Kentucky celebrates former coach, player John Schlarman with Kroger Field poster

The University of Kentucky on Tuesday unveiled a large poster honoring former offensive line coach and football player John Schlarman.

The poster, displayed in the Gate 12 plaza of Kroger Field, facing the Joe Craft Indoor Training Facility, features 12 lines of text with the phrase "Schlarman Strong," which became a mantra for the football team the last couple of seasons while Schlarman was battling cancer. Schlarman's jersey number, 65, is displayed in large font with a quote from Schlarman — "You come together, nobody can stop you." printed in front of two images; one shows Schlarman on the sideline coaching, another shows him celebrating with the team following its win last season at Tennessee, Kentucky's first in Knoxville since the 1980s.

A logo for "The Big Blue Wall," the name by which UK's nationally recognized offensive line came to be known under Schlarman, is displayed in the left corner. The unveiling was attended by members of his family, including his wife LeeAnne, and UK's football team.

In a social media post announcing the new display, the UK football program called it "a first step in honoring the legacy of Coach Schlarman."

Schlarman was part of Mark Stoops' original staff at Kentucky in 2013, and remained the offensive line coach under Stoops until his death last November following a battle with a rare form of liver cancer. He received the diagnosis in 2018.

UK football over the summer renamed its annual golf scramble in Schlarman's honor, and plans to allow players to continue rotating his jersey number with their own in games this season for as long as the Southeastern Conference permits it to do so. Other tributes are in the planning stages.

"We will find the right way to honor him and do that," Stoops said in June. "Believe me, we love him."

Schlarman, a Fort Thomas native, was an offensive lineman at UK from 1993-1997. He was a graduate assistant at the school from 2000-2002 before local high school coaching stints at Campbell County (2003-2004) and Newport (2005-2006). He was the offensive line coach at Troy University from 2007-2012.

The long way home could lead to a memorable 2021 for UK's Wan'Dale Robinson

Wan'Dale Robinson was going to be a Kentucky Wildcat.

A national top 100 player, Robinson was an all-purpose star at Frankfort Western Hills High. He rushed for over 2,000 yards in his sophomore and junior seasons of high school, and missed a three-peat in his senior year by 27 yards. He caught 102 passes, and also went 15-for-22 on passing attempts. We're not even mentioning defense, where his high school coach Don Miller says his improvement was one of the team's keys to success.

"In high school he played safety, linebacker, receiver, quarterback, running back, punt returner, kickoff returner, and probably even more that I don't remember," laughs Miller.

Robinson was a walking, talking SportsCenter top plays candidate.

He did the steady, he did the spectacular. And he was going to stay home and be a Kentucky Wildcat. Robinson committed on Nov. 1, 2018. While coaches cannot comment on unsigned players, a video of the UK staff bursting into high-fives and backslaps circulated — a video that was understood to be of them watching Robinson's commitment announcement to Kentucky.

It seemed like a match made in Heaven.

It lasted about 35 days.

A few days after winning Kentucky's Mr. Football award, the rumor mill on Robinson ramped to a crescendo. Seems he reconsidered that commitment. On Dec. 5, 2018, he decommitted from Kentucky and committed to Nebraska. Two weeks later, he signed with the Cornhuskers. Hints and understandings were given. Mark Stoops' ball-control offense didn't offer a ton of opportunities for a 5-10 jitterbug of a receiver. And it was Kentucky versus Nebraska. Tradition, winning, etc.

"I wasn't surprised," Miller said of the flip. "I believe he felt that Scott Frost's offense would ultimately help him reach his goal of playing in the NFL."

Two years in, things had changed. Kentucky had come to the end of the line with ground-and-pound ball under Eddie Gran and brought in NFL wunderkind Liam Coen to sort out this new-fangled forward passing business. Nebraska had been very, well, un-Nebraska. In the 2 seasons since Robinson's commitment, even without any kind of downfield passing game, Kentucky went 13-11 while Nebraska was 8-12. Kentucky won the Belk Bowl and Gator Bowl, and Nebraska hadn't

made a bowl appearance.

For Robinson, Nebraska did use him, albeit somewhat erratically. Two seasons netted 134 rushing attempts, 91 receptions, 11 kickoff returns and a punt return. Robinson showed big-play capabilities, rushing for 580 yards and 4 touchdowns and adding 914 yards and 3 touchdowns on receptions. He was among the most productive receivers in the Big Ten as a sophomore, and as a true freshman, was 1 of only 2 Nebraska players to reach 1,000 all-purpose yards in their initial season.

But uncertainty with his role (Nebraska bounced him around as a back/receiever), continued mediocrity under Scott Frost and a new approach in Lexington suddenly brought the old Wan'Dale rumor mill abuzz again.

Wan'Dale Robinson would be a Kentucky Wildcat. And if it took 2 years to get here, this time, it was for keeps.

Another happy Kentuckian

Plenty of people are excited to see Robinson wear the blue and white of his homestate Wildcats, among them coach Miller back at Western Hills. Miller's relationship with Robinson goes way back.

"I actually knew of Wan'Dale when he was playing youth league football," Miller said. "He was already making a name for himself at such a young age."

Miller quickly understood the talent he had in Robinson.

"It wasn't until his freshman year that we understood what an impact player he would be," says Miller. "I can still remember our student section chanting, 'He's a freshman!' every time he made a big play."

Miller clearly enjoyed coaching Robinson, and when asked about what makes him special, he zeroed in on a surprising element.

"He is truly happy when those

around him are successful as well," Miller said. "He finds true joy in the success of his teammates and has an understanding that individual successes lead to ultimate team success."

And what will he bring to Kentucky this fall?

"Wan' Dale's speed and quickness, as well as his lateral movement and field vision reminds me of Tyreek Hill," Miller said. "But I feel like his versatility and ability to do whatever is needed to help his team be successful is similar to Randall Cobb when he was a Wildcat."

In Lexington ... finally

On the field, Robinson fills out of Kentucky's immediate needs — somebody to catch the passes that Coen will call this fall. Veteran Josh Ali returned to Kentucky, and his 54 receptions for 473 yards in 2020 demonstrate his experience and potential. But after Ali, it got thin fast, particularly with a significant camp injury to tight end Keaton Upshaw, who was the 2nd leading returning receiver for UK.

Enter Robinson, who will be a slot receiver this fall.

Kentucky coaches have been somewhat understated about Robinson, but it's hard to mistake the elation for first-year OC Coen, and the stick-to-it duo of Stoops and Vince Marrow, who just missed on Robinson in 2018 only to reel him back in for 2020.

"We recruited him extremely hard and tried to do all the right things and make it very difficult for him to say no to us, and that's our job," Stoops said recently. "It didn't work out that way the first go-round, but it came back the second time, and very grateful to have him in our program."

When Robinson's name pops up, Stoops acknowledges his potential impact.

"He's a difference-maker," Stoops said at SEC Media Days. "He's a guy that was electric this spring, and you could feel his presence on the

field. Very excited to have him on our team."

"He's so dynamic," Coen raved in the spring. "He's not just a gadget guy. He can really get the ball down the field."

Coen continued, "The thing I love about Wan'Dale is he loves to play the game and he loves to learn the game."

It's not just Kentucky's coaches who have noted Robinson's potential impact. Phil Steele and Athlon both named him an All-SEC third-team pick before he ever played a snap in the league. A 247sports survey of transfers ranked Robinson as the 4th-best transfer in the nation. Expectations are sky-high.

For Robinson's part, he professes happiness to be back in his old Kentucky home.

"I'm super excited," he said at Kentucky's Media Day. "I'm just glad to be back home."

Robinson addressed his return to Lexington, noting, "I wanted to keep my eyes open a little bit, but I knew I was really eyeing coming back here ... it was a really easy choice to come back home."

For Wan'Dale Robinson, coming home sets up nicely for a memorable 2021 season.

The stealth recruiter who is helping UK football burrow into the Deep South

With productive work on the recruiting trails largely in Ohio and, lately, in Kentucky, Vince Marrow has more than earned his reputation as UK football's ace recruiter.

But even a "Big Dog" needs help. Since Mark Stoops brought Jon Sumrall back to his college alma mater as Kentucky's inside linebackers coach in 2019, the former UK player has produced consistent recruiting success in an area, the Deep South, that has long confounded Wildcats recruiters.

Working often in an "under the radar" manner, the former Kentucky linebacker has brought at least eight players combined from the states of Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi to Lexington in the prior two recruiting cycles.

According to the Rivals.com recruiting database, seven of those eight players picked UK over other SEC offers.

"Sometimes in the Deep South, you try to keep some of the guys quiet that you are in on because there are so many guys under the radar down there who have high talent," Sumrall says. "And I just don't like to publicize what we are doing. I think, sometimes, (other) schools 'copycat recruit."

If you have followed "the scuttlebutt" emanating from Kentucky's mostly closed practices this preseason, many of the young players receiving positive buzz are prospects Sumrall lured north from Dixie:

A 6-foot-3, 305-pound nose guard from Horn Lake, Miss., Josaih Hayes was one of the big national surprises on signing day for the class of 2020 when he picked Kentucky over a litany of traditional SEC powers.

Sumrall, a former Mississippi assistant, won out in an intense recruiting battle with Ole Miss for the four-star defensive lineman. Alabama, Auburn, Georgia and LSU had also offered Hayes.

Reviews on Hayes' play coming from Kentucky's camp this month have grown increasingly bullish.

From the class of 2021, Chauncey Magwood, a 6-foot, 190-pound wideout from Albany, Ga., seems to have a viable chance to crack Kentucky's receiving rotation as a true freshman.

Sumrall beat out Arkansas, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Louisville, Miami, Michigan, Mississippi and Mississippi State for Magwood.

Wide receiver Chris Lewis turned down Arkansas, Louisville, Ole Miss,

Nebraska, Notre Dame, South Carolina, Tennessee, UCLA and West Virginia to choose Kentucky.

The 6-4, 190-pound product of Pleasant Grove, Ala., may need time to build strength; in time, he could give UK the kind of big, athletic outside receiver the Wildcats play against in the SEC.

Kahlil Saunders, a 6-5, 270-pound defensive lineman out of Sumrall's alma mater, Grissom High School in Huntsville, Ala., was an "off the beaten path" recruit — his only other Power Five offers came from Kansas and Virginia Tech.

Nevertheless, there has been a consistent, positive buzz about Saunders coming out of UK practices.

A 6-2, 212-pound product of Rochelle, Ga., linebacker Martez Thrower picked Kentucky over Arkansas, Colorado, Georgia Tech, Michigan State, Minnesota, Mississippi State, Nebraska, Tennessee and Wisconsin, among others.

With injuries creating opportunity, Thrower might play meaningful snaps this fall.

If the recruiting geeks are correct, Trevin Wallace, a 6-2, 220-pound product of Jesup, Ga., is the jewel of Sumrall's efforts so far in the Deep South.

With Ole Miss transfer Jacquez Jones (another Sumrall recruit) battling injury, Wallace was running with the first team during a recent UK practice open to the media.

An injury that ended Wallace's junior season in high school after only four games and an early commitment to Boston College froze his recruitment.

Sumrall, Wallace reports, never relented in recruiting him even after he committed to Boston College.

"He never left the game. He still kept recruiting me," Wallace says.

After Wallace de-committed from BC, he says he probably would have chosen Auburn, except the Tigers changed coaching staffs.

"Getting to know a new coaching staff in a short amount of time, that was going to be difficult," Wallace says. "So my mind switched to Kentucky. I knew Coach Sumrall. He's the type you want on your side. He gives off good energy."

Besides growing up in Alabama, Sumrall has coached at Ole Miss, Tulane and Troy.

"I'm fortunate, in the Deep South, I know the lay of the land pretty well," he says. "I know a lot of the high school coaches really well."

When defensive backs coach Steve Clinkscale departed UK for a job at Michigan this offseason, it was a significant blow to Kentucky recruiting. Clinkscale had opened an effective recruiting pipeline into the state of Michigan for UK. With his absence, it seems unlikely Kentucky can sustain that.

That raises the value to UK of Sumrall's ability to get quality recruits from the heart of SEC country.

Yet when things go the way the former Kentucky linebacker likes it, you won't know about his efforts until a player signs.

"The publicity part of recruiting is great," Sumrall says. "But what really is my job is to find the best fit for the University of Kentucky. And a lot of times, that's done best under the radar, just laying low."

What is a super senior? This Kentucky football player could make history in opener By Jon Hale

College football rosters this fall may look like something out of the Avengers.

Generally, it is not difficult to classify what class a college athlete is in. First-year players are freshmen. For the purposes of NCAA eligibility, second-year players are sophomores or redshirt freshmen depending on how

many games they played in during their debut season. From there, players make take the typical progression from sophomores to juniors to seniors.

The COVID-19 pandemic has altered that system for the next four years.

Spring sports athletes were granted an extra year of eligibility after the 2020 season was cut short by the start of the pandemic. Recognizing the uncertainty surrounding the 2020-21 academic year, the NCAA extended that same concession to fall and winter sports athletes last season.

Kentucky is listing its football players based on their normal year of eligibility depending on how many games they played in during the 2020 season.

But what do we call athletes who played as seniors last season and elected to return to school for the extra year of eligibility? The college sports world has coalesced around the Avengers-esque term, "super seniors," a phrase previously used to describe any student who took longer than four years to graduate from high school or college.

"I've never used that term, but it's a great term, super seniors, for the guys that decided to come back," Kentucky football coach Mark Stoops said this summer. "We greatly appreciate having that experience."

Stoops' squad will include nine super seniors: wide receiver Josh Ali, center Luke Fortner, punter Colin Goodfellow, kickoff returner Zach Johnson, cornerback Quandre Mosely, linebacker William Nalty, tight end Justin Rigg, safety Davonte Robinson and kicker Matt Ruffolo.

Of that group, Fortner, Johnson, Rigg and Robinson are entering their sixth season at Kentucky. The other Wildcat super seniors are entering year No. 5 of college football as they previously had not used a redshirt season.

The Associated Press reported in

February more than 1,000 2020 seniors were expected to take advantage of the extra year of eligibility this fall, but even among that group Rigg might be in a class of his own.

Almost all the sixth-year super seniors sat on the sideline for an entire redshirt season in their first five years on campus. The 6-foot-6, 261-pound Rigg will become one of only a handful of players in college football history to actually play in a game in six separate seasons next week in Kentucky's season opener against Louisiana Monroe.

Prior to the 2018 season, players were not allowed to preserve a redshirt season if they appeared in even a single game, but athletes could be given back a year of eligibility with a medical hardship waiver if they missed the majority of a season due to injury. Rigg, who played in two games a freshman in 2016 before missing the rest of the season with a rib injury, fell into that category.

Even before the COVID-19 waivers were announced, the NCAA did allow for rare circumstances for an athlete to have his or her eligibility clock extended to a sixth year, but those scenarios only came into play when the athlete missed two full seasons due to injury.

Former Wildcat defensive lineman Phil Hoskins played the 2020 season under the sixth-year waiver. While Hoskins elected to enter the NFL draft rather than use the extra COVID-19 year, some players in his situation (like Minnesota defensive lineman Micah Dew-Treadway) did choose to return to college for a seventh season.

Due to the NCAA's pre-2018 redshirt rules, they did not play at all in at least one of their first six years on campus though.

After his injury-shortened freshman season, Rigg played in all 39 games from 2017 to 2019. He played in 9 of 11 games in 2020, missing two games due to COVID-19 protocols. Those missed games played heavily on his

mind when he decided to use the extra year of eligibility.

"I love football, I love Kentucky and I want to play at the next level," Rigg said. "...With missing two games due to COVID, I felt it would be in my best interest to come back and help this team and push this team to become better. Really be a leader for my offense and the whole team. Just show the guys in my room, the younger guys, the right thing to do.

"I just felt coming back would be the best decision I could do to get to the next level."

The majority of Kentucky's super seniors return at key positions.

Fortner, the former starter at right guard, is moving to center for his last season of college football. Ali, Rigg and Ruffolo are returning starters at their positions. Robinson is a former starter who struggled in 2020 after missing all of the 2019 season with an injury.

"It was always a clear decision,"
Robinson said. "I just knew I had a lot
more to give, a lot more to prove. I
didn't want to end my year last year
the way that it happened. Just in my
mind, I was clear that I was coming
back."

The impact of super seniors could be felt for years to come as the 2020 underclassmen decide whether or not to use their extra seasons of eligibility, but Rigg's exclusive club will likely remain small.

Do we call him a super senior after all?

"I don't even know," Rigg said with a laugh. "Super, super senior."

Now, that's a name worthy of the Avengers.

Marquan McCall's explosiveness, maturity on display in fall camp

Marquan McCall's physical growth

– or shrink, rather – as a player this offseason has been well-documented. Tasked with the difficult job of replacing Quinton Bohanna as the team's anchor on the defensive line in 2021, the standout nose guard has cut 40 pounds since last season and is below 350 pounds for the first time since high school.

It's a body change that had UK defensive coordinator Brad White day-dreaming about on-field production possibilities for McCall, who he feels can be a "difference maker" on the defensive line.

"You've got a guy in Marquan Mc-Call that has played significant snaps, played as a true freshman. Now he's in year four here and he understands this is his time," White said of McCall to open fall camp. "His body is in as good of shape as he's been since I've been here and he's been here. He's ready to take that step. ... He does have a chance to be a difference-maker for us and we need him to be that."

The on-field impact has come with the body transformation to open fall camp, but not just in terms of individual production. He's also grown as a leader, something that has caught the attention of his veteran teammates.

"He's a guy that's going to hold other guys accountable, and that's what I like to see. I like to see him hold those guys accountable on the field," senior defensive end Josh Paschal said Saturday. "He's also the type of guy to have fun the guys, as well. It's a good balance to have, being able to tell someone they need to step up, but celebrate them when they do. Marquan has that great balance."

"In offseason workouts, it used to be us telling Marquan to pick it up," senior guard Luke Fortner added. "Now it's Marquan telling us to pick it up."

In his first three years with the program, McCall has racked up 48 total tackles, 6.5 tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, two fumble recoveries and one forced fumble in 31 total games played. Early

reports are that those numbers are going to see a significant spike in year four.

It starts with his athleticism and newfound explosiveness.

"You look to your right or to your left and look at that nose and see someone you can trust and someone that's explosive," Paschal said of Mc-Call. "I'd say he's a playmaker, you'll see him during the fall. He's a big guy that shouldn't be able to move that fast."

McCall is not only bettering himself, but those around him, a recipe for success going into 2021.

"There's not a time you go against Marquan and don't get better. Really," Fortner added. "He truly moves faster than any human his size should. He has been changing the way he works. ... The way he's approached it has been incredible. He's a hard man to block, for sure."

How a viral TikTok video offers hope Will Levis can end the Kentucky football QB drought By Jon Hale

If Will Levis can play quarterback half as well as he TikToks, Kentucky football might have found its best quarterback in more than a decade.

Before even playing a game for the Wildcats, the Penn State transfer made national headlines for his TikTok video in which he eats a banana with the peel still on. Many Kentucky fans' first exposure to Levis came through a viral workout video posted to Twitter of him slinging passes in quick succession

Perhaps the match between Kentucky and Levis was always destined to flourish considering even years before the Connecticut native considered playing for the Wildcats, he posted a picture to Instagram wearing a UK visor.

"I think it was my buddy's," Levis

said with a laugh when asked if the post from June 2017 was some sort of foreshadowing. "He was a Kentucky basketball fan, and I was just wearing it. After I committed, I went back through my pictures and found that one. Just so happened I was wearing some Kentucky stuff way before I even ended up here. It was pretty funny."

Despite his brief stint wearing the UK visor, Levis acknowledges he knew little about the Wildcat football program before Kentucky beat Penn State in the Citrus Bowl during his freshman season.

"Always knew them more as a basketball school," Levis said. "Being from Connecticut, it was fun watching UCONN beat them in the national championship."

Basketball rooting interest aside, Levis has quickly endeared himself to Big Blue Nation with his growing social media presence. As his profile off the field has increase, hype for his performance on it has soared as well.

Levis needed just one week on campus to convince Kentucky coach Mark Stoops and offensive coordinator Liam Coen to award him the starting quarterback position. On his first throw in Kroger Field, Levis completed a 60-plus-yard touchdown pass during a preseason scrimmage.

As reporters gained a glimpse of his impressive arm strength in two open practices during camp, the idea that Levis could help return balance to a Kentucky offense that had become too run-centric in recent years became more plausible.

Kentucky coaches have done little to dampen the enthusiasm.

"I've been around a lot of quarter-backs," UK recruiting coordinator and tight ends coach Vince Marrow said. "Will is one of the strongest arms I've been around. ... Will came in the right way. He won the team over, did the little things. He was the first one in, the last one to leave. Just his leadership on the field, all guys started following him, even the defensive guys."

"I think his personality is one that guys kind of naturally follow," Coen said. "I think obviously you guys can see some of the arm strength talent and see some of the things he can do throwing the football."

Can Will Levis end Kentucky football quarterback drought?

For all the success Stoops has built at Kentucky, the Wildcats run to five consecutive bowl games has often come in spite of its quarterback play rather than because of it.

In Stoops' first eight seasons as coach, only one Kentucky quarterback has thrown for more than 2,500 yards in a season. In four of those seasons, including each of the last three, Kentucky's leading passer threw for less than 2,000 yards.

With Stephen Johnson, Terry Wilson and Lynn Bowden taking the majority of the quarterback snaps during the five bowl seasons, Kentucky averaged just less than 2,000 passing yards per year. The Wildcats have finished last in the Southeastern Conference in passing yards in each of the last three seasons.

Kentucky is one of just two SEC programs without a 3,000-yard passer during the last eight years. No UK quarterback has been named to the coaches' All-SEC team since Andre' Woodson in 2007. No Wildcat quarterback has thrown a touchdown pass in the NFL since Tim Couch in 2003.

"Not to take away nothing from Stephen Johnson, because those guys won games for us," Marrow said. "I don't think Terry Wilson gets enough credit. But I think the potential for what we're looking for, I think Will is the guy to do it. I really do. I'm very impressed with him."

Levis felt unfairly pigeonholed as a run-first quarterback at Penn State, where he rushed for 473 yards and threw for 644 across the last two seasons. His arm strength was never in doubt, but even Levis acknowledges accuracy was an issue early in his college career.

Years of work on that aspect of his game has apparently paid off as he earned raves for his touch on deep passes in particular during camp.

When Coen went searching for a transfer quarterback after being hired by Kentucky, Levis's 2020 performance against Nebraska in which he completed 14 of 31 passes for 219 yards stood out on film.

"He had beliefs in my ability as a quarterback," Levis said. "That's what I really wanted to hear. I wanted to go to a school and play for a coach that believed I could be a great quarterback for him. That's what happened."

Levis insists no promises were made to him about the starting job while Coen and Stoops recruited him to Kentucky, but he remained confident in his ability to quickly win over his teammates and prove worthy of the position.

With incumbents Joey Gatewood and Beau Allen gaining a headstart in learning Coen's offense during spring practice while Levis was completing his degree at Penn State, Levis opened camp taking mostly second- and third-team reps.

"It wasn't like he was running with the ones and it just kind of happened," Coen said. "He had to earn it. He had to earn it, and he did it every single day. I think we saw probably what some of you guys see when he throws the football. He gives you a chance."

More than a banana video

Kentucky coaches have hailed Levis for his natural leadership qualities, but Levis knows the relationships with his teammates will need time to strengthen.

The fact that he has already made significant headway in that area in just more than a month on campus adds optimism to his ability to thrive as the face of a program.

As for the blossoming social media

stardom, Levis has been intentional about allowing fans an inside look at his life off the field as he looks to position himself to profit off college athlete's new name, image and likeness rights.

The infamous banana video, which was featured on the Today Show, was a spur-of-the-moment idea sparked by Levis seeing someone else attempt the trick on social media when he noticed his girlfriend was about to toss out some overly ripe bananas. His Tik-Tok profile also features videos of golf outings, a series of celebrity look-alike photos of teammates and a clip of him hitting the goalpost crossbar with a pass from midfield on his knees that has been viewed more than 200,000 times.

For Levis to end Kentucky's quarterback drought, he will need to prove to be more than a social media star. His engaging personality must combine with his arm strength and athleticism to actually produce on the field.

Levis boasts more than 64,000 TikTok followers with more than 1.3 million likes accumulated on his videos. Now it is time to find out if he can post similarly impressive stats on the field.

