## GAME INFORMATION

### Television Coverage

FOX will televise the game to a national audience. Gus Johnson (play-by-play), Joel Klatt (color) and Jenny Taft (sideline) will call the game.

### Radio Coverage

Doug Karsch (play-by-play), Jon Jansen (color) and Jason Avant (sideline) will call the action on the LEARFIELD Michigan Sports Network. Anchored by WWJ-AM (950) in Detroit, the Michigan Radio Network is comprised of 36 affiliate stations in Michigan and Ohio (see page 3).

### Wolverines in the Big Ten Championship Game

Michigan will be making its third consecutive appearance in the Big Ten Championship Game. The Wolverines have won those past two appearances in the conference championship game, defeating Iowa in 2021 (42-3) and Purdue in 2022 (43-22). This season, the Maize and Blue won the Big Ten East Division crown and advanced to the title game with a 30-24 victory at No. 2 Ohio State. U-M is looking to capture its league-leading 45th Big Ten Championship and third in as many seasons.

### Wolverines and Hawkeyes

This will be the 64th meeting between Michigan and Iowa. The Wolverines hold a 44-15-4 lead in the all-time series and have won 15 of the last 23 games in the series.

### Michigan When Ranked Against Iowa

The Wolverines have compiled a 29-9-2 record against the Hawkeyes when ranked in the AP poll.

### Michigan in Night Games

U-M will play its fifth night game of the 2023 season when it face Iowa in the Big Ten Championship Game on Saturday. This match-up will be the 77th night game in school history. U-M has compiled a 48-28 overall record in games starting after 5 p.m. local time, posting a 13-2 record at Michigan Stadium, a 29-16 mark on the road and a 6-10 record on a neutral site.

THE 2023 SEASON

**U-M in the Big Ten Championship Game**

- The Michigan football team will be making its third consecutive appearance in the Big Ten Championship Game
- U-M will look to capture its league-leading 45th Big Ten Championship with a victory over No. 17/No. 18 Iowa
- The Wolverines qualified for the conference championship game as the Big Ten East Division Champion following a 30-24 victory over No. 2 Ohio State
- Michigan finished the conference season with a 9-0 mark to win its second straight outright Big Ten East Division title
- U-M won a share of the 2018 and 2021 Big Ten East Division titles with Ohio State; the Buckeyes went to the championship game by virtue of their victory over the Wolverines in 2018 and Michigan returned the favor in 2021
- The Wolverines won the Big Ten East outright in 2022 and 2023 with victories over Ohio State

**Iowa Series History**

- This will be the 64th meeting between Michigan and Iowa
- The Wolverines hold a 44-15-4 lead in the all-time series and have claimed victories in 14 of the last 21 games between the two schools
- Michigan has a 24-5-3 record against Iowa at Michigan Stadium, and has a 25-6-3 all-time mark in Ann Arbor
- UM has a 17-8-1 mark in Iowa City, including a 16-8-1 record at Kinnick Stadium
- The Wolverines hold a 13-7 advantage in the last 20 meetings between the two programs but the two programs have split the last 10 meetings in the series
- The Wolverines hold a 2-1 advantage in games played on a neutral site, including a 42-3 victory in the 2021 Big Ten Championship Game played at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis, Ind.
- The only previous neutral site games played between Michigan and Iowa came in the initial contests, with the Hawkeyes winning 28-5 in 1900 (Detroit, Mich.) and the Wolverines claiming 50-0 victory in 1901 (Chicago, Ill.)

**Michigan Football in the state of Indiana**

- U-M is seeking its 53rd win in the state of Indiana when it plays in the 2023 Big Ten Championship Game
- This will be the fifth time in school history that the Wolverines play a football game in the city of Indianapolis
- The previous four games in Indianapolis, all victories by Michigan, were played in 1892 (18-0 victory against DePauw), 1907 (22-0 win against Wabash), 2021 (42-3 victory over Iowa in the Big Ten Championship Game) and 2022 (43-22 win over Purdue in the Big Ten Championship Game)
- The Wolverines have compiled a 52-23-1 record against six opponents in the state of Indiana
- U-M has an impressive 40-12 (.769) record against Big Ten foes in the Hoosier state, battling Indiana (21-3) and Purdue (17-9) on their campuses and Iowa and Purdue on the neutral site in 2021 and 2022; has also faced long-time

rival Notre Dame (9-11-1), DePauw (2-0) and Wabash (1-0) within the state during its 144-year history of intercollegiate football

**U-M's Connection with the Hoosier State**

- Michigan's roster features one Indiana native in DL Kenneth Grant from Merrillville and Merrillville High School
- Head Coach Jim Harbaugh returns to the city where he played four NFL seasons (1994-97), leading the Indianapolis Colts to a pair of playoff appearances, including the AFC Championship Game in 1996, and earned the nickname "Captain Comeback" for his ability to rally the Colts on many occasions; Harbaugh was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor in 2005

**Michigan Ranked Third in the Polls**

- U-M is ranked No. 3 in the Associated Press media poll and the AFCA Coaches' poll heading into the match-up with No. 17/No. 18 Iowa
- The Wolverines have ranked No. 3 in the College Football Playoff rankings for each of the four polls so far this year
- Michigan began the 2023 season ranked No. 2, which is the program's highest preseason ranking since listing No. 2 in 1991, and maintained that ranking through 13 polls before falling to No. 3 prior to the Ohio State game
- The Wolverines finished No. 3 in the polls the past two seasons marking just the third time in school history the program accomplished the feat; the only other times that U-M ranked in the top 5 in consecutive seasons was 1947 and 1948, capturing back-to-back national championships, and 1940 (No. 3) and 1941 (No. 5)
- Michigan has listed in the top five of the national polls for 29 straight rankings
- The Wolverines have been ranked in the top 10 of the polls for 41 straight rankings: 14 this fall, all 16 in 2022 and the final 11 of 2021
- The Wolverines have been listed in the national rankings for 44 straight polls dating back to the second poll of 2021, including a current string of 41 consecutive polls in the top 10
- U-M has been ranked for all but 13 contests during Harbaugh's tenure (98 of 111 games)

**Michigan in the Big Ten Conference**

- The Wolverines' 24-game conference winning streak is a program record, surpassing the 19-game Big Ten winning streak spanning 1990-92
- U-M has claimed wins in 28 of its last 29 games against conference schools
- Michigan has a 62-17 mark in Big Ten action under ninth-year head coach Jim Harbaugh
- The Wolverines have a 30-8 record at home in Big Ten play under Harbaugh and have a 30-9 mark on the road; 2-0 on a neutral site

**2023 Schedule Notes**

- U-M won all three of its rivalry trophy games this season, defeating Minnesota (Little Brown Jug), Michigan State (Paul Bunyan Trophy) and Nebraska (Bussin' Bowl); all three games were contested on the road
- Michigan is one of 13 Power 5 schools not playing an FCS opponent this season
- Two of the Wolverines' foes this fall were

ranked in the top 10 of the preseason AP poll: No. 3 Ohio State and No. 7 Penn State

- Seven of this year's opponents played in bowl games last season: Ohio State (Peach), Penn State (Rose), Purdue (Citrus), Maryland (Duke's Mayo), Minnesota (Pinstripe), Bowling Green (Quick Lane) and East Carolina (Birmingham)