"He's very authentic, which you really like about him, and he works at it," Stoops said. "He's in there a lot. He's in there watching film. A few times this summer when we've had recruits on campus, or he happened to pop in my office, just watching him interact with other people, watching him interact with recruits, parents, anybody—he handles himself like a grown man. You need that out of your quarterback."

'I just love it all': Wan'Dale Robinson is ready to play for Kentucky after recruiting flip

It is Nov. 1, 2018, and Western Hills High School football star Wan'Dale Robinson is about to announce his college choice.

During the previous summer, Robinson had recorded a commitment video with a team from the Lexington Herald-Leader. As he had not yet made his decision at the time the video was shot, Robinson recorded six different endings in which he picked each of his finalists.

After weeks of sleepless nights, the week before his scheduled commitment ceremony in the Western Hills gymnasium, Robinson told the Herald-Leader crew to use the ending where he pledged to Nebraska. But just hours before the ceremony, he called Herald-Leader's Caitlyn Stroh-Page, now the executive editor of the USA TODAY network's Athens Banner-Herald, with a change of heart.

Robinson would be committing to Kentucky instead.

"That was probably the most stressful time of my life," Robinson told The Courier Journal earlier this month. "I can remember in high school, I was up until 2, 3 o'clock in the morning just about every night worrying about where am I going to go? Worried if I was going to make the right choice."

The late change of heart before his initial commitment ceremony was not the final twist in Robinson's recruitment.

Just more than a month later, he flipped his verbal commitment back to Nebraska, writing in a note posted to his Twitter account saying he had become "overwhelmed by the pressure from outside influences, the pressure of staying home and the pressure of

trying to please everyone." The flip came just three days after he was named Mr. Football by the Kentucky Football Coaches Association.

It would not take long for Kentucky fans to realize the significance of the loss as Robinson starred for the Cornhuskers in the fall of 2019, earning second-team Freshman All-American honors as the Wildcats passing game floundered. He caught 40 passes for 453 yards and rushed 88 times for 340 yards with six total touchdowns. Robinson was named one of four finalists for the Paul Hornung Award, which goes to college football's most versatile player.

As a sophomore, Robinson caught 51 passes for 461 yards in eight games during the coronavirus-shortened 2020 season.

Shortly after the season, Robinson entered the transfer portal, citing a desire to move closer to home because his mother was dealing with ongoing health complications after being hospitalized with COVID-19. Four days later, Robinson committed to Kentucky for a second time.

'The whole state is excited he came back'

Now just less than three years after his Western Hills commitment ceremony, Robinson is set to finally play a game for the Wildcats. Against Louisiana Monroe on Saturday, Robinson will wear his No. 1 Kentucky jersey as the face of a revamped offense aiming to inject excitement back into the Kroger Field stands.

"Broke my heart two years ago, but he came back," UK recruiting coordinator Vince Marrow said. "I know the whole state is excited he came back."

Of course, the same pressure Robinson identified as a factor in his initial decision to flip to Nebraska has not gone away.

If anything, after two more years of watching an anemic passing attack, Big Blue Nation has only increased the hype for its hometown hero. The

difference is Robinson is now eager to embrace that spotlight.

"I don't really feel any pressure,"
Robinson said. "At the end of the day,
I have pressure on myself. I don't
really feel anything from the outside.
I always have expectations of what I
should do and how I should go about
things. As long as I prepare and do the
things I'm supposed to, everything will
fall in line."

Had new offensive coordinator Liam Coen been working for Kentucky three years ago, Robinson might have stuck with his initial commitment after all.

Instead, he was worried the runheavy Kentucky attack that had found so much success with Benny Snell in the backfield and a vaunted offensive line paving the way might not be the best system to showcase his abilities to the NFL. Stoops, Marrow and former UK offensive coordinator Eddie Gran pitched Robinson on being used in a similar manner to Lynn Bowden as a high school recruit, but Bowden's biggest impact at Kentucky would come as a running quarterback rather than a pass-catcher.

After Kentucky ranked last in the Southeastern Conference in passing yards for a third consecutive season in 2020, Stoops decided a change was needed if he was ever going to consistently attract offensive playmakers like Robinson to Kentucky. He looked to the NFL to hire Coen, then the assistant quarterbacks coach for the Los Angeles Rams, to bring offensive balance back to Lexington.

"I got to talk to Liam before I decided," Robinson said. "The moment I talked to him, I knew I could play for him and that he'd put me in position to have success and go to the next level."

Coen viewed Robinson as Kentucky's version of Connor Kupp, the Rams slot receiver who caught more than 90 passes in each of the last two seasons. Kentucky plans to also use Robinson as a punt returner in

a search to find as many ways as possible to get the ball in his hands in space.

Despite being the focus of Big Blue Nation's and UK coaches' affection for years, when he finally arrived on campus in January, Robinson set out to prove to his new teammates he was more than a star-for-hire.

"A lot of guys with that type of talent, you'd think that they got a chip on their shoulder or they're arrogant," Marrow said. "He's a class act. ... He didn't want nothing when he came in here. We knew he was talented as a staff, but he did not want his teammates to think something was given to him, so he came in and earned it the right way."

Robinson was quickly hailed as a difference-maker during spring practices as Coen worked to teach his new offense.

Defensive end Josh Paschal labeled him "the truth." Wildcat coaches could barely contain their glee any time his name was mentioned in interviews.

Running back Chris Rodriguez, wide receiver Josh Ali and Kentucky's much-hyped offensive line will say much about the ultimate success of Coen's offense, but it will be Robinson and Penn State quarterback transfer Will Levis that represent the faces of the transformation.

During the first scrimmage of preseason camp, Levis hit Robinson for a 60-plus-yard touchdown pass on the first pass he threw in a competitive setting in Kroger Field. It would be unfair to expect that result often, but no one around the Kentucky locker room has made much of an effort to slow the hype.

"He works very hard every day and really gets better, he improves," Stoops said of Robinson on Monday. "It's amazing to see him, the way he sharpened his skill at wide receiver. We all know he is a talented guy with the ball in his hand, but he's really

developing into a great wide receiver. He's very talented, but I love his work ethic."

Robinson's return to Kentucky coincides with the NCAA's move to allow college athletes to profit off their own name, image and likeness. While that rule change was not adopted until after Robinson enrolled at UK, he acknowledges being a hometown star has boosted his earning potential.

Even at his initial 2018 commitment ceremony in high school, Robinson pointed to the lifelong benefits that could come with being a former Kentucky football player if he returned home after his playing career ended.

The financial benefit will come earlier than expected for Robinson, but there are implications from playing for his home-state team versus Nebraska that extend beyond NIL.

In June, Frankfort posted road signs on the edge of the city highlighting its status as Robinson's hometown. At the ceremony unveiling the signs, Western Hills coach Don Miller acknowledged the real motivation for the gesture was "to welcome Wan' Dale home."

The rest of Big Blue Nation will finally get that chance Saturday.

"It's been really, really nice," Robinson said. "It's been nice I can go out to eat and somebody will recognize me, like, 'I wish you'd never left, I'm glad you're home.'

"I just love it all. I just hope I make everybody proud and make everybody excited and show that when I came back there was good reason to be excited."

Bombs away! Kentucky rolls with the deep ball in successful season opener.

When Big Blue Nation hit the pillow on Friday night, surely it dreamed of new offensive coordinator Liam Coen scheming up fireworks, receiver Wan'Dale Robinson celebrating a welcome home party and new quarterback Will Levis going, well, bananas in Saturday's season opener.

Turns out, fantasy can become reality. Levis, the transfer from Penn State, threw for 367 yards and four touchdowns. Robinson, the transfer from Nebraska via Western Hills High School in Frankfort, caught five passes for 125 yards and two scores. And the Wildcats rolled over undermanned Louisiana Monroe 45-10 in the 2021 season opener.

So what did Coen think of his Big Blue debut? Well, first the former Los Angeles Rams assistant quarterbacks coach had to answer a congratulatory text message from his old boss, Sean McVay. After that, the 35-year-old Coen seemed fairly pleased with the 554 yards of total offense and six touchdowns. Fairly.

"We missed some things," said the coach.

But not too many things, at least outside of Levis' first throw when his missile for receiver Josh Ali came in high and hot, bounced off the veteran wideout's shoulder and into the hands of the Warhawks' Jabari Johnson for an interception. "We just chuckled about it," said Levis afterward, shaking his head.

Not to worry. It didn't take long for Levis to let it fly, hitting a wide-open Robinson with picture-perfect 33-yard pass for a touchdown. On UK's very next play on its very next series, Levis dialed up the long ball again, connecting with Ali for a 58-yard score right down the middle.

Tweeted former UK and current Tampa Bay Bucs safety Mike Edwards, "Imagine us having this offense my senior year." And the Cats went 10-3 with a Citrus Bowl win in 2018, his senior year.

By halftime, Levis had thrown for a third touchdown — a 15-yard slant to the 183-pound Robinson, who pinballed his way into the end zone — and was 11 of 16 for 247 yards as the Cats lead 28-7. Heady numbers for a team that never threw for more than 239 yards in a game all of the 2020 season.

That was the reason head coach Mark Stoops decided to part ways with his old friend and offensive coordinator Eddie Gran, hiring Coen to install a less run-dependent, more balanced, pro-style attack. "You guys know what I was looking for," Stoops said Saturday.

Surely he saw it, what with bullish back Chris Rodriguez rushing for 125 yards on 19 carries — C-Rod's seventh career 100-yard rushing game. In total, the Cats finished with 34 rushing plays and 33 pass plays. "That's what we're looking for," Coen said.

True, Saturday's degree of difficulty must be taken into account. Not only did ULM not win a game in 2020, the Warhawks never led. There were 62 new players on 65-year-old coach Terry Bowden's roster on Saturday. And while veteran offensive coordinator Rich Rodriguez schemed up a touchdown drive on ULM's first possession, the visitors finished with measly 87 total yards on the afternoon.

"Is that correct?" Stoops asked when looking at the stat sheet. "It seemed more aggravating than that."

First games are first games, after all. Stoops wasn't happy with his team's three turnovers. (Recovering its own muffed punt kept UK from a fourth.) There were some communication issues, including one when center Luke Fortner correctly snapped the ball on the first sound when Levis was trying to correct a formation and

forgot the ball was supposed to be snapped on the first sound.

"We have a lot of things we need to clean up," Stoops said.

And the clean-up must happen in a hurry. The Missouri Tigers come to Kroger Field next Saturday night in what promises to be an important early SEC game. Mizzou spanked the Cats 20-10 last year in Columbia. But after Saturday, you might say that was a different Kentucky team, a ground-and-pound club that had yet to discover the potential joy of the forward pass.

Take it from Rodriguez, a running back, "I love this offense."

Big Blue Nation had to love what it saw Saturday.

Stoops on UK's downfield passing attack: 'It's obviously what I've been looking for'

Everyone has been anxiously waiting to see Kentucky's new revamped offense the entire offseason after the additions of Liam Coen and others. On Saturday, those who waited were delivered a treat.

Kentucky's passing attack shredded ULM's defense throughout the entirety of Saturday's 45-10 victory for the Wildcats. The unit finished with 419 passing yards, the most recorded since 2014, and four aerial touchdowns – two to Wan'Dale Robinson and one each to Josh Ali and Brenden Bates.

"It's obviously what I've been looking for and very happy about that," Mark Stoops said after the game. "I talked a lot about it in the spring, that we were getting the ball completed down the field. I know Will wasn't here but just the offense in general, the receivers gaining some confidence and we built on that this summer and it was great to see him throw for – just complete the ball."

The most noticeable improvement in Kentucky's passing game was the deep passes. Will Levis completed 10 passes that gained at least 15 yards, three of which were gains of 50-plus yards.

The one thing that helped Levis continuously find the open man was the receivers' ability to get open. Ali, Robinson and others were able to separate themselves from defenders on almost every route ran, which made Levis' job easier and harder at the same time.

"I just think that the plays were designed for that to happen," Levis said. "Whether the separation is exactly what we expect, but it definitely make it easier for me. Actually sometimes it makes it harder. When there's a guy wide open, you kind of just want to throw it up there and you don't want to screw it up."

Robinson has the biggest game out of Kentucky's receivers. He caught five passes for 125 yards and two touchdowns, which tied his career-high from Nebraska. Robinson's 125 yards was the most from a Wildcat making his debut.

Robinson's first catch was one he'll likely never forget — a 33-yard touchdown to open up the scoring for Kentucky. He was able to get behind his defender on a corner route to the end zone, a place he long dreamed of being as a younger child growing up in the Commonwealth.

"I've grown up here. Coming to these games as a recruit, as a younger kid and things like that, and just envisioned myself scoring touchdowns here. For that to happen, especially my first game in the stadium, it was really nice," Robinson said.

Ali had a career day as well, catching five passes for 136 yards and a touchdown. His 136 yards were a new career-high, and it was the first 100-yard game of his career.

"It was a big relief, it was more fun," Ali said. "I just seen the differ-

ence in our o-line, just different vibes on the field. I like to see everybody smiling on the sidelines and that's what I seen today."

Ali and Robinson's matching 100-yard games marks the first time since 2011 that Kentucky had a pair of 100-yard receivers in a game. The duo should be a lethal combo against defenses for the rest of the season, as they both have a quick burst and good hands that make them both hard to defend individually.

Put them both on the field at the same time and it just presents even more of a challenge to the defense.

"If they on him [Robinson], then they not on me, so that gives us – they flip flop on every one of us so both of us can make plays," Ali said.

Mark Stoops may have chickened out of his banana bet, but he found a quarterback

Call Mark Stoops a chicken if you want, but call him a chicken with a quarterback.

After telling the SEC Network broadcast crew he would eat a banana, peel and all, like Kentucky quarterback Will Levis did in his now famous TikTok video if Levis threw for 400 yards in the Wildcats' 2021 season opener versus Louisiana Monroe, Stoops pulled his quarterback early in the fourth quarter when he was just 33 yards short of the 400-yard plateau.

"Doesn't seem like then I have to eat the banana," Stoops said with a laugh following Kentucky's 45-10 victory. "That's why I got him out of there."

There was little logical reason to leave Levis in any longer as the Penn State transfer had torched the Warhawks defense to help the Wildcats mount a 31-point lead. Kentucky's

backups were more than capable of closing out the victory, but banana talk dominated the broadcast and social media.

Stoops will surely take any playful ribbing at his decision as trade for one of the best Kentucky passing performances in his nine seasons as coach.

But for Levis, the afternoon actually could not have started much worse.

The Penn State transfer's first pass as a Wildcat bounced off the hands of super senior wide receiver Josh Ali and into the arms of a Warhawks defender for an interception that set up a short-field touchdown.

Kentucky has generally struggled against perceived lesser opponents in its season openers during the Stoops era, but this early miscue turned out to be only a temporary stumble rather than a sign of things to come.

Levis recorded his first completion on a 19-yard pass to Ali on the third play of the next drive. Two snaps later, he hit Nebraska transfer Wan'Dale Robinson, the former Mr. Kentucky football who spurned UK as a high school recruit three years ago, for a 33-yard touchdown to tie the game.

A ULM three-and-out followed before Levis hit Ali for a 58-yard touchdown on the first play of Kentucky's third drive to give the Wildcats a lead they never relinquished.

"Coach Stoops did an amazing job on Monday, catching it early, saying, 'Guys, we're going to hit adversity in this game at some point,'" offensive coordinator Liam Coen said. "How do we respond? How do we react? Do we stay the course or start to freak out? You can't have much adversity than that. On the first drive of the game, your first throw as a Wildcat, you throw a pick. Then we respond with some good drives and move the ball down the field.

"That was a huge moment for our whole team, but specifically for the offense. We didn't freak. Nobody panicked. We knew we had the play.

It was open. He just missed the throw. That's going to happen."

The caliber of opponents was nowhere near the same league, but there likely some Penn State fans doubting the Nittany Lions coaches' use of Levis as halftime of the noon games approached.

Penn State entered the locker room of a game versus No. 12 Wisconsin deadlocked in a scoreless tie while Levis completed 11 of 17 passes for 243 yards and three touchdowns in the first half versus ULM. Those fans were likely assuaged by Penn State's 16-10 win, but it also had become quickly apparent Levis possesses the type of arm strength and downfield accuracy to make Penn State's decision to use him as a run-first quarterback laughable.

Levis left Penn State in search of a program and coach that believed in his arm talent. He found that match in Kentucky and Coen.

With Big Blue Nation waiting to learn whether the offseason hype surrounding Coen's offense would be supported when the games actually started, both men sent a message in the opener.

"I was nervous for sure," Levis said.
"I've got the experience. It's not like
it's my first time playing a college
football game, but first time starting
for a new program. Pretty high expectations. I knew a lot of people were
going to be watching and seeing how
the game goes."

Most of Levis' production came by targeting Robinson (five catches, 125 yards, two touchdowns) and Ali (five catches, 136 yards, one touchdown), but it was a third-quarter throw to senior Isaiah Epps that most impressed Coen.

By that point, the game was well in hand, but Levis saw a ULM corner-back drift out of position. He quickly improvised by chucking a pass down the right sideline that Epps hauled in for a 57-yard gain.

"That was not schemed up that

way, just so we're all clear," Coen said. "He made a throw. ... That's the big thing about him: You tell the wideouts you can never stop running. Can never stop running when he's playing quarterback, because he'll let it rip."

It's been sometime since Kentucky had a quarterback capable of making that throw.

Levis' 367 passing yards were second-most by a Kentucky quarter-back in the Stoops era. He became the first Kentucky quarterback to throw for 300 yards since the 2016 regular-season finale and the first to throw for four touchdowns since the 2016 opener.

He hit four passes of at least 30 yards, including two of more than 50.

"It's not like when we see people running down the field we hope and hope that he's going to make the throw," Coen said. "You know he's going to score. It's just about trying to get guys open."

The level of competition will increase dramatically as Kentucky begins SEC play next week against Missouri, but confidence in the new offense is high.

Robinson likely echoed the sentiment of Kentucky fans when he said of Levis, "I'm really glad he's my quarterback," after the win. Stoops undoubtedly agrees.

Just don't expect him to join in on Levis's banana craze.

"I think he was definitely a little scared," Levis said with a smile "He didn't want to do it. ... When (the backups) are out there, I'm going to be cheering them on 100%, but it would have been nice to get those extra 40 yards."

"Student athletes bring tremendous discipline and work ethic to the MS Finance program," said Mark H. Liu, associate professor of finance and MSF program director. "We have had successful students from football, track and tennis in recent years, and they have all gone on to successful careers in finance."

Kentucky head coach Mark Stoops

recently announced that Levis had earned the job as UK's starting quarterback. Levis transferred to UK after graduating from Penn State's Smeal College of Business with a degree in finance.

Gatton College will also be represented on the field by three UK Football players who are students in One Year MBA program: Luke Fortner (offensive guard), Quintin Wilson (center) and Matthew Ruffolo (kicker). Fortner was recently named to the 2021 Preseason Coaches All-Southeastern Conference teams.

He's played football at UK for five years. Now, you might finally get to know him.

Somewhat lost amid the fever surrounding Kentucky football's return to the sky on Saturday was the performance of Isaiah Epps, who in one of UK's final practices leading up to the opener wore smiley face bandages on opposing fingers, one on each hand, during an interview session.

"I like to do stuff different," Epps said when asked about the decorations. "I'm not a mainstream guy. I like stepping outside the box. It's just something that I find interesting. ... Keep the mood light."

A senior who missed all of 2019 and most of 2020 due to various injuries, Epps had plenty of reason to grin in Kentucky's opener. He reeled in three catches for 83 yards, the bulk of that total coming on a throw that wasn't dialed up by the coaching staff. On a third-and-8 snap from UK's own 24-yard line in the third quarter, Will Levis heaved a ball into Epps' vicinity — about 37 yards downfield along the right sideline — and Epps caught it in stride and took it 20 yards further before getting brought down by two Louisiana Monroe defenders.

"The throw down the sideline to

Epps, that's not schemed that way, just so we're all clear," offensive coordinator Liam Coen said on Saturday. "He made a throw because he saw the corner overlap the seam, and he just flicks it. That's the thing about him, you tell the wideouts, 'You can never stop running when he's playing quarterback, 'cause he'll let it rip."

Coen's insight was directly about Levis, but offered a glimpse into the mentality of Epps, who before last year against Vanderbilt hadn't caught a pass in an organized football game in two years. Before the third quarter ended on Saturday he caught another long ball, for 21 yards, to put UK into ULM territory. The Wildcats scored five plays later to go up 38-7 early in the fourth quarter.

Epps didn't get into the end zone himself, but he was thrilled that he even had the opportunity to make big plays that led to two UK scores (his first bomb from Levis might have led to a touchdown, too, but a fumble later in the drive forced the Cats to settle for a field goal). His longest reception before Saturday was for 28 yards, and was made four years ago.

"It felt good," Epps said. "It's been a long time coming. I've been open on some deep balls in the past and just been unable to connect. Just Will's trust in me and the accuracy, it felt good to finally connect and make a big play."

SPEED

Epps matched his career high for single-game receptions and in one game collected more yards than he has had in any single season while at UK; his best before this year was 76 yards on eight catches as a true sophomore. A broken foot, for which he underwent two surgeries, kept him off the field for all of the 2019 season. He played in UK's season opener at Auburn last year but sat out the next five games with a thumb injury. He returned for the final five contests, and

made his first career start in the Cats' Gator Bowl win over North Carolina State (in which he set his career high for catches).

Wide receivers coach Scott Woodward texted Epps after the season opener.

"I said, 'Hey man, anyone that plays for me like that, anyone that gives that amount of effort and makes those plays like that, I'm behind 'em 100 percent,'" Woodward said. "He played lights out for me and is just another guy in the room we can count on. His effort was tremendous. ... It gave us more confidence in the kid."

Speed has always been a distinguishing characteristic for Epps, who played in every game as a true freshman in 2017. He told reporters this week that he started to get "a little weary" following his second surgery to repair his broken foot, but he leaned on his faith to get through that setback.

"There's not much that I could do on my end," Epps said. "Just make sure I'm taking care of everything I can in the training room and let everything work out for itself. I just had to stay the course, really."

Kentucky can use all the speed it can muster against a Missouri squad that gave up 301 passing yards in its opener versus Central Michigan, which in 2020 averaged 100 fewer yards through the air. The Wildcats are anticipating a healthy dose of man coverage, which Epps said he prefers going against opposed to a zone scheme.

Epps says he never thought about losing his speed while rehabbing. If Saturday was any indicator, he was right not to; in the preseason he was the most evident option to be UK's "third" receiver, after Josh Ali and Wan'Dale Robinson, and as long as he's on the field, that's likely to be as low in the pecking order that he'll go.

"I know what I'm capable of and I know the work that I put in," Epps said. "I don't think I've even got close

to reaching my full potential. This year, not missing any practices and being able to go out there with the 1's and stuff, I'm really confident and (ready) to see it come together after this long journey."

This breakout performance in Kentucky football's opener could be key for rest of season By Jon Hale

The outcome of Kentucky football's season-opening win over Louisiana Monroe was already certain when quarterback Will Levis improvised to throw a deep ball down the right sideline to senior wide receiver Isaiah Epps.

But no play in the 45-10 victory may have been more important for the future of the new-look Wildcat offense than the third-quarter heave.

"The throw down the sideline to Epps, that was not schemed up that way, just so we're all clear," offensive coordinator Liam Coen said after the game. "(Levis) made a throw. He saw the corner overlap the seam, and he throws it, just flicks it.

"That's the big thing about him. You tell the wideouts you can never stop running. Can never stop running when he's playing quarterback because he'll let it rip."

The throw might have been Levis's best of the game, but the fact that it was Epps on the other end could be even more important for Kentucky.

For as impressive as receivers Wan' Dale Robinson and Josh Ali were in the opener – the duo combined for 10 catches for 261 yards and three touchdowns – Southeastern Conference opponents will likely be better equipped than ULM to prevent Levis from focusing so heavily on his top two options. For the offense to succeed when defenses take Robinson or Ali away, other receivers need to step up.

Epps suddenly looks more than capable of filling that void.

"I'm happy for him," Kentucky coach Mark Stoops said. "Obviously he helps us, and that was a really nice play. ... The fact that he was really running and the fact that Will took that shot and saw it and had the vision to see it and the arm strength to get it out there in a cover-two defense to the field, that's rare."

Epps finished the season-opening win with three catches for 83 yards. He had never recorded more than 76 receiving yards in an entire season for Kentucky previously.