## THE TEAM UNDER HARBAUGH

### Michigan on the Field

- U-M has won 12-plus games in three consecutive seasons; the 2021-22 seasons were the first time in history that the team accomplished the feat in consecutive seasons
- The Maize and Blue won 25 games in 2021-22, which is the most wins in a two-year stretch in school history
- Michigan has won 10-plus games in six of Harbaugh's nine seasons leading the program
- The Wolverines have won 86 overall games during Coach Harbaugh's nine seasons (86-25)
- Michigan has the seventh-most victories among all college football team since Harbaugh was hired ahead of the 2015 season
- U-M has scored 473 touchdowns while allowing just 230 to its opponents during that stretch
- The defense has been listed in the top 12 nationally in six of his eight seasons, including four seasons ranking among the top 5 in total defense; finished 2022 listed sixth nationally

### Wolverines Excelling in the Classroom

- Not only has the program done well on the field, the players have achieved at a high level in the classroom under Harbaugh
- 344 Academic All-Big Ten Performers (2015-22); fourth-highest total in the conference during that span
- Achieved a school record 60 Academic All-Big Ten performers in consecutive seasons (2021-22)
- More than 80 players have been enrolled in graduate school during Harbaugh's tenure
- 37 student-athletes have been named Big Ten Distinguished Scholars (3.7 GPA or better during the academic year)

### Players Earn National and Big Ten Honors

- A total of 95 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors (1st, 2nd or 3rd team): 16 players in 2016, 15 in four seasons (2018, 2019, 2021 and 2022), 9 in 2017, 8 in 2015 and 2 in 2020
- Nine players have earned first-team All-America honors: Jake Butt (2015-16), Jourdan Lewis (2015-16), Jabrill Peppers (2016), Maurice Hurst (2017), Devin Bush (2018), Aidan Hutchinson (2021), Jake Moody (2021) Olu Oluwatimi (2022) and Blake Corum (2022)
- Moody became Michigan's first-ever winner of the Lou Groza Award as the nation's outstanding place-kicker in 2021 and was just the second kicker to earn first-team All-American honors
- Hutchinson finished as the 2021 Heisman Trophy runner-up and won the Lombardi Award, Ted Hendricks Trophy and Lott IMPACT Trophy
- Corum (2022) and Hutchinson (2021) were recipients of the Chicago Tribune Silver Football as the Big Ten's MVP as voted by the coaches
- Butt and Peppers each collected a pair of national awards during the 2016 season: Butt

won the Mackey Award and Senior CLASS Award while Peppers collected the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Paul Hornung Award

- Additionally, four players have been named finalists for national awards during Harbaugh's tenure: Jabrill Peppers (Lombardi and Bednarik, 2016), Jourdan Lewis (Thorpe, 2016), Devin Bush (Butkus, 2017-18 and Bronko Nagurski, 2018) and Blake Corum (Hornung, 2021)
- Harbaugh has mentored two Heisman Trophy finalists at Michigan and four in his coaching career, in addition to placing third as a player during his senior year

### Harbaugh Earns Accolades

- Harbaugh won both 2022 Big Ten Coach of the Year honors, collecting the Hayes-Schembechler Coach of the Year honor as voted by his fellow coaches and the Dave McClain Coach of the Year recognition as voted by the media
- He was selected as the 2022 AFCA FBS Region 3 Coach of the Year
- Harbaugh was a finalist for four national coach of the year awards in 2022: finalist for Bobby Dodd Trophy, Paul "Bear" Bryant Award, Eddie Robinson Award and George Munger Award
- Harbaugh was named the 2021 Associated Press Coach of the Year in college football, becoming the first U-M head coach to win the honor since the award was established in 1998

### Michigan at Home in the Harbaugh Era

- The Wolverines have compiled a 52-8 home record under Jim Harbaugh
- U-M has won 22 straight home games, claiming back-to-back undefeated home slates in 2021, 2022 and 2023
- Michigan has a 30-8 mark in Big Ten games at the Big House under Harbaugh's leadership
- The Wolverines have gone undefeated five times; posted a 7-0 mark in 2018, 2021 and 2023 and an 8-0 mark in 2016 and 2022
- U-M has put together home winning streaks of 10 games (2016-17), 13 games (2018-19) and 22 games (2021-23) during his tenure
- The only setbacks in Big Ten home games have come in losses to Michigan State and Ohio State as well as Wisconsin and Penn State during the 2020 COVID pandemic season
- The Wolverines are a perfect 22-0 in non-conference home games under Harbaugh, outscoring the opposition by a 923-232 margin

### Michigan on the Road under Harbaugh

- U-M has compiled a 30-11 record (.732) on the road under head coach Jim Harbaugh
- The Wolverines have posted a 30-9 record (.769) in conference road games during his tenure, including a 5-0 record in 2023 and a 4-0 record during the 2015 and 2022 seasons
- The team has won 11 straight road league games dating back to Penn State in 2021, the longest streak for the program since 1945-48
- Michigan has won 13 of its last 14 Big Ten road games dating back to the start of 2021
- The program has posted a 3-5 record in neutral site games: 1-5 mark in bowl games
- The team's only regular season neutral site affair was a 33-17 victory over Florida in the 2017 season opener at Cowboys Stadium

## MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

### Michigan Tops NCAA in Attendance

- Michigan has led the nation in attendance 45 of the past 48 seasons; only years that U-M did not lead the country in attendance was 1997, 2014 and 2020
- U-M has drawn 100,000-plus fans for 315 straight games at Michigan Stadium (since Nov. 8, 1975)
- The Wolverines averaged 109,971 fans at their seven games played at Michigan Stadium in 2023; had 769,797 fans attend the seven home contests
- In 2023, U-M had 373,921 patrons in attendance at its five Big Ten road tilts for an average of 74,784 fans per game
- Michigan has played in front of more than a million fans during the 11-game thus far (1,143,718) in 2023

### College Football's Top TV Draw

- U-M has played in a NCAA record 581 televised and streamed football games, compiling a 389-184-8 record
- Michigan was involved in three of the eight highest rated games during the 2022 season: Fiesta Bowl (#2, 21.7M), Ohio State (#4, 17.1M) and Big Ten Championship Game (#8, 10.7M)
- Every single football game since 1995 has been televised or streamed, a streak of 356 consecutive broadcasts
- The Wolverines have played 335 nationally televised football games over the year
- The very first televised U-M football game came on Sept. 27, 1947, a 55-0 shutout of rival Michigan State on WWJ TV in Detroit

### Jordan Brand

- The Michigan Football program is in its eighth season wearing brand Jordan apparel
- U-M was the first college and/or professional football program to wear Jordan on its uniforms and sideline apparel, starting with the 2016 season
- The Wolverines were joined by North Carolina as Jordan football schools in 2017; Oklahoma and Florida were outfitted by Jordan starting with the 2018 season
- Jordan outfits Michigan from head-to-toe on all apparel needs for the football and basketball programs
- Michigan and NIKE began its 15-year agreement on Aug. 1, 2016

THE TEAM

- The Wolverines are one of six undefeated team at the FBS level: Georgia, Michigan, Florida State, Washington, Ohio State and Liberty
- U-M has won 37 of its last 40 football games dating back to the start of the 2021 season
- The Wolverines have won 28 consecutive regular season games, tied for the longest stretch in Big Ten history with Michigan (1901-03) and Ohio State (2005-07)
- The Maize and Blue are in the midst of a school record 24-game winning streak against conference teams, which includes the past two Big Ten Championship Games; surpassed the 19-game mark set from 1990-92 under coach Gary Moeller
- U-M is 11-0 for the second season in a row; the last time the program achieved at least a 10-0 start in consecutive seasons was during a stretch of four straight seasons with 10 wins through 10 weeks from 1971-74
- The Wolverines have been victorious in 11 straight road league games (dating to Penn State, 2021), the longest streak for the program since Michigan won 17 games from 1988-92; tied for the fifth longest streak in Big Ten history
- Michigan scored 30-plus points in a school record 12 straight games to break the previous mark of eight games set during the 1976 season (Ohio State, 2022 to Penn State, 2023)
- The team scored 40-plus points in five consecutive conference games for the first time in school history: Nebraska (45), Minnesota (52), Indiana (52), Michigan State (49) and Purdue (41)
- Michigan has won each of its first 10 games while holding each opponent under 15 points; the last time that a U-M team accomplished the feat was 1973 when the squad went 10-0-1 and allowed a season-high 13 points
- The 2023 Wolverines are the first Big Ten team to hold their first seven opponents of the season under 14 points while scoring at least 30 points since Minnesota in 1905
- After scoring 52 points at Minnesota and against Indiana, Michigan has scored 50-plus points in consecutive Big Ten games for the first time since 1975

Big House Streak Reaches 22 Games

- U-M has run its home winning streak to 22 games after posting a 7-0 record this season at the Big House
- The 22-game winning streak is the longest home winning streak under Jim Harbaugh and the program's best since a 28-game streak from 1969-73 under Bo Schembechler
- Michigan has claimed three straight undefeated seasons at home, posting a perfect 8-0 record in 2022 and a 7-0 slates in 2021 and 2023
- The Wolverines have posted a perfect home record five times during Harbaugh's tenure: 7-0 (2023), 8-0 (2022), 7-0 (2021), 7-0 (2018) and 8-0 (2016)
- U-M has been unblemished at home on 26 occasions since 1940, including the 1973 and 1992 seasons where they recorded ties at home

U-M Ranks Top 15 in Scoring 'O' and 'D'

- The Wolverines outscored the opposition 451 to 123 margin this fall
- U-M is 13th in the NCAA in scoring offense, averaging 37.6 points per game, and leads the nation in scoring defense allowing just 10.3 points scored per contest
- Michigan, Georgia (No. 8 offense and No. 6 defense), Oregon (No. 2 offense, No. 7 defense), SMU (No. 4 offense, No. 13 defense), Notre Dame (No. 9 offense and defense), Florida State (No. 10 offense, No. 11 defense) and Penn State (No. 14 offense, No. 3 defense) are the teams ranked in the top 15 on both sides of the ball
- Michigan's offense has scored more than 30 points in 11 of the 12 games, and had five straight Big Ten contests with 40-plus points
- The defense held the opposition to less than 15 points in 10 of the 12 games, including under 10

points in eight contests with a shutout against Michigan State

- Michigan scored a season-high 52 points against Minnesota and Indiana and was held to a season low 24 points at Penn State
- Maryland scored a season-high 24 points against Michigan

## Scoring Across All Quarters

- The offense has scored points in 43 of the 48 quarters played this season
- Since the start of the Big Ten season, the Wolverines have tallied points in 34 of the 36 quarters; failed to score in the first quarter against Indiana and Penn State
- The Wolverines scored a season-high 21 points in the third quarter at Minnesota and against Indiana in the second quarter
- Michigan has registered double-digits in points scored in 22 quarters

## Dominant First Half Scoring

- Michigan has outscored the opposition by a 241 to 65 margin in the first half this fall
- The Maize and Blue has jumped out to a 7-0 lead in eight games, tallying touchdowns during the opening stanza of each contest
- The Wolverines rallied from 7-0 deficits against Rutgers and Indiana and a 3-0 hole at Penn State and Maryland
- Michigan has outscored the opposition, 106-26, in the first quarter
- The margin has been larger in the second stanza, with the Wolverines outscoring the opposition by a 138 to 39 margin
- U-M has scored points on its opening possession in six games (five TDs, one FG)
- The Wolverines have allowed only seven teams to score during the first half: Bowling Green (2 FGs), Rutgers (1 TD), Minnesota (1 TD, 1 FG), Indiana (1 TD), Purdue (2 FGs), Penn State (1 FG, 1 TD), Maryland (1 FG, 1 TD) and Ohio State (1 FG, 1 TD)

## Points Off Turnovers

- U-M has scored points on 17 of the 23 opponent turnovers (13 TDs, 4 FGs) in 2023
- The Wolverines have scored 91 points off opponent miscues
- The defense has held the opposition to nine points off seven Michigan turnovers (3 FGs)
- Michigan scored a season-high 17 points off four Indiana turnovers (2 TDs, 1 FG)
- The defense has also scored five touchdowns this fall: 7 points on a fumble recovery by Derrick Moore (4 yards) at Maryland, 14 points on pick sixes at Minnesota by Will Johnson (36 yards) and Keon Sabb (28 yards) and Mike Sainristil recorded a pair of interception returns for scores against Michigan State (72 yards) and Rutgers (71 yards)
- Michigan has forced at least one turnover in 11 of the 12 games, and gained a season-high four turnovers against Indiana
- The defense has collected 17 turnovers in Big Ten action (13 interceptions and four fumbles)

## One of the Nation's Least Penalized Team

- Michigan has been one of the nation's least penalized and most disciplined teams in college

football: flagged 35 times for 317 yards

- The Wolverines are averaging just 26.4 yards of penalties per contests, which leads the nation
- U-M is also first nationally in fewest penalties with an average of 2.92 per game
- Michigan did not commit a penalty at Nebraska; was the first time the program was not called for a penalty since 1980 (Wisconsin)
- The Maize and Blue committed a season-high seven penalties for 75 yards at Michigan State

## Possessing the Pigskin

- Michigan has won the time of possession battle 10 of its 12 contests this season
- The Wolverines list second in the Big Ten and 14th in the NCAA, possessing the ball for an average of 32:30 minutes
- U-M held the ball for a season-high 38:01 at Nebraska and had it a season-low 23:47 against Bowling Green
- Michigan held the ball for 33-plus minutes in seven contests: ECU (33:26), Rutgers (36:08), Nebraska (38:01), Michigan State (34:31), Purdue (33:54), Penn State (33:12) and Ohio State (33:28)

## Wolverines Thriving in the Classroom

- U-M had a perfect 1000 APR Score last year
- Michigan matched its school record with 60 Academic All-Big Ten performers in 2022; equaled the total from 2021
- Zak Zinter is a returning Academic All-American, having earned second-team honors in 2022 from the College Sports Communicators (CSC; formerly CoSIDA)
- Zinter is a 2023 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Award recipient and one of the finalists for the William V. Campbell Trophy
- 21 players are currently enrolled in graduate school on the 2023 team