Talent has never been the question for Epps. The 6-foot-2, 188-pound Oklahoma native has been considered one of the fastest players on the roster since he arrived on campus in 2017 but has struggled to stay healthy.

After appearing in all 26 games across his first two seasons on campus, Epps missed all of the 2019 season with a foot injury that ultimately required two different surgeries. Finally recovered from the foot injury, Epps was sidelined again after just one game in 2020 due by a thumb injury.

Epps missed three games with the thumb injury. He dressed for the next two games against Missouri and Georgia but did not play.

After recording his first catch in almost two years in the win over Vanderbilt, Epps finally built some positive momentum with seven catches over the final four games of the 2020 season. He made his first career start in the Gator Bowl win over NC State, recording a career-high three catches for 23 yards.

"Whenever I had to have a second (foot) operation, it kind of got a little weary," Epps said. "But just put all my trust in God and believed in his plan. There's not much I could do on my end. Just make sure I'm taking care of everything I can in the training room and let everything work out for itself. Just had to stay the course, really."

Stoops' decision to rebuild Kentucky's offense by hiring Coen from the Los Angeles Rams invigorated a group of Wildcat receivers that had been primarily used as blockers in a run-heavy scheme in recent years, but Epps was limited again in spring practice, hurting his first opportunity to make an impression on his new offensive coordinator.

"We were trying to get him to this point," Coen said. "We're still continuing to try to do that. He was very limited in terms of like one practice on, one off. A period on, a period off. So, I really didn't get a lot to see of him at that time."

In preseason camp, Epps locked down the starting spot at the third wide receiver position alongside Ali and Robinson, but there was no guarantee his position would be on the field for the majority of plays as Kentucky's depth at running back and tight end suggested Coen would make heavy use of larger personnel groupings.

At halftime of the opener, Epps had yet to be targeted by Levis. That changed with a simple 5-yard completion to start Kentucky's first drive of the second half. The 57-yard bomb from Levis over a defender extended the Wildcats' next drive on a thirdand-8 play. Levis found Epps again with a 21-yard completion that helped set up the final touchdown with the starters in the game.

"After that game I texted him on the side, I said, 'Hey man, anyone who plays for me like that, gives that effort and makes plays like that, I'm behind them 100%," wide receivers coach Scott Woodward said. "He played lights out for me. Just another guy in the room we can count on. His effort was tremendous. Made a couple bigtime plays. Made a couple conversions for us. Just gave us more confidence in the kid. It was great to see."

Ali and Robinson will remain Levis's top targets as long as they are healthy.

The tight ends and running backs will likely become more involved in the passing game in the weeks ahead.

Epps still needs to prove himself against better opponents, but Kentucky's offensive coaches now have plenty of reason to believe the offense has found a legitimate third wide receiver, as well.

"It finally all came together," Epps said. "My time is finally here."

Before our eyes, Stoops and troops are killing off 'the old Kentucky'

Aided immeasurably by the exertions of "The Big Blue Wall," Kentucky star running back Christopher Rodriguez spent his Saturday evening running the ball down Missouri's throats.

Yet on a night when C-Rod powered his way to 206 rushing yards and when the Wildcats rolled up 340 rushing yards as a team, UK nevertheless came perilously close to letting down a raucous Kroger Field crowd of 58,437.

In a crucial, early-season SEC East showdown, Kentucky (2-0, 1-0 SEC) overcame Missouri (1-1, 0-1 SEC) — and itself — to earn a tense 35-28 victory.

"I thought we did so many good things. It's a shame that, you know, that (the score) had to be so close," Kentucky Coach Mark Stoops said afterward. "Because we had opportunities to pull away."

Figuratively speaking, Kentucky spent much of the game with a machine gun turned on its own feet.

- With UK up 14-0, what became Missouri's first touchdown drive was extended when Tyrell Ajian's interception of a Connor Bazelak pass was nullified by a pass interference call on Cedric Dort.
 - UK was on the verge of going

ahead 28-7 late in the first half when Rodriguez lost a fumble at the Missouri 1-yard line after Mizzou safety Jaylon Carlies appeared to hit the ball head-on with his helmet.

Instead of going in at halftime up 28-7, UK instead led only 21-14 after the Wildcats defense surrendered an 80-yard scoring drive following the lost fumble.

- As Missouri was driving for what became the touchdown that tied the game at 28 in the fourth quarter, UK's Jalen Geiger dropped what should have been an easy interception off of a deflected pass in the end zone.
- Kentucky was up 35-28 with just over two minutes left in the game and had Matt Ruffolo lined up for a 37-yard field goal that would seemingly have clinched victory.

Instead, Missouri's Blaze Alldredge blocked it and Mizzou's Kris Abrams-Draine recovered it at the Tigers' 45-yard line.

Over the star-crossed history of the Kentucky football program, a game filled with so much self-afflicted hardship has oft been a recipe for disaster.

Now, right before our eyes, Stoops and troops are methodically slaying "the old Kentucky."

On the night Stoops became an overall winning head coach at UK (51-50) for the first time in his tenure, his team played like a unit that believed it was supposed to overcome adversity, not succumb.

"There's always going to be ups and downs (in a game)," Kentucky slot receiver Wan'Dale Robinson said. "At the end of the day, you've got to fight and figure out a way to win. That's what we did today."

UK bested Mizzou because Rodriguez shook off his late first-half fumble and was a battering ram when it mattered down the stretch.

Said Rodriguez: "I told everyone in that locker room (at halftime), 'I shouldn't have fumbled that ball. That's on me.' We shouldn't have ever

been in that predicament. But we were. I put that on me."

Kentucky won because Robinson, the former Western Hills High School star and Nebraska transfer, has given UK the dynamic playmaking capacity (five catches, 101 yards receiving; 73 yards rushing on three jet sweeps) in space that it lacked a season ago.

The Cats were victorious because quarterback Will Levis (10-of-18 passing for 179 yards with one TD and one interception) was patient and took what the Mizzou "D" was giving.

And on a night when Bazelak, Tyler Badie and Co. repeatedly frustrated the Cats, UK won because its defense met the challenge after the blocked field goal had given Mizzou both a short field and a last-gasp chance to steal victory.

Instead, the remarkable J.J. Weaver — remember, he is back from a torn ACL in the next-to-last game of last season — made Kentucky's only quarterback sack of the game on third-and-5 from the UK 37.

Then true freshman linebacker Trevin Wallace pressured Bazelak into a hurried pass on fourth-and-13 from the Wildcats' 45 that redshirt freshman cornernback Carrington Valentine broke up.

"We had a pressure on," Kentucky defensive coordinator Brad White said of Weaver's sack. "Every once in a while, you roll the right one. And Carrington made a big play on that fourth down. Trevin did a nice job spying the quarterback, pulling him up and forcing a tough throw."

Since the start of the 2016 season, Kentucky is now 16-8 in one-possession games.

Yet as recently as 2019, White notes, UK lost home games to Florida and Tennessee because the Cats did not make the plays at the end under game-deciding pressure.

Against Missouri on Saturday night, UK overcame its multiple miscues to dig out a big conference victory.

"When the moment called for this crew to rise up, they rose up," White said.

For Kentucky football, that's becoming a new way of doing things.

A hat tip to Mark Stoops for achieving something rare in UK football history

On Monday at his weekly news conference at Kroger Field, Mark Stoops did something he had never done before:

The Kentucky Wildcats head man appeared before assembled local media members to preview the pending UK game as a coach with an overall winning record.

Kentucky's tense, 35-28 victory over Missouri on Saturday night in what was deemed as a pivotal SEC showdown for both teams left Stoops with a mark of 51-50.

For a coach who started his coaching tenure at UK by going 12-26, clawing back above .500 is no small achievement.

Jokingly, I asked Stoops if he feels smarter now that he is a coach with a winning record.

"There are a lot of things I could say here," Stoops said, laughing. "But, I really don't (feel smarter), I really don't." Turning serious, Stoops added, "I just continue to do what I know the best I can."

As Wan'Dale Robinson, Christopher Rodriguez, Will Levis and Co. prepare to lead host Kentucky (2-0, 1-0 SEC) into battle against FCS foe Chattanooga (1-1, 0-0 Southern Conference) Saturday at noon, it feels like an appropriate time to take stock of what Stoops has achieved in what has traditionally been a career-derailing job.

Anyone with even a rudimentary knowledge of UK football history knows that no head man has left Kentucky with a winning record since

Blanton Collier (41-36-3) in 1961.

According to Corey Price, the "numbers guy" in the UK Athletics Communications Department, the last Kentucky coach with a winning record at least 50 games into his Wildcats tenure was Fran Curci — who stood 45-44-2 after suffering a 19-10 loss to Alabama on Sept. 19, 1981.

Curci went on to finish his UK career at 47-51-2, one of the nine straight Kentucky head men prior to Stoops who departed Lexington with losing records as top Cat.

That Stoops has inched above .500 so deep into his UK tenure is made more impressive by the hole he was in when he started.

The season before Stoops was hired, Kentucky went 2-10, 0-8 in the SEC, in 2012. Once Stoops accepted the task of rebuilding at UK, he lost 26 of the first 38 games he coached.

Yet from there, beginning in the third game of his fourth season, Stoops and UK have subsequently gone 39-24.

Price, the UK sports statistician, says Kentucky's .619 winning percentage starting with that third game of 2016 until now is the best run for the Wildcats football program over a 63-game stretch since the Cats went 37-22-4 from Oct. 21, 1951, through Oct. 19, 1957, under Bear Bryant (through 1953) and then Collier.

History says a coach should not be able to dig out of a 12-26 start to build an overall winning record at Kentucky.

Asked if he takes satisfaction in defying UK-football-coaching gravity, Stoops demurred.

"You know me, (my approach is) day-to-day. It's week-to-week. That's how I look at it," Stoops said. "I like my job. I like what I do. I like our team. I like where our program is right now. But it's truly one day at a time. You know and I know how quickly this can be flipped."

In the bigger picture, the run of relative success that has turned Stoops into a winning coach is also lifting the

Kentucky program itself back toward the plus side of the ledger.

From the second game of the 1903 season through the ninth game of 2012, no UK football team ever took the field representing a program with an overall losing record.

Alas, after 109 years, UK football lost the status of an all-time winner in 2012 when the Wildcats fell 33-10 at Missouri in Joker Phillips' final season as UK head coach.

That lowered Kentucky's all-time record to 579-580-44.

For a time, that hole only grew deeper.

By the second game of 2016, when Stoops and the Cats were smoked at Florida 45-7, Kentucky stood at 16 games under .500 overall.

Now, if UK beats Chattanooga on Saturday — and it will be dire and shocking if the Cats fail to tame the Mocs — UK's all-time record as a program will return to .500 at 632-632-44.

Having entered 2021 three games under .500 all-time, Kentucky must go at least 9-4 (based off a 13-game season) to finish this year with an all-time winning mark.

Assuming Stoops stays at UK through at least the 2022 season, he seems certain to make more Kentucky coaching history — both positive and negative.

At 51-50, Stoops needs 10 more wins as UK coach to pass Bryant (60-23-5 from 1946-1953) as Kentucky's all-time wins leader. Conversely, three more defeats will push Stoops past Bill Curry (26-52 from 1990-1996) as UK's loss leader.

Stoops says neither the UK coaching history he has made nor the marks which could be still to come are what motivate him.

"This is not about me," Stoops says.
"It's about our program, our kids, our staff. There's a lot of things that go into it. I'm just the guy who is holding down the seat right now."

Eddie Gran returning to Kentucky football as a 'special assistant' to Mark Stoops

The decision to fire Eddie Gran was a hard one for Mark Stoops to make last December. So when the opportunity presented itself to bring the former offensive coordinator back into the Kentucky football program, it stands to reason it was an easy call to make.

UK on Friday announced the addition of Gran to the football program's staff as a "special assistant to the head coach." Gran, who spent the last five seasons leading the Wildcats' offense, won't have on-field coaching responsibilities in his new role.

"Why would I come back? It's simple. I love Kentucky," Gran, 56, said in a news release. "I love working with Coach Stoops and I want to be a positive role model in these young men's lives. I am excited to have the opportunity to return to this program and help any way I can. This place is special and it's where I want to work and finish out my career."

Stoops hired Gran, along with former quarterbacks coach Darin Hinshaw, away from Cincinnati ahead of the 2016 season, which would be the first of Stoops' tenure in which UK qualified for a bowl trip. Kentucky won its third straight bowl last season, in its fifth straight appearance, but Gran and Hinshaw were relieved of their duties ahead of that game. Liam Coen was hired as UK's offensive coordinator in mid-December but Vince Marrow coordinated the offense in the Wildcats' most recent bowl.

Based on his previous contract, Gran was owed \$2.35 million through June 2022 unless he found a coaching position elsewhere. In a February interview with the Herald-Leader, Gran expressed a desire to continue coaching but acknowledged difficulty in finding a job.

"You really find out who your friends are in this profession when you can get a call back, and, when you don't get calls back," Gran said then. "I've got my core guys and we keep in touch. So that's kind of how it happens. It's really who you know, and you get lucky and somebody gets a job. And, gosh, if you don't know him, you're really almost crud out of luck. But if there's a relationship there, then you have a chance."

Gran's offenses at Kentucky produced some of the best rushing performances in school history — the Wildcats in back-to-back games in 2019 broke the single-game rushing record, and set a season record for rushing (3,624 yards) and rushing touchdowns (36) that same year but yielded diminishing returns in the passing game, finishing at the bottom of the Southeastern Conference in each of his final three seasons. He and Stoops, who first crossed paths a decade ago when the two were both first-time coordinators on Florida State's staff, have both described his departure from the program as a mutual decision.

"I'm grateful to have somebody with the experience of Eddie Gran rejoining our program in a different capacity," Stoops said in the news release. "Eddie has a wealth of experience in many different areas. He will be an asset to me and our program."

Hinshaw, who was owed \$750,000 through June 2022 at the time of his firing, is now a quality control assistant at Central Florida.

'Jalen Geiger makes strong impact in homecoming win at South Carolina

Redshirt sophomore cornerback Jalen Geiger has had a relatively quiet start to his time at Kentucky. In his first two years as a Wildcat, he racked up just four tackles (three solo) and one pass deflection in eight games.

This season alone, Geiger has managed just three total tackles and one QB hit leading up to Saturday's game at South Carolina. As a role player in the secondary, that's to be expected.

Originally a three-star signee out of Columbia, S.C., Geiger returned home in Kentucky's first road matchup of the season, his first game action in his hometown as a Wildcat. And with a bump in reps, he played a crucial role in UK's 16-10 victory.

Geiger finished with two tackles, one tackle for loss, and one pass breakup on a massive fourth-down attempt by the Gamecocks in the fourth quarter. It was a performance that earned praise by head coach Mark Stoops following the win.

"It was really good for him," Stoops said of Geiger. "You can see it's a confidence thing for him. As he gets more and more reps, he's getting better and better, more comfortable. He's really a great young man, getting better and better.

"I love his ability. He's going to be a good player."

It was Geiger's late-game heroics that caught Stoops' eye, namely his ability to make open-field tackles in critical situations. It's not only a "big deal" for his personal development, but the team's growth as a whole.

"Late in the game on their last possession when they got their long field goal, he made some really good open tackles there. That's critical," Stoops added. "I talk about it all the time to

the defense. In a two-minute drill, it's critically important to keep everything in front of you.

"But tackling, you have to get them down, not let them get out of bounds, keep that clock running. That's a big deal for us."

After seeing his work in practice and in the film room, defensive teammate DeAndre Square says Geiger's performance this week is no surprise. And as a whole, his growth and playmaking ability is what Kentucky needs to take the next step forward in the SEC.

"He's been pretty good," Square said following the win. "He works hard in practice, he's always in the film room, and he makes the plays that come to him. That's what you need in the secondary of an SEC defense.

"I'm proud of the way he played tonight. I know he's going to keep it up because he's a hard-working kid."

Mark Stoops is giving Kentucky exactly what he promised nine years ago

The logical place to start is here: How did Kentucky win that football game?

Mark Stoops and the troops traveled south for their SEC road opener Saturday night and emphatically checked the top box on the "how to lose at football" checklist.

Not once, not twice, not thrice but four times UK put the ball on the Williams-Brice Stadium turf.

By game's end, host South Carolina had collected three turnovers — two fumble recoveries and an interception — while Kentucky had forced exactly no TOs.

Yet, defying football logic, UK won a road game in the Southeastern Conference with a turnover tally of minus-3.

Continuing its recent mastery over

South Carolina, Kentucky (4-0, 2-0 SEC) pulled out a 16-10 win over the host Gamecocks (2-2, 0-2 SEC) before an announced crowd of 77,559.

UK won because its defense flat refused to allow the Cats to lose.

Kentucky stopped the hosts three times on fourth-down plays in Wildcats territory. The Cats did not surrender a single point after those three turnovers.

Winning in such a manner was "a real credit to our defense," Stoops said afterward. "I love the way our team fought."

It was Kentucky's seventh victory over SEC East-rival South Carolina in the past eight meetings. It moved Stoops (26-42) past Fran Curci (25-30) as the all-time Kentucky coaching leader in SEC victories.

That Kentucky will carry an unblemished record into Saturday's meeting with No. 11 Florida owes to the fact that Stoops has followed through on one of the vows he made when UK hired the former Florida State defensive coordinator nine years ago as its head coach.

Stoops has built a stout defensive culture at a school that had not consistently had one since the Jerry Claiborne coaching era in the 1980s.

Kentucky defensive resilience was on display everywhere Saturday night.

In the first half, with UK holding a 7-0 lead, the Wildcats "D" snuffed out a South Carolina drive when DeAndre Square and Marquan McCall combined to stop Gamecocks running back Kevin Harris for no gain on fourth-and-1 from the Cats 47.

That was only a warm-up for the crises the Kentucky defenders would have to surmount in half two.

With Kentucky clinging to a 13-7 lead, a Josh Ali fumble gave the Gamecocks the ball at the Cats' 40-yard line with 1:32 left in the third quarter.

Yet, aided by a South Carolina holding penalty, UK forced an incomplete Luke Doty pass on fourth-and-4 from the Kentucky 24 with 13:33 left in the

game.

Alas, Kentucky was not out of self-inflicted danger.

Another Ali fumble gave South Carolina the ball again, this time at the UK 47 with 11:32 left.

But on fourth-and-3 from the Kentucky 40, Wildcats safety Jalen Geiger — a product of Columbia, S.C. — broke up a pass intended for Dakereon Joyner with 9:43 left.

"We always have the mentality, if sudden change happens, we always say 'Good,'" said Square, UK's senior linebacker. "It's the mentality our whole defense has. (Defending after a turnover) is not a bad thing. We get to go out there and show our talent."

According to his Rivals.com recruiting profile, the 6-foot-1, 200-pound Geiger had scholarship offers from Power Five schools such as Boston College, North Carolina, Rutgers and Virginia, in addition to UK.

What the Spring Valley High School product did not have was an offer from hometown South Carolina.

On what became the Gamecocks' final offensive drive of the game, the sophomore again showed the home folks what they missed when he caught Harris for a 6-yard loss on a swing pass on a first-and-10 play from the UK 34.

"I was proud of the way he played tonight," Square said of Geiger.

What we can say with certainty is there were many seasons in recent decades when UK would not have had the defensive gumption to go on the road in the SEC and win a game in which the Cats were minus-three in the turnover ledger.

It happened Saturday night because Stoops has kept his word about building a winning defensive culture at Kentucky.

"I really can't say enough," Mark Stoops said, "about (the UK defense) gutting it out."

Kentucky football's Wan'Dale Robinson has lived up to the hype and then some

We live in the world of the oversold and the overrated, where prospects and transfers rarely match the buildup offered by the hype train.

And then there's Wan'Dale Robinson.

You know, the Real'Deal Robinson. "The truth," Kentucky football teammate Josh Paschal called the former Western Hills High School star and wide receiver transfer from Nebraska when Robinson started sizzling in UK's practices last spring. Paschal added, "You'll see."

We've seen it alright. Robinson topped the 100-yard receiving mark in each of his first three games as a Wildcat. Through four games, he leads the SEC in receiving yards with 402. He's averaging 16.8 yards per catch on his 25 grabs.

Robinson can run the ball, too. Week two, against Missouri at Kroger Field, he took a jet sweep 64 yards on the Wildcats' second play, a tone-setter for an eventual 35-28 Kentucky victory.

And here's the icing on the cake: The kid is tough. Never mind his listed 5-foot-11, 185-pound frame, Robinson won't go down without a fight. He's shown that on the field by forcing tacklers to wrestle him to the ground. And Saturday night at South Carolina, he showed that by just being on the field after rumors he might miss the game because of a hamstring injury.

"At this point, there are nagging things with people," UK coach Mark Stoops said Monday. "It's fair to say he has something nagging him."

Nagging or not, Robinson caught seven passes for 65 yards. Five catches were responsible for first downs. Four catches came on the 13-play, 67-yard march in the third quarter that ended with a 21-yard Matt Ruffolo field goal for a 13-7 Kentucky lead in a 16-10 UK victory.

This is what Big Blue Nation expected, or at least hoped for, when Robinson left Lincoln to return home. Still, hasn't the player who was such a coveted recruit in 2018 exceeded expectations in 2021?

"I knew he was a good player coming out of high school and you can watch the film from Nebraska and know he was a very good player," Stoops said Monday. "I don't want to use the word 'surprised.' I am extremely pleased with him and love his attitude. I love his competitive nature. He is very unselfish. He works very hard. He is all about the team and I love that part of it and yes, by the way, he is very talented."

Talented enough to take it to the next level?

"I think he's a fantastic NFL prospect!" said Emory Hunt, draft analyst for Football Gameplan and co-host of the College Draft podcast with Ross Tucker. "His versatility fits today's game. He can affect the game as a runner or receiver, and has added benefit as a return specialist. If I had a team, I'd spend a second-round pick on him easily."

ROBINSON'S WORK ETHIC HAS IMPRESSED UK

So far, the only knock on Robinson has been that quarterback Will Levis targets his favorite receiver perhaps a little too much. That's not much of a knock. How often have fans grumbled about UK's inability to put the ball in the hands of its best players?

"There were times I wish he was lasered in on him more," Stoops said with a smile.

One more Wan'Dale thing. The best thing. He has been nothing but a worker. No big-time attitude. No entitlement.

"I love his work ethic and also his instincts," Stoops said. "You've heard us talk about Lynn (Bowden), about that a lot, and just his football IQ and

they are different people, but both of them are intelligent on the field."

Now the expectation is Robinson's impact will be ongoing.

"I think now there's no stopping us from recruiting talented wide receivers and getting that speed," Stoops said. "Even if you may say other people have higher numbers, you can look at what we do and what we want to do and as we get better wide receivers, as we get greater skill and speed, we will open things up even more and more."

In part, because Real'Deal has lived up to the hype.

For UK Football Player, Nursing is the Ultimate Team Sport

Colin Goodfellow knows a thing or two about being a team player.

As the punter for the University of Kentucky football team, Goodfellow relies on his teammates to bring the Wildcats to victory. Everyone knows their position and works together. The same model, he says, applies to the dynamic between him and his fellow nurses at UK HealthCare.

"There's a lot of similarity between a nursing staff and a football team," Goodfellow says. "I can't do it without my snapper. In nursing, everyone works together because you don't know what's going to happen next."

Goodfellow graduated from the UK College of Nursing in May 2021, but he opted to return for a fifth year, taking advantage of the NCAA ruling to grant an extra year of eligibility due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This semester, when he's not running drills with his teammates, he's engaged in an independent study with Dean Janie Heath. But balancing the demands of the rigorous nursing program with the schedule of the football team isn't just a unique challenge — it's unprece-

dented.

"I wanted to be a nurse, so I looked up the best nursing schools — UK was at the top of the list," Goodfellow said. "It's the only school in the country that let me do nursing and football at the same time. And I was the first one to do it."

Goodfellow knew from an early age that he wanted to be a nurse. His parents are both in the medical field — his father is an orthopedic surgeon, and his mother is a nurse. In middle school, Goodfellow had surgery on his ankles. He remembers waking up after the procedure to a team of nurses, cracking jokes with him and helping him feel calm and relaxed in an unfamiliar setting.

"As a sixth grader, it's tough to never have had surgery and to wake up in an environment you're not used to," Goodfellow recalled. "And to wake up to people who really care about you and want you to be safe and healthy is pretty cool."