THE OFFENSE

A Look at the 2023 Offense

- The offense is led by third-year offensive coordinator/offensive line coach Sherrone Moore, a semifinalist for the 2023 Broyles Award
- Michigan had 13 players entering the 2023 season with at least one starting assignment during their career; added five new starters this season: C Drake Nugent, RT Myles Hinton, TE A.J. Barner, WR Tyler Morris and LT LaDarius Henderson
- U-M returns seven starters from the 2022 season: RT Karsen Barnhart, RB Blake Corum, WR Cornelius Johnson, LG Trevor Keegan, TE Colston Loveland\*, QB J.J. McCarthy, WR Roman Wilson\* and RG Zak Zinter; \* Loveland and Wilson both split time as the starters at their positions
- Michigan is the back-to-back Joe Moore Award winning unit as the nation's top offensive line; became the first team to capture the award in consecutive seasons
- U-M is averaging nearly three rushing TDs per game over the last 30 contests (87 total; 33 this season, 41 in 14 games in 2022, 13 in the final four games of 2021)
- RB Blake Corum is a returning consensus All-American and was a seventh-place finisher in the Heisman Trophy voting
- A total of 20 players have carried the ball in a collegiate game: RBs Blake Corum, Donovan Edwards, Tavierre Dunlap, C.J. Stokes, Kalel Mullings, Leon Franklin, Cole Cabana, Danny Hughes, Henry Donohue, Benjamin Hall and Christian Boivin, WRs Roman Wilson, Cornelius Johnson and Semaj Morgan, TE Colston Loveland and QBs J.J. McCarthy, Jack Tuttle, Davis Warren, Jayden Denegal and Alex Orji
- 12 Wolverines have scored rushing touchdowns in their careers, combining for 86 scores; Corum leads the group with 53 and is followed by Edwards (14), McCarthy (10), Mullings (4), Orji (3), Morgan (2), Wilson (1), Franklin (1) and Stokes (1)
- McCarthy, Warren, Orji, Jack Tuttle and Jayden Denegal have seen action under center during their career
- U-M has 19 players with a reception in their careers: WRs Johnson, Mike Sainristil, Roman Wilson, Cristian Dixon, Peyton O'Leary, Will Rolapp, Tyler Morris, Fred Moore, Semaj Morgan and Karmello English; TEs Colston Loveland, A.J. Barner, Matt Hibner, Max Bredeson and Marlin Klein; and RBs Corum, Edwards, Kalel Mullings, C.J. Stokes, Leon Franklin and Danny Hughes
- 15 Wolverines have scored receiving touchdowns, combining for 55 end zone trips, led by Wilson (19) and Johnson (14); Sainristil (5), Loveland (6), Edwards (3), Corum (2), Morgan (2), Barner (1), O'Leary (1), English (1) and Franklin (1) have also caught receiving TDs
- Johnson and Zinter lead the team with 41 starts on offense

Scoring Offense

- U-M has scored 451 points on the season for an average of 37.6 points per contest
- The team has scored 59 TDs (33 rushing, 21 receiving, 4 interception returns, 1 fumble return) and 12 field goals

- The Wolverines have scored 30-plus points in 11 of the 12 games, including a season-high 52 points at Minnesota and against Indiana
- The offense is averaging 0.606 points per play which is the best rate in the Big Ten (Ohio State, 0.491) and fifth overall (LSU, USC, Oregon and Notre Dame)
- The Wolverines scored 30-plus points in a school record 12 straight games (Ohio State, 2022 to Penn State, 2023); that string broke the previous mark of eight 30-plus games set during the 1976 season

Total Offensive Production

- The Wolverines are averaging 394.5 yards per game of total offense, which ranks second in the Big Ten and 57th nationally
- The offense has run 744 plays totaling 4,734 yards for an average of 6.4 yards per play
- U-M generated more than 400 yards of total offense in eight games
- The Maize and Blue had a season-high 492 yards against UNLV and gained a conference-best 477 yards at Michigan State

Efficient Passing Attack

- The Wolverines have the third most efficient passing attack in the country and are tops in the Big Ten (174.33 rating)
- The offense is averaging 224.8 yards per game through the air
- The signal callers have completed 211-of-285 passes for 2,697 yards and 21 touchdowns with five interceptions
- Michigan leads the Big Ten and is second in the country in completion percentage (74.0%)
- U-M has thrown for more than 250 yards in five games, including a season-high 335 yards against Purdue
- J.J. McCarthy has passed for more than 200 yards in seven of his 12 starts this season

Running Game Ready to Take Off

- The Wolverines' running game is starting to find cohesion and continuity which is allowing it to average 169.8 yards per contest
- U-M has carried the ball 459 times for 2,037 yards and scored 33 rushing touchdowns
- The Maize and Blue are tied for third nationally in rushing TDs (33); trails NCAA leaders UNLV (36) and Liberty (34)
- The offense is averaging 4.4 yards per carry
- The Wolverines have surpassed 150 yards rushing in nine of the 12 games, including the 200-yard mark in three Big Ten games: Rutgers (201), Nebraska (249) and Penn State (227)
- Michigan has only 168 negative yards on the ground this season, with 109 of those yards

coming on 14 opponent sacks

- The offense is fourth nationally in fewest tackles for loss allowed (3.33 avg.) and is 13th in fewest sacks allowed (1.17 avg.)

## Big Play Capability

- The offense has generated 62 plays of 20-plus yards in 2023: 45 receiving and 17 rushing
- The Wolverines have 12 receptions and six runs over 30 yards, with six of those being scoring plays; four on receptions of 33, 47, 50 and 54 yards and two on runs of 30 and 44 yards
- Roman Wilson lead the team with 14 plays of 20-plus yards, all on receptions, with Colston Loveland second with 11 plays of more than 20 yards and Cornelius Johnson lists third with nine
- Semaj Morgan has eight plays over 20 yards: four kickoffs, three receptions and a 44-yard jet sweep for a touchdown

## U-M'S OFFENSE UNDER HARBAUGH

- U-M has gained more than 5,000 yards of total offense in six of Coach Harbaugh's eight seasons
- The Wolverines have surpassed 6,000 yards of offense in back-to-back seasons: 6,203 (2021) and 6,423 (2022)
- The 6,423 offensive yards gained in 2022 are a school record, breaking the previous mark of 6,353 yards attained in 2010
- The offense has generated two of the top three total offensive seasons in school history: 6,423 in 2022 (1st) and 6,203 yards in 2021 (3rd); the 2016 squad has the sixth-best offensive season with 5,524 yards
- Two of the three players in school history to pass for more than 3,000 yards in a season have played during Harbaugh's tenure: Jake Rudock (3,017 in 2015) and Shea Patterson (3,061 in 2019); school record is 3,331 yards by John Navarre in 2003
- The Wolverines have scored 3,827 points in 111 games for an average of 34.5 points per contest
- Michigan has three of the top seven scoring outputs for a season in school history: 566 in 2022 (3rd), 524 in 2016 (6th) and 501 in 2021 (7th); the only totals among the top seven in school history are from the Point-a-Minute teams of the early 1900s (1901-04)
- Michigan gained more than 2,000 rushing yards in seven seasons under Harbaugh: 2,057 yards (2015), 2,768 (2016), 2,310 (2017), 2,653 (2018), 3,001 (2021), 3,345 (2022) and 2,037 (2023); also finished with 1,959 yards in 2019
- The red zone offense has converted at just under 90 percent, 437-497 (88%); scored 321 TDs in those 437 conversions (73% of scores are TDs)
- U-M has ranked in the top 15 nationally in red zone efficiency on three occasions: 10th (2022), 13th (2016) and 7th (2015)

- Michigan has a 49-2 record under Harbaugh when a player gains 100 yards rushing and is 76-5 when outrushing the opposition
- U-M is 76-7 under Jim Harbaugh when gaining 125 rushing yards or more in a game
- The Wolverines have lost 49 fumbles in 111 games: six (2015), five (2016), 11 (2017), three (2018), 11 (2019), two (2020), five (2021), four (2022) and two (2023)

THE DEFENSE

A Look at the 2023 Defense

- The defense is led by second-year defensive coordinator Jesse Minter, who was a finalist for the 2022 Broyles Award (nation's top assistant coach) in his first season with the Wolverines
- The Wolverines have 16 defenders that started at least one game in their career, including six players that have started at least 15 contests
- 43 defensive players have recorded at least one tackle during their career
- Junior Colson leads the defense with 232 career tackles while Barrett is second with 188 stops
- A total of 28 Wolverine defenders have recorded stops in the opposition's backfield during their career, led by Jaylen Harrell (17.5) and Michael Barrett (11.0)
- The 28 players have combined to post 171.0 TFLs over their careers; 120.5 of those stops in the backfield were made in a Michigan uniform
- 18 players have combined to register 79.0 sacks during their collegiate careers: Stewart (4.5 at U-M; 16.0 at CC), Jaylen Harrell (10.0), Goode (2.0 at U-M; 6.0 at UCF), Barrett (7.5), Mason Graham (5.5), Derrick Moore (5.0), Braidon McGregor (4.0), Kris Jenkins (3.5), Mike Sainristil (3.0), Kenneth Grant (2.5), Colson (2.5), T.J. Guy (2.0), Rayshaun Benny (1.0), Makari Paige (1.0), Ernest Hausmann (1.0 at UN), Josh Wallace (1.0 at UMass), Keon Sabb (0.5) and Rod Moore (0.5)
- 15 Wolverines have collected interceptions in their career, led by Mike Sainristil (6), Rod Moore (6), Will Johnson (6), Keon Sabb (2) and Mike Barrett (2): Grant, Goode, Paige, Jenkins, McBurrows, Quinten Johnson and Caden Kolesar have each collected one pick
- Sainristil leads the team with 18 career passes defended: 12 breakups and six interceptions
- 21 players have collected at least one pass defended in their career: Sainristil (17), R. Moore (9), W. Johnson (7), Goode (5), McGregor (5), Wallace (4), Q. Johnson (4), Barrett (4), Colson (3), Paige (3), Grant (3), D. Moore (3), Harrell (2), Sabb (2), Kolesar (2), Hood (1), Green (1), Harris (1), Graham (1), Benny (1), Walker (1), Waller (1) and McBurrows (1); Goode had four PBUs at UCF
- Six Wolverines have scooped up an opponent fumble: Barrett (2), D. Moore, Colson, Graham and Paige on defense and Velazquez and Matt Hibner on special teams
- Derrick Moore scored the team's only fumble return for a touchdown on a 4-yard recovery at Maryland
- Sainristil (2), Barrett, Sabb and Will Johnson have scored defensive touchdowns during their career
- Nine defenders have started double-digit career games: Colson (33), Sainristil (33), Barrett (32), Jenkins (30), Harrell (27), R. Moore (25), Paige (17), McGregor (15) and W. Johnson (14)

Nation's Best Scoring Defense

- The Wolverines lead the nation in scoring defense (10.3 avg.) this season
- U-M has yielded less than 10 points in eight games this season, including seven of those contests allowing less than seven points
- Opponents are averaging 0.18 points per play, the lowest rate in the nation

- The Maize and Blue gained its first shutout of 2023 with a 49-0 win at Michigan State
- Michigan yielded less than 10 points in each of its first eight games this season; this was the longest such streak by any U-M team since 1972
- Michigan has allowed 21 scores (14 TDs, 8 FGs) in 130 possessions by the opposition; four of those drives started in Michigan territory with only three gaining points on two field goals by Purdue and another field goal by Bowling Green
- The Wolverines are yielded just 0.946 points per possession by the opposition
- Overall, the defense has allowed just 123 points on the season
- It was the first time since 1941 in which the Wolverines have held each of their first five opponents to seven points or fewer

Wolverines Lead the NCAA in Total Defense

- Michigan leads the nation in total defense, allowing just 246.8 yards per contest
- The Wolverines have held the opposition to less than 250 yards in eight games: ECU (235), UNLV (229), BGSU (203), Minnesota (169), Indiana (232), Michigan State (190) and Penn State (238)
- Ohio State gained a season-high 378 yards against Michigan
- Overall, the defense has yielded just 2,961 yards on 672 offensive plays
- U-M is allowing an average of 4.4 yards per play, including a stingy 3.0 yards per rush and 6.0 yards per pass play
- 41 defensive players have recorded at least one tackle this season, including 18 players with at least 20 stops on the year

U-M Run Wall Holding Opposition

- Michigan's run defense has been one of the nation's best this season, ranking sixth nationally and second in the Big Ten
- The defense is yielding just 91.4 yards per game
- U-M has limited the opposition to 1,097 yards on 363 carries, allowing just 3.0 yards per carry
- Michigan has registered 307 negative yards on 68 tackles for loss
- Michigan has held four opponents to less than 80 rushing yards and five total teams to fewer than 100 yards: UNLV (61), BGSU (81), Rutgers (77), Indiana (92), Michigan State (57) and Maryland (15)
- Penn State gained a season-high 164 yards on the ground against the defense
- The only rushing touchdowns allowed by the Wolverines came against UNLV, Nebraska, Penn State, Maryland (3) and Ohio State

Stingy Pass Defense

- The pass defense has been one of the best in college football, listing fourth in the NCAA in pass defense (155.3 avg.) while listing sixth in pass efficiency (102.2 rating)
- The opposition has thrown for just 1,864 yards on 168-of-309 passing with seven touchdowns and 16 interceptions
- U-M allows just 6.0 yards per pass attempt
- The only teams to score passing touchdowns against the Wolverines were Rutgers (69 yards), Minnesota (35), Indiana (44), Purdue (24), Penn State (8) and Ohio State (14)
- Michigan has held six opponents to less than

150 passing yards: ECU (132), BGSU (124), Minnesota (52), Indiana (140), Michigan State (133), Purdue (144) and Penn State (74)  
 • The defense has intercepted 16 passes and accumulated 39 pass breakups

## Defense Make Stops in Opponent's Backfield

- Michigan has accumulated 311 negative yards on 68 tackles for loss this season
- The defense recorded a season-high 10 tackles for loss in two games -- UNLV and BGSU -- and had a conference-best nine TFLs at Michigan State
- In addition, the Wolverines have registered 29 sacks this fall, with 13 players chipping in at least a share of a sack
- 24 players have contributed to the team's 68 tackles for loss this season
- Jaylen Harrell and Josaiah Stewart lead the team in TFLs (6.5) while Harrell leads the squad with 5.5 sacks
- The defense is 64th nationally in tackles for loss (5.7 avg.) and 38th in sacks (2.42 avg.)

## Dominant Third Quarter Defense

- Michigan has yielded just 21 points in the third quarter this season and didn't allow any points in the first 10 games during the third stanza
- Maryland scored the first points on the defense on a pair of third quarter touchdowns and Ohio State added a touchdown
- The opposition has possessed the ball 34 times during the third quarter against the Wolverines and only tallied three TDs while the defense set up Michigan's offense with scoring opportunities to the tune of 129 points
- The defense has even got into the scoring column with three pick-sixes in the third quarter: Mike Sainristil's 71-yard interception return for a touchdown against Rutgers, Keon Sabb's 28 interception return for a score at Minnesota and Sainristil's 72-yard return at Michigan State
- U-M did not allow its opponents to score on its first 29 possessions of the third quarter this fall
- The defense has forced 19 three-and-outs in those 34 series during the third frame
- Only eight opponent possessions have moved across midfield, and they ended with three turnovers on downs, an interception a missed field goal and the three TDs

## Second Half Defense

- The Wolverines have been a dominant second-half defense, allowing just 58 points on 57 possessions (1.02 points per possession)
- The only points yielded by the defense came on touchdowns by Ohio State in the third and fourth quarter, two third quarter touchdowns by Maryland and in the fourth quarter on a field goal by East Carolina and touchdowns by UNLV, Nebraska and Penn State
- U-M has yielded only 21 points in the third quarter and has allowed only 37 points in the fourth quarter
- Michigan has held five opponents scoreless in the second half: Michigan State, Indiana, Minnesota, Rutgers and Bowling Green
- The defense has forced 13 turnovers in the final 30 minutes, intercepting nine passes and recovering four fumbles; the defense has scored

three pick-sixes and recorded a safety  
 • The Wolverines forced 27 punts by the opposition in the second half and ended nine (9) drives with fourth down stops  
 • U-M held two opponents to less than 65 yards in the second half: Minnesota (31 plays, 61 yards) and Minnesota (23 plays, 37 yards)