Like everything else, Goodfellow found that managing his coursework with his practice schedule was also a team effort. His freshman year, he took advantage of the college's tutoring center to learn how to effectively take notes and to manage his time. The support staff for the football team helped him with his scheduling so that he would have enough time for his course and clinic work.

"School comes first, then football," Goodfellow said. "Luckily, UK Football was very willing to work with me and my schedule to make sure I could do both, which I'm very grateful for."

There was one unexpected challenge that no amount of support or tutoring could have prepared him for.

"Being one of four guys in the nursing program is a struggle," Goodfellow said with a laugh. "I came from an all-boys high school. So that was definitely a change of experience."

This semester, when he's not running drills with his teammates, he's

engaged in graduate level coursework where he is studying the science behind high performance brain functioning. When Goodfellow is done pulling double-duty as both an SEC punter and a registered nurse, he wants to focus on becoming a nurse anesthetist. He says nurses today, especially new nurses, are facing an extremely challenging work environment in the form of a pandemic, but he believes he and his classmates are more than equipped to meet the challenge.

"Our program does a great job on how to prevent burnout and how to keep motivation as a nurse," he said. "I couldn't have asked for a better home. UK has done a great job shaping me to be a great nurse, a great man and to be a great teammate in nursing."

The scene was so familiar it sent a shudder through Dale Robinson. A long-awaited homecoming. His son's debut with a new team. First touch of the season. Boom, the kid was gone, blazing a diagonal path to the end zone while defenders trailed hopelessly behind him.

This time, it was a 33-yard reception that gave Kentucky its first touchdown of the year and instantly validated a decision by the state's 2018 Mr. Football to transfer back after two seasons at Nebraska. For Dale, it was déjà vu.

"I'm getting chills thinking about it," he says. "You couldn't write a better story."

As Dale watched that welcome-home touchdown unfold last month, he was transported back to the summer of 2015. After serving 8 ½ years in prison for dealing cocaine, he was released just in time to see Wan'Dale play his first high school football game as a freshman at Western Hills in their hometown of Frankfort, Ky. There was one problem: A sundown curfew at his court-ordered halfway house meant Dale couldn't stay to the end. He paced the sideline and stared at his watch, praying for a highlight before it was time to leave.

Per usual, Wan'Dale delivered. Letters to Dale in prison often included photos of Wan'Dale playing football because, "I wanted him to always see me scoring touchdowns," he said. And he wasn't going to miss this chance to finally show his dad in person. So the first time Wan'Dale touched the ball in high school, with only minutes to spare for Dale, he took a jet sweep to the house. There were 118 touchdowns in his Western Hills career,

but that's the one father and son will never forget.

"That's my kid! That's my son! He's doing what I left him doing!" Dale remembers howling. "It was like, 'This is what I've been waiting for, eight long years, to see my son score another touchdown.' It was priceless.

"It was like God telling me, 'This is right on time. You have changed your ways, and you are ready to guide your son in the right direction."

Today, Dale runs his own gym, G.U.R.U. Fitness. Wan'Dale's teammates all react the same way when they see him: Bro, your dad is huge! Dale is also a motivational speaker who has authored a book about the lessons he learned in prison and the life he has built since getting out. But Dale is proudest of co-founding the Wanda Joyce Robinson Foundation in 2018. It's named for his mother — Wan'Dale is a mashup of his their names — and aims to help children of incarcerated parents by providing emotional, financial and educational support.

"I went to prison and left two boys out here to fend for themselves," says Dale, who has an older son named Dalevon. "When I got out, I wanted to help kids like the ones I left behind. Our goal is to help those kids not go the route of their parents in prison. The statistics say eight of 10 kids who have parents incarcerated will go the same way. But that's always been Wan'Dale's thing: 'I'm going to break the cycle.'"

Dale started smoking marijuana in high school and loved it so much that when Jack Harbaugh announced weekly urine tests at Western Kentucky during his sophomore season, Dale quit the team instead of the weed. He gave up a scholarship and his job backing up All-American quarterback Willie Taggart to drop out of college and start selling drugs back home in Frankfort. That was the birth of what eventually became a

seven-figure empire, Dale says, but also earned him two separate bids totaling more than a dozen years in prison. He missed all but 19 months of Wan'Dale's life before high school.

Dale says all of his friends growing up are now dead or behind bars. His brother, Roni, is considered one of the greatest high school athletes Kentucky has ever seen, an all-state football and basketball star, but he spent about a decade in prison himself for robbery — only to get out and rush for more than 3,000 career yards in his late 20s at Kentucky State. Like Dale, 42-year-old Roni still looks like he could play.

"It runs in the family," Wan'Dale says of the athletic gene — and perhaps of finding trouble. "I'm just trying to be different from everybody else, different from what everybody expects. Everybody who knows my family knows the history: Somebody's always messing up, somebody's always going away. I just wanted to break that cycle, stay on the straight path and just make it. Sometimes I feel like it's a blessing that I went through what I did with my dad because I don't think I'd be the way I am now without it. It made me grow up. It made me realize what I do want and what I don't want in life."

One thing he wants is to play in the NFL, and that's looking more likely every day. Despite his stature Robinson is listed at 5-foot-11, 185 pounds — he's a compact powerhouse with ankle-breaking moves and game-changing speed. After amassing 914 receiving yards and 580 rushing yards in two seasons at Nebraska, he has become an instant star at Kentucky. Through four games, he leads the SEC in receiving yards (402) and ranks third in receptions (25). Only one FBS player in the country has more plays of 30-plus yards from scrimmage than Robinson's six.

He is the first Wildcats player since Derek Abney 20 years ago to record three consecutive 100-yard receiving games and the only player in program history to open a season that way. On Saturday night, he'll try to help undefeated Kentucky deliver one of the biggest wins of the Mark Stoops era when top-10 Florida comes to Kroger Field.

For the children Dale's foundation serves, "Wan'Dale is the hero," his father says. "He's proof that anything is possible. We use him and my other son, who has a criminal justice degree, to say, 'You can still make it, regardless of your circumstances, even if your parents aren't there.' We use their story and allow them to speak to kids so they can feel like, 'I'm not alone. If these guys can make it, I can make it too.""

When Wan'Dale signed the first name, image and likeness deal between any UK athlete and a car dealership — joining Stoops and John Calipari as pitchmen for Paul Miller Ford in Lexington — he also announced that a portion of the proceeds from any of his NIL agreements will go to the Wanda J. Robinson Foundation. He plans to give his time, too, as a speaker and mentor. After all, he is the literal poster child for its mission.

"My dad realizes that there were people who surrounded me and helped while he was gone, and he just wants to be there for the kids who are going through that same situation without that same support," Wan'Dale says. "And my message to them is that they can get through it. You gotta have a dream and do everything you can to go get it."

In his book, "The Making of a Guru," Dale thanks the "mothers of my sons for tirelessly carrying the load and ensuring our boys became men." He thanks Mike and Kelley Hawkins, Wan'Dale's former coach and his wife, who frequently welcomed Dale's boys into their home and "served as their substitute families." Dale thanks his sons, writing: "I do what I do for you and kids like you. You made me want

to be something different."

When Wan'Dale was just a baby, Dale got caught on a drug run to Atlanta and served 51 months in prison. Instead of reforming inside, he plotted how to grow his illegal business even bigger and not get caught again. He ignored every warning to leave that life behind — getting shot, losing \$1.6 million, seeing his best friend killed — and squandered his second chance. He was free for about a year and a half, long enough to enroll in college and start teaching 5-year-old Wan'Dale the sport he loves.

Frankfort only offered flag football for kids that age and Dale wanted him to play tackle, so they drove 60 miles to Louisville several times per week and used a fake birth certificate to get Wan'Dale into a league for older boys: "About halfway through the season, they figured out, 'That ain't this kid's name.'" In those earliest days, before spending much time on Xs and Os, Dale taught Wan'Dale what he considered the most important lesson.

"When you step on the field, who is the best player out there?" he asked regularly Wan'Dale.

"Me," Wan'Dale was required to answer until he actually began to believe it.

"Since I was 5," he says now, "that's the thing I think about every time I walk onto the field. That's what helped get me to the point I am now. It's not even a cockiness. It's just a mindset you need, 'Nobody is going to be better than me today."

Those are happy memories, father and son bonding over football, Dale rolling in money again and buying Wan'Dale whatever he wanted to make up for lost time. It was, of course, too good to be true. On the day in 2007 when federal agents surrounded Dale, who planned to swap a duffel bag full of cocaine for \$250,000, he was supposed to pick Wan'Dale up from a summer youth program. He

called his then-wife and Wan'Dale's mother, Victoria Davis, and asked her to break the news. She declined.

"I told Dale he had to do that. I wasn't going to be the one," Davis says. "I think what he's doing now is great. He's really turned his life around. I just wish he would've done it prior to going to prison. I tried. I did what I could. I voiced my opinion, but it didn't make a difference. He had to hit the bottom before he finally got his head on."

Here's what the bottom looked like: Six-year-old Wan'Dale sobbing on the other side of prison glass as his father explained he was going to be gone for the better part of a decade. Worse still, the final seven years would be served at a prison in New Jersey, meaning they'd only see each other in person twice during that time.

"When I walked away from that glass, it changed my life," Dale says. "It was crushing. It was probably the worst feeling I ever felt."

It flipped a switch in him. This time in prison, Dale was introspective and obsessed with self-improvement. He became a voracious reader and a personal trainer — the latter by accident. A younger inmate wanted to know the secret to his shredded look and begged for lifting tips until Dale relented. He scribbled workouts on scraps of paper that he has kept for all these years since. Those crumpled notes and another inmate's nickname for him, "The Guru," planted the first seeds for what is now Dale's gym in Frankfort.

He was eventually released early for good behavior, excluding one incident. Dale tried to sneak a cell phone into the prison and earned three months of solitary confinement the day before Wan'Dale was scheduled to visit for his birthday.

"Every birthday gets me closer to my dad coming home," Wan'Dale remembers thinking. "OK, now I'm 10, just a few more years." The fact that Dale was allowed just 300 minutes per month on the prison phone meant he had to cut off communication with just about everyone in his life — and might explain the cell phone caper. He prioritized calls with his sons. To her eternal credit, Dale says, Wan'Dale's mother always handed him the phone. His incarceration had made her life brutally hard as a single mother suffering from multiple sclerosis and fibromyalgia, but she knew her son needed his dad.

"I can't believe he was gone all that time, because their relationship is great," Davis says. "I think I'm a big part of that, too, because I didn't try to keep them apart."

They're divorced now, but Robinson's parents co-parent and travel together to watch him play. Dale is remarried with an 18-month-old daughter who is "already jacked," he says.

Wan'Dale isn't bitter or ashamed about his dad's past. The overwhelming emotion, he said, is pride about the dramatic change Dale has made. He admires his father, but he worships his mother, and he doesn't want her story to get lost here.

"She's why I play. Everything I'm trying to get is for her," he says. "She's really the one who harped on me that I can't be like the rest of them. Sometimes you have to be different. Different is good. Saying no is OK. You can't just say yes to everything. My mom taught me that."

Dreaming big in prison was easy. Bringing those dreams to life on the outside was harder than Dale expected. He applied to be a personal trainer at every gym in Frankfort and Lexington after he got out, but checking the "convicted felon" box on job applications was a non-starter. He took a factory job for \$7.50 an hour, 25 percent of which went to the halfway house. Then there was a janitorial gig at Kentucky State, where he skipped lunch and gave free fitness lessons during his break from mopping floors

and scrubbing toilets.

That first Christmas, 14-year-old Wan'Dale only wanted one thing: a baseball bat. Dale, who once loved to spoil his son, couldn't afford it. In fact, he couldn't afford any gifts. He barely could put food on the table. As that harsh reality set in, Wan'Dale curled up beside his father and cried. "That was the moment," Dale says, that he had another epiphany. If he could build a booming illegal business (twice), surely he could build a successful legal enterprise. On Jan. 1, 2016, he posted on Facebook that he was starting G.U.R.U. Fitness. In the garage of his late mother's house.

Three people showed up. One of them was Amy Nance Snow. Fate had intervened. They grew up together in Frankfort, and she knew enough about him to not be fearful of working out in an ex-con's garage. She didn't balk when he smoothed out a tiny scrap of paper from prison to read off that day's exercise plan.

"I didn't have any hesitations. I was actually drawn to that setting. I didn't want a bunch of people looking at me. I just wanted to sweat or snort and nobody cares because we're all there to be pushed and held accountable," Snow says. "Once you meet Dale, you know instantly he's very genuine and very direct, and he brings something really irreplaceable to the table: He's an example of somebody who has completely changed his life but is not afraid to discuss his failures, his wrong decisions. There's no secrets with Dale. That kind of environment really pushes people to grow and reach their own personal success."

Today, G.U.R.U. is an actual gym, in a commercial space, with about 300 members. In the fall of 2018, with the business beginning to take flight, Dale asked Snow to meet him at Starbucks to discuss another vision he had in prison. He knew she had been a caseworker for kids in foster care, a juvenile probation officer and currently

serves as the dropout prevention coordinator for Franklin County Schools, which meant she was the perfect person to help him reach at-risk kids. Over coffee, they scratched out the mission statement for the Wanda Joyce Robinson Foundation right there on a napkin.

The gist, as Dale sees it: "Help kids deal with the trauma of having their parents locked up."

It turns out, that's a cause that lots of folks wanted to get behind. Today, the foundation has a 21-member board, with Snow as its president, and supports a dozen outreach programs that impacted more than 300 children of incarcerated parents in and around Franklin County in 2019. COVID-19 has limited what the group can do since then, but in normal times that list is long.

The foundation helps facilitate in-person prison visitations and free video visitations. It has a literacy program that encourages inmates to read to their children in recorded messages. It provides financial support to families traveling long distances for visitations and offers volunteer drivers for trips within a four-hour radius. And it signs up kids for extracurricular activities and hosts family days to get peers together who are similarly impacted by incarceration.

"That's a big thing," Dale says.

"Because it's really hard on a child when they go to school functions and people are always asking, 'Where's your dad?' It's hard and maybe a little embarrassing to say, 'My dad's locked up.' But when you're surrounded by other people in the same situation, it's easier for you to say it and hold your head up."

Beating Florida didn't happen overnight; now Kentucky football needs to keep it going By John Clay Lexington Herald-Leader October 3, 2021

Rome wasn't built in a day. Neither was Kentucky football's epic Saturday night win over 10th-ranked Florida. It might have been UK's first home victory over the dreaded Gators since 1986, but the seeds were planted nine seasons ago. My how they've grown.

First, UK AD Mitch Barnhart bucked the trend, hiring a defensive coordinator to be his head coach when so many of his colleagues were choosing offense. Then Mark Stoops built back better. Brick by brick. Season by season. Breakthrough by breakthrough. Bowl by bowl. One good recruiting class followed by a better recruiting class. The only way to build a better football program: Sign and develop better football players.

The fans were the final piece of the puzzle. This isn't the old days, when Big Blue Nation filled Commonwealth Stadium every Saturday to back the Cats. We live in a different world now, with infinite choices for your entertainment dollar. UK didn't enjoy the traditional ticket booth boost after hiring a new coach. It took awhile for Stoops to get the BBN to totally buy in

Saturday night, that support exploded. A jam-packed Kroger Field let it rip and Florida felt the noise. Eight times the Gators were whistled for false start penalties. The Kentucky defense felt it, too, rising up to meet the moment, especially in the final moments, holding the Gators out of the end zone after the visitors owned a first-and-goal from the 5.

Same movie, different ending. In 2017, Kentucky led Florida 27-14 only to lose 28-27. In 2019, Kentucky led Florida 21-10 only to lose 29-21. In 2021, Kentucky led Florida 20-10 with

11:32 to go and won 20-13. Florida departed with heads down, ears ringing.

"A big shout-out to you," was Stoops' salute to the BBN.

The Gators outgained the Cats 382-224, but Florida could never dial up the big play that had burned the Cats so many times in the past. UK defensive coordinator Brad White's master plan made Dan Mullen's team work for their yards. Nothing cheap. Nothing easy. (Barnhart's smart bet on a strong Stoops' defense paid off.) Mission accomplished, the pent-up frustration of 16 consecutive home losses to the Gators spilled over the barriers onto the field in a celebration to savor. UK can afford the fine.

"Unbelievable," said Kentucky defensive end Josh Paschal, who played a fairly unbelievable game himself. "We loved it."

Now here's the thing: A one-off would only cheapen the feat of finally beating Florida. Now 5-0 overall and 3-0 in the SEC, the Cats have placed themselves in prime position to be a major factor in the SEC race. Five league games to go. Job 1 is LSU. The Tigers arrive Saturday night for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff on the SEC Network. The Cats need to follow up.

History lesson: Think back to 2007. Rich Brooks was the man in charge when Kentucky knocked off No. 1-ranked and eventual national champion LSU 43-37 in an overtime thriller at Commonwealth Stadium. College GameDay and Tim Tebow came to Lexington the following Saturday. But Florida triumphed 45-37. The next week, Mississippi State doubled UK's misery, beating the Cats 31-14. Momentum vanished.

National champions in 2019, LSU has slipped since, 5-5 last year, 3-2 so far this season. Saturday, the Tigers lost 24-19 at home to Auburn. Joe Burrow isn't walking through that door. Still, LSU is LSU. Ed Orgeron has outstanding players. Who knows, this Saturday might be the night the Tigers

put it all together.

Meanwhile, Kentucky must avoid the seductive pats on the back.
Remember last year when a breakthrough 34-7 win at Tennessee was followed by a 20-10 flat tire at Missouri. Games are won during the week. Time to get back to work.

"We want to play in a lot of big games," Stoops said Saturday. "To do that, you have to take care of what's right in front of you."

After all, Kentucky football worked too long and too hard to let Saturday's home triumph go to waste.

'We proved our identity.' UK defense thriving with its back against the wall.

Florida had nine opportunities to run a game-tying — or, if it scored a touchdown and got a two-point conversion, game-winning — play inside Kentucky's 20-yard line inside the final minute of play. And nine times, the Gators failed to find pay dirt.

That sequence of plays featured two of Florida's eight false-start penalties, the product of a sold-out Kroger Field. Kentucky's crowd was the first group to receive praise from head coach Mark Stoops in his postgame news conference, and was lauded by every staffer and player who spoke with media afterward.

The crowd deserved its credit. But it didn't take long for UK's ball-stoppers to get their due.

"Defensively, back-to-back, as good of performances that we've had in a long time," Stoops said.

A seven-play, 75-yard drive on Florida's second series put the Gators up 7-0 midway through the first quarter, but it proved to be an outlier rather than a tone-setter. They put together two other lengthy scoring drives, but both were capped by field goals after

stalling in UK territory. Florida piled up 54 yards on its final series, but its last play that drive was a pass deflected by Jacquez Jones. Kentucky soon after kneeled for a 20-13 victory.

Josh Paschal finished with seven tackles, 2.5 of them for a loss, and blocked the Gators' second field-goal try of the game, a play that turned more than momentum in Kentucky's direction. He got both hands on a ball that deflected into the hands of true freshman linebacker Trevin Wallace, who hauled it 76 yards for a touchdown that gave UK a 14-10 lead, to which it clung for the remainder.

Paschal was back in Lexington when UK defeated Florida in Gainesville in 2018, a victory that ended a 31-game losing streak to the Gators. He played a little bit at the end of that season after undergoing offseason surgery to remove a malignant melanoma discovered on his right foot, but he has since blossomed into one of the team's biggest leaders. Earlier this year he became the first Kentucky football player to be named a captain in three straight seasons.

Saturday's win was something of a "coming full-circle" moment for the senior.

"You just cherish it," Paschal said.
"I remember, looking back on 2018, and wishing I could be there to make plays. It's a blessing to be here a couple years later making those plays and being able to help my team out with this win."

Paschal wasn't in the game for all of UK's final defensive series — sophomore Tre'vonn Rybka took over on the majority of snaps — but his influence was felt then and throughout the game. He brought a sense of calm to a defensive line that in the first quarter lost its starting nose guard, senior Marquan McCall, to an ankle injury; he was injured on the only Florida series that ended in a touchdown. Defensive coordinator Brad White said he needs to review the tape, but he

didn't think back-ups Josaih Hayes and Justin Rogers did anything detrimental in relief of McCall.

"When a big player like Marquan goes down, you're thrown into the fire," Paschal said. "And that was a big game with a big atmosphere. A lot of pressure that a young guy can feel, and to see those guys step up, and make those plays, and just be able to go in there and not skip a beat? We're really glad to see that."

Kentucky's offense last week at South Carolina put the defense in some dicey situations, and it responded on each occasion. Penalties and turnovers weren't an issue this week when UK had the ball in its hands, but it had a tough time getting any traction. The Wildcats were 1-for-9 on third down and had the ball for only 23 minutes of game time, so for a second straight week the defense got plenty of what it describes as "opportunities."

Florida racked up yardage — it wasn't too far from doubling up Kentucky, 382 to 224 — but the Cats held the Gators to a season-low 171 rushing yards; they were averaging 323 yards per game, No. 3 in the nation, coming in. Quarterback Emory Jones was held in a check most of the night, and lauded backup Anthony Richardson in his few appearances didn't demonstrate the level of wizardry he did against non-Power Five competition earlier in the season.

With a victory on the line against a top-10 team that's had its number for the better part of the last 35 years, Kentucky withstood blow after blow in the red zone and walked away with a school-record fourth straight win decided by single digits.

"They have played really well with their backs against the wall," White said.

Paschal, unknowingly doing an imitation of Stoops from about 30 minutes earlier, said UK would celebrate for a few hours tonight and then move

onto LSU. The Wildcats will likely be ranked, in large part thanks due to a historic string of defensive efforts.

They didn't have anything to prove to themselves, but the nation will be on alert, now.

"We proved that we can play with anybody," Paschal said. "We already knew that. We proved our identity. We're a defense that will swarm around the ball and that, no matter what happens, we're gonna bounce back and respond.

"We're a true brotherhood here at UK."

After cancer kept him from 2018 Florida win, Josh Paschal earned his moment vs. Gators By Jon Hale Louisville Courier Journal September 3, 2021

When Kentucky snapped its 31-game losing streak to Florida in 2018, one of two game balls awarded in the postgame locker room celebration by coach Mark Stoops went to defensive lineman Josh Paschal.

But Paschal was not in Gainesville that night. Like the rest of Big Blue Nation, he was at home in Lexington watching from his couch, screaming until his voice went hoarse.

The Wildcats emotional leader was still in early weeks of a year of immunotherapy treatments following his malignant melanoma diagnosis. While he would return to the field for the final four games of what ended up being a historic 2018 season, Paschal was not there to celebrate with his teammates for so many of the 10-win season's biggest moments.

Three years later, Paschal and Kentucky fans got to celebrate together as the No. 23-ranked Wildcats stunned No. 9 Florida with a stellar defensive performance in a 20-13 win Saturday.

As the sellout crowd stormed the field from the Kroger Field stands, Paschal could not help but take a

moment to think about how far he had come since the program's last win over Florida, one of just two in the last 35 meetings.

"This is something you just cherish," Paschal said. "I remember looking back in 2018 and wishing I could be there to make plays. It's a blessing to be here a couple years later making those plays and being able to help my team out with this win."

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"The blocked field goal was a game-changer, but it was more than that," defensive coordinator Brad White said of Paschal. "Play after play after play, he's in the backfield. His effort, everybody feeds off that. I feed of it as a play-caller. I try to call up things to get him going or get some matchups because I wouldn't want to be an offensive player trying to block him."

To Paschal's point, he was far from the only defensive standout for the Wildcats.

On a night where Kentucky's offense totaled just 211 yards, UK's defense held Florida to a season-low 382 yards, 57 less than the Gators totaled against No. 1 Alabama two weeks ago. Florida entered the game ranked third nationally in rushing offense (322.5 yards per game) but was held 151.5 yards short of its season average in that category.

One week after holding South Carolina without any points after three UK turnovers, including back-to-back

fourth-down stops after Kentucky lost fumbles in the second half, the Wildcat defense saved its best play for when the stakes were highest against Florida.

Paschal's blocked field goal came after the defense forced a three-and-out following a Florida interception that started its drive at Kentucky's 31-yard line. Early in the fourth quarter, sophomore outside linebacker J.J. Weaver, who tore his ACL in the Wildcats' November loss at Florida last season, intercepted a pass and returned it to the Florida 29-yard line to set up a pivotal Chris Rodriguez touchdown run to give Kentucky a two-score advantage.