## Forcing 3-and-outs

- Michigan has limited its opponents to three plays or less on 47 percent of their possessions this season
- The defense has forced 43 three-and-outs by the opposition in 126 possessions
- In addition, the Wolverines have stopped 14 drives on turnovers within three plays of series: two against Bowling Green, Minnesota, Indiana and Maryland and one against East Carolina, Nebraska, Michigan State, Purdue and Ohio State; U-M also forced a safety at Maryland
- U-M has forced at least three (3) three-and-outs in 10 of the 12 games this season, including six against Purdue and five at Minnesota and Michigan State
- The Wolverines had seven possessions with three or less plays against the Gophers, including two pick-sixes, and also seven against the Boilermakers
- The defense has forced 23 three-and-outs during the first half and 20 three-and-outs during the second half; 17 of the 20 during the second half have come during the third quarter

## EDGE

- Seven edge defenders have seen game action during their careers
- Jaylen Harrell leads the group in games played (43) and starting assignments (27) in a Michigan uniform; Josaiah Stewart made 17 starts at Coastal Carolina
- Harrell also paces the edge performers in career tackles (73), tackles for loss (17.5) and sacks (10.0) while tying for second in PBUs (2)
- Three of the edge players have made starts during their career: Harrell (27) and Braiden McGregor (15); Stewart started 17 games at Coastal Carolina
- Six players have registered 44.0 tackles in the opposition's backfield during their Michigan careers: Harrell (17.5), McGregor (10.5), Derrick Moore (6.0), Stewart (6.5), T.J. Guy (2.5) and Kechaun Bennett (1.0); Stewart also amassed 25.5 TFLs in two years at Coastal Carolina
- 58 percent (25.5 of 44.0) of those stops have been sacks: Harrell (9.0), McGregor (4.0), Moore (5.0), Stewart (4.0) and Guy (2.0); Stewart also had 16.0 sacks at CC
- McGregor (5), Moore (3) and Harrell (2) are the only players to record pass breakups

## Jaylen Harrell

- Two-time Academic All-Big Ten (2021-22)
- 2022 All-Big Ten honorable mention
- Played in 43 career games and made 27 starting assignments; accumulated 73 tackles, 17.5 tackles for loss, 9.0 sacks, two forced fumbles and two pass breakups during his career
- Started all 12 games in 2023; tallied 26 tackles, 6.5 TFLs, 5.5 sacks and two forced fumbles

## U-M'S DEFENSE UNDER HARBAUGH

- Michigan has ranked in the top 10 nationally in total defense five times, including four times in the top four in the country: No. 4 (2015), No. 1 (2016), No. 3 (2017) and No. 2 (2018) and No. 6 (2022); currently the No. 2 defense in the country
- The Wolverines' pass defense has been among the nation's top three in four seasons: No. 3 (2015), No. 1 (2016), No. 1 (2017), No. 2 (2018)
- U-M led the nation in pass efficiency defense in 2015, finished second in 2016 and ranked among the top 10 a total of five times; also placed fourth in 2017, fifth in 2022 and seventh in 2018
- The Wolverines have held 43 of their 111 opponents under Harbaugh to 10 points or less, including seven shutouts
- Only 41 opponents have managed to score 20 or more points against Michigan
- U-M has 20 defensive touchdowns: 1 (2015, 2020, 2021), 2 (2022), 3 (2016, 2017) and 4 (2018) and 5 (2023)
- The defense has held the opposition to 100 rushing yards or less in 51 of the 111 games
- The Wolverines have posted 711 tackles for loss: 68 (2023), 73 (2022), 72 (2021), 20 (2020), 79 (2019), 76 (2018), 114 (2017), 121 (2016) and 88 (2015)
- Quarterbacks have been sacked 299 times: 29 (2023), 37 (2022), 34 (2021), 9 (2020), 36 (2019), 34 (2018), 42 (2017), 46 (2016) and 32 (2015)
- Michigan led the nation in third down defense in consecutive seasons (2016-17); set a school record in 2016 by allowing the opponent to convert just 21 percent on third down and followed up by allowing the opposition to convert just 26.1 percent of its chances in 2017
- Only 17 opponents have converted more than six third-down chances against Michigan since 2016; held 18 opponents with two or less third down conversions over the past nine seasons
- Michigan has finished in the top five nationally in three-and-outs forced on two occasions: first nationally in 2017 (83 in 162 series, 51.2%) and fourth in 2016 (73 in 164 possessions, 44.5%)

## A LOOK BACK AT THE 2022 DEFENSE

- U-M listed top 30 nationally in nine categories
- Michigan finished fifth in the NCAA in pass efficiency defense, sixth in total defense and seventh in rushing defense, scoring defense and fourth down defense
- U-M finished seventh nationally in scoring defense at 16.1 points per game; held eight opponents to 14 points or less, including six to less than 10 points
- The defense allowed 225 points on the year, yielding only 21 TDs (10 rushing, 11 passing) and 17 FGs
- The defense gave up just 292.1 yards per game, the sixth-best mark in the NCAA; 4,090 yards on 879 plays
- The Wolverines held seven opponents under 255 yards of total offense: Colorado State (219), Hawaii (253), UConn (110), Indiana (222), Michigan State (252), Rutgers (180) and Nebraska (146)
- The run defense ranked seventh in the NCAA, yielding just 97.9 yards per contest
- Michigan's opponents gained 1,371 yards on 421 carries, allowing just 3.3 yards per carry
- U-M held eight opponents to less than 100 rushing yards, including four Big Ten teams to less than 40 yards: Iowa (35), Indiana (19), MSU (37) and Rutgers (14)
- 37 defenders recorded at least one stop in 2022
- 20 players helped amass 73 TFLs, with 15 of those individuals contributing to the team's sack total (37)
- The Wolverines made a season-high 11 tackles for loss and seven sacks against Colorado State; also accumulated seven sacks at Indiana
- Michigan was second in the Big Ten and ranked 34th nationally in sacks per contest (2.64 avg.)
- The Wolverines boasted one of the nation's best pass defenses, ranking fifth in pass efficiency (107.58 rating) and 20th in passing yards allowed (194.2 avg.)
- The opposition completed just 55.9 percent of their passes (256-458) for 2,719 yards and 11 touchdowns with 14 interceptions
- U-M held four opponents to less than 150 passing yards, including a mere 24 yards by UConn
- The 11 passing TDs yielded by the defense were tied for the sixth fewest nationally
- The defense intercepted 14 passes, accumulated 61 total passes defended (47 PBUs, 14 Ints.) • The Wolverines collected a season-best three interceptions at Rutgers and batted down a season-high seven passes at Ohio State
- U-M allowed only 34 trips inside the red zone, yielding just 28 scores (82.4%, 15 TDs and 13 FGs)
- The defense forced the opposition to move long distance to score, with 17 of the 25 touchdown drives requiring 75-plus yards
- U-M was dominant in second half, allowing just 104 points on 85 possessions (1.22 points per possession)
- Six of the final nine opponents did not score in the fourth quarter; only points during that stretch came by Ohio State (1 FG), Purdue (2 FGs) and TCU (1 TD, 1 FG)
- U-M held five opponents scoreless in the second half: Nebraska, Rutgers, Michigan State, Indiana and UConn
- U-M gained 18 turnovers (14 interceptions and four fumble recoveries), with 17 on defense and one on kickoff coverage; forced a season-high three turnovers against Maryland, Rutgers and TCU
- CB D.J. Turner and LB Michael Barrett had the team's only defensive scores; Turner had a 45-yard fumble return against Colorado State and Barrett returned an interception 31 yards for the score at Rutgers
- The defense forced the opposition into 50 three-and-outs; does not include multiple series that ended in turnovers of less than three plays