With the Wildcats leading by 10 in the fourth quarter, the defense finally looked gassed as Florida moved down the field with ease into the red zone but stepped up to hold the Gators to a 33-yard field goal.

Following a three-and-out from Kentucky's offense, Florida again marched into Wildcat territory. As the Gators earned a first-and-goal at UK's 9-yard line with time winding down, most of the 61,632 fans at Kroger Field had to be thinking of Florida's last two trips to Lexington in which Kentucky blew double-digit fourth quarter leads.

This time, Kentucky kept Florida from scoring on seven consecutive plays, capped by a Jacquez Jones' pass deflection in the end zone to seal the win.

"Tonight was special," Stoops said.
"That was a thing of beauty defensively. I mean, we gave up some yards ... but overall, just to have that desire, the heart, the guts to stand up and getting seven, eight stops at the end is amazing.

"...I mean, it's incredible. It's a credit to our team."

Stoops, White and Kentucky players were quick to credit Big Blue Nation for an assist in the win. To be sure, without Florida's eight noise-induced

false starts, including two in the seven-play sequence to end the game, Kentucky would not have recorded its first win over the Gators in Lexington since 1986.

But Kentucky fans have been loud for near misses against Florida at the facility formerly known as Commonwealth Stadium before. What the Wildcats lacked in those games was the type of elite defense on display the last two weeks.

And that defense would not be what it is without Paschal leading the way.

Paschal was stunned to see how quickly the field clogged with fans as soon as the final buzzer sounded, but he made sure to embrace the moment. Just more than two years after his cancer treatments ended, Paschal was in the center of the celebration this time rather than watching it from home.

His cancer battle remains a key part of Paschal's story, but it does not define him anymore. Leading his team to wins like Saturday is just as important.

"This may be bad to say, you don't think about (the cancer) anymore," White said. "I thought about it in 2019, and a little bit in 2020. But this year, you don't even think about it. The way he plays, it doesn't show any glimpses that he had fought that battle. That's not to take away the battle that he fought, which was unbelievable.

"The fact that he's worked so hard, you would never guess. That's a testament to him."

Liam Coen: "I just keep going back to the belief of this team" By Eric Decker

"Believe it and it will happen." It's not quite exactly what Liam Coen said last night, but he decided to become Michael Strahan for a second when describing the 2021 'Cats.

"I just keep going back to the belief, the belief of this team," Coen, Kentucky's first-year offensive coordinator, said after walking out with a win in his first game against Florida. "Our defense is stacked, they just did such a great job tonight. I would've loved to contribute more, but I'm really happy to be a part of it."

It's good that Coen has the awareness to praise the defense immediately after the game—they won the game for Kentucky once again. I wouldn't even put much blame on the offensive coordinator anyway, he really didn't call a bad game.

Field position football still works I don't think it's very controversial to say that football in the NFL and the NCAA are vastly different. For a large portion of college games and programs in the modern era, it's simply about who can get to 50 points first.

Offenses usually focus on how often they can try to score through big plays, regardless of how the other phases of the game are going. The NFL is very much still a game about field position and clock management. So maybe poaching an NFL coach over the offseason was exactly what they needed, regardless of if the numbers aren't meeting expectations yet.

It sure wasn't a flawless performance either though against Florida. Coen had some questionable decisions that could've easily been avoided. Play-calling wasn't perfect, specifically looking back at that ugly bootleg call in the second half. But that being said, it's still a major upgrade to what people in Lexington have come to expect.

Coen still was able to get Wan'Dale Robinson out in space multiple times to where he could let his star receiver make plays. He did commit to the run at certain points of the game when it was working and killing the clock, even if he did take Rodriguez out maybe a tad too much. He schemed up a

game that played off of his defense and won the game, which is all that really matters.

Where does the belief go?

This is uncharted waters for the BBN. 5-0 and arguably the third-best team in the SEC. They have no idea how to react. No wonder State Street turned into the Burning Man festival with every couch on campus. People around Lexington have a taste of what it can be like to be good in the SEC, and we're starting to learn that it's insatiable.

The city and the school are all in now, there's no more doubt there.

The team has just been waiting for them to join in. This team really believes that they can win against whoever they go up against, which may be true outside of Georgia (and Georgia shouldn't count). That alone is massive for this team to be able to succeed. Tonight was a major hurdle in the perception of the program. If Coen and the rest of 'Cats can keep it up against a now 3-2 LSU next weekend, the legitimacy of the football team only grows.

This is a coaching staff that knows how to prepare for and win close games. I wouldn't worry if the offense ever really fully explodes this season, they don't need it to. They have an elite defense that will keep them in almost any game, Liam Coen and the offense just need to find a way to do enough.

Kentucky football: No worries, DC Brad White getting things done in Lexington

It's all about the defense. Mark Stoops was a defensive guy. Given UK's myriad offensives struggles since 2013, it's fair to assume that Stoops' game plan was about the defense. Make opponents plod down the field. Take away the big play, but still sting occasionally with tackles for loss. Outslug the opponent, rinse, repeat and go to bowl games.

Which was why losing Matt House felt like a big deal. Stoops never quite connected with his first UK defensive coordinator, DJ Eliot, and Eliot struggled to craft UK's defense into an SEC-level group. Even discounting the 2013 season, when Stoops and Eliot inherited sub-SEC talent, UK struggled. In Eliot's last 3 seasons, UK allowed 31, 27, and 31 points per game, coughing up 407, 394, and 434 yards per game.

But when Stoops brought in Matt House, suddenly things clicked. Maybe that had something to do with guys like Mike Edwards and Josh Allen gaining experience and maturity. Or maybe House had the secret formula. When House helped the 2018 UK defense hold foes to 16.8 points and 338 yards per game en route to a 10-3 season, it felt like the secret formula. And when House headed for the Kansas City Chiefs (where he promptly won a Super Bowl), it felt like Kentucky might fall off.

Enter Brad White. If you've paid attention to Liam Coen's story, you might feel like you're hearing it again with White's background. In fact, the two were high school rivals. A New Englander (from Rhode Island), White had coached a few years in college and then worked his way onto Chuck Pagano's staff with the Indianapolis Colts. While the Colts slowly declined from reaching the AFC Championship game in White's first year to going 4-12 in his last, White, along with the rest of Pagano's staff, became expendable. Just in time for Kentucky to swoop in.

In Year 3 of White's work in Lexington, the sky has definitely not fallen. Kentucky has continued its streak of bowl appearances and has generally continued to be a defensive pest. Even in 2020's crazy all-SEC season,

White held SEC offenses to just under 26 points and 381 yards per game. In 2019, the numbers were 19.3 points and 325 yards per game. So far in 2021, it's 16.8 points and 284 yards per game. Kentucky has gone 18-11 with White leading the defense, and suddenly it feels like maybe Matt House didn't take the secret sauce to KC when he left.

In fact, White is conducting an SEC masterclass with his Kentucky defense right now. In Week 4, South Carolina held Kentucky to just 16 points in Columbia. That would spell trouble for most opponents, but not Kentucky. White's defense held Carolina to 216 total yard, 12 first downs and 10 points. While the offense dealt out a trio of turnovers, White's Wildcats stood strong, stopping Carolina on a pair of attempted 4th-down conversions that salted away the game.

But Florida would be different? Not much. Yes, UF (we hear you, Dan Mullen) amassed 382 total yards. But Kentucky faced the SEC's most dangerous big-play offense — UF had 28 plays of 20+ yards in their first 4 games — and shut it down. UF had 1 20-yard play, a 22-yard completion in the first quarter. That was it. And deprived of the big play, a Florida offense that was averaging over 35 points per game took home a 20-13 loss.

White wasn't surprised.

"There's a calm that anytime (the defense) gets put in these situations ... there's no anxiety. There's a high awareness that you have to step up and play," White said.

Stoops waxed a little more rhapsodic after the game.

"Defensively, back to back as good of performances as we've had in a long time," he said. "A credit to Coach White ... the staff, the players."

White's no-nonsense demeanor, his careful game planning, and his ability to get results from his players speak well toward his future. When Marquan McCall was hurt early on

Saturday, White coaxed an impressive effort from his other interior defensive linemen. When linebacker Jamin Davis became a first-round draft pick of the Washington Redskins, White plugged in transfer Jacquez Jones and freshman Trevin Wallace. Jones broke up the win-clinching pass, and Wallace returned a blocked field goal in the third quarter to give UK a lead it did not relinquish.

Kentucky is going places, and Brad White's defense is right at the heart of it. Just like Mark Stoops planned.

3 things to know about Kentucky football's Darian Kinnard, a top NFL Draft prospect

Darian Kinnard is one of the top offensive lineman in the country. Here are three things to know about the 6-foot-5, 345-pound senior:

Darian Kinnard pancakes people 'like he's about to eat breakfast'

Kinnard racked up a myriad of recognition heading into the 2021 season: he was named to the Outland Trophy Watch List for the nation's top interior lineman, a preseason All-American by multiple outlets, and was graded by Pro Football Focus (PFF) as college football's No. 1 run-blocking tackle.

The three-year starter is an imposing force and running back Chris Rodriguez has said that Kinnard pancakes people "like he's about to eat breakfast."

UK has had a strong running game in recent years, and Kinnard has been a key factor.

"He's obviously very, very strong," UK offensive line coach Eric Wolford said before the season. "But he's a gifted athlete, too. When you're 340-plus pounds and able to move and change direction like that ... that's the sign of an athlete."

Kinnard would have been selected in the 2021 NFL Draft, but he opted to return for another season in Lexington, and he's considered to be a first or second-round prospect for next year's draft.

The Athletic rated him as the No. 34 overall player in August and one analyst for The Draft Network has him at No. 15 — right in the middle of the first round. Prior to the Florida game, PFF ranked him as the only offensive tackle in the country with an 85 or higher grade in run and in pass blocking.

Pro Football Network described him as having "surprising mobility" and "otherwordly size."

"Kinnard is truly an eye-catching prospect," the site wrote.

Kinnard went to high school in Cleveland, Ohio, but is a Knoxville, Tenn. native and his aunt is a first cousin of country music legend Dolly Parton, although he's never actually met her.

"It's kind of cool," he said. "I grew up going to Dollywood and stuff like that, but I never really go around saying my cousin is Dolly Parton. ... I just go about my business and focus on doing what I have to do."

Like Will Levis and Caleb Williams, this season of great storylines shapes up to only get better

Will Levis' Sunday featured an autograph session at a local bar and a weekly dinner with his offensive linemen. Both were paid events. Both spoke to just how quickly he has won everyone over at Kentucky.

That he was named the Walter Camp offensive player of the week speaks to the impression he and his Wildcats are making on the rest of the nation, and the spotlight will be on Kentucky this Saturday when ESPN's "College GameDay" visits Athens for a showdown with No. 1 Georgia in a battle of the SEC's only unbeaten teams.

Kentucky came in at No. 11 in this week's AP poll. Levis is the first quarterback since at least 1993 to win his first six starts in a Wildcat uniform.

Not bad for a Penn State grad transfer whose only real impression of Kentucky football had come in a 2018 Citrus Bowl loss during his redshirt year with the Nittany Lions.

"These past couple of weeks have been big wins, but the mentality has always been the same: it's on to the next one, and as soon as we wake up on Sunday and watch the film, we turn the page and get prepared for the next one," Levis said Sunday night by phone. "We obviously celebrated after the game yesterday in the locker room, celebrated with my family a little bit, but when it comes down to waking up the next day you've got to just move on, focus on the next task at hand.

"Especially this past week coming off the Florida win, just how historic that was to the program, you've seen a lot of teams historically have wins like that and kind of have that hangover the next week. We really want to make sure that wasn't us. Coach (Mark) Stoops made that very clear to us and wanted us to take seriously our preparation for the week, which we did, and I'm sure that he's going to have the same message for us this week. That's how we've got to approach it if we want to go out there and play our best game and give us a chance to win it."

That showed on Saturday against LSU, as Levis completed 14 of 17 passes for 145 yards with three touchdowns and rushed for 75 yards and two more scores in a 42-21 win that was surprising only in how unsurprising it seemed to come against the 2019 national champs.

The 6-foot-3, 232-pound Levis

proved tough to bring down, posting a season high in rushing yards while having his most efficient passing performance of the season. Kentucky boasts the SEC's leader in rushing yards (Chris Rodriguez Jr., 768) and receiving yards (Wan'Dale Robinson, 527), and the offense under first-year coordinator Liam Coen is only beginning to materialize.

"Honestly, I don't think it's really clicked that much yet," Levis said of the offense. "This past week we had our most complete game offensively, for sure. We've shown flashes of what we're able to do offensively. It's a great system, but it's a system that takes some time to really get comfortable with. And the fact we've been able to win games like we have while still not playing to our full potential goes to show how much better and how good this team can be once we get things firing on all cylinders."

The 35-year-old Coen was hired this offseason from the Sean McVay coaching tree, having served as an assistant with the Rams the past three seasons. A native of Warwick, R.I., Coen had initially recruited Levis, a fellow New Englander, out of Madison, Conn., before the latter ultimately chose Penn State. Their connection in Lexington has proved to be the key to unlocking one of the best stories through the first half of the college football season, with Coen and Levis regularly texting each other while watching Rams games to identify the similarities between the two teams.

"We text each other like, 'Hey, that's this,' or 'Hey, that's that,' " Levis said. "It's a way for us to see and understand what it should look like. We're striving for perfection; we're never going to get perfect, but we're always striving for perfection, and those guys are executing that offense as close to perfect as you can in some aspects, so it's really cool to watch.

"It's really cool to see a guy like Matt Stafford, who honestly I see some of myself in just with what I'm able to do with my arm. And it's good for receivers to watch, too, just with the details of the routes and the timing of everything. So it's just cool to see pros do what pros do."

Levis has earned plenty of viral fame for a TikTok account that includes videos of him eating a whole banana and of him putting mayonnaise in his coffee. His appetite, however, is far from limited.

The Sunday dinners with his offensive linemen are part of an NIL deal he signed with Malone's, a local steakhouse that pays for Levis and nine teammates of his choice to gorge themselves after game day. (Levis knows to take care of those who take care of him, and he was named a team captain before even playing in a game at Kentucky.)

His autograph session earlier on Sunday took place at Kentucky Sports Bar and Grill, drawing enough fans to keep him busy for 90 minutes straight.

Levis recently launched a merchandise line with the help of his mother, Beth, who runs an apparel company. He has partnered with the Lexington Leadership Foundation and will apply to be a mentor in its Amachi program, which assists children whose parents are incarcerated.

Busy is all Levis knows. This is a guy who ran five miles backward last summer to raise more than \$3,800 for COVID-19 response efforts as part of the Makin' Lemonade Fund, a community-based fundraising organization that was started by college students. He has described the NIL era as a learning process, relying on the guidance of those close to him to strategically allot time for interests that won't interfere with winning football games. (He cited the Sunday signing session as an example, as it was originally scheduled for a Thursday before he realized that Stoops might be uneasy with the event coming so close to a game day.)

Kentucky's success so far has only made Levis hungrier, and the options afforded to him in that department have rated as the biggest surprise in his transition from Central Pennsylvania to Central Kentucky.

"The food here is awesome," Levis said, laughing. "I've been to some awesome restaurants here. Honestly, I think a lot of people who have been to State College would agree with me. I love State College, but the one thing that was lacking there was the food scene a little bit. Being a football player, you're always hungry, looking for a place to eat. And there are a couple of good restaurants out there, but it doesn't compare to what's down here. There's awesome, awesome places."

How Wan'Dale Robinson and Liam Coen joined forces to become a revelation in Lexington

In a meeting room on the second floor of Kentucky's football facility, Liam Coen is sitting at the head of a table chatting with a visiting reporter when the door opens. The Wildcats' first-year offensive coordinator doesn't skip a beat as he turns his chair so that he can dap up the guy who entered the room rocking an olive drab green hoody. It's Wan'Dale Robinson, whom Coen just spent the better part of the last half hour heaping praise onto.

Coen is never lacking words to describe Robinson — the Kentucky OC openly calls him the team's best offensive player — which is fitting. In his first year back in his home state, the Nebraska transfer is the talk of the town. The former Kentucky Mr. Football winner is the SEC's leading receiver, he reportedly has at least 6 figures worth of NIL money rolling in and above all else, Robinson's mil-

lion-dollar smile is the face of Coen's new Sean McVay-inspired offense in Lexington.

"(Coen) and I were both really excited to add Wan'Dale to our roster,"
Kentucky coach Mark Stoops told SDS on the SEC Coaches Teleconference.
"What I love about Liam and the offense is it's easy for him to target guys. They do a good job of targeting the receivers ... we felt like he could be a great addition and he certainly has been."

That's an understatement. "Revelation" is a better way to describe Robinson's impact in Coen's offense.

Together, Coen and Robinson helped the program to its first 6-0 start since a 37-year-old Paul "Bear" Bryant led the Cats to that mark in 1950. No. 11 Kentucky will face the ultimate test Saturday in Athens against No. 1 Georgia and Kirby Smart's allworld defense.

Regardless of what happens in a game that's essentially the SEC East Championship, what's undeniable is that Coen and Robinson have become synonymous with the new era of Kentucky offense. A passing attack that ranked outside of the top 115 in FBS each of the past 3 seasons now has life.

Go figure that Kentucky's offensive awakening came from a couple of guys who, at this time last year, didn't know each other existed.

In January, Coen had to be sold before he could do his own selling. Let's back up a second.

At the time, Coen had just accepted his first job as a play-caller at the FBS level (he called plays at FCS Maine in 2016-17). That happened after Coen wowed Stoops, who was in desperate need for a modern but balanced offensive approach, with a 300-play film breakdown during an informal meeting over drinks in the Los Angeles home of comedian Russell Peters. Coen promised to bring McVay's offensive concepts to Lexing-

ton. Before Coen could even get 1/4 of the way through his breakdown, Stoops stopped him. He was sold. The 35-year-old Rams assistant had the gig.

Coen's first pitch was a successful one. Before he made another pitch, he needed to sell himself on a player. A hybrid playmaker from Nebraska named "Wan'Dale Robinson" entered the transfer portal in early January. He was frustrated with his role in Scott Frost's offense (more on that later) and combined with his mother's COVID complications, Robinson sought a place to play that was closer to his Frankfort, Kentucky family.

Stoops and some of Kentucky's staff were familiar with Robinson, who committed to the program before flipping to Nebraska as a high school senior because of his fear that Kentucky's offense was too run-heavy (that proved to be quite ironic). Coen, however, still wanted to do his homework on Robinson.

The newly hired Kentucky OC knew someone who worked closely with Robinson at Nebraska, and he also reached out to former Nebraska quarterback and current Cincinnati Bengals coach Zac Taylor. Before they got to their current jobs, Coen and Taylor were assistants on the Rams together, so there was a mutual respect when it came to evaluating a player's fit in the McVay-style offense.

Needless to say, it didn't take long to sell Coen on Robinson.

"Then you turn the film on," Coen told SDS, "and he's just so dynamic doing so many good things. That was a key piece to this whole thing. This was a huge piece. Once he was in the portal and I was officially signed on here, and I was able to talk to him and get to know him ... he reminded me a lot more of the guys I was around (with the Rams) than the other younger guys I've gotten to know."

Who did Robinson remind Coen of? Cooper Kupp, AKA the Rams'

slot receiver who averaged 93 catches for 1,068 yards in Coen's last 2 seasons with the Rams. It was Kupp who taught Coen, a former UMass quarterback, some of the intricacies of route-running after he joined the Rams in 2018. That's why Kupp was the blueprint for Coen's pitch to Robinson.

"That's literally all we talked about," Coen said.

And yeah, it worked. But not until Robinson did his own homework, of course. He reached out to Cupp for a full scouting report on Coen.

"(Cupp) was like, 'Dude, you're gonna love it. You're gonna get the catches, you're gonna get the targets. I promise you're gonna get the ball with (Coen),'" Robinson told SDS. "So I was like, that sold me. I'm good."

There was another key caveat to Coen's Kentucky pitch. It wasn't the volume of touches that Robinson sought. "Quality over quantity," he says. It was no secret that Robinson didn't want to play running back like he was asked to do at times during his 2 prolific years at Nebraska. He has since spoken candidly about playing in a role that he saw for himself at the NFL level instead of making cut blocks against blitzing linebackers, and doing so in an offense that didn't utilize prostyle concepts. At least not like Coen's did.

Coen had (and has) zero plans to line up Robinson in the backfield. He transferred back home to Kentucky to be a receiver and not a part-time one who could plug a hole for a depleted running back room like he did in Lincoln. That was evident on the first day of spring practice at Kentucky.

"I'm actually running routes. I'm running NFL concepts," Robinson said. "I'm not just in there in the slot, I'm playing the outside position, too, and moving around in a lot of different places. That's what I'm used to doing. That's what I was excited about."

Ask Robinson if Coen has ever used

him to make a cut block and he'll politely say "nah," with a smile.

Ask Robinson if he misses playing running back and he'll politely say, "nope, nope, nope. I'm having fun right where I'm at."

Let's back up again.

There's a right way to interpret that and a wrong way to interpret that. The wrong way would be to assume that a player who doesn't want to cut block is afraid of contact, which couldn't be further from the truth with Robinson.

"He's not soft," Coen said. "He's a tough, tough dude."

We saw that in his first game at Kentucky. After Robinson beat his man in press coverage, he proceeded to haul in Will Levis' pass and bulldoze a poor Louisiana-Monroe safety, who couldn't stand in the way of Robinson reaching pay dirt.

"That is him in a nutshell," Coen said. "It's character. It's everything you want in a player in terms of the way they approach the game, the way they study the game. And then he goes out and plays like an absolute dog. You want to try to get that kid the ball as many times as you can. He deserves it."

If Robinson doesn't like contact, he certainly doesn't do a good job of showing it.

"That just comes from my back-ground playing running back. You can't be afraid to take a hit," said Robinson, who recorded a 570-pound max squat at Nebraska (Robinson said max squats were more of a thing at Nebraska than at Kentucky). "I've always known that I've been smaller, but that doesn't mean I can't bring a punch. Most people aren't expecting me to bring a punch, so whenever it does hit 'em, they're surprised."

And to be clear, it's not that Coen can't use Robinson in running situations. He has 5 carries on the year, including an end-around that went for 64 yards against Mizzou. Those looks, however, weren't similar to the major-

ity of the 134 carries he got in 2 years at Nebraska.

"It's a lot different because a lot of those are schemed up to where it's essentially the 2 tight ends and me, and I have really a read of where I wanna go," Robinson said. "There's not a bunch of traffic. So I can really just get in space and do what I do and then if I have to make somebody miss ... at that point, it can be house calls."

Coen lived up to his promise from the initial recruiting pitch. He has yet to line Robinson up in the backfield for a single snap — not even to run a route — which he admitted is tempting. There are ways in which Coen could use Robinson to line up in motion and start in the backfield just to get the defense to tip its hand with whether it's in man or zone coverage.

Instead, Coen would rather do right by his guy and avoid those potential Nebraska flashbacks.

"That's the stigma that he was trying to get away from, that he's a 'gadget guy,'" Coen said. "But he's the type of kid that at this point, I believe there's a trust and a belief in his usage and what we're trying to do with him. So I guarantee you that if it was, 'Hey, game is on the line, we're gonna put you in the backfield and you're gonna run a route,' he would do whatever it takes."

In the short time they've known each other, Robinson and Coen developed an open line of communication. It's mostly texts about ball. Coen started by sending Robinson clips from games to illustrate a receiver's get-off or how he got separation at the top of the route. Robinson always has a response or a clip of his own ready. Days before Kentucky's game against LSU, they went back and forth breaking down a route they saw from Hunter Renfrow on Monday Night Football.

Coen will also text with his former Rams buddies McVay and Kupp about the things Robinson does in the offense. Ten minutes into the game against Florida, Coen scripted a jail-break screen of sorts for Robinson. It worked in practice against Kentucky's first-team defense, which was as good a sign as any for Coen. All it took was Will Levis making a quick on-target throw to Robinson, a clear-out block on Florida's corner by Kavosiey Smoke, some nice downfield blocking by the Kentucky offensive line and of course, Robinson's signature dead leg in space did the rest. Six points.

After that play helped Kentucky beat Florida in Lexington for the first time since 1986, Coen got a text from McVay.

"Hey, great job with the screen. We're gonna take that one."

Coen might not be able to recall plays quite at the level of his former boss, but he has no problem digging into the archives to illustrate a concept.