- Pressured the quarterback on the game-ending pick that secured the win over Ohio State
- Registered one sack at Maryland
- Equaled his career high with five tackles at Penn State, including one sack
- Assisted on two tackles against Purdue, Nebraska and ECU
- Made two sacks and forced one fumble against Indiana
- Tallied three stops and one TFL at Minnesota
- Registered one sack among two stops and forced a fumble vs. Bowling Green
- Recorded a career-best five stops against UNLV, including 1.5 sacks
- Started 12 games and played in 13 contests during the 2022 season; tallied a career-best 30 stops, 7.5 TFLs, 3.5 sacks and two PBUs
- Registered two sacks against Purdue in the Big Ten Championship Game
- Contributed 15 tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss in 14 games of action during the 2021 season
- Started three games at outside linebacker
- Matched career-best with four stops against Georgia in the CFP Semifinal at the Orange Bowl
- Posted a career-high four tackles and one TFL in start against Iowa in the Big Ten Championship Game
- Made his first career start vs. Northern Illinois, assisting on three tackles and a tackle for loss
- Played in four games during the 2020 season, assisting on two tackles

- Assisted on a tackle for loss vs. Bowling Green
- Posted a career-best five stops including 1.5 tackles for loss against UNLV
- Made two tackles against East Carolina
- Played on the edge in 13 games and on special teams in all 14 contests during the 2022 season; started three games at edge
- Registered 17 stops, 5.0 TFLs, 2.5 sacks and two pass breakups in 2022
- Played on the edge in consecutive College Football Playoff games (2021-22)
- Made two stops in start against Purdue in the Big Ten Championship Game
- Tallied a tackle for loss and a career-best two PBUs at Ohio State
- Registered one sack at Indiana and against Michigan State
- Made first career start against UConn, tallying a career-high four tackles
- Contributed at defensive end in nine games during the 2021 season; tallied five tackles and one tackle for loss
- Registered three tackles against Northwestern, including first career TFL
- Made career debut vs. Western Michigan, assisting on a tackle

- Missed the 2020 COVID season after rehabbing from injury sustained in high school

### Derrick Moore

- Appeared in all 12 games this season
- Leads all edge defenders with 31 tackles, including 4.0 tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and two pass breakups
- Tallied four tackles and one pass breakup against Ohio State
- Scored first points on a 4-yard fumble recovery for a touchdown at Maryland; added two tackles
- Made two solo tackles against Purdue and Penn State
- Recorded four stops, including one sack, at Michigan State
- Tallied two tackles against Indiana and three stops at Minnesota
- Registered three tackles, one sack, one forced fumble and one PBU at Nebraska
- Set career high with five tackles and one TFL vs. Rutgers
- Contributed one solo stop vs. Bowling Green
- Recorded one sack against UNLV
- Made two solo tackles against ECU
- Played on the edge in all 14 games during the 2022 season, contributing eight tackles, two sacks and one pass breakup
- Collected one solo tackle and first career PBU vs. Purdue in the Big Ten Championship Game

SPECIAL TEAMS

A Look at the 2023 Special Teams

- Jay Harbaugh is in his fourth season as the program's Special Teams Coordinator after serving as an assistant the prior five seasons on staff
- The Wolverines return long snappers William Wagner and Greg Tarr from the 2022 corps of specialists; Wagner started 25 consecutive games prior to a season-ending injury at Iowa in 2022 and Tarr made nine starts to end the 2022 season
- Tommy Doman has been the team's backup punter, placekicker and kickoff specialist the past two seasons (2021-22)
- Doman is the only returning Michigan player that has punted, attempted a PAT or kicked off in a game for Michigan
- U-M added a pair of transfer specialists in kickers James Turner (Louisville) and Hudson Hollenbeck (Mississippi State)

Special Teams Play under Harbaugh

- Michigan had two specialists win national awards: Jake Moody (2021 Groza Award) and Jabrill Peppers (2016 Hornung Award)
- Three U-M specialists have been named the top performer in the Big Ten at their position: Jake Moody (2021 and 2021 Bakken-Anderson Kicker of the Year), Will Hart (2018 Eddleman-Field Punter of the Year) and Jabrill Peppers (2016 Rodgers-Dwight Return Specialist of the Year)
- Moody finished his career as Michigan's all-time leading scorer with 355 points; tallied a school record 147 points in 2022
- Moody holds 13 schools records for kicking -- game, season or career marks
- The Wolverines have converted 160-195 field goals (82%) and 436-444 point-after-attempts
- U-M has 409 touchbacks on 729 kickoffs
- Michigan has punted the ball three or less times in 51 games, including four contests where the team did not attempt a punt: Hawaii (2016), Maryland (2016), Northern Illinois (2021) and Penn State (2022)
- The Wolverines have downed 154 punts inside the opposition's 20-yard line
- U-M has 21 blocks in the nine seasons that Coach Harbaugh has led the program
- Michigan led the Big Ten and finished second nationally with seven blocked kicks in 2016: one PAT, two FGs and four punts; an additional three punts were deflected and rolled for positive yards while another opponent punt hit into the back of its own player
- Led the NCAA with four blocked punts in 2016
- Michigan has scored 10 touchdowns on returns during Harbaugh's tenure, scoring five times on kickoffs and five times on punt returns

Tommy Doman

- 2022 Academic All-Big Ten
- Has punted 36 times for a 45.0-yard average this season; had 18 fair caught and 14 downed inside the opposition's 20-yard line
- Tied for third at Michigan in season punting average at 45.03 yards per punt
- Averaging 4.37 seconds of hangtime per punt, the best in the Big Ten and second-best average of any punter in the country

## 2022 SPECIAL TEAMS HIGHLIGHTS

- Jake Moody was a finalist for the 2022 Lou Groza Award after becoming the school's first-ever winner of the award in 2021
- Moody won the 2021 Bakken-Andersen Big Ten Kicker of the Year award for the second straight season and earned All-Big Ten first team honors
- Moody collected second-team All-American honors from the Walter Camp Football Foundation, American Football Coaches Association and Associated Press
- Brad Robbins was a semifinalist for the 2021 Ray Guy Award and was a candidate for this year's award
- Moody was second in the NCAA in total points scored with a school record 147 and was also second in scoring at 10.5 points per game
- Moody set U-M records in field goals scored (29), field goals attempted (35), PATs scored and attempted (60) and 40-yard-plus field goals (10)
- In addition, Moody set the school record with a 59-yard field goal against TCU in the Fiesta Bowl, breaking the previous mark of 57 yards
- Moody scored more than 10 points in nine of the 14 games

- The Wolverines allowed just 640 return yards on 39 returns (punts, kickoffs and interceptions); average of 16.41 yards per return
- Michigan blocked a punt and returned a punt for a touchdown against UConn
- U-M was sixth in the conference and 36th nationally with two blocks: Caden Kolesar on a punt vs. UConn and Mike Morris on a field goal attempt at Indiana