It's fitting that the defining offensive play of Coen's first year in Lexington involved Robinson. In their first SEC game working alongside one another, Kentucky held a 35-28 lead against Mizzou. Facing 3rd-and-12 on their own 26-yard line with just over 6 minutes left to play, the Wildcats were in desperate need of a big-time conversion to keep the emerging Mizzou offense off the field.

There was a 3rd-down play that Coen felt confident in, but 3rd-and-12 was a different challenge. It was a pivotal moment for Coen. He wasn't brought in to run a 3rd-down draw to the tailback in hopes that the defense could put the game away. It was Coen's job to make the adjustment and find the mismatch.

At that point, Robinson had been saying all game that he was getting press coverage, so he told Levis "if he's standing flat-footed, I can beat him over the top." Sure enough, Mizzou came out in that same look to defend Kentucky's 5-wide set. Little did anyone at home know that even though there were technically 5

pass-catching options, Robinson was the only real option. Coen had the running back on a go-route to clear space, there were hitches on the outside and then there was Robinson, who had to get separation on a fade route from of the slot against Mizzou's press man coverage.

"It was just a moment where I saw (Mizzou) press our best player," Coen said, "and I don't think that's a good thing."

Levis saw it, too.

"I just say, 'Hey, Wan'Dale is better than that guy. I just need to look off that safety who's playing off really high and I can drop it in there for a first down,'" Levis told SDS in September. "That was our best man-beater for that play, so that's pretty much all I was thinking."

Bingo. Perfect scheme, perfect recognition, perfect route, perfect throw. Thirty-three yards.

First down.

New offensive identity? You'd better believe it.

"It was a big moment for our offense," Coen said. "Have we put it together every single week yet? No, but there were moments, specifically that one, that give you trust in the system, that give you trust in your players to go out and execute in a moment like that."

It's trust that got Kentucky to this point. Stoops put his faith in Coen to overhaul the offense. Coen put his faith in Robinson to be the game-changing receiver in the middle of it all. That foundation helped lead Kentucky to a historic start.

We don't know what awaits Robinson beyond 2021.

Coen cited that the difference in how pass interference is called at the NFL level could actually benefit someone like Robinson, who moves so efficiently to get separation at the top of his routes. He could follow the path of his Bluegrass State friend Rondale Moore, who won the Paul Hornung Award in 2018 and became

a second-round pick by the Cardinals in 2018. Never mind the fact that the former Purdue star isn't exactly close to 6 feet like Robinson is. "He's making me money," Robinson said with a laugh.

In the meantime, Robinson is focused on leading his home-state program to new heights. He's not concerned about becoming Kentucky's first 1,000-yard receiver since Randall Cobb in 2010, though he's on pace to do just that. Robinson would rather spend his time working on his craft so that he can continue to develop in Coen's offense.

After all, it's quality over quantity

Chris Rodriguez has more than football goals versus homestate Georgia Bulldogs

Little about Chris Rodriguez's college resume suggested he was ready to leave school for the 2021 NFL draft, but the speculation would not go away.

Rodriguez had yet to start a game in three seasons for Kentucky. He had never rushed for 1,000 yards in a season.

But the 5-foot-11, 224-pound running back had averaged more than 7 yards per carry for his career and had rushed for at least 80 yards in each of his last four games. The common thinking suggests running backs should start being paid to play as early as possible due to the finite number of carries in each body before the physical toll of the position begins to show.

Rodriguez had other plans though. He would return to Kentucky for the 2021 season.

The decision had little to do with football.

"I came back because my whole goal was to finish college," Rodriguez

said. "... Being the first generation from my family (to go to college), that's one of the things me and my mom talked about: When I go to college, I don't want to just go and not finish. The whole plan was to come to college and finish. That's the reason I came back."

Rodriguez's plan started at an early age when he and an older cousin made a plan to break a familiar cycle of dropping out even before high school as an example to their younger cousins.

Both graduated high school. Rodriguez's cousin then went to cosmetology school, while Rodriguez's football skills earned him multiple college scholarships offers.

"Me and him made a deal that, 'We need to graduate so they know not to just give up,'" Rodriguez said. "We're not going to let this keep going, generations of family just drop out and be done. That is not how you live your life. ... I wanted to come here to a big university and show them you don't have to be like the rest of the family. You can do something."

Of course, there were football benefits to his decision to return too.

Kentucky coach Mark Stoops had hired Liam Coen as his new offensive coordinator to run the same offense Sean McVay had perfected with the NFL's Los Angeles Rams. Shining in that scheme could only help Rodriguez's draft stock.

With senior A.J. Rose starting his professional career, Rodriguez would be the clear starter for the Wildcats. Coen quickly made it clear Rodriguez could expect to be used in a featured role in Kentucky's new offense.

Through Kentucky's first six games, Rodriguez has exceeded even the most optimistic of expectations.

He leads the Southeastern Conference in rushing yards (768) with more than 100 yards more than any other player in the league. He is tied for fifth in the SEC in total touchdowns

(seven). Known for his bone-crushing running style, Rodriguez has proven his worth as a pass-catcher with two touchdown receptions.

"Probably better in a lot of ways (than I expected) because he just doesn't take negatives," Coen said. "He doesn't take negative-yard runs."

Rodriguez's early-season production was marred by four fumbles through the first three games. Against Missouri, Rodriguez rushed for 207 yards with three total touchdowns, but he missed the opportunity for two more touchdowns when he fumbled twice just before crossing the goal line.

While Kentucky lost possession on just one of Rodriguez's four fumbles, Coen and the rest of UK's offensive staff began emphasizing ball security drills more in practice. That work has paid off with back-to-back games without a fumble.

"He's a guy that wants to play at the next level," running backs coach John Settle said. "He's seen guys that have come through here get an opportunity, so he was dedicated. In my past, if you've got a guy that's dedicated and wants to learn, wants to do it right, it makes my job a lot easier. ... He's all in. He's totally bought into what we're doing here and wants to be great at it."

Rodriguez has topped the 100-yard plateau in four of Kentucky's first six games – he just missed the milestone with 99 yards against Florida – but his most difficult test yet will come this weekend against his home-state Georgia Bulldogs.

The McDonough, Georgia native, who was not offered a scholarship by Kirby Smart's staff in high school, has made no secret of his desire to prove himself against the Bulldogs throughout his Kentucky career. A year ago, Rodriguez was one of the few Wildcats to find any success against Georgia with 20 carries for 108 yards, but he failed to reach the end zone in

Kentucky's 14-3 loss.

"I've always wanted to beat Georgia since I got here," Rodriguez said.
"...For the program, I think it means a lot. For us to go 7-0, beat the No. 1 team, it's a big step for this program."

A standout performance against a Georgia defense that ranks fourth nationally in fewest rushing yards allowed per game (66.5) would go far in cementing Rodriguez's status as one of the best running backs in the country. It would boost his candidacy for SEC Offensive Player of the Year and surely attract more interest from NFL scouts.

But with more than 20 family members expected at the game, Rodriguez's bigger goal remains just as important.

"The educational part is really the most important part to me," he said. "I talk to my mom all the time. She's like, 'I'm proud of you,' but mostly for the school part."

Turning down FSU to stay at Kentucky best career move Mark Stoops ever made

Smart man, that Mark Stoops. It was just two years ago when the Florida State Seminoles reportedly made overtures to Stoops about possibly replacing Willie Taggart as FSU's head coach.

Stoops, the head coach at undefeated and 11th-ranked Kentucky, did not pursue the job even though he had been Jimbo Fisher's defensive coordinator when Fisher replaced Bobby Bowden and began the process of rebuilding the Seminoles back into a national championship contender.

Best career decision Mark Stoops has ever made.

Why would Stoops go to a place where he could be fired in two years just like Taggart was?

In fact, Stoops should never leave Kentucky for any other job.

Not even if LSU opens up. Or Miami.

Or even if Southern Cal calls him about filling its marquee coaching vacancy.

If you ask me, Mark Stoops has the best coaching job in America at a place where he actually gets a one-year contract rollover anytime he wins seven games. You heard me, seven games! At programs like Florida, Florida State and Miami, you get fired for winning seven games a season, but at Kentucky you actually get a contract extension.

At LSU, Ed Orgeron won the national championship just two years ago and yet, incredibly, he will be lucky to keep his job after this season.

Meanwhile, Stoops, who has led Kentucky to its first 6-0 record since 1950 (some guy named Bear Bryant was coaching the Wildcats then) heading into Saturday's showdown with No. 1-ranked Georgia, is a case study in the benefits of institutional backbone. Obviously, longtime Kentucky AD Mitch Barnhart is a reader of Tolstoy, who once wrote: "The two most powerful warriors are patience and time."

In today's Instagram, instant-gratification world, it's refreshing when a program actually exhibits prudence and patience when dealing with a coach. Yes, Barnhart heard grumbling when Stoops was 2-10, 5-7 and 5-7 during his first three seasons and didn't have a winning conference record until Year 6, but he knew he had the right coach.

Of course, if Stoops were Kentucky's basketball coach he would have been quickly jettisoned, but UK fans are much more forgiving when it comes to a football program that has been an SEC also-ran for much of its existence.

That said, I love when ADs go all Tammy Wynette and stand by their

man. I've told this story before, but it bears repeating: Perhaps the No. 1 piece of advice for up-and-coming young ADs should be a famous quote that late, great Duke AD Tom Butters once recited to me: "If you listen to the fans, you'll soon find yourself sitting with them."

Butters is the AD who stood by struggling young coach Mike Krzyzewski even though Krzyzewski was 38-47 in his first three seasons at Duke. Many boosters were angry and demanded that Butters get rid of Coach K.

After Butters retired to a golf community in Florida, I interviewed him once amid Coach K's run of five national titles, 12 Final Fours and nearly 1,200 victories. Butters told me then, "You cannot let the alumni tell you who to fire. I knew our coach was the absolute right man for the job."

Then he deadpanned: "I think in time my decision may still work out."

Former Florida State AD Dave Hart told me a similar story when fans were demanding that he fire basketball coach Leonard Hamilton, who failed to make the NCAA Tournament during his first six years at FSU. Hamilton is now entering his 20th year in Tallahassee, is the ACC's fifth all-time winningest coach and just led the Seminoles to a school-first ACC regular season championship.

When I asked Hart a couple of years ago if he would have stood by Hamilton in today's toxic social media world, he replied: "Yes, I would have, except I might be the one to get fired instead. There's no question, it's harder now. Because of social media, there are more opinions than ever before, but you still have to make the decisions you feel are right."

Imagine how the history of sports might have changed if the current trend of firing struggling coaches after a couple of years and doling out millions of dollars in buyout money had existed years ago.

Would the Dallas Cowboys have

ever become "America's Team" if they had fired the legendary Tom Landry, who compiled a 13-38-3 record during his first four years?

Would UCLA have ever become the most dominant force in the history of collegiate sports if some impulsive, impatient AD had decided John Wooden, who went 16 years before he won his first national championship, just couldn't win the big one?

Would Pittsburgh Steelers legend Chuck Noll, who won four Super Bowls, survive today if he went 1-13, 5-9 and 6-8 in his first three years? Stay at Kentucky, Mark Stoops.

Kentucky's win over Florida 'closed a chapter' for J.J. Weaver: 'It was like he was healed' By Kyle Tucker The Athletic October 15 2021

On the best night of his life, J.J. Weaver briefly panicked. Where's Mama? How would he ever find her in that roiling sea of humanity? When Kentucky finally beat Florida in a home football game, which had not happened since 1986, people spilled over the wall like water over Niagara Falls. Weaver would have to swim against the current. It felt like 60,000 fans wanted onto the turf at Kroger Field to celebrate and he was the only non-Gators player who wanted off.

Weaver, a 6-foot-5, 230-pound outside linebacker, pushed past the oncoming throng and toward his mom's seat in the stands. His field-storming brother got to him first. Where's Mama? She was too worried to watch the final moments of UK's 20-13 victory, sealed by a fourth-down stop in the end zone with 18 seconds left and walked off her nervous energy on the concourse. She waited for Weaver outside a tunnel the players take from the field to their locker room.

From there, Stacey Sherrell saw a giant party was in progress and figured it would be a while before her son emerged from that jubilant horde. He's always the last player to leave the field anyway. It startled her when Weaver came bounding through the tunnel before any of his teammates, screaming her name and galloping at such a speed that Sherrell wondered if someone had gotten hurt in the pandemonium. She was even more startled when Weaver leaped over a waist-high metal barrier, wrapped her in a bear hug and nearly lifted her off the ground. He howled: Mama, I did it!

"He was just so happy," Sherrell said, "and it just tore me up."

She cried. He cried. They stood there sobbing together for a little while, quietly considering all Weaver endured — and conquered — during the previous 16 months. His father was murdered in June 2020, Weaver tore his ACL in November, and his beloved high school coach died after a battle with cancer in August. The weight of all that threatened to crush him, but the right people in Kentucky's program noticed in time to get him help. Weaver rehabilitated his mental and physical health with equal vigor and believed he had made a full recovery even before the Florida game.

But that would be the true test. He suffered the indignity of tight end Kyle Pitts tagging him in an Instagram photo of the exact moment Weaver injured his right knee trying to defend the former Gators star. He circled Florida on the schedule, although even his wildest dream for the game could not have topped reality. From film study, Weaver correctly predicted a fourth-quarter pass play and alerted the rest of Kentucky's defense, which was in a zone, that he was taking the tight end one-on-one. Still wearing a brace on his knee, he ran stride for stride down the seam and stepped in front of a throw he knew was coming, and his first career interception set up the decisive touchdown.

"We just stood there hugging and

crying like two babies," Sherrell said.
"Because that game meant so much
to him. It was like he closed a chapter.
It was like he was healed."

Physically, there's no doubt. Weaver was expected to ease his way back into action this season but instead delivered a tackle for loss in each of the first five games. He leads the Wildcats in sacks (3.5) and is a major reason they're 6-0 for the first time since 1950, have their highest ranking in the Mark Stoops era (11th) and are preparing for one of the biggest games in program history on Saturday at No. 1 Georgia. He has been nominated for the Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award and the Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year Award.

"It's very important, and it needs to be known," Sherrell said of what her son has overcome. "Because sometimes men have that macho thing happening — especially young men - where they're not in touch with their emotions or they're scared to be emotional because they don't want to seem weak. 'I'm a football player. I'm strong. I'm tough.' But it needs to be talked about because there's suicide, there's drugs, there's all these things they turn to instead of dealing with their emotions. It's important to know that it's OK to talk to someone. I just want his story to touch somebody's life and heart and help other young men come out and say, 'Hey, I'm not OK. I need help.""

Weaver is no stranger to hardship. Six weeks before his due date, baby J.J. was already 22 inches long and weighed nearly 11 pounds. He was so big, he pressed against his mother's pelvis and cut off his own oxygen. Sherrell's doctor discovered this at a regular checkup and made an alarming announcement: We've got to rush you to the hospital. This baby needs to come out right now. Everything after those words was a blur, except for one minor detail after Weaver's emergency delivery.

"Um, ma'am, your son has six

fingers on his right hand," Sherrell remembers a nurse telling her.

With an extra, fully functional pinky, Weaver was destined to stand out. With that physical anomaly, plus a speech impediment and some developmental delays that resulted from his lack of oxygen in the womb, Weaver unfortunately was sure to be seen as different. His mother and grandmother reframed those differences: Anyone with such special features must be God's gift, they always told him.

"He gave you these things for a reason," Sherrell said. "You're going to struggle in life now so that when you get to all the great things he has planned for you, you'll appreciate them. You're going to be a testimony to other children who have difficulties learning or speaking or who look different. One day, they'll all look up to you."

That was of little comfort at the time when classmates made fun of the way he stuttered or called him names because of his hand. For years, Weaver tried to hide his extra digit. When he started playing football, he discovered that the two pinkies on his right hand could be smashed into a single finger hole on his gloves. It was terribly uncomfortable, but at least he felt normal.

"With a helmet and gloves on, he looked like everyone else. He used that as a shield. It hid his identity," Sherrell said. "Football became his identity — up until he went to Kentucky. Now when I watch his interviews, I just break down and cry. He's not scared in front of the camera. Millions of people are watching, and I can see his confidence. He smiles, he cracks jokes. After all those years going to talk to teachers and principals because he was being picked on, coming home hurt and sad and not really loving himself, my God, look at him now. Look at you now, kid."

Ask Weaver about his extra finger today, and he smiles wide.

"Shoot, I can grip things better," he says, laughing. "My right hand is way bigger than most."

He poses for pictures with the six-fingered hand extended proudly out in front of him. It has been turned into an Internet meme, which cracks him up. That's a recent development; he was still jamming that pinky into a regular pair of gloves last season. He finally went to Kentucky's equipment manager this summer and requested an alteration. Tom Kalinowski happily obliged, snipping off the pinky from one glove and sewing it onto a special pair for Weaver. Not surprisingly, he feels like he plays better with all 11 of his fingers available.

"I was afraid to come out to the world about it," he said, "but I'm comfortable now. I'm not afraid to let people see me."

That causes his mother to cry again. The happiest of tears. That painfully shy little boy is gone, and a remarkable young man has taken his place.

"If God doesn't bless me with anything else, my heart is really full seeing how far he's come," Sherrell said. "Just like I promised, there are kids watching him now who have issues they're trying to overcome, and they see J.J. and know it's possible."

His grandmother rarely called and never four times in a row, so Weaver figured he better answer when his phone blew up on June 17, 2020. Granny was despondent on the other end. He struggled to understand her, and surely he misunderstood or she misspoke because the message sounded utterly impossible: "Your father has been killed."

"I hung up on her," Weaver said.
"I tried to call my daddy. Straight to voicemail. Called my daddy again. Straight to voicemail. Then I heard a knock on my door."

His parents divorced when he was still a toddler and Weaver moved from Florida to Louisville with his mother when he was 10. She got word that her ex-husband, 44-year-old Terrance

Weaver, had been shot 17 times during a robbery at his home in Albany, Ga., around 2:30 a.m. and did not survive. Four teenagers were arrested in connection with the crime. Sherrell immediately jumped in the car and drove to Lexington, where Weaver's roommate let her in.

"As soon as he saw us there, he knew it was true, and he just fell to the floor," Sherrell said. "That was the hardest day ever, the hardest thing I've ever done, delivering that news. I know the relationship he and his older brother had with their dad. That's who got them into football. Football was their thing with him. J.J. was so excited to show his dad, 'Look at me, I'm in the SEC. I made it.' To know his father would never get to see that, it was just devastating."

But it was also motivating. Now he had to make it, to honor the man he considered his best friend. Weaver wears No. 13 because his father had 13 children. He wants to carry on operating his father's mobile car detailing business and make sure all his siblings — he's the second-oldest — never forget their dad. He also desperately wants to make it to the NFL so that his mother and all the people his father left behind are taken care of.

In that way, football saved him. Summer workouts, then preseason camp, then a grueling SEC schedule kept Weaver's mind occupied. He poured himself into the game his dad taught him to love and by the second half of his redshirt freshman season, the four-star recruit was playing up to that ranking. He had 33 tackles, 6 1/2 for loss, in nine games. He earned his first career start against Florida on Nov. 28, 2020 and had a career-high six tackles in just three quarters. Weaver looked like one of the most talented players on the field, right up until Pitts went up for a catch, and Weaver came down clutching his knee.

"Football was my escape. Football was my coping mechanism. And then

I couldn't play football," said Weaver, who finally had to face his grief. "It all hit me. I'm always an excited person, a happy person, smile on my face every day, always greeting people when I see them. But I didn't want to be around anybody. Just wanted to be isolated. I was really depressed. I kept my hoodie up, kept my headphones in, didn't want to talk to anyone, just walked right past people."

Gabe Amponsah noticed. Kentucky's head athletic trainer might spend more time talking about non-football things with players than anyone on the staff. He got to know Weaver well before the injury and even better once he began rehab. Through regular encounters, Amponsah began to recognize things that Weaver's mother had inquired about and got the standard brush-off: Mama, I'm fine. Just tired.

"No, he was struggling," Amponsah said. "When you see it once, you think nothing of it. But if you see it twice, three times, you start to wonder. There's a huge psychological component to coming back from injury, not to mention so many other heavy things these guys carry around and the pressure they feel to succeed, so we always try to keep that in mind and pay attention to it in the training room: 'Are they OK not just physically, but also mentally?'"

One day in early 2021, Amponsah pulled Weaver into his office and put it plainly: "I know what's going on," he said, "and if you need to talk to someone, I can help you."

Weaver fell apart. Through tears, he confessed that, yes, he was drowning in the darkness. And no, he didn't think he could climb out on his own.

"It was like God talking to me that day," Weaver said. "The way I felt, that's when people start drinking, start popping pills. I've had friends go through depression and they weren't talking to anybody about it, and it was bad. I wasn't trying to talk to anybody either — I was just trying to hurry up

and get back to football — but Gabe convinced me that opening up to somebody and talking would really help."

Amponsah suggested Weaver go see Stoops, who lost his father unexpectedly while playing at lowa, and explain what was going on. Weaver felt comforted by his coach taking the time to relate. After that emotional meeting, Kentucky's staff connected Weaver with a therapist. For six months, he visited her every Thursday for an hour. He unburdened himself of all the sadness, fear and anger that had overwhelmed him.

"Got a lot of things off my chest," Weaver said. "There's so much value in that. The week of the Florida game, every day before I got taped, before treatment, I was telling Gabe, 'Thank you for everything. Y'all helped me through this long process and I'm finally here.' And after that game, I gave every one of them a hug."

But Amponsah figures Weaver deserves most of the credit. It takes a lot to acknowledge the problem and accept the help.

"He started coming back out of his shell," Amponsah said, "and he immediately looked lighter. It's an unbelievably rewarding feeling to see where he's at now. People talk about adversity a lot in sports, but this is real adversity. And when you start having people like J.J., people like Dak Prescott and Simone Biles, high-profile athletes talking about the importance of mental health, it brings a lot of awareness to the subject. Maybe it helps a younger athlete who is scared and hurting to actually think, 'It's time to get help.' Maybe you can prevent a person from doing something that could be irreversible."

When Weaver's high school coach, Rob Reader, passed away in August at the age of 50, Weaver was crushed all over again. Reader was a close family friend, another father figure in Weaver's life, and the grief was profound. But this time, Weaver had the tools

to cope with it, so his mother wasn't worried sick.

Amponsah, Stoops, defensive coordinator Brad White and recruiting coordinator Vince Marrow promised Weaver's mother they would remain vigilant. If Sherrell checks in, White gets back to her within a few hours to provide an update — or the occasional request for mom to "get on J.J.'s butt" about something. That's what flashed through her mind when Weaver and the Wildcats knocked off Florida, when her boy came sprinting out of the madness with a wide smile across his face.

"I could not ask for a better program," Sherrell said. "I could not ask for better people to look after my son. He's not a talker. He never was a talker. But they got him talking. And for him to say, 'Yeah, I need to talk to someone,' it showed me a lot of maturity. It tells me they're helping him grow up. And I look at him in a different light now. I don't think of him as this little kid anymore who I need to ask, 'Did you brush your teeth? Did you put away your clothes?' He's this grown man. He's this amazing person I always knew he would be: somebody to look up to."

Will Levis: 'No point' in thinking about what might have been if he stayed at Penn State

Kentucky football quarterback Will Levis hears the chatter. The Penn State transfer just does not care to engage in the conversation.

After an early slump, Levis has posted back-to-back impressive performances for the No. 12 Wildcats to offer hope of even more production in the final five games of the 2021 season. Meanwhile, his former team has gone from leading College Football Playoff contender to No. 17 nationally with consecutive losses.

No factor has contributed more to Penn State's back-to-back defeats than quarterback play after starter Sean Clifford missed half of the loss to Iowa with an injury and was obviously hampered by the lingering effects of that issue in a nine-overtime loss to Illinois.

"(James) Franklin banked on a crippled version of Clifford at quarterback, we must believe, because he did not trust healthy backups — even against this opponent," USA TODAY network reporter Frank Bodani wrote for the York Daily Record after the Illinois loss. "The plan failed miserably. If nothing else, that shouts to the program's depth vacuum at the game's most important position."

The Nittany Lions' quarterback issues have led many fans and reporters to ask the same question: Would Penn State still be in the playoff hunt if Levis had remained in Happy Valley?

Levis spent the last two seasons as Clifford's primary backup. He totaled 644 passing yards and 473 rushing yards with nine total touchdowns in 15 games, including one start.

The Connecticut native grew frustrated with what he viewed as the Penn State coaching staff pigeon-holing him as a run-first quarterback. When he entered his name in the transfer portal in January, Levis wanted to find a coach who believed in his ability to also make plays with his arm.

"It's up to the coaches, it's up to the guys calling the plays," Levis told the Courier Journal before the season. "Luckily, I'm at a place now where the staff believes in that ability and hopefully are going to be able to give me opportunities to throw it down the field more."

Levis's considerable arm strength has been clear with Kentucky with 18 completions of at least 20 yards and 10 of at least 30 yards through seven games.

The decision to transfer from Penn State to Kentucky has worked out best for his career too as he needed just more than one week of preseason camp to be named the Wildcats' starter. He helped lead the team to six consecutive wins to start the season.

Levis entered Kentucky's bye week after two of his best performances. He totaled 220 yards and five touchdowns in the blowout of LSU then completed 32 of 42 passes for 192 yards and two touchdowns in the loss at No. 1 Georgia.

"I think he's doing an unbelievable job right now," UK offensive coordinator Liam Coen said of Levis. "... You saw him take a little bit of a step in terms of being a quarterback last week. That's where we're trying to continue to get him to: Being a true quarterback. Yes, he's athletic. Yes, he can run. But for us to have success we need him to continue to play like he did last week."

Had Levis remained at Penn State, he might have been thrust into the spotlight following Clifford's injury, but he would have likely spent most of the first half of the season on the bench.

Since he graduated from Penn State in the spring, Levis would have been able to transfer and play immediately this season even before the NCAA allowed most players to transfer once without sitting out a year, but the new transfer rule ensures that Penn State will be far from the only program with quarterback depth issues moving forward.

As the college football adage goes: If you have a good backup quarter-back, you might just have someone else's starting quarterback.

"Most guys want to come in and be guaranteed the starting job, depending on where they are in their careers and why they're leaving," Penn State coach James Franklin said last week.

Even after transferring to Kentucky, Levis has made no secret of his desire to see his friends and former teammates at Penn State perform well. During Kentucky's bye week, he watched every snap of the Nittany Lion's nine-overtime thriller against Illinois.

And while Levis has chosen to stay out of the social media conversation about how Penn State's season might be different if he had remained in Happy Valley, he issued a vote of confidence for his former team in an interview this week.

"I don't pay attention to any of that stuff," Levis said. "Sean is a great player. Obviously, he had that injury against Iowa, which is unfortunate. Hopefully he can get back to 100% here pretty soon, but he's been playing good ball. He's their quarterback and he's going to continue to work hard for them, I know. He's going to fight for every game, for every play.

"Everyone throws out what ifs all the time, but it doesn't matter. It's in the past. The decision was made. There's no point in thinking that way."

Levis delivers career-best performance in Tennessee loss By Derek Terry

Cat's Pause November 7, 2021

Kentucky quarterback Will Levis responded from a poor outing at Mississippi State with one of his best performances of his career on Saturday night against Tennessee. Despite a losing effort by the team, Levis played well enough to give Kentucky every opportunity to come away with a victory.

The Connecticut native threw for a career-high 372 yards and three touchdowns. He also rushed for two touchdowns in the 45-42 loss. It was the second time this season that Levis accounted for three passing touchdowns and two rushing touchdowns in a game, making him the first player in school history to do so. In all, Kentucky's offense possessed the ball for over 46 minutes, went 12 of 17 on third down, racked up 612 yards and gained 35 first downs.

"He's a stud," offensive coordinator Liam Coen said. "That's the way he is. He's tough as nails. It means so much to him. All day Sunday, all day that kid was in our building watching film, trying to get better. Nobody puts in more time. Nobody puts in more work. Nobody practices like he practices in terms of how fast he goes, how hard he goes, the speed at which he plays and practices at is how he always is. He's 100 miles per hour. It's a fine line of trying to slow him down. I thought he was fantastic being slow tonight. We didn't protect him. We need to do a better job of pass pro."

Through nine games, Levis has already passed for more touchdowns than any other quarterback in the Mark Stoops era. It's no secret that Kentucky has struggled through the air for much of Stoops' time at Kentucky, but it still shows development within a new offense. He's already thrown 17 touchdowns this year and should see that number increase as the schedule softens over the next few weeks. His 372 yards against Tennessee were the most for a UK quarterback since Patrick Towles threw for 390 yards against Mississippi State in 2014.

"When you have a game like I did last week it's definitely motivation," Levis said. "I'm just trying to take it to the next level. I think I have a good work ethic, but regardless how good your work ethic is, you can always be better."

Perhaps more impressive was that Levis was not at 100 percent during the Tennessee game. While the nature of his injury was not discussed, Levis was in the locker room right up until the start of the second half. Backup quarterback Beau Allen was taking snaps from starting center Luke Fortner and had his helmet on while talking to Coen. But Levis sprinted onto the sidelines right before the kick and started the second half. Levis had laid his body on the line in the first half, hurdling multiple times over Tennessee defenders. One of the hurdles resulted in a touchdown to even the game at 14.

When asked if he's nervous when Levis leaves his feet, Coen said he indeed was.

"Yes, very much so," Coen said. "Every time I see him leave his feet I'm a little bit sick. But you guys see it. How many other kids compete like that? Just throw your body around. Just that will. If you're anybody, fan, teammate, anybody in the building respects him and should because of the way he competes. It's not even close."

Yes, Levis had some throws he'd want back. He airmailed a throw to a wide open Chris Rodriguez late in the first half that was nearly picked off. He threw a tad behind Wan'Dale Robinson on the next play and then Robinson dropped a pass on fourth down. Tennessee ultimately took the ball and got into field goal range to take a three-point lead into the break.

His biggest mistake of the night came in the third quarter. Levis was baited into an out route to Robinson that was intercepted and returned 56-yards for a touchdown by Alontae Taylor.

"Despite the numbers there are a lot of things that could've gone differently," Levis said. "That interception is a bad decision by me. (Taylor) clouded the field. I can't be throwing a quickout, breaking route like that because that corner is in the flat responsibility. Just need to do a better job of seeing the big picture and moving on in that progression. I know we've got a lot of things run game wise that could've been cleaner, but we've gotta take the positives too. We've gotta look at the tape and be proud of what we did offensively. But at the same time being as critical as possible to improve ourselves as much as possible."

'We want to be first.' Another winning SEC record a building block for UK.

Kentucky's football season isn't finished yet, but it capped Southeastern Conference play Saturday with a 34-17 victory at Vanderbilt.

The result stopped a three-game losing streak. Each loss was to a league opponent, and each one was disappointing in a different way for a UK team that started 6-0 and teased the notion of earning a New Year's Six bowl game, or even contending for a spot in the College Football Playoff.

The first, to Georgia, eliminated Kentucky from the SEC championship conversation. The second, at Mississippi State, was distressing given that UK was coming off a bye. The third, at home last week, came at the hands of Tennessee — need more be said? A fourth would have been the worst of all, since it would have been league win No. 1 this season for the Commodores, who instead lost their 18th straight SEC game.

Kentucky did what it needed to in front of a friendly crowd — at least 15,000 of the 25,000-plus fans in attendance wore blue in contrast to the black Vanderbilt asked its fans to adorn — and took steps to rekindle the momentum it lost amid its slide. A lackluster showing in the second half kept its flame from getting too bright — UK took a 31-3 lead into halftime but was outscored 14-3 in the second half after Vanderbilt switched from Ken Seals to Mike Wright at quarterback. But with wins off the menu since Oct. 9, UK was more satisfied than not.

"We were hungry for a win," said defensive end Josh Paschal, who had two quarterback sacks. "We hadn't won in like a month, so we were ready to get a win."

With a 5-3 final ledger in the

league, Kentucky ended with a winning record in SEC play for just the second time since 1977. The first, in 2018, also came under Mark Stoops, who earned an automatic extension of his contract by one year by winning his seventh game of the season. Since the league split into divisions in 1992, it is the first time that UK ended league play with sole possession of second place in the East; the 2018 team finished in a tie for second place, as did Stoops' 2016 team.

Kentucky's players and coaches talk a lot about getting to Atlanta. A 5-3 league record isn't going to get teams into the SEC championship game most years, but getting above .500 — period, let alone in the SEC — is still more new in Lexington than it's not. The bar's raising, even if incrementally.

"At the end of the day, we want to be first," Paschal said. "That's our goal. But being second, we're not going to take any moral victories, that's something to build on. These guys, I'm sure they'll come back next year hungry and ready to get after it. "It's good to set that standard, but of course we're trying to get better and get up to that first spot."

Chris Rodriguez looked the most like himself since the 6-0 start. Newly-inserted starters at the safety spots - Vito Tisdale for Davonte Robinson and Jalen Geiger for Tyrell Ajian helped give the Cats' struggling defense a different energy to open the game. Youngsters JuTahn McClain (69 yards on 10 rushes) and Izayah Cummings (27 yards and a TD on two catches) demonstrated playmaking ability from the non-Rodriguez and Wan'Dale Robinson categories. Quarterback Will Levis' final stat line wasn't especially noteworthy — 14 of 22 for 177 yards and two touchdowns with an interception — mostly because he started 10 of 12 and all but 21 of those yards came on those first 10 completions. But he didn't take a big step back from his performance against the Volunteers, as he did

coming off other strong showings this season.

For Kentucky, it was ultimately a win from which to grow, for the remainder of this year and into the future. The context of how UK got to it, right now, makes a 5-3 SEC finish taste a bit sour. But as far as bricks go, it could be building with worse.

"I think we have the team, and the talent, and the leadership and the coaching to do that year in and year out," Levis said. "... The SEC, it's tough to do that regardless of who you are or who you're playing. Getting an SEC win on the road and getting a record like that is something to be proud of. I'm happy for my guys and glad to wrap up our SEC schedule this year on a good note."

Kentucky football embracing increased expectations

Expectations can be fickle.

Once you change the expectations, all of a sudden you have to meet them. That's where Mark Stoops' Kentucky team finds itself 10 games into the 2021 season.

On one hand, the Wildcats got off to its first 6-0 start since 1950, which is no small feat. In the process, UK beat Florida in Lexington for the first time since 1986, recorded its first win over an Associated Press top-10 team since 2010, and beat both Florida and LSU in the same season for the first time since 1977.

On the other, dreams of a New Year's Six bowl game and a possible 10 or even 11-win season were dashed following a 3-game losing streak to Georgia, Mississippi State and Tennessee, eliminating any chance at what some viewed as a once and a lifetime type of season.

Fans now find themselves conflicted after Kentucky's 34-17 win at Vanderbilt Saturday night.

The victory not only stopped a 3-game skid, it clinched UK's first outright second place finish in the SEC East since the league split into divisions in 1992. At 5-3, the Wildcats also secured just its second winning record in the SEC since 1977 and its sixth straight win over the Commodores is tied for its longest vs. any SEC opponent.

Kentucky has already qualified for a school record sixth straight bowl game but 7-3 in the shadow of 11-1 or 10-2 doesn't appear quite as significant.

Senior defensive end Josh Paschal says the team embraces those increased expectations.

"We love this game. We love Kentucky football. We love this program. We've poured our heart and soul into this program for the past 4-5 years," Paschal said. "We want to be first. That's our goal. But being second, that's something to build on. We don't want to be satisfied with 7-3. I feel like we set new standards and that's what the fan base is holding us to. At the end of the day, that's what you want to do. Raise the standard every year."

Saturday's win clinched a winning record for the fifth time in Stoops' nine seasons at UK but even that felt tainted. After outscoring Vanderbilt 31-3 in the first half, the Wildcats managed just a fourth quarter field goal in the second.

Quarterback Will Levis looked visibly frustrated in the second half as the Cats were outscored 14-3.

"We came out in the second half with the game plan to put the nail in the coffin and choke them out and finish the game out and we didn't do that," Levis said. "It's games like that where everything is going your way you want to find challenges and things to improve on and that was an area we haven't been able to capitalize on all season. We had an opportunity to do that this game and it didn't come together for us so it is a little frustrating."

A first-year transfer from Penn

State, Levis' perspective isn't colored by the history of Kentucky football. "I wasn't aware of that but that should be expected from this group," Levis said of UK's winning record in the SEC. "I think we have the team and the talent and the leadership and the coaching year in and year out. We should be able to do that and I'm glad we were able to do that this year and glad we were able to wrap up our SEC schedule on a good note."

As long as he understands that good is no longer good enough.

Senior Spotlight: Colin Goodfellow is Dropping Bombs

No Max Duffy? No problem, thanks to Colin Goodfellow.

Kentucky had a big hole to fill entering the 2021 football season. Duffy's Australian style worked to perfection over three seasons in Lexington. He set the UK record for career punting average (45.96) and became the first Wildcat to win the Ray Guy Award, given each year to college football's top punter.

Kentucky initially expected to solve its punter problem with another Australian, Wilson Berry. The younger brother of NFL star Jordan Berry and a friend of Duffy's, it appeared a match made un heaven. That all changed when Berry suffered a preseason back injury. After fighting through the nagging injury with subpar punts for two weeks, Kentucky turned to Goodfellow and never looked back.

A walk-on from Cleveland, Goodfellow went to high school with Darian Kinnard at football powerhouse St. Ignatius. He filled in for Duffy a couple of times in 2020, then brought out the boomstick against Chattanooga.

In his first game as the primary punter, Goodfellow launched a ball 59 yards and averaged 50.5 yards per kick. He's kicked nine punts of 50 yards or more, including two 70-yarders. He has also placed 11 balls inside opponents' 20-yard line. Goodfellow averages 47.4 yards per punt, on pace to finish with the second best punting season in school history.

"He's hitting some punts. He is booming some and we have seen that in practice the past couple of years, so it's really nice to see that," Mark Stoops said Monday. "It shows some good depth, and it gave us a different style to become more in the pocket, so it's been good."

Kentucky's special teams have not always been great in 2021 (especially the blocking on field goals). When faced with a significant problem in the punting department, Goodfellow saved the day. His impact on the Wildcats' success in 2021 cannot be overlooked.

Gatton on the Gridiron: UK Football Players Balance the Game, Pursuing Master's in Business

From every block and tackle to pass and touchdown, you've cheered them on.

As a Wildcat fan, you've applauded and chanted along with the roaring crowd at Kroger Field as the University of Kentucky football team fights to clinch another victory.

Their accomplishments on the field don't go unnoticed. But what about off the field? Their successes in the classroom don't often make the highlight reel.

"I like seeing the look on people's faces, because obviously, there's the stereotype of, 'you're just a football player,'" Quintin Wilson, center for UK Football, said. "And we really want to take advantage of every opportunity that UK gives us and being part of this program is just another one of those opportunities."

Overcome obstacles and exceed expectations — that's what Wilson hopes to do as an athlete and as a student.

And he's not alone.

Wilson is one of four football players pursuing a master's degree in the Gatton College of Business and Economics.

Wilson, Luke Fortner (center) and Matthew Ruffolo (kicker) are part of the One Year MBA program, while Will Levis (quarterback) is working toward a Master's of Science in Finance (MSF).

The MBA program is designed for young professionals, recent graduates and emerging leaders across all academic majors. The program aims to help students discover their passions and position them for success in their future careers.

The MSF prepares students for a professional career in the finance and banking industries. The science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) program focuses on analytics and data science related skills in courses through Python, Tableau and more.

"When I got the extra year because of COVID, I thought it would be a great idea, and it's all worked out really well," Fortner, who is also pursuing a master's degree from the College of Engineering, said.

It's the silver lining after an unprecedented year. But that doesn't mean balancing life as a student-athlete comes easy.

The stakes are high when it comes to college football. But the stakes are just as high when pursuing a master's degree. It requires diligence to keep up with schoolwork and determination to stay focused at practice.

"Obviously in grad school, you have to do more work than in undergrad, but the program here at UK is great, and they work with us whenever we need help," Ruffolo said.

"It's difficult to be pursuing a degree at a high level, and it's also difficult to be playing football at a high level," Levis added. "I think it's good for others to see and think, 'if they can do it, why can't I do it too — if not better.'"

And while the payoff isn't as immediate as a win under the bright lights on a Saturday night, Fortner, Levis, Ruffolo and Wilson are interested in playing the long game.

"So far, I think the leadership and management skills that I've learned will help me no matter if I'm in a management role or working toward a management role," Ruffolo said.

"Ultimately, I'd love to be my own boss one day," Wilson added. "And I think this gives you the groundwork to help you become successful."

Though he is proud of his accomplishments, Wilson admits he has a lot of support when it comes to reaching his goals. On and off the field, he has teammates — they serve as his foundation for success.

"The most challenging part is definitely to balance when to focus on football and when to focus on school," Wilson explained. "You feel like you're getting pulled in all angles sometimes, but everyone is supportive. Whenever I do struggle, they are willing to pick me up and help me out."

Bringing true meaning to the phrase — "For the Team."

"We all have a common goal to do well in the classroom and to win games. And we have a support system both in the classroom and on the field," Fortner said. "To be able to lean on each other when things get a little tougher is really big for us."

"I think the most rewarding part is probably going to be at the end of this when you get to tack on the three letters at the end of your name on the resume," Ruffolo added. "Obviously, it's a lot of work, but football doesn't last forever. I think school is really important. Getting this graduate degree is going to help us when we don't have football anymore."

Will Levis came to UK as a 'running QB.' He had a record day as one against U of L.

In rushing for four touchdowns in UK's 52-21 win over Louisville, Will Levis did something only six other players in school history have done.

The last to achieve that feat did so against the same school, in much the same fashion: Lynn Bowden set a Governor's Cup record with four rushing TDs as the Wildcats physically dominated the visiting Cardinals in a 45-13 win. With two years to strengthen up in the trenches, U of L in year three under Scott Satterfield looked just as overwhelmed as it did in 2019, the last time these two got together.

Levis feasted to the tune of 113 yards on 14 carries. He was barely touched on all four of his scores, most of them coming on draw plays that UK thought it could have success with coming into Saturday. They worked out better than anyone on the Cats' sideline could have dreamed.

"I knew they were in the game plan but we literally called the same play, I think, four or five times," Levis said. "If it ain't broke, don't fix it, I guess. It's a good play for us."

Kentucky ended with 511 total yards, 362 of them coming on the ground. There were multiple plays ran that were called as passes but that ended with Levis scurrying for double-digit yardage. The Wildcats by no means struggled through the air — Levis was 14 of 18 for 149 yards — but their ability to dominate at the line of scrimmage again gave themselves plenty of open turf.

Throughout the week, UK players and staff who'd played against Louisville felt like they'd have a distinct physical advantage. It didn't take long for first-time rivalry participants to understand why.

"Our staff actually helped me

understand, 'We will be more physical, we will be the more physical unit, we will run the football well, you just gotta stick with it," Coen said.

That was hard to digest at first, because of how U of L's defense showed up on film, Coen said. UK often put its receivers in wider splits to try and create some cleaner running lanes, and that proved effective, but the Wildcats this week mostly were able to thrive based on the fruits of their past labor.

"They just know where they've had success in the past, and that's something that I'm continuing to learn," Coen said. "Just do what they want to do, do what they're confident in.' It may not always be what I want to do or what I'm comfortable with, or a play I've run a lot of times, but if they know it, they like it and they can execute it, that's what it's all about. It's not about me, it's about what they can do."

Levis was known as a running quarterback at Penn State, from which he transferred ahead of this season. He'd rushed for 274 yards and five touchdowns at UK prior to Saturday, few enough for Satterfield to address the abnormality of his latest effort in the opening statement of his postgame press conference.

He didn't think his team was mismatched physically; he thought it was more about execution and run fits.

"I know there were holes and I know there were guys running free and their quarterback ran," Satterfield said. "One of the plays on third down, we bought pressure and he spins out of a tackle, and he picks up a big first down and they ended up scoring on that drive. That's not a physical mismatch, that's a missed tackle."

Whatever the reason, Levis running around in Cardinal Stadium on Saturday looked a lot like Bowden running around at Kroger Field in 2019. Luke Fortner blocked for both; who's the tougher runner?

"I'd probably go with Will, but I

don't know if you can call him a better runner than Lynn, though," Fortner said.

Levis' success on the ground was even starker contrasted with the relative ineffectiveness of Cardinals star Malik Cunningham, who was held to 35 yards and a touchdown on 11 rushes. He dismissed the notion that the hype surrounding Cunningham and U of L's offense coming into the game motivated him and his teammates.

"He's a great player and he deserves all the attention that he's gotten," Levis said. "I'm just glad the right team came out on top tonight."

Wan'Dale Robinson breaks Kentucky football record for catches in a single season

Wide receiver Wan'Dale Robinson needed just one season to leave his mark on the Kentucky football record book.

With a second-quarter reception, his sixth of the game, in the regular season finale against Louisville Saturday, Robinson broke the program's record for most catches in a season. The record was previously held by tight end James Whalen, who totaled 90 receptions in the 1999 season.

"He is an absolute baller," UK coach Mark Stoops said after Kentucky's 52-21 win. "He just really is playing at a super high level. He is so competitive, so tough and so good.

"It's not any one area. He does a lot of things good. He really picks things up. He's intelligent. He makes tough catches, puts the ball away in traffic. Gets banged up and he's trying to go in there and cut people out and crack people in the run game. He's a very complete player."

Robinson's record-setting junior season came in his first year as a Wildcat. The Frankfort native initially committed to Kentucky's 2019 recruiting class, but he flipped his commitment to Nebraska just more than a month later. After two seasons with the Cornhuskers, Robinson transferred home before the 2021 season.

At Nebraska, Robinson split time between slot receiver and running back, totaling 914 receiving yards and 580 rushing yards with seven total touchdowns. One of his primary goals when entering the transfer portal was to prove he could be a full-time receiver, despite questions about his size at 5-foot-10, 183 pounds.

"(The record) definitely means something to me," Robinson said after UK's win over New Mexico State last week that moved him within five catches of the record. "A lot of people, especially with me transferring, didn't really want to tell me I could be a full-time receiver, do the things I'm doing now.

"Even my old coach, he wanted to tell me I wasn't really a receiver. I just kind of put my head down and worked ever since I got here in the spring. Just wanted to make the impact I could. Now, luckily things are paying off."

Robinson has thrived this season despite accounting for the over-whelming majority of targets from quarterback Will Levis. He was paid even more attention from opposing defenses when super senior wide receiver Josh Ali, the Wildcats' No. 2 option, was sidelined by an injury for two games.

The record-setting season has Robinson in the running for All-SEC honors at wide receiver after being named to multiple preseason All-SEC teams as an all-purpose player.

"That's just all the work I tried to put in," Robinson said. "I wanted to go out there and prove I could really play receiver and I could do this at the highest level in college football, the SEC."

With a stellar bowl performance, Robinson could also break UK's record

for most receiving yards in a single season (1,311). After tallying nine catches for 97 yards against Louisville, Robinson has 94 catches for 1,164 yards on the season.

Kentucky football signs Mark Stoops to contract extension through 2027 season

Amid speculation tying coach Mark Stoops to multiple high-profile job openings, Kentucky football has made its investment to keep Stoops in Lexington

Stoops has "agreed in principle" to a new contract that will run through the 2027 season, expiring in June 2028. Like his previous deal, the contract includes guaranteed extensions for any season with seven wins (one-year extension) or 10 wins (two-year extension).

Stoops' previous deal was set to expire in June 2027 but could have been extended an additional year with a win in UK's bowl game. The school has not released salary information for the new contract, which is awaiting final signatures.

"We have been in discussion with Coach Stoops in recent weeks and are excited about his ongoing commitment to Kentucky," UK athletic director Mitch Barnhart said in a news release. "Coach Stoops has done an outstanding job in building the UK football program and we look forward to continued success under his leadership."

Stoops had been mentioned as a candidate at Florida and LSU, but those openings were filled by Billy Napier and Brian Kelly respectively. He has also been listed as a candidate for the current open positions at Oklahoma, where his brother Bob was a legendary coach, and Notre Dame.

"I'm excited to continue to build

this program to national prominence," Stoops said in the release. "We're on our way and I'm more confident in Kentucky football than I've ever been.

"I thank President (Eli) Capilouto and Mitch Barnhart for their support. The continuity among us for the last nine years is extremely valuable and I'm looking forward to more success together. Mitch and I came to an agreement a week or two ago and shook hands on it Saturday afternoon. This process is a compliment to our relationship."