## 2022 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- The Wolverines listed No. 3 in the final rankings for the second straight season; the only other times that Michigan ranked in the top 5 of the polls in consecutive seasons was 1947 and 1948, when it captured back-to-back national championships, and 1940 (No. 3) and 1941 (No. 5).
- U-M won its league-leading 44th conference title and played in the College Football Playoff for the second time.
- Michigan won 13 games for the first time in school history, surpassing the previous mark of 12 wins attained during the 1905, 1997 and 2021 seasons.
- Center Olu Oluwatimi and running back Blake Corum earned consensus All-America honors. Edge Mike Morris and kicker Jake Moody earned second-team All-America.
- Oluwatimi won the Outland Trophy as the nation's top interior lineman and the Rimington Trophy as the top center in college football.
- Corum finished seventh in the Heisman Trophy balloting and won the Chicago Tribune Silver Football as the Big Ten's MVP as voted by the conference coaches. He was also a finalist for the Doak Walker Award as the nation's top running back.
- The offensive line won the Joe Moore Award as the nation's top unit for the second straight season.
- Corum was named the Big Ten's Running Back of the Year, Mike Morris was voted the Big Ten's Defensive Lineman of the Year and Moody was selected as the Big Ten's Kicker of the Year for the second straight season.
- U-M had 15 players (8 offense, 5 defense, 2 special teams) recognized with first, second or team all-conference accolades this season and seven Wolverines collected honorable mention honors.
- Michigan was led by seven players earning first-team All-Big Ten honors: Blake Corum, Trevor Keegan, Jake Moody, Olu Oluwatimi, Mike Morris, Mazi Smith and Zak Zinter.
- The Wolverines outscored the opposition 566 to 225 margin, finishing sixth in the NCAA in scoring offense (40.4 ppg.) and seventh in scoring defense (16.1 ppg.).
- Moody was second in the nation and set the Michigan season record with 147 points on the year. A finalist for the Lou Groza Award, Moody set program season records in 2022 for field goals scored (29), field goals attempted (35), PATs scored and attempted (60) and 40-yard-plus field goals (10).
- Moody became the U-M's all-time leading scorer with 355 points, hitting 69-84 field goals and all 148 PATs.
- Right guard Zak Zinter earned Academic All-America second team honors.
- Michigan matched its program record with 60 Academic All-Big performers this fall.
- Jim Harbaugh was named the Big Ten's Coach of the Year and defensive coordinator Jesse Minter was a finalist for the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach.

## Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2023 (96 Years)

The football program is in its 96th season in the "Big House" in 2022, with a 458-133-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capacity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 44 times of the past 47 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 315 consecutive games; the current streak was paused when health officials and government agencies limited fans at sporting events during the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

**CAPACITY:** 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

**COMPLETION:** 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators. Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

**FIRST GAME:** October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

**DEDICATION GAME:** October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0.

**REDEDICATION GAME:** September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

**ATTENDANCE:** Since 1927, 53,727,298 fans have watched the Wolverines play at Michigan Stadium. Stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

**FIELD:** 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

## 100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 315 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000; current streak was paused when health officials and government agencies limited fans at sporting events during the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

## MICHIGAN'S NFL FACTS AND INFORMATION

- Michigan had 59 players participating in 2023 NFL training camps
- A total of 53 Wolverines have been drafted during Coach Jim Harbaugh's tenure, including nine (9) first-round picks and 25 players chosen in the first three rounds
- During Harbaugh's tenure, Michigan has had 61 participants in the NFL Combine, including a record 14 players in 2017 and 11 in 2020
- Michigan is the only school to have a player selected in every NFL Draft; 85 consecutive selection meetings with a Wolverine chosen
- Since the inaugural draft in 1938, a total of 401 Michigan players have been selected; ranks fifth-best all-time among college programs
- A total of 60 players have been chosen in the first round of the professional draft: 52 NFL, 5 AAFC and 3 AFL
- Tom Harmon (1941) and Jake Long (2008) were the first overall picks in the NFL Draft
- U-M has had a first round pick six of the past seven drafts, including multiple first round selection in three of those drafts

## Jim Harbaugh

### J. Ira and Nicki Harris Family Head Football Coach

### 83-25 Record at Michigan; 62-17 Big Ten Record

Now in his ninth year as head coach, Jim Harbaugh has led Michigan to back-to-back Big Ten Championships and College Football Playoff appearances (2021-22).

U-M won a school record 13 games in 2022, surpassing the 12-win seasons attained by the 1905, 1997 and 2021 teams. The Wolverines listed No. 3 in the final national polls for the second straight season which was only the third time in school history where the program finished in the top 5 in consecutive years.

Overall, Harbaugh has guided the Wolverines to an 83-25 record and is 62-17 in Big Ten games. He has led U-M to six 10-win seasons and seven bowl games, including consecutive College Football Playoff Semifinal appearances (2021-22), two New Year's Six bowls and three additional New Year's Day bowl games. His teams have finished the season ranked in the national polls on six occasions, including three finishes in the top 10.

Thirteen Wolverines have secured 18 All-America honors under Harbaugh, including nine consensus honorees: Devin Bush, Jake Butt, Maurice Hurst, Jourdan Lewis, Jabrill Peppers, Aidan Hutchinson, Jake Moody, Blake Corum and Olu Oluwatimi. Hutchinson (second place, 2021) and Peppers (fifth place, 2016) were also Heisman Trophy finalists while Corum finished seventh in the 2022 balloting.

Five players have won major awards during Harbaugh's tenure: Butt (2016 Mackey Award, Senior CLASS Award), Peppers (2016 Lott IMPACT Trophy and Paul Hornung Award), Hutchinson (2021 Rotary Lombardi Award, Ted Hendricks Award, Lott IMPACT Trophy), Moody (2021 Lou Groza Award) and Oluwatimi (2022 Outland Trophy and Rimington Trophy). A total of 95 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors, with 30 players earning first-team all-conference honors. A record 16 players collected All-Big Ten honors in 2016 and 15 Wolverines received the honor during the 2018, 2019, 2021 and 2022 seasons. In the classroom, Michigan has totaled 344 Academic All-Big Ten honors, including a program-record 60 in 2021 and 2022.

During Harbaugh's tenure, Michigan has produced three of the five most-productive offensive seasons in school history. U-M has had a top-12 national defense in six seasons and a top-three unit on three occasions.

Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in Michigan football history on Dec. 30, 2014. He became the sixth Michigan football player selected to lead college football's winningest program.

Harbaugh came to Ann Arbor after a four-year run in the NFL with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the NFC title in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record, including 5-3 in the postseason.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular-season record and the NFC Championship Game in 2011, his first season,

earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular-season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only matchup of brothers as head coaches in NFL history.

At the collegiate level, Harbaugh spent three years at the University of San Diego (2004-06) and four years at Stanford (2007-10). He turned around a Cardinal program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory in 2010. In his debut as a head coach, Harbaugh led San Diego to a 29-6 record in three seasons.

He spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the Oakland Raiders' quarterbacks coach, assisting the team to Super Bowl XXXVII.

Harbaugh began preparing for a coaching career during his professional playing days, spending eight years as an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001).

As an NFL quarterback, Harbaugh played for five organizations in his 15-year career (1987-2001). He threw for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games and made 140 career starts. He was the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. In 2005, he was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor.

As a Wolverine, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished runner-up the following year. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for more than 12 years.

In 1986, Harbaugh won the "Chicago Tribune" Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, was a first-team All-American and finished third in Heisman Trophy voting.

The first Michigan quarterback to throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin), Harbaugh also eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against Michigan State and Ohio State. During his college career, he completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns; all four statistical categories still list among the top 12

in school history.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and two sons, Jack and John. He also has three adult children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.