After beating Louisville in the regular season finale, Stoops ranks second on UK's career coaching wins list, two shy of Paul "Bear" Bryant for most in program history. His 58-53 record at Kentucky will not turn heads alone, but he is 46-27 since the third game of the 2016 season after winning just 12 of his first 38 games. Stoops already holds the UK records for most home wins (41) and total games coached (111).

He is tied with Fran Curci for most seasons as Kentucky's head coach (nine). No coach has left UK with a winning record since Blanton Collier, who was 41-36 from 1954 to 1961.

Stoops led Kentucky to its first 10-win season since 1977 in 2018 and will coach the Wildcats in their sixth consecutive bowl game later this season. A win in the bowl game would give Kentucky just the third double-digit win season in program history. Kentucky has won three consecutive bowl games.

The Wildcats are 25-25 in SEC play the last six seasons with two winning records in league play in that span. Before Kentucky's historic 2018 season, the program had not posted a winning record in SEC play since 1977.

Stoops' rebuilding project at Kentucky was forged on unprecedented recruiting success.

Each of Stoops' first nine signing classes were ranked in the top 40 nationally by the 247Sports Compos-

ite, including three in the top 30. The 2022 class is poised to be his best yet, currently ranked 13th nationally. The class is headlined by five-star Charlestown, Indiana offensive tackle Kiyaunta Goodwin and four-star Nashville wide receiver Barion Brown.

Prior to Stoops's arrival at Kentucky many pundits predicted the only way the program could win in the SEC was to close the talent gap with the rest of the league by using a gimmicky offense like the "Air Raid" Hal Mumme built in Lexington in the late 1990s, but Stoops was able to recruit and develop enough players to win with a physical, run-first mentality.

Running back Benny Snell became the program's career rushing leader playing for Stoops and running behind an offensive line that was known as one of the best in the SEC.

When the offense became too one-dimensional, Stoops fired coordinator Eddie Gran after the 2020 season and hired Liam Coen to run the offense built by Sean McVay and the Los Angeles Rams. The offense, which still relies heavily only a strong run game to set up play-action passes, averaged 100 more passing yards per game than last season with Coen as coordinator, Penn State transfer Will Levis at quarterback and Nebraska transfer Wan'Dale Robinson at wide receiver.

Stoops' has been aided by financial investment from UK before.

In the early years of Stoops' tenure, Kentucky unveiled a \$120 million stadium renovation and constructed a new \$45 million practice facility. After the 10-win 2018 season, Stoops signed a contract extension that pays him \$5.25 million this season. His salary was scheduled to increase by \$250,000 each year through the end of the contract. He ranks 15th nationally in salary among head coaches at public universities, according to a USA TODAY database.

That contract awarded Stoops an

additional \$250,000 per win starting with win No. 9 each season. Every time he wins seven games, the contract was automatically extended by one year. If he wins 10 games, the contract was extended an additional year.

Kentucky to face coach Mark Stoops' alma mater - Iowa football - in Citrus Bowl 2021 By Jon Hale Louisville Courier Journal

Mark Stoops will face a familiar foe in Kentucky football's bowl game.

December 5, 2021

The No. 22 Wildcats will return to the Citrus Bowl for the second time in four years for a matchup with No. 15 Iowa football, the program where Stoops played from 1986 to 1989. The Citrus Bowl, which has first pick of SEC and Big Ten teams after the playoff committee fills the New Year's Six bowls, took Kentucky over Arkansas and Texas A&M.

Kentucky will play in its sixth consecutive bowl game. The Wildcats have won their last three bowl games, including last season's victory over NC State in the Gator Bowl to cap a 5-6 season. The streak started with a win over Penn State in the Citrus Bowl following the 2018 season.

"Mark has done just a phenomenal job with the program there," lowa coach Kirk Ferentz said. "Little personal aspect to it, but it's going to be a great thrill for us to compete against their football team. We'll have our hands full, I'm sure of that."

With a win in the bowl, UK would secure just the third-double digit win season in program history.

"Obviously like most people, naturally I want 10, 11," Stoops said after UK's regular season finale. "That's human nature. We all want more, but we're just going to keep on working. We're going to keep on growing the program, we're going to keep on re-

cruiting.

"I told you in the summer we were on the right track and I felt good about this team."

A New Year's Day bowl game would represent a successful end to a season had fans dreaming of a possible berth in the playoff after a 6-0 start but had lost almost all its momentum after three consecutive losses to Georgia, Mississippi State and Tennessee.

Kentucky bounced back with wins over overmatched foes Vanderbilt and New Mexico State in November then closed the regular season on a high note with a 52-21 blowout of Louisville in the Governor's Cup rivalry game.

The bowl game should give Kentucky an opportunity to rewrite the narrative of its season.

October wins over Florida and LSU were thought to be marquee victories at the time, but both of those teams have struggled down the stretch and ended up firing their coaches. Kentucky did not beat an FBS team in the regular season with a winning record, but it did beat five teams eligible for a bowl game at 6-6.

A berth in a high-profile New Year's Day bowl, which will be televised on ABC, could help provide momentum in advance of signing day later this month. Kentucky's 2022 recruiting class is currently ranked 16th nationally by the 247Sports Composite and the Wildcats are still pursuing several high-profile transfers.

But most of the attention leading up to the game is like to center around Stoops, who earlier this week agreed in principle to a contract extension with Kentucky.

Stoops agreed to his extension amid reports listing him as a possible candidate for the open jobs at LSU, Florida and Oklahoma, but he has also been mentioned as a logical candidate to replace Ferentz whenever college football's longest-tenured coach decides to retire.

Stoops was a three-year letterman at lowa (1987-89) and started his coaching career as a graduate assistant for legendary lowa coach Hayden Fry (1990-91). Ferentz was an offensive line coach for the Hawkeyes while Stoops was a player.

In an interview with The Courier Journal earlier this week, Citrus Bowl CEO Steve Hogan denied setting up the Stoops-vs.-lowa matchup was a consideration in the bowl's selections, but he acknowledged the bowl would promote that storyline if the two teams were picked.

"His connection in that case would be fun, for sure, but that's not one that goes, 'OK, here it is, that's the reason to do this,'" Hogan said. "It's just one you'd have fun with once you actually put that matchup together."

Why playing lowa in the Citrus Bowl will be special for Kentucky football coach Mark Stoops

In talking about Kentucky football's opponents, Mark Stoops generally likes to stick to coaching clichés.

The next game is a big game only because it is the next one.

But even Stoops made no effort to hide the importance of Kentucky facing Iowa, the program he and two of his brothers played for in college, in the Citrus Bowl.

"My father has my game jersey from the Hawkeyes very neatly folded and placed in his casket where he's buried with the black and gold," Stoops said in a Zoom news conference Sunday evening after the matchup was confirmed. "It definitely will mean something to me. Different than anybody else I've played, that's for sure."

Bob Stoops lettered at Iowa in four years from 1979 to 1982. Mike Stoops

followed with letters in 1981, 1983 and 1984.

Mark, the youngest of the Stoops' brothers, also considered Ohio State and Michigan State as a recruit, but the family's ties to lowa won out in the end.

"I felt so comfortable with those coaches," Stoops said. "They were really like fathers to me during my time there. They were just such great people, such a great organization. That's what I try to be for our players and try to be and support them during good times and bad."

The headline in the Jan. 24, 1985, edition of the Des Moines Register read, "Another Stoops to play at lowa," on the day after Mark announced his commitment to legendary coach Hayden Fry's program. Once he got to campus, injuries would derail his career, but Stoops still lettered three times from 1987 to 1989.

Like his brothers, Stoops then started his coaching career as a graduate assistant on Fry's staff.

Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz worked on Fry's staff as the offensive line coach when Iowa was recruiting Stoops. After Stoops' visit to campus, Ferentz remembers then defensive coordinator Bill Brazier shaking his head in incredulity at Stoops' diminutive frame.

"Bill made the comment: If this wasn't a Stoops, I would have sworn there is no way this guy was going to be a college football player," Ferentz said Sunday. "His point was Mark at that time probably looked like he was 15. Just a really young-looking high school senior. Coach Fry had his mind made up on that one already. Certainly, it panned out.

"All three of the boys had tremendous careers here. Not just good careers, tremendous careers. Not surprised at all. Mark has done a wonderful job there with Kentucky's program."

While Stoops' time at Iowa may not have prepared him for a professional

playing career – UK's coach described himself as a "very average player" – it did shape his coaching philosophy.

He joked he might find some film of his playing days to show Kentucky's players during the upcoming month of bowl practices, but the more likely impact will come from his work to build a similar culture at Kentucky to the one Fry built at Iowa. When Stoops' father, Ron, died in 1988, Fry flew to Youngstown, Ohio for the funeral even as his team prepared to face Michigan that weekend.

"It just shows you what kind of people they are," Stoops said.

While Stoops talked about his connection to the Hawkeyes program, UK seniors Luke Fortner and DeAndre Square watched on from their own computer screens while waiting their turn to field questions from reporters.

Asked what it would mean to beat lowa, Fortner paid Stoops perhaps the highest compliment a player can give a coach.

"He talked a lot about the way he felt when he was at lowa," Fortner said. "I think the best thing about it is that's the way we feel about Coach Stoops. Feel like the coaching staff here act as father figures to us. They make us feel comfortable, and we know they would do anything for us.

"...To get a win over Iowa for Coach Stoops, it would truly mean a lot to us. He works his butt off for us, and his coaching staff works as hard as they can for us. To be able to reward him with that win would be big for us."

Citrus Bowl against lowa conjures unique emotions for Kentucky, Mark Stoops

Mark Stoops isn't sure how emotional the Wildcats' matchup with Iowa in the Citrus Bowl will be.

Stoops' father, Ron, was buried with the jersey that Mark wore while playing for the lowa Hawkeyes. He and two of his brothers, Bob and Mike, played at and got their coaching careers kick-started with the Hawkeyes. Mark recalls playing in high school football games on Friday nights and then driving 10 hours overnight from Struthers, Ohio, to lowa City, lowa, to watch his brothers play. "It's hard to put into words what the lowa program has meant to us," Kentucky's head coach said.

The program that helped groom Stoops and two of his brothers into Power Five football coaches now stands between UK and its fourth season with 10 or more wins in school history. Kentucky won its final three games to finish 9-3 in the regular season and the No. 22 spot in the final College Football Playoff rankings. Iowa, the Big Ten championship runner-up, was 15th in those same rankings. Kentucky made its Citrus Bowl debut just three seasons ago after finishing 9-3 in the 2018 season. The Wildcats toppled Penn State, 27-24, in that edition of the game. That win has since seemed to resonate with recruits, and another victory in front of a national television audience — the game will be broadcast by ABC — could yield similar value for a team trying to climb the ranks in the Southeastern Conference.

What might resonate more, though, is Stoops' recent commitment to the school; he last week agreed to a contract extension through the, at least, the 2027 season, following a few weeks of speculation that saw his named linked to several prominent openings across the country. "What does the University of Kentucky mean to me? It means everything to me," Stoops said. "... It's been a really good marriage between the University of Kentucky and myself. There's ups and there's downs, but it's always that way." Contract details aren't yet

available, but reports surfaced prior to the announcement of Stoops' extension that he was hoping UK would make progress on the development of a new indoor training facility and expand the salary pool for his assistant coaches. "We're working through it," Stoops said of those items. "I've had a great relationship with Dr. (Eli) Capilouto and (Athletic Director) Mitch (Barnhart). I have a lot of trust in those guys and we talked about it prior to the agreement. I'm sure we'll continue to work our way through it. It's not like it's just a simple answer on some things."

Two of the players who've contributed the most to UK's recent ascension — offensive lineman Luke Fortner and linebacker DeAndre Square — had contrasting experiences the last time Kentucky went to Orlando. Fortner, then playing guard but now the Cats' starting center, was sidelined due to an injury suffered during practice in the week before the game. Square made his first career start against Penn State and has since started in 34 of UK's last 35 games. He'd played a lot prior to this season, but Square took on a greater leadership role coming into the 2021 campaign. He's among several seniors who could return for an additional year of eligibility under the NCAA's COVID-19 waiver but has not yet decided what he'll do. "I'm glad that we get a chance to get back down into Orlando to play a bowl game," said Square, a Detroit native. "It was fun being down there my freshman year, so to do it again my senior year, to come full circle? I think it'll be pretty fun." Fortner described this opportunity as a "do-over" for him. The 6-foot-7 lineman could describe the entire 2021 season that way; he might have gotten selected late in the 2021 NFL Draft but, by demonstrating his effectiveness in a completely different role this year, his chances of making an NFL roster in 2022 improved drastically. On a

personal level, Fortner and UK's other linemen will have an opportunity to showcase their talents in the same game as that of lowa, consistently one of the nation's best units and which boasts Tyler Linderbaum, the Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year. UK's offensive line recently was named as a semifinalist for the Joe Moore Award, a distinction it earned for the fourth time in the last six years.

"I've watched their offensve line quite a bit," Fortner said of lowa. "They play hard, they're a hard-nosed unit. ... I definitely think there's gonna be some pride going into it. Their defense is doing really well and defending against the run this year, and they haven't given up many points in each of their games. It's definitely going to be a pride thing."

Stoops joked during his availability that he would break out film from his playing days at lowa to lighten the mood during some of UK's practices leading up to the Citrus Bowl. "I was not very impressive as a player, that's for sure," Stoops said. "I loved my time there, did the best I could, and I'm not going to make any excuses, but back then when you tore up a knee, it was a little different than it is right now." Stoops earned a starting job his junior year. His father died during the same week he suffered that knee injury.

"I got back from my father's funeral on Wednesday and I blew out my knee against Michigan on Saturday," Stoops said.

New Troy coach Jon Sumrall explains why he'll coach with Kentucky in Citrus Bowl

Though he now has a new job, Jon Sumrall wants to finish his old one.

The new head football coach at Troy said Monday he will coach the line-backers for Kentucky in the Wildcats' Citrus Bowl game against Iowa on Jan. 1, 2022.

"I am going to coach in the bowl game," Sumrall told reporters in a conference call. "Coach (Mark) Stoops and I have communicated. Mr. (Mitch) Barnhart and I have communicated about it, as well. The plan is for me to coach in the bowl game.

"I'd love to get win No. 10 and coaching some of those young men there that mean so much to me. I really will cherish one more opportunity to go out with those guys that I've had the opportunity to coach at Kentucky." An assistant at Troy from 2015-18 under Neal Brown, Sumrall spent the past three seasons at his alma mater. He was named Troy's new head coach last Thursday. A native of Huntsville, Ala., Sumrall replaces Chip Lindsey, who went 15-19 in three seasons at the Sun Belt Conference school.

Asked to expound on why it was important for him to coach one more game with Kentucky, Sumrall said, "The University of Kentucky is important to me. The young men on that football team are important to me. Getting win No. 10 is important to me, and finishing the job."

Sumrall told reporters that after a knee injury ended his career at Kentucky, former UK coach Rich Brooks was instrumental in starting him in coaching. He also talked about what he learned from being on Mark Stoops' staff at Kentucky. "I think Coach Stoops really understands how to evaluate the most important critical factors to building a great program and emphasizing those," Sumrall said. "He's very detailed, very thorough. He has a great relationship with our players. As a head coach, he's so engaged to the pulse of our team. The guys on the roster at Kentucky understand how much he cares about them."

After being named head coach at

Troy, Sumrall flew back to Lexington for UK's recruiting visits. He returned with his family to Alabama on Sunday night and said he will spend the next two weeks at Troy before rejoining UK for the bowl game.

"I really want to emphasize that, yeah, I'm doing this job right now, and that's what's next, but I'm going to finish this job before I fully move on," said the coach. "Most of my attention the next couple of weeks is going to be on Troy. I'll do things here and there for Kentucky. And I'll continue to do whatever Coach Stoops asks of me, but at the same time next couple of weeks I'll be busy here.

"But I'm coaching the (bowl) game because I want to finish the job. I want to finish it for Coach Stoops. I want to finish it with (defensive coordinator) Brad White. I want to finish it for the linebackers I coach. I want to finish it for the university. I want to see us get to 10 wins and finish in the top 25."

'It was actually one of the best days of my life.' Will Levis recalls lowa offer.

The Country School, the Connecticut private school that Kentucky quarterback Will Levis attended through eighth grade, didn't have a football team, so he had to settle for playing in local leagues until he enrolled at Xavier High School.

The New England area isn't traditionally regarded as a producer of high-level football prospects, but Levis says he's been encouraged by the number of players he's seen get major offers from his state in recent years. (Example: Michigan signed a defensive lineman and offensive tackle, the No. 2 and No. 3 players in the state, out of Connecticut as part of the 2021 class.)

His road to Power Five football was in large part the product of personal

tenacity and parents who were willing to spend the energy, time and money needed to put him in front of as many eyeballs as possible.

"Because of where I'm from, it changed how I had to approach the recruiting process a lot," Levis told the Herald-Leader. "I really had to scratch and claw, go to camps and make a name for myself. People didn't really know who I was at the time. ... There was a time when I thought nobody would recruit me, that nobody would take a shot on me."

lowa head coach Kirk Ferentz noted on Sunday, during a news conference following the announcement that his team would play Kentucky in the Citrus Bowl, that his school was the first Power Five program to offer Levis. The UK quarterback, who played his first three seasons at Penn State, recalled that moment.

"It was actually one of the best days of my life," Levis said.

Ken O'Keefe, Iowa's quarterbacks coach, attended a rival high school in Connecticut and was the man who invited Levis to the camp at which he received an offer.

"I don't know if I'd be here right now if that hadn't happened," Levis said. "They were right at the top of my list until the very end. I had to make a choice between them and Penn State, those were my final two picks. I went with Penn State but Iowa's a great place. I loved it and have all the respect in the world for Coach Ferentz."

Stoops, Marrow Land Top Football Recruiting Class in Kentucky History

Wednesday was National Signing Day, the day when players sign their National Letters of Intent to play their college football for a particular school. Through Wednesday evening, Kentucky had signed 21 players and had a recruiting class that ranked in the top 20 nationally.

Still, there was one huge piece, literally, that was missing from the class.

That issue was resolved on Thursday when five-star offensive lineman Kiyaunta Goodwin put pen to paper and signed with the Cats.

Goodwin was the number one player in the state of Indiana this season. He was the number two offensive tackle and No. 13 player overall in the nation, as ranked by 247Sports.

After waiting 24 hours to get the official paperwork on Goodwin, UK head coach Mark Stoops was excited to welcome him to the UK family.

"We are happy to welcome Kiyaunta, the big fellow, into our organization," Stoops said on Thursday. "As I told him last night, welcome to the program but it feels like you've been a part of it for nearly a year now, or more. We've recruited and known Kiyaunta since he was in eighth grade. We've known him for a long time. Terrific young man. Unbelievable football player and we're excited to add him to our program."

Goodwin had committed to UK a few months ago but a few other schools made late runs at him, trying to pry him away from the Cats. Asked whether he was nervous about losing Goodwin, Stoops was honest.

"I wouldn't say nervous," Stoops said. "It's just constant work. We got it done."

Goodwin is a 6-8, 340-pound offensive lineman. But for Stoops, it wasn't just his size.

"Number one, it's very rare to see a human being move at that size," Stoops said. "He is unbelievably athletic for his size. He can move his feet, he can do a lot of things and that's rare for someone his size."

Stoops knows that Goodwin was a highly-coveted prospect.

"This is a young man who could truly play anywhere in the United

States," Stoops said. "Any college in the country would take his signature today."

Stoops does not rule out Goodwin playing as a true freshman.

"I would never put it past him," Stoops said. "Yes, he has that ability."

The class is not only Goodwin. There are plenty of talented pieces that make up this group. Stoops touched on a number of them on Thursday.

Alex Afari, DB —"Alex Afari, we had people going to extreme lengths right down to the wire to try to get him away from us, and Alex has been committed to us for some time. He's a DB, a big corner that can also be very versatile, playing in that medium position that we know is so important for us and could play safety. He's a guy that's a five-position player in my eyes, just a terrific football player."

Kobi Albert, DB – "Kobi we just mentioned, one of the best athletes we've recruited, can play multiple positions."

Grant Bingham, OL – "A guy from right here in Kentucky, Paintsville, big, physical guy, highly recruited, four-star guy, terrific player, is going to help us."

Barion Brown, WR – "Barion Brown, as high as a five-star with certain people, extremely explosive. Hopefully he comes in and helps us right away."

Tyreese Fearbry, DE – "Tyreese Fearby out of Pittsburgh, great outside linebacker, that length that we were talking about that with needed."

Zah Frazier, Juco DB — "Zah Frazier, big-time length, 6'3" corner, junior college player, one of the top junior college players in the country that we needed. I wanted that size at corner."

Dane Key, WR – "Dane Key is a terrific football player. He's also very mature. He's very intelligent, works extremely hard."

Destin Wade, ATH/QB and Keaten Wade, LB — "Destin Wade, a quarter-back, but a terrific player. Him and his brother Keaten, two terrific players

out of Tennessee. Took their team to the state championship game, top players in Tennessee, terrific people, great leaders. Going to be unbelievable fits for us."

Deone Walker, DT — "Deone Walker as I mentioned was a big, big get. Coach Wolford did a great job going into Detroit and keeping that streak alive and continuing to recruit and beat some terrific teams on him, and we felt good but never really secure. It was a battle all the way to the end, and Coach Wolf did a tremendous job with him."

Stoops knows that all of his staff's hard work has paid off with this tremendous class.

"It's always a battle and a fight," Stoops said. "To the best of my recollection, we've never been ranked in the SEC. I've never been ranked ahead of ninth."

It's also a historic class for Kentucky.

"By national experts, it's my understanding that this is the best class the University of Kentucky has ever signed," Stoops said. "That's the way we understand it."

The 2022 signing class continues the elevation of the Kentucky program, one that Stoops has overseen since his arrival in Lexington.

Football Cats Impressed with What They See from lowa

Now that finals and National Signing Day are over, No. 22 Kentucky can turn its attention to their opponent in the Citrus Bowl, 15th-ranked Iowa.

The Hawkeyes, like the Cats, opened their season with six straight victories. Iowa beat Indiana, Iowa State, Kent State, Colorado State, Maryland and Penn State and, in doing so, rose to number two in the national rankings.

Also like the Cats, the Hawkeyes had some bumpy roads in the middle of the season. After opening 6-0, lowa was upset, at home, by unranked Purdue and followed that with a loss as Wisconsin.

Iowa would close out its regular season by beating Northwestern, Minnesota, Illinois and Nebraska. By finishing 10-2 and 7-2 in the Big Ten, the Hawkeyes won their division and advanced to the Big Ten title game.

There, they ran into a buzzsaw that called itself Michigan. The Wolverines beat the Hawkeyes 42-3 in Indianapolis.

Still, at 10-3, lowa has put together a most impressive season, one that will culminate with a game against Kentucky in Orlando in New Year's Day.

Veteran head coach Kirk Ferentz leads the Hawkeyes and is in his 23rd season in Iowa City. Ferentz likes his offense simple and his defense complex, something that the Cats have discovered on film.

The Hawkeyes have run the ball 477 times this season while passing on just 374 occasions. Those numbers tell the UK defense that Iowa will be running the ball, something that senior Marquan McCall seems to favor.

"We are really excited because it's an old-school offense and that's what we like," McCall said. "We like for teams to run the ball and to give us some more challenges. We're prepared and ready to go."

McCall's job against lowa will be especially tough as he squares off with Tyler Linderbaum, who is widely regarded as the best center in the country and a likely first-round pick in next year's NFL Draft. McCall plans to be up for the challenge.

"I'm really excited. I always like competition," McCall said. "It's just exciting to get to go against him and show him what I got and for him to show me what he's got."

On the other side of the ball, the Hawkeyes have one of the nation's best defeneses. That's because they

do a lot of things very well, according to UK All-American tackle Darian Kinnard.

"Their defense is very technical," Kinnard said. "They are pretty big, they're very stout when they play. They don't miss a lot of tackles. Their linebackers have over 100 tackles, one of their (defensive) lineman has like 50. They're very technical guys and they're going to play throughout the whole game."

As the Cats continue to prepare for lowa, as well as preparing for a trip to Florida, Kinnard is enjoying one last ride with his teammates. And he has advice for the younger players.

"Throughout this whole break before bowl game, I would say enjoy the time," Kinnard said. "It is a daily grind but I would say have fun with it. Have fun, don't burn yourself out and enjoy the process."

That process includes learning more about lowa each and every day, something UK will continue to do right up until game time.
